Cuevas Kicks 25-Yarder With Just 9 Seconds Left In Game

Lopes Use Late Field Goal To Down Previously Unbeaten Idalou, 16-13

last Friday night at Idalou, with the visiting Abernathy Antelopes emerging with a 16-13 victory off the toe of junior field goal kicker Gilbert Cuevas with just 9 seconds left in the game. The veteran kicker had missed on field goal tries of 41 and 31 yards earlier in the contest, but when it counted the most, with the game tied at 13-13, and in a soaking downpour, Cuevas calmly booted the wet ball through the uprights to sack the game away for the Lopes.

The win gave the Lopes a 2-1 District 4-AA record, with a 6-2 season record, their best in several seasons. Prior to Friday night, the Idalou Wildcats were ranked 9th in the State in Class AA ratings, and are now 7-1 for the season, and 1-1 in district competition. Tulia is currently riding on top of the heap in District 4-AA without a loss, having defeated Abernathy and Lockney after going 1-5 in non-conference play.

Abernathy will host the always-strong Floydada Whirlwinds here this Friday night in their final regularseason game. The outcome of this game may play Floydada and Idalou; and in addition to Tulia, Idalou has yet to play Lockney. Floydada is currently 1-1, having beaten Lockney, but lost to

Idalou. The Antelopes of Coach Larry Aldridge and his staff put together an offense with punch", and defensively contained the Idalou offense except on the two scoring drives. All-around Idalou Buckles Bryant was held fo only 25 total yards rushing on 11 carries, but was credited with a 28-yard touchdown pass reception on the final play before halftime. Idalou's 200 pound fullback Ricky Hobbs was the games leading groundgainer with 121 yards on 26

Ace halfback Roger Lindsey was the leading rusher for the Antelopes, picking up 84 yards on 17 carries, while sophomore runner Sylvester Dunn added 48 yards on 7 carries. Junior quarterback Tony Heath completed 8 of 13 passes for 153 yards, hitting standout end Dean McGuire with 5 aerials for 86 yards, connecting with Lindsey on a screen pass which resulted in 45 yards and a touchdown, and hitting Dunn and Joe

Barrera on tosses of 15 and

nate quarterback Cuevas threw on pass, teaming up with Scott Morrison for 11 yards.

The Lopes' 164 yards through the air and their 133 on the ground gave them a total of 298 yards to Idalou's 235.Idalou quarterback Brad DeBusk hit on 5 of 10 passes for 86 vards. Ken Sanders, also a junior,

carried only three times from scrimmage, but accounted for 5 yards and one of the Lopes TDs. He had kickoff returns of 21 and 27 yards. Halfback Lee McCune, who was injured in the Lockney game the week before, played an outstanding defensive game, but saw only limited action on offense, carrying 3 times for

Idalou returned the opening kickoff to the 32 and in 9 plays drove to the Abernathy 26 where the Lopes took over after Barrera broke up a 4th down pass. Aided by a pass interference call against Idalou and runs up the middle by Dunn and Lindsey, Heath guided the Lopes four yards deep into Wildcat territory before pass intended for McGuire was intercepted by Bryant and returned to the Idalou The Lope defense dug and Bryant punted to

Cuevas got off a 41 yard quick kick on 3rd down. The Lopes allowed the Cats only 4 yards on 3 plays, and again Idalou was forced to punt. However, hard charging Ken Sanders and hit the kicker instead, and a 15 yard penalty against the Lopes gave the Cats new life at the Abemathy 33. Eight plays later, fullback Hobbs capped the

After runs of 4 and 1 yards by Dunn and Lindsey, and Cuevas' 11 yard pass to Morrison, the Lopes still lacked 9 yards having a first down, and Cuevas got off a 44 yard punt. Again Lope defensive unit held, and Idalou punted to Barrera at the Abernathy 35 and he got only back to the 38 before being wrapped up.

Pinson Place, Phase I, Given Final Approval In Special Council Meet

approved the final plat of Pinson Place Addition, Phase in a special meeting Thursday, November 2. Developers James Pope, Max Kester, and Billy Smyers requested the extra meeting to help speed the development's progress. engineer, Don Jennings, needed the council's approval to complete cost estimates and other details before the council's next regular meeting November 13. Aldermen Harold Stillwell and Harold Thompson couldn't attend because of previous committments. Pope and Jennings represen-

ted the developers. The council has agreed to annex Phase I of the addition when installation of utilities, streets, and other improvements by developers is complete. Street construction will begin as soon as the cotton crop now on the

site is harvested. Most discussion dealt with lot and house numbers and street names. assured the council that when Phase II is developed, the numbers will continue in sequence from Phase I. When concern arose about the cul de sac causing a new block on one side of Ave. I but not the other, he suggested that the east side house numbers be broken to match.

