

Notice Given For In-Town Traffic On Highway Work

HIGHWAY DEPT. REPORT LUBBOCK---- The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation announces that due to construction on the Frontage Roads in Interstate Highway 27 (US 87) thru Abernathy, it will be necessary to change the Stop Signs at the intersection of FM 597 and Interstate Highway 27 (US 87) Frontage Road and Main Street and Instate Highway 27 (Us 87)

Frontage Road. Effective Thursday, July 6, 1978 and for two weeks until July 20, 1978, there will be a four (4) way stop at the intersection of FM 597 with Interstate Highway 27 (US 87) Frontage Road, and Main Street and Interstate Highway 27 (US 87) Frontage Road. After this two week period, FM 597 and Main Street will remain a stop situation and the Frontage Road stop signs

removed. This traffic control pattern will remain in effect until the Interstate Highway 27 is completed and Main Lane traffic is returned to the Main Lanes.

Mitch has compiled an outstanding coaching record in all sports including tennis, golf, football, boys basketball as well as girls basketball and track. From 1963 to 1969, coached girls basketball at Abemathy High School with a record of 135 wins, 57 losses. At Waco Midway High School, his eight-year record was 264 wins and 17 losses with 92 consecutive victories and three state championships, one state finalist and one state semifinalist. His girls mile relay team won state four times and the 1973 team set a national record for being the first team to break 4 minutes. His track team won the state championship in 1975. He served as president of the Texas High School Girls Coaches Association in 1969 and coached the South All-Stars in 1973. In 1975 he was selected Coach of the Year by the Waco
