Six From Here Get Citizenship Award At Wayland College

PLAINVIEW, TX (SPL)--Six Abernathy students at Wayland Baptist College are among 110 seniors eligible for the Wayland citizenship Award, one of the top honors available to graduating seniors.

Elaine is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nolan Steinfield, 911 4th St., and is a 1975 graduate of Abernathy High School. Pam is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eulan Greenlee, 1601 E. Osage, and is a 1973 graduate of McAlister High School. Ruben is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe M. Rodriguez, 711 13th St., and is a 1974 graduate of Abernathy High School. Mike is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don O'Donnell, 904 Louisiana, Iowa Park, and is a 1973 graduate of Iowa Park High School. Jerry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Miller, 602 10th, and is a 1971 graduate of Abernathy. Lynda is a 1962 graduate of Lockney High School.

Voted by the student body annually, only one man and one woman receives the distinguished award. Only graduating seniors who have attended Wayland for three complete semesters are eligible to be nominated.

Ballots are tabulated by a committee composed of the President of the Junior Class, a faculty member, and a representative of the Administration. The names of three men and women receiving the highest number of votes is then presented to the full faculty which selects the winners by secret ballot. The names of the winners have their names inscribed on a special Citizenship Plaque in the corridor of Gates Hall, Wayland's administration building.

The purpose of the award is to inspire students to be outstanding citizens of the college community and to be active Christian citizens after graduation, exemplifying what Wayland proposes to produce in its graduates. Characteristics include a Christian attitude, acceptable academic record, diversity of interest, loyalty to American ideals, personal integrity, and exemplification of the Wayland spirit.

4-H Showmanship Clinic Set Dec. 9

The first Annual Collegiate 4-H Showmanship Clinic will be held on Saturday, December 9th. Registration will begin at 10:00 a. m. at the Texas Tech University Agricultural Pavilion on Indiana Avenue, west of the Tech campus, according to Ollie Linder, County Extension Agent.

There will be one class taught on each of barrows, lambs and steers. The 4-H's may pick two of these classes and attend one session in the morning from 10:30 until 12:00 and the other session will be taught from 1:00 until 2:30 p. m. The classes will be taught by collegiate 4-H Club members, using experience gained from their years of showing livestock in 4-H. Each class will cover the main points of showing showmanship, Linder stated.

The Collegiate 4-H Club requests that a minimum \$2.00 donation be made. This will go into the club fund to assist with travel expenses of club members as they travel to the counties, districts, and state events to assist in 4-H work and activities.

OBJECTIONABLE PUBLICATIONS

The City of Abernathy and other community leaders have contacted out of town business officials about local display of publications not generally considered suitable for viewing by all ages. The matter came to their attention through a citizen's complaint.

The City of Abernathy has no ordinance against objectionable publications. Ordinances must be able to stand up in court and state pornography laws are rather vague. Therefore, local leaders decided to advise company officials of prevailing community opinions about the material and ask that it be removed.

Managers and employees of many businesses not locally owned have no say about product orders or display. A company buyer orders for all the stores from lists. Even they don't know exactly what is in the publications. In order to be fair, community leaders want to give the company the opportunity to cooperate before taking more forceful action.

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Local FFA Team To State Contest

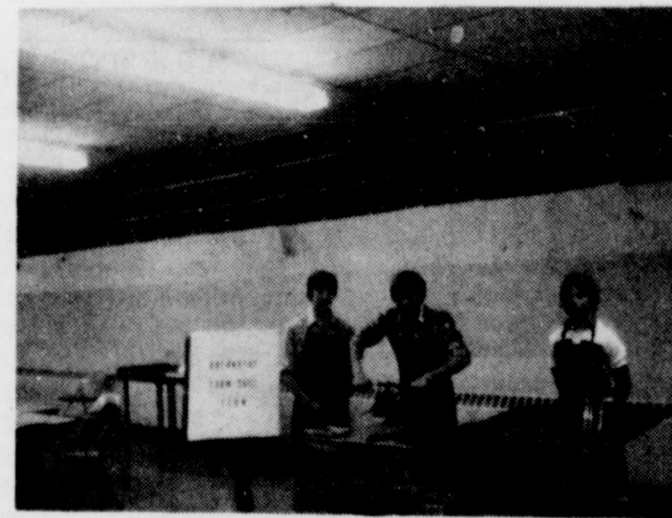

Max Riley, Kenneth Moss, Stacey Mills, and Bobby Ross head for the State Future Farmers of America Leadership Contest in Huntsville Saturday, December 2. Riley, Moss, and Mills, with Ross as alternate, comprise Abernathy's Greenhand Farm Skills Team which won first place honors in district competition in Plainview two weeks ago. The Greenhands are freshmen Future Farmers.

Abernathy FFA sponsor Jerry Adams said FFA Leadership competition is not divided into classes so 2-A schools compete with 4-A's like Lubbock and Amarillo. The Abernathy team beat winners from the five other districts in Area I and, in state competition, faces winning teams from the other nine areas.

