Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 7, to cast ballots in the General Election. Voting in Abernathy, Hale County, will be at Abernathy City Hall. Voting at Lakeview, Hale County, will be in the Methodist Church. Lubbock County voting in Abernathy will be at Joe Thompson Implement Company. Polls at New Deal will be in the clubhouse and at New Deal School. Becton-Heckville area voters will mark ballots at the Becton Gin office.

Polls will open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Please vote early in the day... Nov. 7.

Absentee voting for the Nov. 7 General Election is now underway in offices of the County Clerks in Plainview and Lubbock. Absentee voting will end Friday, Nov. 3.

Texas will elect a U. S. Senator and Governor along with U. S. Representatives and other state officers.

The big race in the Hale-Lubbock area is for U. S. Representative, 19th District of Texas, the office being vacated by George Mahon's retirement at the end of this year.

Texas also will vote Nov. 7 on eight or more proposed Constitutional Amendments. Generating the greatest amount of interest is the proposed "Tax Relief Amendment" (H. J. R. 1).

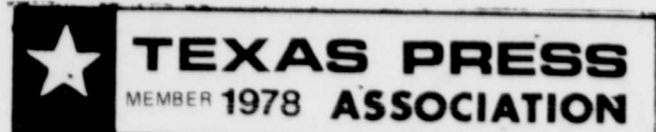

N&C---After reading a recent article in the Avalanche-Journal about taxpayers' 65 and over being

granted homestead exemption deductions by the City of Lubbock and Lubbock School District, some of the local 65-and-over residents wondered if the city and school here might grant such a deduction. Here's what the Texas Research League in Austin says: "Beginning in 1973, local governments were permitted to provide local option homestead exemptions for the elderly in amounts ranging upward from \$3,000 of assessed value. Many local governments have exercised this option, and some now exempt as much as \$15,000 of the assessed value of elderly owned homes." Apparently, the city and school here have opted not to grant homestead exemptions. The TRL further states: "The only existing exemption for disabled homeowners is the mandatory provision which became effective for disabled veterans in 1975. This provision (which also covers the survivors of service personnel killed on active duty) must be given by all taxing jurisdictions..."

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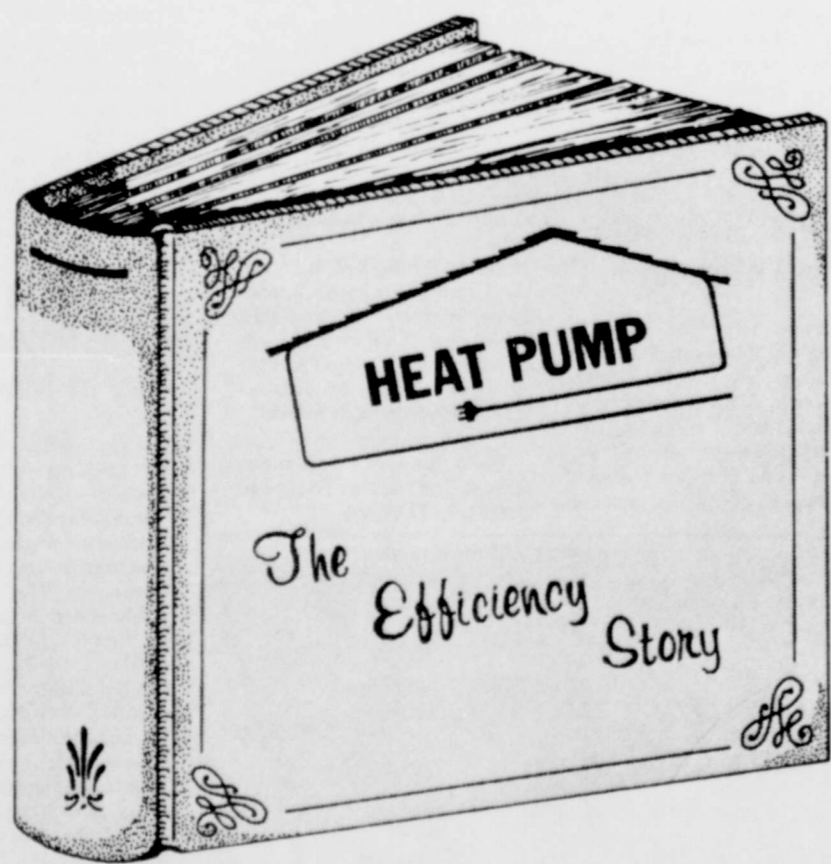

Individualized Art Lab Ideal For High School Art Program

If anyone had asked Georgia Bartlett what kind of art program is ideal for high school students, she'd have said "individualized lab." That's exactly what Abernathy High School has and Georgia is the instructor. However, it was Dr. Delwin Webb's concept and, according to Georgia, a delightful program to work in. She doesn't know of any school that has a similar one.

