**NEWS AND COMMENTS**

NGC---The dictator of Panama must have given Jimmy Carter ten easy lessons in how to become a dictator during the president's recent visit to the focal point of his (and the U.S. Senate's) canal give-away. Carter is complaining about the power held by Congress to clamp legislative vetoes on the executive branch decisions and regulations by a majority vote of the Senate or House. A lot of the "decisions" and "regulations" coming from the executive branch are hatched up by Cabinet members and/or Aides, all appointed by the president. Carter's good old Georgia buddy, Attorney General Griffin Bell, is taking the Chief's side in the confrontation with Congress.

NGC---Beginning July 20th, or soon thereafter, don't complain to your food store people if you find pepper-size flakes of bone in hot dogs, canned spaghetti and meatballs, sausage, scrapple (?) and meat sauce. The USDA has approved this salvaged meat-bone mixture. Read the label. If it has it, must say it contains the bone and salvaged meat mixture.

NGC---Welcome back to Mrs. Nona Tucker, who moved to Colorado several months ago, and to Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Galloway, who are moving back to Abernathy from Dublin, Texas. Mrs. Tucker is a longtime Abernathy resident. The Galloways are former New Deal residents, who also resided in Abernathy more than 15 years before moving to Dublin. Mr. Galloway is a former school bus foreman at New Deal and Abernathy Schools. We are happy to have these three fine people "back home" in Abernathy.

NGC---Washington giveth and Washington taketh away! After the American Agriculture organization's strike effort last year and early this year finally got the attention of the big wigs in WDC, a farm bill of sorts was passed that gave the farmer some relief. WDC taketh away by increasing imports of beef, which will hurt the ranchers and the farmers that grow the cattle feed.

NGC---Washington giveth and Washington taketh away! Several months ago, a Social Security law was passed to give widowers with children the same benefits that long have been available to widows with children. WDC taketh away: When the benefit to widowers became law, working women on Social Security were the losers. Before the "widower" law, women could retire at age

62 and draw full Social Security benefits. Now, if they retire at 62, they will not draw full benefits. Women must work to age 65 to draw the maximum benefits due them under Social Security.

NGC---Washington giveth and Washington taketh away! USDA upped the cotton loan rate from four cents a pound from last year... OSHA's stringent "cotton dust rules" will be costly to the cotton industry, ranging from the ginning process to the textile spinning mills, which will be the hardest hit. It is feared that some spinning mills may close down rather than face the excessive high cost of satisfying OSHA rules. Also worrying the cotton producer is the possibility of spinning mills turning to synthetics.

NGC---Austin also has a giveth and taketh away syndrome. Being considered is a special session of the Texas Legislature to deal with tax reductions in the state. Sounds good. But, some of the tax reductions mentioned will bring about an increase in state college and university tuition and fees. Some of the tax reduction proposals will benefit the rich at the expense of the middle income families that are struggling to keep one or more students in college even at the present rate of tuition and fees.

NGC---Shortly after Californians voted for Proposition 13, I predicted that it would bring about chaos. After reading the nitty-gritty of Prop. 13, I believe conditions in that state will be even more chaotic than I first thought. Singling out one phase of 13: real estate sales people stand to damage on this point: when the low tax goes on homes, businesses, buildings and industrial property it will last only until the property changes ownership, then the tax will be raised to the level it was before Prop. 13.

NGC---Getting old is not so bad... when you consider the alternative. And, there are a few more compensations along the way on the downhill path. Such as: being called "grandad"; not being faked by the 55 mph speed limit, which was made-to-order for older drivers; not having to cringe when you read about next year's new model car going up in price... price went beyond my ability to buy a new car several years ago; not having to worry (if you are on Social Security) if FDIC drops back to its original limits of \$10,000 on bank deposits; certain IRS breaks for 65 or over; and, by age 65, your tours of jury duties are behind you.

NGC---U. S. Senator John Tower, Rep., will have an uphill battle to retain his office. Recent publicity in the hearings on the Tongue Park investigation will hurt his chance of re-election even though he may be completely innocent of wrongdoing.

NGC---"Aid benefits rich in Bangladesh, report says" was a headline in recent issue of the A/J. Tax cuts in the U.S. usually help the rich more than the white and blue collar workers, who provide the largest percent of the federal tax money. The promised federal tax relief proposal to cut taxes on capital gains will be of little help for the middle income taxpayers. Reports in the media about some millionaires not having to pay federal income tax leads one to believe that you have to be very rich or very poor to escape IRS.

NGC---Non-smokers are becoming militant in their battle against smoking in public places and conveyances. Airlines now segregate smokers and non-smokers by placing the smokers in the back of the airplane. Mrs. BFD, a non-smoker, goes with me to the back of the plane, but is worried by the noise on certain make planes with the engines in the rear, such as three engines on the tail of Boeing's 727, two on the DC-9 and one tail engine on the DC-10 and on L-1011. The latter two aircraft have one engine on each wing in addition to the tail engine. I believe the non-smokers have a right to complain. Smoking is a costly, filthy habit, and second-hand smoke is even more filthy. Even though I do, there's nothing good to be said about smoking.

NGC---The first new car that Dan Blocker (Hoss Cartwright) ever owned may be in Abernathy's Fourth of July Parade Tuesday. It belongs to Don Heath of Don's Chevrolet, Inc., and has been on storage in Abernathy since Don came here from Lubbock to take over the Chevrolet dealership several years ago. It is a 1948 Plymouth coupe, which Don acquired while in the car business in Lubbock. Written on the space back of the front seat is: "My First New Car. Dan Blocker." Don went to the court house in Tahoka and obtained copies of title and registration which verify that the Blocker ownership claim is authentic. Blocker grew up in O'Donnell near Tahoka. The vintage Plymouth has about 56,000 miles on the odometer. Don has driven it 600 or 700 miles since he bought it just to keep it operational.

They will attend the 31st Annual Reunion of Rudolph's World War II outfit, the 52nd Navy Construction Battalion, August 4-5-6. Rudolph has missed only two of the reunions, the first one, and the one 1971. Rudolph and family were in Japan attending a World Boy Scout gathering when the 1971 reunion was held. Since the sons were born, they have accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Struve to every reunion except two.

Now, the cow chip has come full circle, and again is heating and cooking. The current cow chip role is providing fuel in a more sophisticated manner. A plant near an extra large feedlot operation at Guymon, Okla., is taking the cattle feedlot waste and processing it into methane gas and piping it to cities in the northeast. TV showed a Chicago housewife cooking with the methane gas piped from Guymon.