The team will demonstrate to a panel of judges the use of a screw plate set. The demonstration must last at least 10 minutes but not more than 20, including preparation and clean-up. Team members must introduce themselves, give the reasons for the skill, explain it as they demonstrate, and end with a summary of the demonstration.

Adams wrote the script for the screw plate set demonstration which Abernathy teams have used for several years. Mills, Moss, and Riley's presentation is smooth and interesting even to someone quite unfamiliar with taps, dies, bolts, and threads. They show how to thread and make a bolt, rethread an old bolt, and thread a hole in a piece of metal.

I snapped the photo in the Abernathy City Hall Clubroom during a local gathering to honor U.S. Representative George H. Mahon and his wife, Helen, who is looking on as he receives a document of Abernathy's appreciation for his service in Congress. Presenting the document is the manager of Abernathy Chamber of Commerce at that time. I do not remember his name. In the background, with a hat, is Bob Stephens, who operated a radio station in Abernathy at that time. Currently, Bob is the weather man on KCBD-TV, Ch. 11, Lubbock. Mr. Mahon has been a public servant since

1926, when he was elected county attorney of Mitchell County, Texas. He and Helen Stevenson of Lorraine, Texas, were married in 1923. A daughter, Daphne, was born to them in 1927. He has represented the 19th District of Texas in Congress ever since he was elected in 1934. He chose to retire. When his current term ends, Mr. Mahon will be followed by another Democrat, Kent Hance, also of Lubbock, who moves up from State Senator to the office of Congressman. Abernathy, in this year of 1978, renews its expressions of appreciation to George and Helen Mahon for bringing honor and distinction to the 19th District, and to all of the State of Texas.

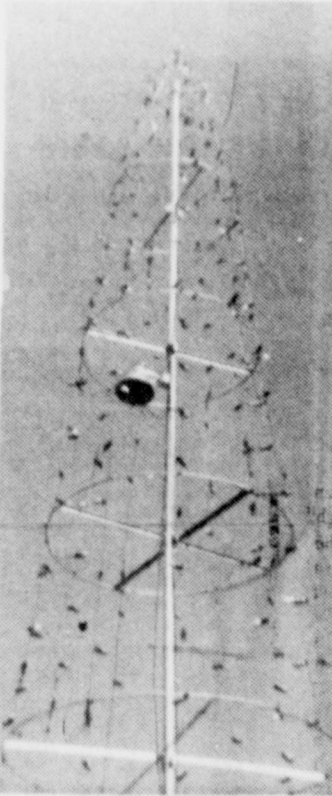

N&C--This photo is from The Abernathy Weekly Review files for 1966, showing Christmas-light decorations on the city square. It's that time of the year for 1978.

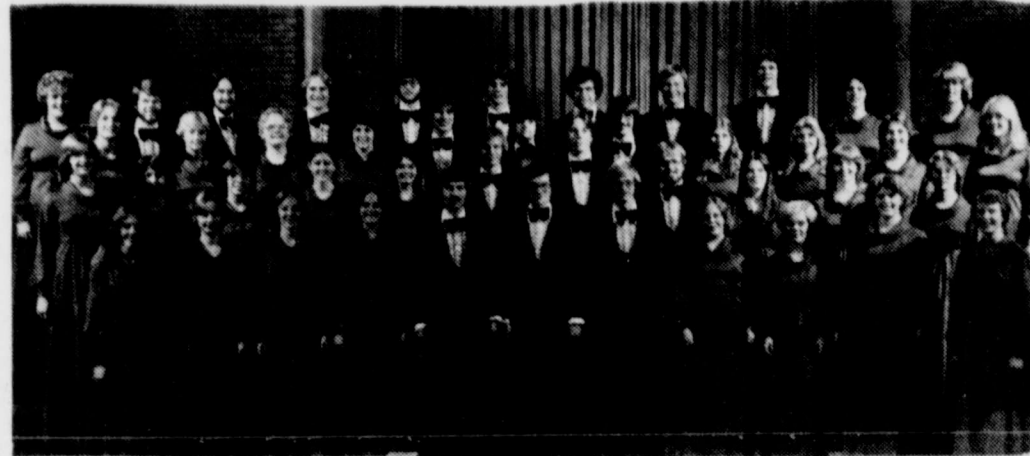


N&C--While we're in the column/photo business, this is a long-time-ago (1965) picture of a young Abernathy businessman currently involved in a local retail store. Recognize him?

The McMurry College Chanters To Present Christmas Concert Here December 9

Abilene--The McMurry College Chanters will present a Christmas concert of choral music at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 9, at the Abernathy United Methodist Church.

The concert is part of the Chanters' weekend Christmas tour with programs in Abernathy, Amarillo and Abilene.

Under the direction of James Pearce, the 44-member ensemble will perform both sacred and secular Christmas carols in an hour long presentation of "very familiar music," Pearce said.