The lab is a large room near the stairs at Abernathy Junior High and Academic Center. The lab furnishes a creative atmosphere that motivates kids.

"Not everyone wants to paint on canvas but everyone needs to create," said Georgia. "In Art Lab, the kids' imaginations have no limit. Whatever they can think of to work with, we'll get the materials."

Students paint with oils and water colors; do needlework, barge, metal sculpture; work with ceramics or wood; paint on fabrics—whatever interests them. Supervising the lab is a big job with the students all doing different things at the same time. That's one reason why the class is limited to nine students. Another is that it's an expensive program for the school.

Georgia said she wishes more students could take the lab. She has the help of student aides, which are an important part of the success of the Art Lab principle.

The school has a good library of resource materials to help and inspire the students. Craftsmen and artists come to the lab quite often to demonstrate their

specialties. Georgia meets many of these people through the classes she teaches at Village Crafts in Lubbock's South Plains Mall.

The Art Lab teaches students to use tools correctly and makes them aware of quality crafts and esthetic values. They learn the difference between "crafty crafts" done for temporary enjoyment and art crafts which have enduring beauty. Families and friends get to enjoy the students' work and the lab experience has enabled several former students to earn extra money for college.

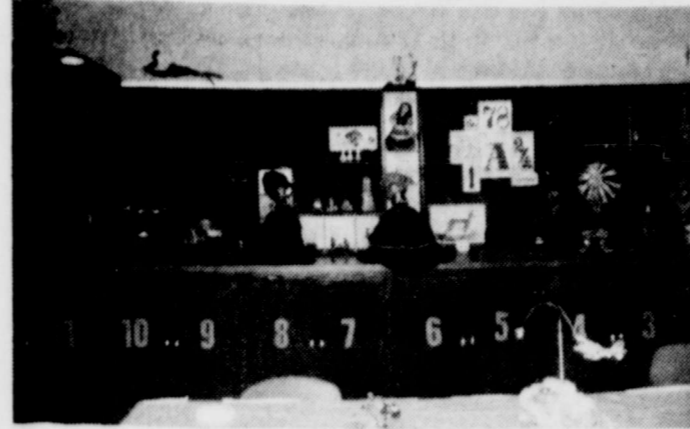
Whether they achieve fame in the arts or not, the lab offers students a chance to try everything in art that's pleasurable and discover things they can do the rest of their lives that, until the lab, they didn't know they would enjoy.

Dr. James "Doc" Blakely, a humorist and inspirational speaker from Wharton, will address the morning session that gets underway at 9:45 a.m. in the Lubbock Civic Center. 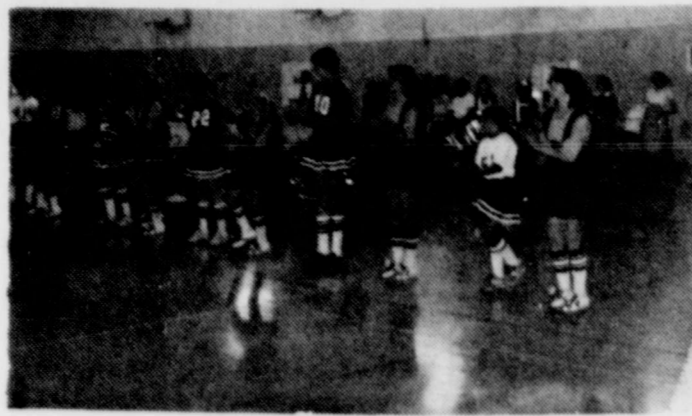

Clements Clarifies Voters Rights

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Dear Editor,
With the November 7th General Election coming up very soon... it seems that many of the voters of Texas are confused about their voting rights.

It is surprising how many calls have come into my campaign headquarters concerning the actual procedure of voting.

Regardless of how a person voted in the Primary in May, he may vote for any individual or party he wishes on November 7th.

For example, if someone voted in the Democratic Primary in May, he is free to vote for either a Republican or Democrat on November 7th.

Also, an individual voter may switch back and forth between the parties on his ballot. For example, he may vote for a Republican for one office and a Democrat for another.

These things seem simple and fundamental, but I wanted to clarify them for the voters of your community so they can exercise

The Eye Bank Program

What is an Eye Bank?

It is an organization formed to collect human eyes and to distribute them to hospitals where a cornea is needed for grafting or transplantation. It also stores the vitreous fluid for use in retinal detachment operation or transplantation.

How are eyes obtained?

