The school has four TV cameras but they were bought with government "program money" and use is restricted to particular activities.

The basketball association had a surplus of funds and wanted the money used for the benefit of local kids.

School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb said gifts valued at more than \$200 cannot be given to sponsors or particular departments of a school without violating Interstate League regulations.

He said a survey of Abernathy schools' provisions for the handicapped show need only for a couple of wheelchair ramps and enlargement of a couple of restroom stalls.

REPORTS-Business Manager Earl Carter reported that delinquent taxes from 1931 through 1977 amount to only \$61,409--an unusually low figure compared to other schools. Assessed valuation in the school district is \$162,658,-970 based on 85¢ per \$100 valuation.

Dr. Webb reported that Abernathy school enrollment was 1100 on October 2. The figure is up 35 students from September but 35 below enrollment this time last year.

An average of 87 students eat breakfast in the cafeteria, 570 eat lunch.

PSAT/NMSQT Exam Set Here Oct. 24

Charles Bowen, guidance director at Abernathy High School, has announced that juniors, and some sophomores will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall. The test, co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college plans.

Scheduled for October 24, at Abernathy High School, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude--two abilities important in doing college work. The test can also lead to other opportunities for high school students. For example, students can ask to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service which helps colleges learn about students like them.

By taking the PSAT/NMSQT, they can enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and can get a good idea

of what the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like. Along with their score reports, students will receive a copy of ABOUT YOUR PSAT/NMSQT SCORES, a booklet that contains valuable how-to information about estimating SAT scores; finding out where to get and how to use detailed information about colleges and financial aid; and planning for financing a college education.

Also, students can use the College Board's College Handbook, to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,800 colleges and universities.

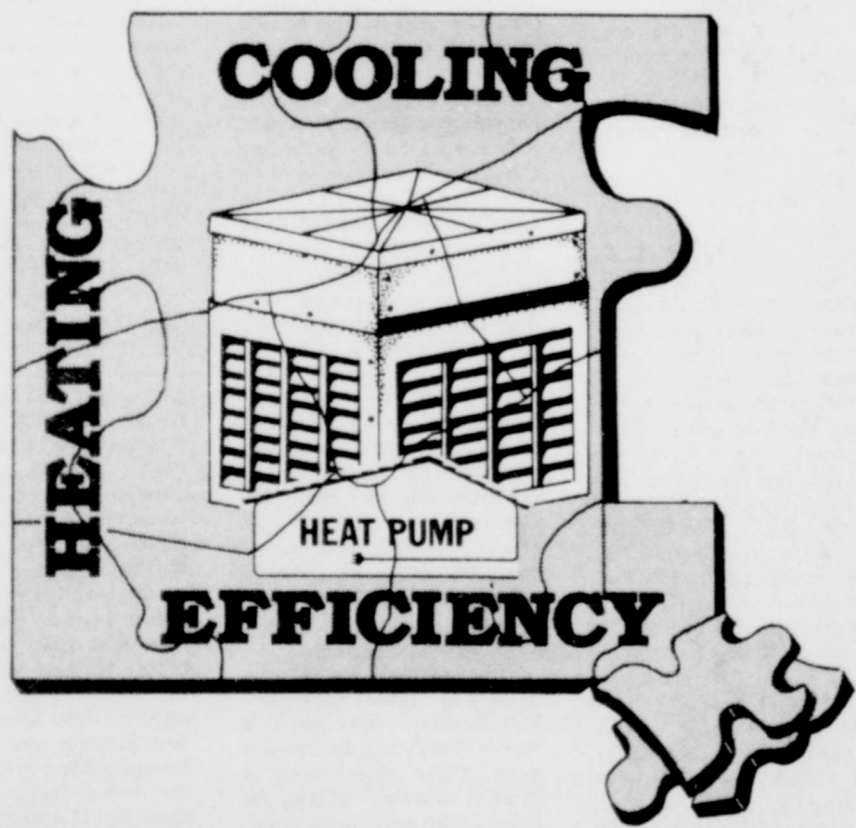

Additional Lots Approved In Lakeview Subdivision

Lakeview subdivision owner and developer, Jackie Barton, announces plans for the remaining acres under development in the subdivision. When it is completed there will be approximately 90 building sites. He has been working closely with Abernathy city engineers from Lubbock concerning water drainage and the flood water line.

