NEW OFFICE LOCATION FOR FRONTIER SAVINGS ASSOCIATION

A completely new modern savings and loan facility to be located at 7th & Avenue D in Abernathy was announced today by Dorothy (Tommye) Lane, Abernathy manager for Frontier Savings Association. Country Peddler Antiques Opens Here

Abernathy men gather at Graham's to chat and visit with friends. Ann Thickett hopes the Country Peddler Antique Shop will be that kind of gathering place for Abernathy women.

The shop opened Thursday, August 24 in a charming old house on Ave. D just across the street west from Higginbotham Bartlett Lumber Co. It's bright, comfortable, inviting house with none of the dusty, slightly spooky and depressing "old" atmosphere of many antique shops. Touring it is like visiting someone's well cared for home.

Ann says the house has old age problems but possesses more than enough character to make up for them. She feels quite at home there and enjoys its busy downtown location.

The Thicketts always dreamed of owning an antique shop and when arthritis ended Ann's career as a musician, they decided to use the unhappy circumstance to make the dream come true. They searched a long time for the right place in Lubbock and Idalou as well as Abernathy.

They often eyed 1005 Ave. D but it was always occupied. Then one day after hearing the Thicketts talk about the house, a friend passed by and noticed a "For Sale" sign that had been put out only hours before. They snapped it up and began two months of clean up, repairs, and painting inside and out, trying always to preserve the traits of the house which the house was built.

They aren't nearly finished yet. Ann will make curtains as she has time. They plan to gravel the north side of the property to make off-street parking and to redo the two out-building behind the house. She plans in the future to carry gift items, candles, needle work kits, and perhaps yarn. She'd also like to have quilts, rag dolls, and other fine handwork on consignment.

The place could offer business opportunities for others too. A back bedroom is plenty large enough for some-

one else's shop and the out buildings, which had shops in them in past years, can someday be used again.

The house was built sometime between 1914 and 1920 by Homer Rantz, father of Hilbert Rantz. Rantz was a carpenter who constructed many of the first houses in Abernathy. An old timer says the Thompson boys, including Mayor Pete, used to play under the house when they lived there as very small boys.

The house was acquired by J. C. Woodbridge Lumber Company which became Higginbotham Bartlett. It housed the lumber yard managers and their families. Hugh Vaughn, a former manager, says it's a well built house but getting pretty old now. He moved his family into it in 1947 and built two more rooms onto the back. During renovation, his mother-in-law from Hale Center insisted that he install closets everywhere possible. It has lots of storage space.

Dale and Ann Thickett transferred to Abernathy from Lubbock 10 years ago. Dale is manager of Pioneer Natural Gas Company. He is a native of Indiana; she grew up in Lubbock. Their daughter, Juliana, is a nurse at Heath Sciences Hospital in Lubbock. Their son, Jon, is a vice-president of Sanitary Linen Company in Odessa and is married to Anna Smith, an Abernathy girl.

Ann taught piano here and played for the First Methodist Church for many years. The Thicketts are members of that church. For 11 years, Ann was dance accompanist at Texas Tech. She loved her work and the young people but had little opportunity to get to know many Abernathians other fellow church members. She wants the antique shop to give her the opportunity to get acquainted.

Ann loves antiques. She was reared with them and has always collected them. She enjoys the constant search the gratifying fine, and the feeling of accomplishment after

Question: I am 21 years old and recently applied for a social security number. The person I talked to said that I could not be issued a number until I furnished proof of my age and identity. Is this a requirement for everyone?

Answer: Yes. If you are over age 18, you must make application for a social security number in person and furnish proof of your age and identity. This is to assure that you are the person you claim to be and that based upon your identity, no one else will be issued your number.

IMMUNIZATION RECORDS FOR SCHOOL & BIRTH CERTIFICATE:

When you come to register your child for elementary school you must bring their birth certificate and their immunization records. Note the following required immunization your child must have. Polio-3 doses of oral polio vaccine required, provided at least one dose has been received after the 4th birthday. DPT (the same), measles-all students in this group must have received measles vaccine after first birthday, Rubella-one dose of Rubella vaccine is required, and Mumps-vaccine will be required for all students through 7 years of age.

You must have these immunization records before you can enroll.

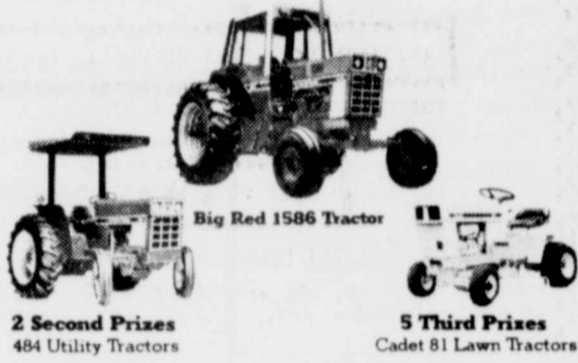

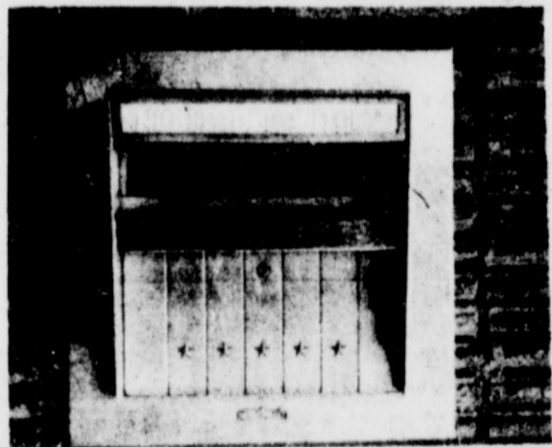