Eyes are removed from persons after death who have generously authorized this use while living.

What donated eyes can be used?

Any eye from any age person can be used. Even those who have had a cataract operation or a corneal transplantation.

Does sex, color or creed matter?

No. All religions have approved the procedure.

Does removal of eyes mar the appearance of the body?

No. Enucleation (removal) of eyes is carefully done and modern morticians close the eyes skillfully so that they appear normal.

Can eyes be donated if the donor wears eyeglasses?

Yes. This does not affect the use of the healthy clear corneal tissue.

Who will get the eyes?

Eyes cannot be designated for a specific person. They are used for the next patient on an eye surgeon's list. In the event a patient is not available within the time limit needed to use the fresh tissue, the cornea and vitreous are preserved and stored for later use or shipped elsewhere (they have been sent to foreign countries). If a donated eye is diseased or cannot be used for grafting, it is carefully studied in research to help find causes and cures for blindness.

Is there a charge for eyes?

No. Eye Banks furnish eyes free to patients and hospitals needing them. They are never bought or sold.

How may eyes be donated?

By signing a donor form, notifying your next of kin of your desire and by informing your family physician of your action. They should not be willed, as they must be removed shortly after death, before the will is read. This program can easily be expanded to friends and relatives of our members.

How does the Eye Bank work?

The Eye Bank must be notified immediately after death (day or night) by relatives or the family physician. The Bank then takes care of all arrangements with no delay.

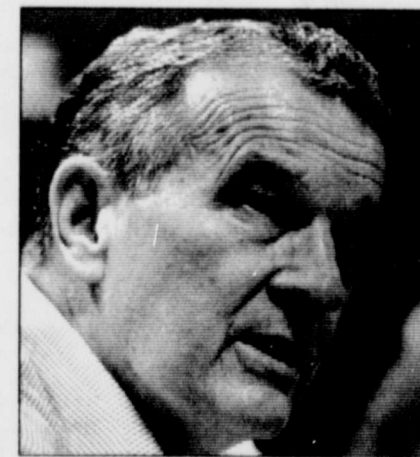

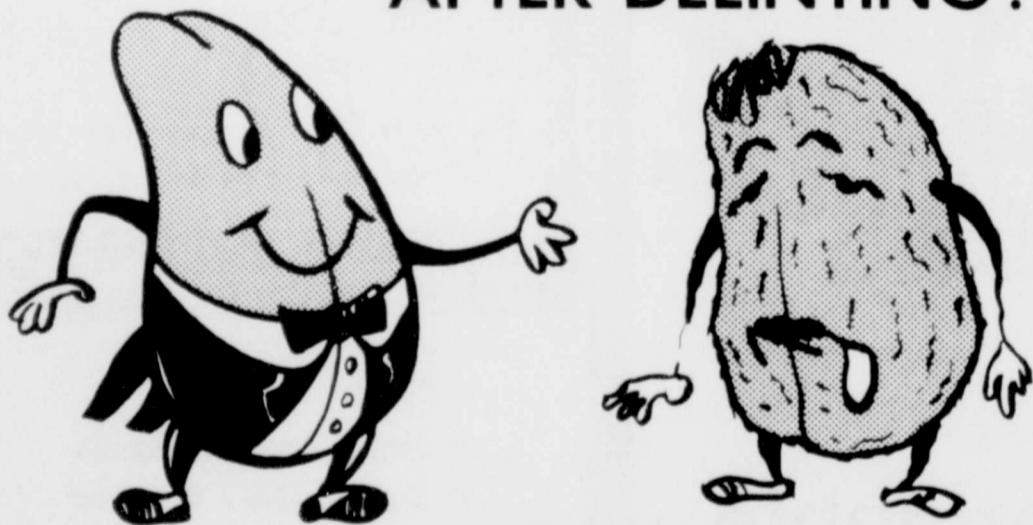

ANTELOPES LOSE FIRST GAME IN DISTRICT PLAY WITH TULIA

TULIA — Tulia running back Monty Jones exploded for two touchdowns and Ray Ruiz added a pair of one-yarders to key the Hornets to a 28-14 upset victory over Abernathy in a District 4-AA opener here Friday night.

Tulia got on the scoreboard first as Jones galloped 73 yards for a touchdown. The kick for extra failed, leaving the Hornets holding a slim 6-0 advantage.

Abernathy got its offense untracked in the second period as halfback Ken Sanders bolted 44 yards for a score. Gilbert Cuevas added the PAT to put the visitors up by 7-6.

The Antelopes weren't through for the second quarter, however, as Lee McCune dashed 77 yards for another Abernathy score. Cuevas again kicked the PAT to put the Lopes on top at halftime, 14-6.

