ABERNATHY IN LIMELIGHT AT TASA, TASB CONVENTION AT SAN ANTONIO

Zig Zigler, Hughes Rudd, and Dean Berkley will be the main speakers at the Texas Association of School Administrators and Texas Association of School Boards joint annual convention September 23-25 in San Antonio. Approximately 3200 people will attend the convention representing over 900 of the 1100 schools in the state. Speaking and presiding over part of this high gathering will be Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent of Abernathy Schools, who is also President of TASA this year. Abernathy School Board President Billie Harrison will head a discussion group as well as Business Manager Earl Carter and Guidance Counselor Charles Bowen. At a banquet Sunday night, the Antelope Stage Band (enlarged for the occasion) will play a 40 minute musical program, including vocals and special numbers, for probably 2000 people. Dr. Webb will be master of ceremonies for that banquet, making the welcome address, introducing other speakers and presenting awards. All the Abernathy School Board members and their wives, staff members and their wives will be introduced at the banquet, too. It will be a proud and important but scary weekend for Abernathy. Dr. and Mrs. Webb will have run the gamut from a rugged, primitive backpack vacation last month to the heights of sophistication and elegance this weekend in San Antonio. What a contrast. The convention is a work session for school boards and school administrators. Rapid changes cause problems for which solutions must be

found. The convention offers a common ground for finding these solutions. Discussion groups and seminars cover such topics as School Finance-Future Directions for Texas; The Texas Assessment Project-Competencies, Testing and Promotion; Energy Conservation-Auditing Your Buildings; The Federal Scene-Update; Affecting Legislative Decision Making. Zig Ziglar, noted public speaker and motivation expert, will deliver the opening address at a general session Sunday morning. Dr. Dean Berkley, noted humorist and professor from Indiana State University, will entertain at the banquet Sunday evening. CBS News Correspondent Hughes Rudd will address the convention at a luncheon at noon Monday. Those attending from Abernathy besides Dr. and Mrs. Webb, will be Mr. and Mrs. Earl Carter, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bowen, Mr. and Mrs. Billie Harrison, Mr. and Mrs. Don McKenzie, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Howard, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Riley, and Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Oswald. Band Director and Mrs. George Riddell, Mr. and Mrs. Mitch LeMoine, and Mrs. Jerry Adams will accompany the 46 band members. All the band seniors and stage band members are going plus a few other best players. The band will leave Abernathy early Sunday morning by charter bus. They will spend Sunday night in San Antonio, have dinner in the Tower of the Americas and see the sights before coming home. (Good luck, Band. We hope you aren't too scared to blow. However, Dr. Webb admits to being a bit scared, too.)

Young Farmer Week Observed

September 17-23 has been officially designated as Young Farmer Week in Texas by proclamation of Governor Dolph Briscoe. The proclamation signed recently gives additional recognition to this rapidly growing farm group. The Young Farmer Association is sponsored under the auspices of vocational agriculture departments in high schools across Texas and the Texas Education Agency. Over 200 Young Farmer chapters have been organized on local school district or county-wide basis to carry out educational activities which will help the members keep abreast of the technological advancements in the field of agriculture and to develop greater skill and efficiency in management, production, and marketing. Governor Briscoe points out in the proclamation that, in addition to educational activities, Young Farmers incorporate in their planned chapter programs civic and community service projects and leadership activities that are designed to improve their communities, State, and Nation, and to promote the welfare of all citizens. He further points out that through these efforts they are helping to strengthen the economy of our country and are promoting good citizenship. In closing the proclamation the Governor predicted that as the organization continues to grow it will play an increasingly important role in the life of rural America. Renny Stewart, a 28 year old dairyman from Sulphur Springs, Texas is President of the State Association of Young Farmers which has a membership of over 4,000.