VELRAY

He said the developers, with the council's approval, want to name the cul de sac Velray, without adding Street or Drive. The name is a combination of Velma and Ray, the first names of the property's previous owners. Mr. and Mrs. Ray Pinson. The developers considered naming the addition Velray but since the property is known locally as "the Pinson place", de ci de d Pinson Place

would identify it better.

Mayor Thompson City Manager Fields had reservations about the single name. They said a continued system of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and A, B, C makes it easy for people to find their way in a town. Unexpected names confuse everyone, especially delivery people. Thompson said Velray could sound like a restaurant or anything else to strangers. Alderman Nelson said it's surprising, though, how many people stop at his place of business asking where some thing so plain as Main Street

Pope said the developers hope the name Velray will appeal to people who want

to build extra nice homes in an extra nice neighborhood. Mayor Thom, son said local slang will probably add "street" or "dive" anyway. Fields said he's afraid the name will set a precedent. The mayor agreed but said Abemathy isn't so big as to fret over it.

PROMOTION BROCHURE The council previously agreed to pay half the cost up to \$500 of a brochure planned by the Chamber of Commerce to promote Abemathy. The brochure is ready and the chamber needs to present a bill for the city's half.

GLIDERS-A man has been conducting glider operations at Abemathy Airport, Crowell Aviation, the present fixed base operator, and local powered aircraft pilots are complaining. Powered aircraft have to give way to gliders because gliders are slow and behave differently. They also must be pulled into the air by vehicles on runways or by other aircraft.


The council cannot give one fixed base operator exclusive rights and any other can request space at the airport. An operation can be excluded if it presents a hazard however, and the city is looking into safety factors. usually try to operate from grass air strips.

SEWER SERVICE-City Manager Fields said two residents have recently requested sewer service. A few homes and businesses in scattered places couldn't he hooked onto sewer lines during major installation because of the cost. are hooked on as funds become available but some people still lack this service.

Fields said the city must provide either the service or an adjustment of some kind on utility bills or taxes. People without sewerservice can no longer have cesspools and septic tanks must meet

SUBSTANDARD BUILD-INGS-Fields reported that some property owners have been surprisingly cooperative about city building inspections. inspector needs a camera to make slides of the buildings inside and out at the time of inspection so they will be available should inspection results ever be questione d






Delegates gave Welch a standing ovation after he objected to President Carter's urban policy which he says rewards mismanage ment rather than successful management of cities.

"The federal establishment says we (Texas cities) are too well off to quality for federal participation, so we are expected to solve our own problems with our own resources," he said. "However, at the same time our federal tax dollars are being shipped off to Massachusetts, New York and Michigan,

Welch said Northern cities are becoming wards of the federal government because they are dependent on federal money and that the administration's urban program will only nurture that addiction.

U. S. Housing and Urban Development Secretary Patricia Harris was keynote convention speaker but her speech got a lukewarm reception from delegates. She presented statistics on how much HUD money has gone to Texas cities and towns and stressed the need for more cooperation and less confrontation between Texas cities and the federal government

federal funding. Mayor Moscone saidstate and federal officials must end the habit of creating programs for cities to administer and expecting local revenues to pay for such programs. He also said Proposition 13 forced Califomia cities to become more efficient in administering local governments.

Idalou pursurers to the goal line. Cuevas' kick tied the

score at 7-7. Idalou mishandled the ball on the kickoff, and Gary Smith picked it up at the 5 and made it out to the 12 before being downed by several Antelopes. Hobbs carried for 3 yards to the 15, and on the next play Bryant took a pitch out around right end and sailed down the sideline for 85 yards and an apparant TD. However, as he passed the Idalou bench. some of his teammates stepped out onto the field to watch his progress down the sideline and got into the way of an official following the play and the ref threw his flag, nulifying the play and penalizing the Cats 5 yards for "illegal substitution." Two plays later the Cats were still on their own 10 yards line, and Bryant punted out to his

own 48. With just over 2 minutes left in the second quarter, the Lopes put their welloiled machine into motion. Lindsey slanted off-tackle for 15 yards and a first down at the 33. Heath lost a yard, then hit McGuire for 19 yards and another first at the 15 yard line. Heath kept left, but slipped down for a yard loss, then on the next play threw a quick toss to McGuire for 11 yards and a first with just 4 1/2 yards between them and a TD. Sanders hit the line twice, the second time going in from 4 yards out for the goahead score. Cuevas' kick was off to the right, but the Lopes were out front 13-7.

Their lead was shortlived, however, as the Wildcats took the short kick on their own 38 and went 62 yards in the remaining 33 seconds, capping the drive as the gun sounded with Bryant's 28 yard reception in the end zone for the TD. Lindsey raced in to block the extra point attempt, and the score was knotted at 13-13 until the final 9 seconds of the game.