Abernathy approved city engineers from Lubbock have surveyed and have maps of the elevation of the subdivision. An architect from Lubbock has drawn the plat for the remaining land that is suitable for homes. He has planned the building sites with the elevation and drainage being taken into consideration. There will be no problems of drainage or water standing too long until it can drain off. Speculation has suggested that water has been as high as 12th and Ave. H streets. After the recent rains only a trace of water was in the lake.

It is true there has been enough water in the lake at one time to water ski on, however it has never been above the flood water level line. In fact Mr. and Mrs. Wesley, former owners of the land, state "water has never been higher than 100 feet north of the clump of trees in the lake." Mrs. Wesley has owned or lived on the lands since early 1900. There is a pump in the lake that can be used for drainage and irrigation. It has not been used this year.

Dirt has been moved to raise the elevation of the lots along Ave. J and Ave. F. These streets are now paved and the lots are ready for building. 10th street will be continued west to connect Ave. J and Ave. H, taking care of water drainage from 10th street. The city is installing city sewer systems in the area of Ave. J and Ave. K.

Ave. K and Ave. L will have a cul-de-sac with drainage to the lake at the

south end of the cul-de-sac street. Ave. M and 10th street will connect, making a curved street with some lots facing the south and south-east. No lots will be south of 10th street except those on Ave. H.

A cul-de-sac will run west from Ave. M. These lots will face north and south. The lots along the south side of this development are being built to higher elevation. They are not available at the present time.

The lots are designed to be 75x135 feet and larger. There are other restrictions for the protection of the home owner. Some lots are perfect for split level homes. Two story homes would give a lovely view of the lake and surrounding grassland.

Two homes are now under construction on Ave. J. There are builders and building contractors available to build a home according to your own house plans. Mr. Barton invites you to come by and look over the building sites and choose one designed to fit the type home of your choice. (Paid Advertising)