Firemen Sponsor Blood Drive Here Sept. 26

You may keep somebody alive by donating your blood in a drive sponsored by Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department Tuesday, September 26. South Plains Blood Service personnel will bring a mobile unit and set up several donation stations in the fire hall from 5 PM to 9 PM. Abernathy firemen will assist the blood service people and provide free cookies and juice to those who donate blood. In a special assembly Friday, September 22, Abernathy High School seniors will be given information about donating blood. People as young as 17 can donate if parents sign a permission slip. When people learn about the needs and are comfortable with the process of donating blood at a young age, they are more likely to do it in later years. Last year, 63 people came to donate blood in the Abernathy drive; forty-nine were accepted. Donors are carefully screened before blood is taken and are eliminated for slight colds, recently pierced ears, and numerous other small things. Antelope football team members and coaches came after practice. Janice Hassell of South Plains Blood Service told the Weekly Review that the organization especially appreciates Charles Bowen and Harold Stillwell. Both men are firemen and have helped greatly in the past with promoting the blood drives in Abernathy. Bowen said blood donating became important to him when his mother needed 26 pints of blood during her final illness. He has a rare type of blood welcomed by the blood service. If you don't know your blood type, here's the best way to find out. The knowledge might be a crucial factor in saving your life sometime. There's no guarantee your blood will be accepted but your willingness is most appreciated. If your blood is accepted, you know you're in good shape.

BOARD CONSIDERS HEALTH DEPARTMENT REQUEST AND ROUTINE MATTERS

WRITER'S NOTE: Because its regular meeting fell on Labor Day, Abernathy School Board met on the 11th which was Abernathy City Council's regular meeting date. The Review could not cover both meetings so this information is from an interview with School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb.

Dr. Richard Morgan and Nurse Truesdale of Hale County Health Department requested financial assistance for the department at Abernathy School Board's September 11 meeting. The department wants schools with no nurse to pay the cost of a health department nurse coming to give immunizations to school children. The board took no action but will consider the request at its October meeting.

STUDENT HANDBOOK: High School Principal Mitch LeMoine presented the high school handbook for 1978-79 which the board approved. The only major change from other years is a policy exempting students with a grade average of 90 from final exams.

FUND RAISING: The board also approved fund raising activities for the year including the Future Farmer's Christmas fruit sales, Future Homemakers concession stand at the stock show, Antelope Band magazine sales, the Junior Class May 1st, Senior Class Play November 11, bake sales, and cheerleader ribbon sales each week before games.

POLICY STATEMENT: They approved a policy statement on bilingual education which says the school system conducts a survey of the language spoken in students' homes and that those more proficient in a language other than English will be taught English as a second language.

WEBB APPOINTMENT: The board verified Dr. Webb's appointment by the

State Commissioner of Education to a four member Suburban Advisory Panel which meets twice a year without pay to discuss education problems in suburban areas. Webb said small towns within 12 miles or so of a city are considered suburbs according to some standards.

INSURANCE & PORTABLES: The board called for bids on liability insurance to be opened at the October meeting and authorized the school to request from the Title I Migrant Program two portable classrooms so migrant classes can move out of the oldest wing of the school buildings.

REPORTS: Business Manager Earl Carter reported 99.32% of school taxes collected, the highest percent of collections on record; 1061 students enrolled in Abernathy schools; 65 students eating breakfast in the cafeteria each day, and 575 eating lunch.

The Weekly Review asked Dr. Webb about complaints that school buses pick up students earlier than usual so the few who eat breakfast at school can get to the cafeteria on time. He said buses are supposed to arrive between 8:15 and 8:30, the usual schedule, and the drivers shouldn't be picking up students any earlier than in other years.

BUILDING PROGRESS: A construction and renovation progress report showed high school renovation completed. The project included new lighting, insulation, ceilings, and storm windows. The new vocational area and remodeling the old library for use as a principal's office should be complete within a month.

All board members were present for the meeting as were Dr. Webb, Carter, Floyd Galloway, Charles Bowen, and Principals LeMoine and Adkison.

Mother, 2 Children Escape Serious Injury in Turnover

An Abernathy mother and her two young children escaped serious injury at 6:50 p.m. Sept. 14, when the 1977 Chevy window van in which they were riding overturned on FM 597 east of town. Mrs. Jim Waits and daughter, Jamie, 8, and son James, 2, were taken by Abernathy EMS ambulance to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. Mrs. Waits and Jamie were treated and released, and James was kept overnight in the hospital for observation. The accident happened at a curve near the Wayne Attebury home on FM 597. The van, which came to rest on its top, sustained extensive damage.