Chanters is the oldest singing group on campus, founded by the late Gypsy Ted Sullivan Wylie, first fine arts dean at McMurry. The Chanters' repertoire includes a cappella and accompanied music from modern as well as classic resources.

The program will include such old favorites as "Silent Night," "Angels We Have Heard On High," "Carol of the Bells," "Do You Hear What I Hear?" and "Carol of the Drum."

Performance of "The Coventry Carol" will feature soloist Cindy Holden of Abilene. Gary Mauldin, McMurry student from Amarillo, will be featured soloist on "Go Tell It On the Mountain."

"Holy Is The Lord" will be accompanied by Francis Hinkel, McMurry associate professor of music, on the harpsichord, and by Susan Chalcraft of Abilene and Susan Gilkeson of Conroe on flutes.

Student conductor Mike Seabrook, of Abilene will direct the group for their performance of "A Crowded Inn at Bethlehem." Dawn Olmstead, another Abilene student, will conduct "Jesus, Jesus, Rest Your Head."

Chanters will also sing "Noel, Noel, Let Us Sing Merry Christmas," "He Is Born," "The Three Kings," "Sing Ye, Sing Noel," "Amen," and "Glory to God in the Highest" by Randall Thompson.

An independent four-year liberal arts college located in Abilene, McMurry College is jointly owned by the Northwest Texas and New Mexico Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church.

Pearce is director of choral activities at McMurry. He received his bachelor of music degree in 1969 from Oklahoma Baptist, and in 1971 earned a master of music degree from the University of Colorado.

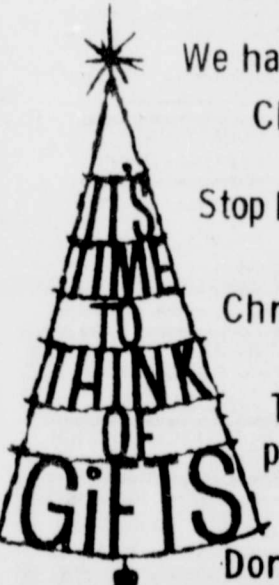

Food stamp program to undergo change

Beginning Dec. 1, a new food stamp program will be implemented in Texas, allowing participants to obtain food stamp coupons without cash.

The change, according to Texas Department of Human Resources (DHR) Regional Administrator Nathan Martin, is intended to help poor people who cannot accumulate enough cash to buy all the food stamps they need for a month's worth of food.

Under the old program, food stamp recipients paid a certain amount of money, determined by income and the number of people in the household, for an equivalent amount of food stamps. They then received an extra amount of food stamps, called bonus stamps. Under the new system, recipients will pay no cash for stamps, but will receive the bonus amount of stamps only.

For example, a typical household of four may now be getting \$182 a month in food stamps. For this amount, the household pays \$58 of its own money, making the bonus value of the coupons \$124. When the purchase requirement is eliminated, the household will receive only the \$124 in food stamps, and will pay no cash. This means that participants in the new program will have to spend some of their money for groceries in order to maintain the same nutritional level as previously provided by the program.

"The former requirement that recipients buy a portion of their food stamp allotment before obtaining the bonus stamps prevented many on low, fixed incomes from receiving any food stamp benefits,"

explained Martin. "The zero-purchase requirement will make it possible for many people, especially the aged and disabled, to participate in the food stamp program."

Additional food stamp changes designed to make the program more accessible to Texas' poor are to be implemented by DHR in March 1979.

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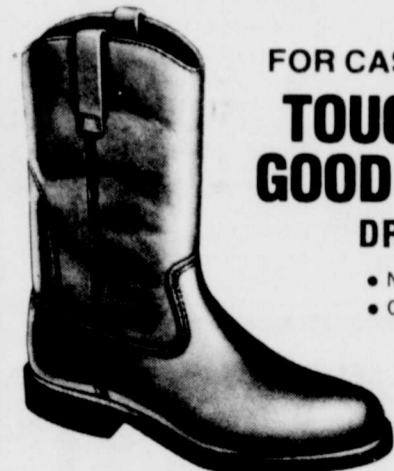
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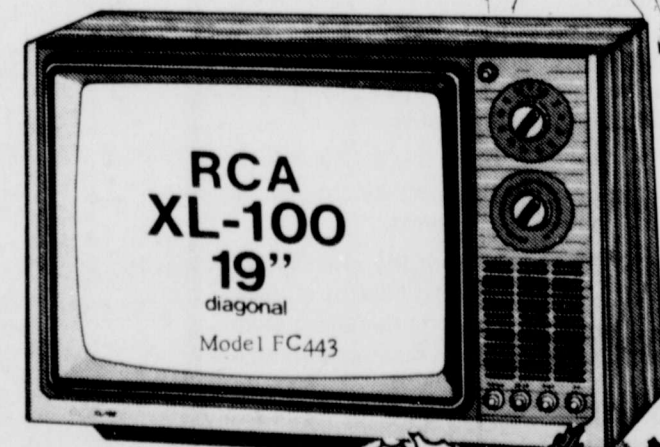
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
