It will help our readers understand what Korfball is.

LETTER: Dear Coach Lewis, Coach Cagle and FCA girls,

Thank you so much for the beautiful ivy plant with yellow daisies. It was such a surprise, for I didn't know that you even knew anything about it (U. S. Korfball team). Since you probably are wondering what a U.S. Korfball team is, I'll try to explain it.

Korfball is a European co-ed sport. It's played on a court like girl's half-court baske tball. The ball is similar to a soccer ball, but it is never dribbled or run with. The object of the game is to score baskets like in basketball. However, twelve foot goals sit in the center of each half-court. The goals have a hoop, but no backboards and four girls and four guys. Two girls and guys are on each side and play against their own sex. The sport is fast, non-aggressive, and non-contact. There is a flow and grace of movement on the floor with each person trying to get open, so thirty to forty minute halves, with virtually no substitution and no breaks. (I'm certainly glad I

ran this summer. ) The coach of the team is at ORU. He sent letters all over the U.S. for people to try out for the team, but there was no response except at ORU. Therefore we're really excited that we will have a U.S. team made entirely of ORU studen to christians. We hope to be living witnesses to the other countries of what it's like to be athletes for Christ.

We will be competing

in the World Cup Tournament in Amsterdam Holland on November 4-11. They have put us in the brackets with the very best teams in an attempt to get rid of us early. We're going to win though! They realize that this is the first U. S. Korfball and they aren't

expecting us to be very good. The tournament is in honor of Holland's Crown Prince and the seventy-fifth year of Korfball.

We will be leaving ORU on October 27th for New York and possibly have exhibition games there. Then we will be going on to Holland for concentrated practice and the tournament. We'll be gone two weeks. I'm not sure how I'll get my school work done, but hopefully I will get it done somehow.

One major problem right now is funds. We hope to send twenty-four members, but we are in need of \$550,00 for each member. Sponsors for each member are needed.

Practice is a major part of this sport as in all sports, and we will begin in earnest tomorrow morning, October 3 at 6:15 a.m. This will certainly be a time when a 10:30 bedtime is welcome.

It's exciting of course, to be a part of a team and to anticipate traveling but, even more exciting is the chance to let others know what it really means to be a Christian. Plans are being made now for a summer mission team of Korfball to go to South Africa. I hope

to be a part of this also. My prayers and thoughts are with you and each of your teams. I hope that this year will be a successful year for each of you. I know that it will, for you have tremendous coaches, a good school, and most of the Lord behind you.

#### Council Keeps Tax, Approves Code, And General Customers Considers Land Swap In New Addition

(By Jacquelyn Smyers) Abemathy City Council took care of its business in only a couple of hours Monday, October 9. The council approved the final plat for Jackie Barton's Lakeview Addition and discussed a possible land

The city owns an acre of land which has always been used for storage in the northwest comer of the addition. However, when residences are built nearby in the addition, it can hardly be used for that anymore. The city also has a sewer lift station near the southeast comer of Barton's addition and a drainage pipeline and alley on his property. Barton, thinking it would benefit both parties, offered to trade some of his land around the lift station for the city's acre in the northwest comer. He said since the northwest corner land has a paved street, he will be willing to pave one next to the southeast lift station if they work

out a trade. Councilman Harold Stillwell thought the Texas Municipal League should be consulted but thought the land near the lift station could be worth more to the city for future expansion than the northwest acre. Mayor Thompson said a trade will be good if the city can use the southeast property but not just to be The discussion doing it. brought out the fact that no future lift station will be built beside the present one and that a storage area should be located out of

The mayor and council wanted the city manager to check to see if a swap could take place legally and without charges of favoritism. They discussed the need for cleaning up the storage area no matter who owns surrounding land and for doing something about the sewer overflow pipe on

Barton's property.
WRITER'S NOTE: City Manager Larry Fields said Monday that he checked and the swap is legal if the city advertises for bids to trade a like amount of land. No money will change hands. Questions were raised

about some of the addition's nearness to a potential flood area. Barton said he isn't interested in getting anyone in that position and that he won't sell any lots that will flood. City Manager Larry Fields said the government designates flood prone areas and that cities must pass ordinances (as Abernathy has done) so people who build in these areas can get fe deral flood insurance. They are toldwhen they apply for building permits if they will be in one of these areas.

HOUSING CODE

The council passed an ordinance known as the Uniform Housing Code which provides for disposition of substandard structures. When the city building inspector finds a building that doesn't meet standards, the owner will be notified and given a specified period in which to repair or demolish it. If an owner refuses, the city can have the structure torn down and a lien placed on the property to pay for it.

The code also provides for a Housing Standards Commission which acts as an appeals board for property As in previous discussions, the council thought it unfair to subject local citizens to the pressure of appointment to the appeals board. They also expressed concern that appointed members might bend too much and defeat the purpose of the code.

City Manager Fields feared citizens might think they have no appeal should the council serve as the Housing Standards Commi-They might feel railroaded since the city council passed the ordinance, the city's inspector decided the building was substandard, and the city council served as the appeals board. The council felt, however, that the citizens have recourse through elections if they think council members are unfair.

Building Inspector Max Garza, who is also a building inspector for Lubbock, agreed with Fields that the housing code contains everything Abemathy needs to insure safe structures and improve appearances. UTILITIES TAX

The council decided to ep the city's 1% sales tax on utilities. Residential users will be exempt from the 4% statewide tax after April 1979 but cities have the option of keeping the Doing away with it would save residential users only \$3 per month on utility bills and take away \$4200 of city revenue which, with our already tight budget, would have to be made up for with property taxes.

