BOARD CONSIDERS HEALTH DEPARTMENT Mother, 2 Children **REQUEST AND ROUTINE MATTERS**

WRITER'S NOTE: Because its regular meeting fell on Labor Day, Abemathy School Board met on the 11th which was Abernathy City Council's regular meeting date. The Review could not cover both meetings so this information is from an interview with School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb.

Dr. Richard Morgan and Nurse Truesdale of Hale County Health Department requested financial assistance for the department at Abemathy School Board's September 11 meeting. The department wants schools with no nurse to pay the cost of a health department nurse coming to give immunizations to school children. The board took no action but will consider the request at

its October meeting.
STUDENT HANDBOOK: High School Principal Mitch LeMoine presented the high school handbook for 1978-79 which the board approved. The only major change from other years is a policy exempting students with a grade average of 90 from final exams.

FUND RAISING: The board also approved fund raising activities for the year including the Future Farmer's Christmas fruit sales, Future Homemakers concession standat the stock show, Antelope Band magazine sales, the Junior Class May 1st, Senior Class Play November 11, bake sales, and cheerleader ribbon sales each week before games.

POLICY STATEMENT: They approved a policy statement on bilingual education which says the school system conducts a survey of the language spoken in students' homes and that those more proficient in a language other than English will be taught English as a se condlanguage.

WEBB APPOINTMENT: The board verified Dr. Webb's appointment by the

State Commissioner of Education to a four member Suburban Advisory Panel which meets twice a year without pay to discuss education problems in suburban areas. Webb said small towns within 12 miles or so

of a city are considered

suburbs according to some

standards. INSURANCE & PORTAB-LES: The board called for bids on liability insurance to be opened at the October meeting and authorized the school to request from the Title I Migrant Program two portable classrooms so migrant classes can move out of the oldest wing of the school

Manager Earl Carter reported 99.32% of school taxes collected, the highest percent of collections on 1061 students enrolled in Abemathy schools; 65 students eating breakfast in the cafeteria each day, and 575 eating

lunch. The Weekly Review asked Dr. Webb about complaints that school buses pick up students earlier than usual so the few who eat breakfast at school can get to the cafeteria on time. He said buses are supposed to arrive between 8:15 and 8:30, the usual schedule, and the drivers shouldn't be picking up students any

earlier than in other years. BUILDING PROGRESS: A construction and renovation progress report showed high school renovation completed. The project included new lighting, insulation, ceilings, and storm windows. The new vocational area and remodeling the old library for use as a principal's office should be complete within a month.

All board members were present for the meeting as were Dr. Webb, Carter, Floyd Galloway, Charles Bowen, and Principals Le Moine and Adkisson.



Last Minute Field Goal Boosts Abernathy Past Olton, 9 - 7

Cuevas, who had missed on two field goal attempts in the first game of the season, booteda 34-yarder with less than a minute to play last Friday night at Olton to give the Antelopes a 9-7 victory of the Mustangs and a 2-0 record. The field goal capped a

64-yard drive after Joe Barrera had intercepted an Olton aerial on the Abernathy 18 with 4 1/2 minutes Piloted by Tony Heath, quarterback with running backs Lee McCune and Roger Lindsey carrying the mail, the Lopes moved the ball to the 18, where they faced fourth down and 5 yards to go when Coach Larry Aldridge called

on Cuevas to do his thing. Heath had put the Antelopes on the score board when he raced 52 yards to paydirt on the Lopes' second play from scrimmage. Faking to McCune through the line, play to perfection, picked up some good blocking and scrampered in for the score. Cuevas' extra point try was wide, and the 6-0 lead held until late in the third quarter.

Olton tied the score when slotback Danny Garcia went in from 9 yards out, then went ahead 7-6 on Brad Allcom's extra point. The Mustangs had intercepted a fluke pass on their on 47 to begin the drive. The Lope defense forced

the Mustangs to punt 6 times, averaging only 28 yards per punt, while Cuevas punted four times for the Antelopes, averaging 41 yards. Lopes picked up 14 first downs and 229 yards rushing, with McCune carrying 19 times for 118 yards. They added 11 yards passing on a completion from Heath to Dean McGuire, Olton carried 194 yards on the ground and hit on 5 of 8 passes for 95

yards, picking up 13 first

A 69-yard touchdown pass completion from Heath to Cuevas late in the third period was erased when pass interference was called against Abemathy.

Abernathy's kicking game, in addition to the field goal, played a major role in the victory, with Cuevas' punts putting the Mustangs deep in their own territory. And the defense turned in another fine performance. Of patricular note was the "second effort" given by both the offensive and defensive players.

The Antelopes will tangle with the Hale Center Owls Friday night for their second out-of-town game of the young season. Both teams are undefeated going into their third game. The Owls won their season opener 15-0 over Bovina, then last week downed Kress 27-7. The Owls running backs are versatile, and quarterback Leroy Cox has a good throwing arm.



PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be in-

creased. The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the govern ing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing authority where the property tax is imposed.

tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled pers and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax state spending; and for property tax administra-

NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50) S.J.R. 50 proposes an

amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comp-

NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdic-

The amendment also peace concurrent jurisdicdistrict courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000. except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control. The wording of the pro-

posed amendment as will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund.'

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or other indebtedness or otherwise lend its credit to engage in firefighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to support such activities.

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
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
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
