Korfball is a European co-ed sport. It's played on a court like girl's half-court basketball. The ball is similar to a soccer ball, but it is never dribbled or run with. The object of the game is to score baskets like in basketball. However, twelve foot goals sit in the center of each half-court. The goals have a hoop, but no backboards and four girls and four guys. Two girls and two guys are on each side and play against their own sex. The sport is fast, non-aggressive, and non-contact. There is a flow and grace of movement on the floor with each person trying to get open, so thirty to forty minute halves, with virtually no substitution and no breaks. The coach of the team is at ORU. He sent letters all over the U.S. for people to try out for the team, but there was no response except at ORU. Therefore we're really excited that we will have a U.S. team made entirely of ORU students christians. Council Keeps Tax, Approves Code, And Considers Land Swap In New Addition

 Abernathy City Council took care of its business in only a couple of hours Monday, October 9. The council approved the final plat for Jackie Barton's Lakeview Addition and discussed a possible land trade.

The city owns an acre of land which has always been used for storage in the northwest corner of the addition. However, when residences are built nearby in the addition, it can hardly be used for that anymore. The city also has a sewer lift station near the southeast corner of Barton's addition and a drainage pipeline and alley on his property. Barton, thinking it would benefit both parties, offered to trade some of his land around the lift station for the city's acre in the northwest corner. He said since the northwest corner land has a paved street, he will be willing to pave one next to the southeast lift station if they work out a trade.

Councilman Harold Stillwell thought the Texas Municipal League should be consulted but thought the land near the lift station could be worth more to the city for future expansion than the northwest acre. Mayor Thompson said a trade will be good if the city can use the southeast property but not just to be doing it. The discussion brought out the fact that no future lift station will be built beside the present one and that a storage area should be located out of town.

The mayor and council wanted the city manager to check to see if a swap could take place legally and without charges of favoritism. They discussed the need for cleaning up the storage area no matter who owns surrounding land and for doing something about the sewer overflow pipe on Barton's property.

WRITER'S NOTE: City Manager Larry Fields said Monday that he checked and the swap is legal if the city advertises for bids to trade a like amount of land. No money will change hands.

Questions were raised about some of the addition's nearness to a potential flood area. Barton said he isn't interested in getting anyone in that position and that he won't sell any lots that will flood. City Manager Larry Fields said the government designates flood prone areas and that cities must pass ordinances (as Abernathy has done) so people who build in these areas can get federal flood insurance. They are told when they apply for building permits if they will be in one of these areas.

UTILITIES TAX
 The council decided to keep the city's 1% sales tax on utilities. Residential users will be exempt from the 4% statewide tax after April 1979 but cities have the option of keeping the 1%. Doing away with it would save residential users only \$3 per month on utility bills and take away \$42000 of city revenue which, with our already tight budget, would have to be made up for with property taxes.

The council and city manager feel a users tax is easier on people and more fair than property taxes and that it is in the best interest of the city to keep it.

COMMUNITY BUILDING
 The council decided to appoint representatives from community organizations to a committee which will decide what sort of meeting place will serve community needs. The 1935 Study Club, Sunshine Group, Lions Club, and Chamber of Commerce will be on the committee. (cont. to page 2)

AUSTIN — The Governor's Criminal Justice Division Advisory Board has recommended granting \$14,796 in CJD funds to Hale County to hire an assistant county attorney.

In its application, the county predicts a backlog of 352 cases for 1978, and says the assistant could help reduce the caseload to a "manageable level."

The recommendation has been sent to Gov. Briscoe for his final approval.