The council and city manager feel a users tax is easier on people and more fair than property taxes and that it is in the best interest of the city to keep it.

COMMUNITY BUILDING The council decided to appoint representatives from community organizations to a committee which will decide what sort of meeting place will serve community needs. The 1935 Study Club, Sunshine Group, Lions Club, and Chamber of

#### West-Side Road Improvement

There's no way that a highway can be re-built to Interstate Highway specifications without causing some inconvenience to motorists. And, we are not complaining to the Highway Department and the contractors now at work in Abernathy to convert US 87 to Interstate 27. I think they have done a good job, here and to Lubbock, of routing highway traffic with a minimum of problems to motorists. In Abernathy, there is a problem concerning funeral processions. This can be accomplished by staying with US 87, but it takes all of the lawmen we have, and then some, to hold highway traffic on both sides of the north underpass and at the turn north of town to go west to the cemetery. Two lawmen, Abernathy Chief of Police Clyde Vandygriff and Hale County Deputy Sheriff Dayton Marr, had a good idea that could lessen the funeral procession problem. They solicited, and received, the cooperation of the Highway Dept. , highway building contractors, Hale County Precinct Three Commissioner Henry Rieff and the City of Abernathy, and local As a result, a good stretch of the rural road on

the west-of-town road, starting at the cemetery road at the J. C. Mills home and going south to a point beyond 12th Street. material cost nothing, the contractor's supt. John Henry cooperated by using a loader to place the material on Precinct 3's trucks that hauled it to the west road. Pct. 3 equipment and men prepared the road bed and formed the bar ditches for proper drainage before the material was dumped, and spread it evenly on the roadbed where it was packed by rollers. In addition to the west road work, the two unpaved blocks at the west end of 16th Street were similary improved. Chambers, who called my attention to the project promoted by Marr and Vandygriff, says this improvement will be helpful to the problem. Thanks to the promoters, the Highway Dept., the highway building contractor and his men, to Pct. 3 Commissioner equipment and labor provided, to the city and individuals who worked on the improvement. #### State Senator Endorsement of Amendments

State Senator Ray Farabee today endorsed Proposed Constitutional Amendments Number Two and Number Three. Farabee said, "We urge all Texans to give favorable consideration to Proposed Amendments Two and Three on the November 7th ballot."

Amendment Number Two provides a new tool for attracting industry to Texas which will be particularly helpful to smaller cities and rural areas. Safeguards included in the law provide that no city or county Issuing the revenue bonds can tax its citizens for repayment. In fact, that statement must be printed on the bonds.

printed on the bonds.

Amendment Number
Three authorizes cities and
towns to issue revenue bonds
for public improvements in
connection with local
redevelopment. These bonds
would be repaid from the
additional revenue produced
by the improvements
Neither the credit of the
government nor its general
revenue can be used to
make payment of these

bonds.

Farabee stated, "These two amendments will insure that Texans will enjoy a healthy economy and can compete with other states that allow this type of public financing." Forty-six states already have industrial revenue bonds and a number of states have provided for tax increment financing.

#### State Senator Endorsement of Amendments

State Senator Ray Farabee today endorsed Proposed Constitutional Amendments Number Two and Number Three. Farabee said, "We urge all Texans to give favorable consideration to Proposed Amendments Two and Three on the November 7th ballot."

Amendment Number Two provides a new tool for attracting industry to Texas which will be particularly helpful to smaller cities and rural areas. Safeguards included in the law provide that no city or county issuing the revenue bonds can tax its citizens for repayment. In fact, that statement must be printed on the bonds.

Amendment Number Three authorizes cities and towns to issue revenue bonds for public improvements in connection with local redevelopment. These bonds would be repaid from the additional revenue produced by the improvements Neither the credit of the government nor its general revenue can be used to make payment of these

bonds.

Farabee stated, "These two amendments will insure that Texans will enjoy a healthy economy and can compete with other states that allow this type of public financing." Forty-six states already have industrial revenue bonds and a number of states have provided for tax increment financing.







Grain sorghum farmers have a big sales job ahead if they want to continue exporting a large share of their production. This was the report of a grain sorghum promotion team that has just returned from Europe.

The team was led by Elbert Harp, Executive Director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. Accompanying were Ben Baisdon, Director of Marketing, Texas Department of Agriculture, and Dr. Reed Richardson, Livestock Nutritionist and Assistant Professor, Texas Tech University.

"We will lose our current sorghum markets unless we fight to keep them, " Harp stated Problems that must be overcome are: 1) widespread lack of knowledge about nutritional value of yellow sorghum, 2) poor performance from livestock fed high tannin sorghum imported from Argentina, South Africa, and other countries, and 3) lack of market information about prices of sorghum in relation barley and other

The fast moving team sponsored by the U. S. Feed Grains Council and the Foreign Agriculture Service of U. S. D. A., worked in England, Germany, Norway, Poland, Romania, Spain, and Switzerland. The mission lasted almost three weeks.

Prospects for large grain sales this year are dimmed by the huge barley and wheat crops that have been harvested in Europe. Many normally importing countries are actually exporting grain this year. Until these surpluses are used, sorghum sales from the United States will suffer. Poland, one of the new major customers for sorghum, can