Tulia struck back in the third quarter, with Ruiz scoring both of his six-pointers. Jones also tallied again for the Hornets, this time on a 50-yard run. Barry Cowan ran for the extras.

The Hornets put icing on the cake in the final stanza on a safety by defensive tackle Albert Bernal.

Jones finished the evening with 178 yards on 20 carries. Ruiz ground out 85 yards on eight trips and Kevin Crooks carried 19 times for 86 steps. McCune carried 13 times for 121 yards.

The win bettered the Hornets' season record to 2-5, dropping Abernathy to a 5-2 mark. Friday's game was the first district tilt for both teams.

Abernathy will host Lockney, 10-7 losers to Floydada, Friday night in another district affair. Tulia takes the week off before returning to action Nov. 3 against Lockney.

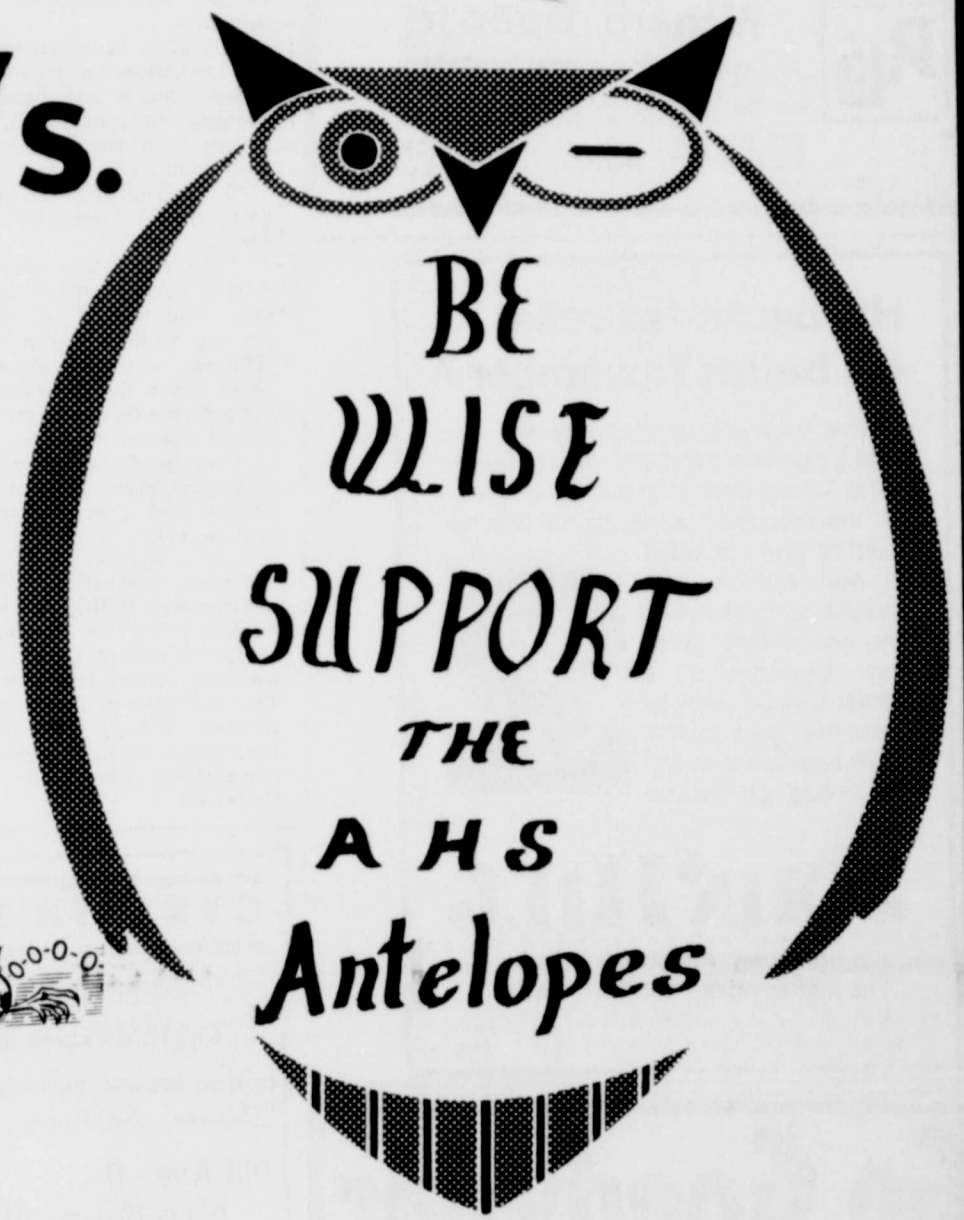