West-Side Road Improvement

 There's no way a highway can be re-built to Interstate Highway specifications without causing some inconvenience to motorists. And, we are not complaining to the Highway Department and the Contractors now at work in Abernathy to convert US 87 to Interstate 27. I think they have done a good job, here and to Lubbock, of routing highway traffic with a minimum of problems to motorists. In Abernathy, there is a problem concerning funeral processions. Kent Hance Visits With Local Citizens At Graham's Tuesday

 Kent Hance campaigned among the coffee drinkers at Graham's Restaurant early Tuesday morning. He met varying degrees of enthusiasm cheerfully and made his points with friendly humor. Hance is State Senator from the 28th District and is running against Republican George Bush for George Mahon's seat in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Commenting on his conversation with a rather reluctant farmer, Hance said, "I see that a lot in the American public. There's a lot of frustration because Washington has turned its back on agriculture while helping every other group that has come along. They've not given agriculture a fair shake."

Hance said he is a strong proponent of agriculture. He owns a farm, and grew up on a farm. He is 35 and has

lived in this district all his life.

"There's a big contrast between me and George Bush," he said. "Bush has no background in agriculture and it's very important that people realize that. He said Bush outpends him five to one on the campaign and that Bush gets 64% of his money from outside this area."

Mahon and Speaker of the House Bill Claydon have endorsed Hance. He said that speaks for itself. He pointed out his four years of service in state government and feels that experience will help him start immediately to do an effective job.

This was Hance's third or fourth visit with Graham's coffee group. He said he gets a better feel there of what people are thinking about and has recommended it to other elected officials with whom he disagrees.

Mayor Thompson said a community facility will be contingent upon the taxpayers. There was some concern about groups not taking care of the building but councilmen agreed that any group which messes up the facility and does not follow rules will be barred from using it again.

OTHER ACTIONS
The council approved an ordinance granting Southwestern Public Service Co. a 4 million dollar rate increase instead of the 21 million it asked for and left in the provision for automatic increases for fuel costs. It authorized a study of water supplies by High Plains Water District and refused a special dumping rate to CCC Sanitation.

**State Senator
Endorsement of
Amendments**

State Senator Ray Farabee today endorsed Proposed Constitutional Amendments Number Two and Number Three. Farabee said, "We urge all Texans to give favorable consideration to Proposed Amendments Two and Three on the November 7th ballot."

Amendment Number Two provides a new tool for attracting industry to Texas which will be particularly helpful to smaller cities and rural areas. Safeguards included in the law provide that no city or county issuing the revenue bonds can tax its citizens for repayment. In fact, that statement must be printed on the bonds.

Amendment Number Three authorizes cities and towns to issue revenue bonds for public improvements in connection with local redevelopment. These bonds would be repaid from the additional revenue produced by the improvements. Neither the credit of the government nor its general revenue can be used to make payment of these bonds.

Farabee stated, "These two amendments will insure that Texans will enjoy a healthy economy and can compete with other states that allow this type of public financing." Forty-six states already have industrial revenue bonds and a number of states have provided for tax increment financing.

The council approved an ordinance granting Southwestern Public Service Co. a 4 million dollar rate increase instead of the 21 million it asked for and left in the provision for automatic increases for fuel costs. It authorized a study of water supplies by High Plains Water District and refused a special dumping rate to CCC Sanitation.

State Senator
Endorsement of
Amendments

State Senator Ray Farabee today endorsed Proposed Constitutional Amendments Number Two and Number Three. Farabee said, "We urge all Texans to give favorable consideration to Proposed Amendments Two and Three on the November 7th ballot."

Amendment Number Two provides a new tool for attracting industry to Texas which will be particularly helpful to smaller cities and rural areas. Safeguards included in the law provide that no city or county issuing the revenue bonds can tax its citizens for repayment. In fact, that statement must be printed on the bonds.

Amendment Number Three authorizes cities and towns to issue revenue bonds for public improvements in connection with local development. These bonds would be repaid from the additional revenue produced by the improvements. Neither the credit of the government nor its general revenue can be used to make payment of these bonds.

Farabee stated, "These two amendments will insure that Texans will enjoy a healthy economy and can compete with other states that allow this type of public financing." Forty-six states already have industrial revenue bonds and a number of states have provided for tax increment financing.

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Grain sorghum farmers have a big sales job ahead if they want to continue exporting a large share of their production. This was the report of a grain sorghum promotion team that has just returned from Europe.