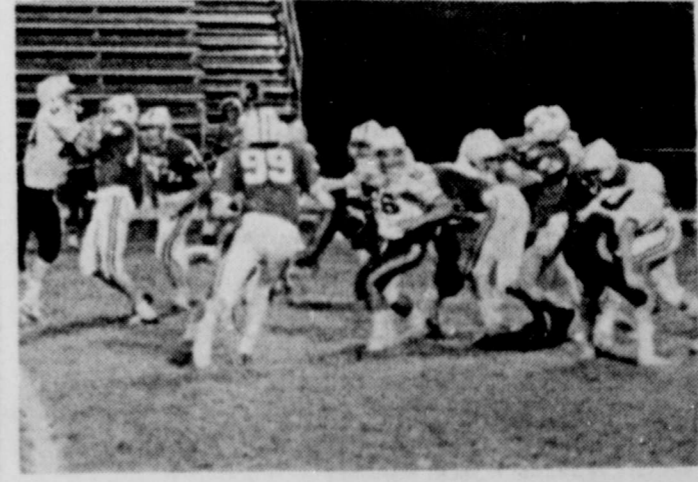

Last Minute Field Goal Boosts Abernathy Past Olton, 9 - 7

Junior back Gilbert Cuevas, who had missed on two field goal attempts in the first game of the season, booted a 34-yarder with less than a minute to play last Friday night at Olton to give the Antelopes a 9-7 victory over the Mustangs and a 2-0 record. The field goal capped a 64-yard drive after Joe Barera had intercepted an Olton aerial on the Abernathy 18 with 4 1/2 minutes remaining. Piloted by quarterback Tony Heath, with running backs Lee McCune and Roger Lindsey carrying the ball, the Lopes moved the ball to the 18, where they faced fourth down and 5 yards to go when Coach Larry Aldridge called on Cuevas to do his thing. Heath had put the Antelopes on the scoreboard when he raced 52 yards to paydirt on the Lopes' second play from scrimmage. Faking to McCune through the line, Heath executed the option play to perfection, picked up some good blocking and scrambled in for the score. Cuevas' extra point try was wide, and the 6-0 lead held until late in the third quarter. Olton tied the score when slotback Danny Garcia went in from 9 yards out, then went ahead 7-6 on Brad Alloom's extra point. The Mustangs had intercepted a fuke pass on their own 47 to begin the drive. The Lopes defense forced the Mustangs to punt 6 times, averaging only 28 yards per punt, while Cuevas punted four times for the Antelopes, averaging 41 yards. The Lopes picked up 14 first downs and 229 yards rushing, with McCune carrying 19 times for 118 yards. They added 11 yards passing on a completion from Heath to Dean McGuire. Olton carried 194 yards on the ground and hit on 5 of 8 passes for 95 yards, picking up 13 first downs. A 69-yard touchdown pass completion from Heath to Cuevas late in the third period was erased when pass interference was called against Abernathy. Abernathy's kicking game, in addition to the field goal, played a major role in the victory, with Cuevas' punts putting the Mustangs deep in their own territory. And the defense turned in another fine performance. Of particular note was the "second effort" given by both the offensive and defensive players. The Antelopes will tangle with the Hale Center Owls Friday night for their second out-of-town game of the young season. Both teams are undefeated going into their third game. The Owls won their season opener 15-0 over Bovina, then last week downed Kiets 27-7. The Owls running backs are versatile, and quarterback Leroy Cox has a good throwing arm.

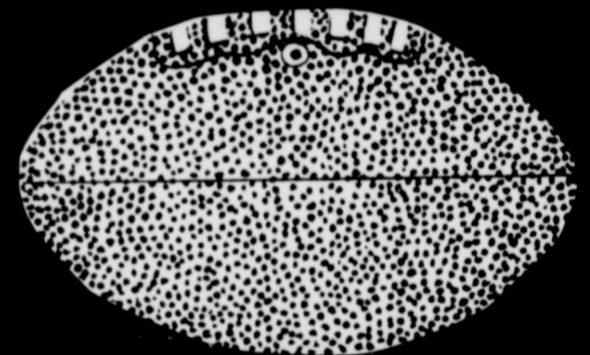
Wade Henderson is in Central Plains Hospital in Plainview. He injured his back lifting weights and is in traction. Doctors say the mishap will not keep him from playing football.