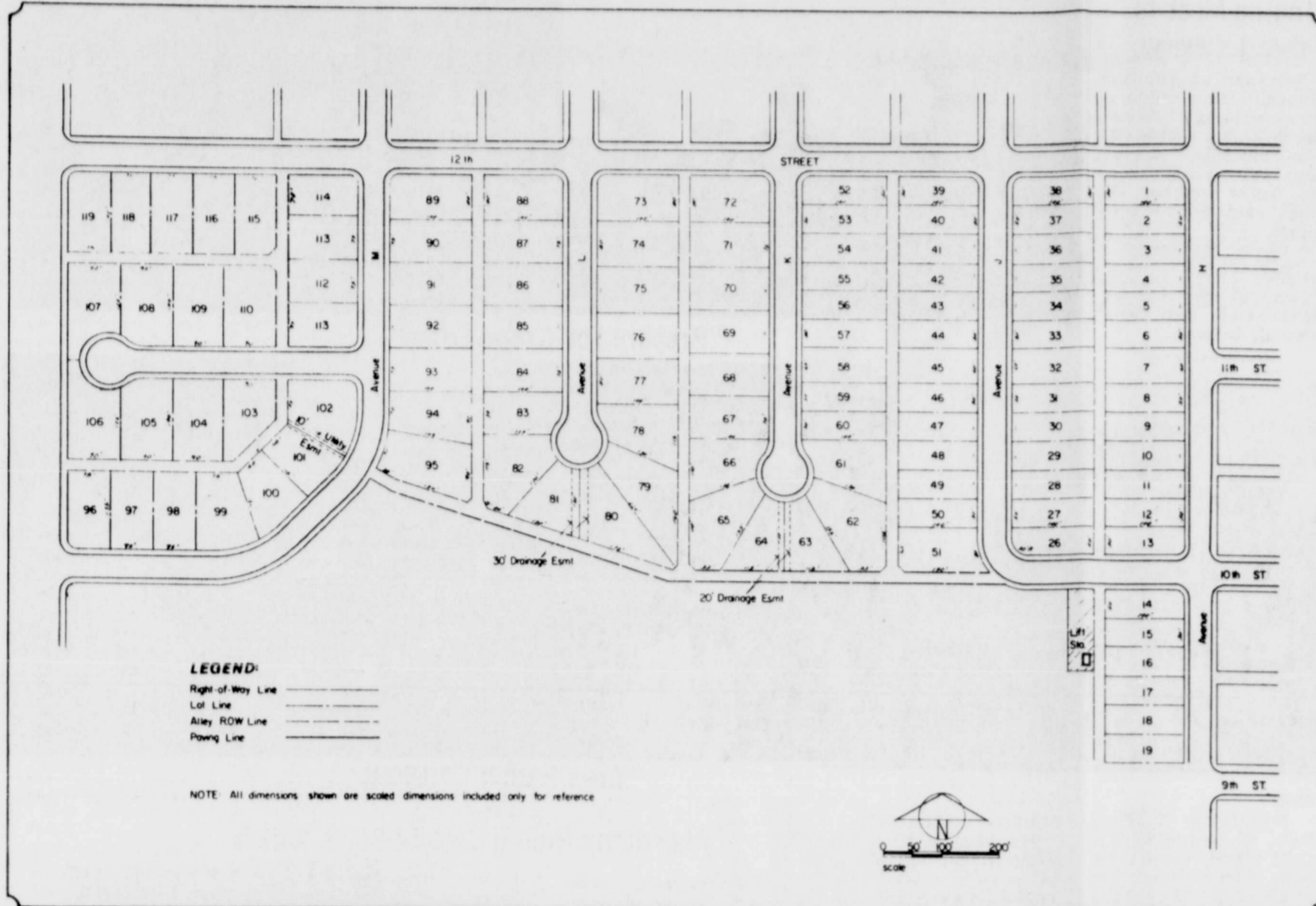
Wynon Mayes Presents Program At G. S. H. D. Club

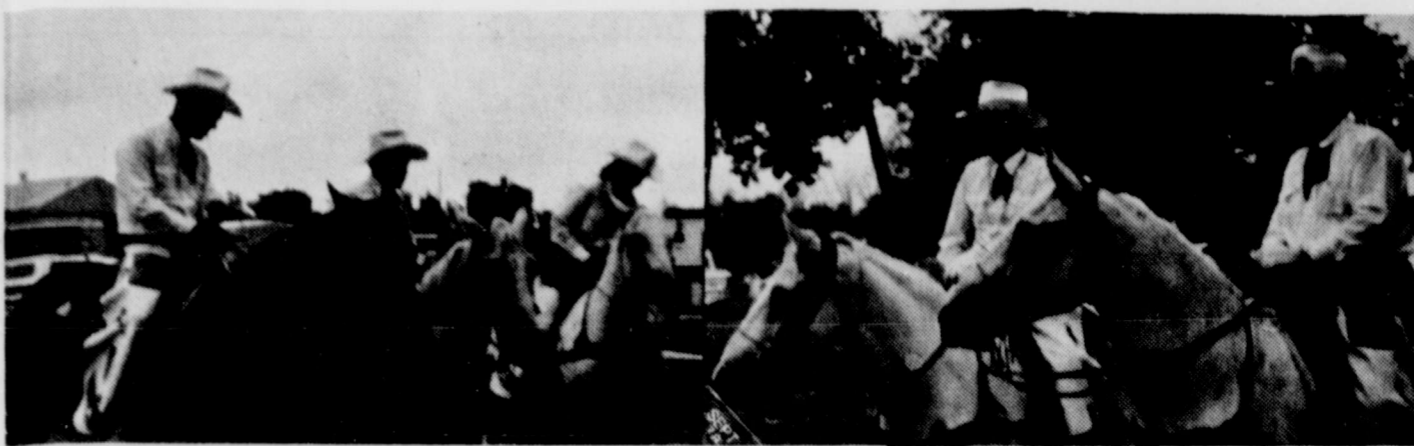

Another short kickoff saw the Mules in possession on their own 41. The visitors lost a yard on a reverse, then a 60 yard pass-run play from Northcutt to Timmy James put the Mules within one point of the Lopes. The Lopes tipped the ball on the extra point try, and the 7-6 margin stood until there were just over 7 minutes left in the game.