The team was led by Elbert Harp, Executive Director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. Accompanying Harp were Ben Baisdon, Director of Marketing, Texas Department of Agriculture, and Dr. Reed Richardson, Livestock Nutritionist and Assistant Professor, Texas Tech University.

"We will lose our current sorghum markets unless we fight to keep them," Harp stated. Problems that must be overcome are: 1) widespread lack of knowledge about nutritional value of yellow sorghum, 2) poor performance from livestock fed high tannin sorghum imported from Argentina, South Africa, and other countries, and 3) lack of market information about prices of sorghum in relation to corn, barley and other grains.

The fast moving team sponsored by the U. S. Feed Grains Council and the Foreign Agriculture Service of U. S. D. A., worked in England, Germany, Norway, Poland, Romania, Spain, and Switzerland. The mission lasted almost three weeks.

Prospects for large grain sales this year are dimmed by the huge barley and wheat crops that have been harvested in Europe. Many normally importing countries are actually exporting grain this year. Until these surpluses are used, sorghum sales from the United States will suffer. Poland, one of the new major customers for sorghum, can

buy European barley delivered to their ports for the price of sorghum at the U. S. Gulf ports. As long as this price relationship exists, they will use barley.

To overcome the prejudice that had developed in recent years because of high tannin sorghum, GSPA, through U. S. Feed Grains Council, is conducting demonstration feeding tests. Such tests in poultry, swine, beef, and fish feed are being completed in Poland. All tests have shown favorable results with U. S. No. 2 yellow sorghum. These tests will help us sell more sorghum to Poland in the future.

The team also met with officials in the London office of Reuter's Commodity News Service, encouraging them to carry current market prices of U. S. sorghum. "When a prospective customer doesn't know the advantages and savings of U. S. sorghum, he won't buy it. Informing them is a necessary part of our sales job," Harp continued.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association has been active in market promotion for twenty years. In that time sales have risen from virtually nil to over 200 million bushels per year, about one-third of the total U. S. production.

"Less than fifty thousand dollars has been available annually to carry on the worldwide grain sorghum market development program. Ten times that amount is needed to adequately carry on the educational program in areas that have already been identified as potential customers. Farmers are just beginning to realize that selling is as important to their crop as producing it," Harp concluded.

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4-H Boy and Girl of The Month

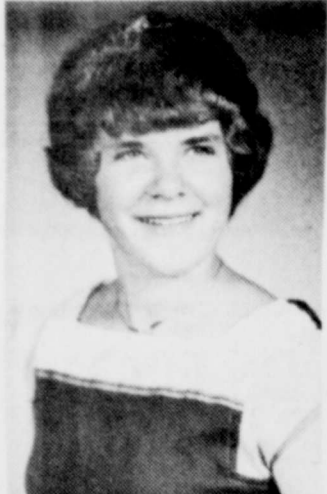

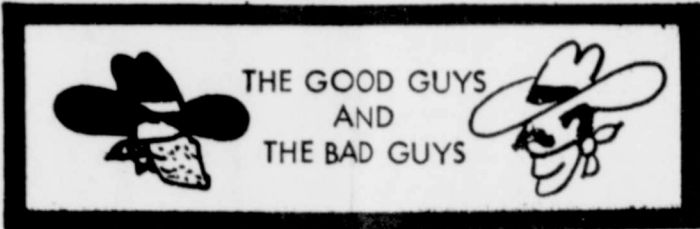

LCHS held the Antelopes scoreless in the third period, but Cuevas booted a 31-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to round out the scoring.

"We weren't emotionally high, but we played well mentally," commented Abernathy Coach Larry Aldridge. "Heath, McGuire

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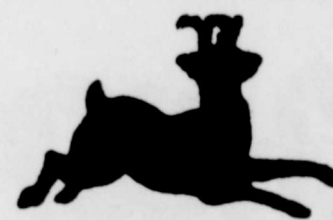