After forcing the Lopes to punt early in the final period, the Mules took over on their own 23 and put together a sustained drive, with Shanks going the final yard for the score. On a fake extra point kick, the ball was given to Zeke Pecina, who raced around end untouched to give the Mules a 14-7 lead.

Ken Sanders brought the ensuing kickoff from the 8 to the 30, but fumbled and the Mules recovered, turning the miscue into a score just 6 plays later, with Shanks going the final 7 yards. Villereal's EP kick was off the mark, but the Mules held a 20-7 lead with 4:28 left on the clock.

This time Sanders brought the kick from the goal line out to the 20. Heath kept for 7 yards, then picked up 19 on a pass to McGuire. McCune hit the middle for 10, then pass interference against the Mules gave the Lopes a first and 10 on the 15. On the next play the give was to McCune who hit the middle of the line, shook off 3 would-be tacklers and bounced over the goal line for the TD. Cuevas' kick was true and the Lopes trailed, 14-20.

With 3:10 left to play, the Lopes again tried an on-side kick, and this time recovered on the Mules 43. Lindsey carried twice, a pass intended for McGuire fell behind him, then Lindsey took a screen pass from Heath and scooted down the sideline for 18 yards before stepping out of bounds on the Mules 24.

McCune picked up 4 yards, a pass intended for Barreia fell incomplete, then pass interference was called against a Muleshoe defender when he tripped McGuire, the intended receiver, at the 2 yard line. Sanders hit the middle for a yard, then Lindsey burst through right guard to tie the score at 20-20. With the pressure on, Cuevas' EP kick was slightly off to the left.

Another on-side kick put the Mules in business on their own 46 with 1:01 left to play. To complete passes, one for 13 yards and another for 32, put the ball on the Lopes' 9 yard line, then Shanks went through the middle for the score. The Lopes blocked the EP try, but the Mules held what turned out to be the winning margin, 26-20.

Tony Heath, who hit on 7 of 9 passes for 135 yards, carried 13 times for 56 ground yards, while Cuevas hit on 2 of 5 passes for 47 yards. McCune was the Lopes leading ground-gainer,

picking up 85 yards on 17 carries, while Lindsey had 44 on 15 trips. Sanders' 5-yards total gave the Lopes 190 yards on the ground, plus 182 via air for a total of 372 yards. The Mules had a total of 376 yards, 264 on the ground and 112 through the air, with Shanks the leading ground-gainer with 119 yards on 19 carries. The Lopes were penalized 6 times for 46 yards, while the Mules had four 5-yard penalties.

The Lopes will travel to Lubbock Friday night for their last non-conference game, taking on the Lubbock Christian High School team on the Lena Stephens Field on the LCC campus. Game time is 8 p.m.

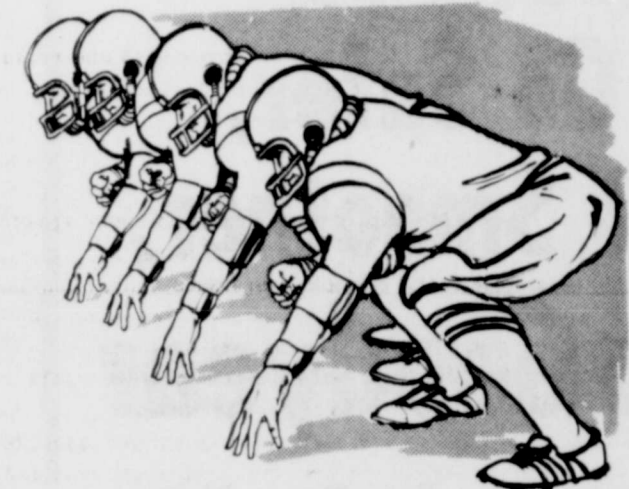
