Further Report On School Board's January Session

(By Jacquelyn Smyers) WRITER'S NOTE: We've had no chance to finish coverage of the January school board meeting. Here's the rest of it.

LEAKS, BUS & HEAT More leaks have developed in school building roofs and at the school board's January meeting, School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb reported that only one company, Texas Roofing, bid on the job. This is the same company which fixed leaks three months ago. The board decided to let them repair these, too.

Dr. Webb also reported only one bid received for the 1965 Dodge school bus they decided to sell. The state gets first chance at used buses but didn't want this one. Abernathy Boy Scouts do and offered the school \$500 which the board accepted.

The boilers which supply heat to high school haven't been dependable for some Dr. Webb said one seems OK but the other may not last the year. He said classrooms stay pretty warm because of the new storm windows but the halls don't and asked what the board wants to do about the pro-

After discussion about whether to rework the old system or install a new one, they asked Dr. Webb to have a professional evaluate the system, recommend several alternatives, and present cost estimates. That was done last summer but costs have most likely increased since then.

Board member Jerry Oswalt asked, "Are we ever going to talk about air conditioning?" Webb said the evaluation could include proposals for air condition-Don McKenzie asked if they were talking about air conditioning for just the high school and said it gets just as hot at eleme-

Dr. Webb said the elementary heating unit was designed so air conditioning could be added later. Howthat was 1963 and things have changed since then. The board wants the evaluator to consider that, though.

Webb said any plans should be complete and the equipment ready for installation by the end of school in June so the work will be finished by the time school starts in September. PORTABLE BUILDINGS

The board decided to forget about the portable classroom buildings Dr. Webb had suggested they apply for from one of the special programs, when he reported on experiences other schools have had with them. The money allowed by the state doesn't nearly cover actual costs of the buildings, the schools have to make up the difference, and the Texas Education Agency can transfer the buildings from the purchasing school to another without regard for how much extra they spend if the purchasing school no longer needs them for the original

MINIMUM WAGE Since the national minimum wage has been increased, Dr. Webb recommended and the board agreed to starting new school custodians at the new minimum and raise the salaries of longer time custodial employees in proportion. That will be 10¢ in some cases, 20¢ in others. Beginners who start at \$2, 90

willeam \$3, 10 after a year. The school doesn't have to pay minimum but prefers to in order to keep good employees.

Franklin Dunn and Ray West came home Tuesday last week from their stint of duty with AAM Tractorcade to Washington, D. C. They drove the tractor representing Abernathy, New Deal, and Idalou from Fort Worth to Jackson, Mississippi. Roy Don Stevenson, J. W. Hamilton, and Willie Dunn took over in Jackson and drove to Atlanta. They came home Friday leaving the tractor in the hands of Brian Shadden, Gary Lovelace, Carol Dunn, and Dale McDougal.

Dunn carried the names of 50 supporters -- business men and farmers--from Abernathy, 25 from Idalou and several from New Deal. Their donations are much appreciated because even though the trip itself isn't so expensive, rental on the 18' trailer that follows the tractor and the cost of shipping the tractor home amounts to a lot. He said the tractor is getting eight miles to the gallon, about the same as a pickup. He expected severe wear on the tires but noticed none as far as Jackson.

The Tractorcade, Group #1, included 153 tractors when Dunn was there. Reports say 106 more joined at Atlanta and 1000 more are waiting to join in Virginia. Dunn said he encountered lots of rain when driv-

ing but none of the hardships of groups on the northern routes. His group got to spend Superbowl "eekend in Monroe, Louisiana.

The group is getting good support and publicity long the way. Pictures of Dunn's tractor and several from Shallowater were featured in the Talladega-Sylacauga, Alabama, newspaper when Group #1 stopped overnight at the Alabama International Motor Speedday. One newspaper reporter has been with the tractorcade since the beginning. One was riding with Clifford Hamilton, leader of the Shallowater tractors, when

Dunn came home. Dunn leaves again this weekend to meet the Tractorcade in Washington, D. C. He'll fly out Saturday with his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ray West, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Waits and Mrs. Brian Shadden whose husband is driving in the Tractorcade now.

SCHOOL BOARD from page 1 Texas voters last fall. People thought they voted for the amendment but legislators and school administrators can't seem to figure out how to put it in operation. He explained how much Abernathy schools stand to lose because of the vote but said the state will reimburse

100% of the loss. Business Manager Earl Carter reported 1116 students enrolled in Abernathy schools in December. The cafeteria was "in the red" which he said is not unusual for that time of year.

The board decided to continue membership in Texas Association of School Boards. Membership is figured on a certain percent of a school's operating budget. It costs Abernathy \$200

Dr. Webb reviewed the effects of the tax relief amendment approved by Texas voters last fall. People thought they voted for the amendment but legislators and school administrators can't seem to figure out how to put it in operation. He explained how much Abernathy schools stand to lose because of the vote but said the state will reimburse 100% of the loss.

VANDALISM Dr. Webb and board members discussed very expensive repairs to school buses recently due to vandalism. The damage included broken windows, slashed and deflated tires, and a motor torn all to pieces when someone droppedabolt inside. A replacement engine cost \$3,000. These repairs over two months, cost \$4,500. The school has no vandalism

insurance. Dr. Webb asked for suggestions about what to do. Preventive measures already taken include locks on gas tanks and hoods. Drivers now are cautioned to check tires carefully before driving.

Board members suggested checking into vandalism insurance, then discussed hiring security guards to stay with the buses both here and in other towns. Coaches often drive buses to out of town games and cannot stay with them. Daniel Fondy

said he'd like to see two adults accompany teams to out of town events anyway and cited a Roosevelt game in which a boy was hurt but the coach couldn't leave in the middle of the game to see to the boy's care.

Women coaches often drive buses to out of town games and the board expressed concern for their safety and talked about putting radios in the buses so they'll be able to communicate with the highway patrol or other agencies in case of trouble. Team fans often follow the buses home after varsity games but the younger teams often make the trips all alone. A woman coach's husband is so concerned about the situation he asked to be made a substitute driver so he can accompany his wife on out

of town trips. Coaches don't have to drive the buses but it's very hard to get substitutes will-

ing to make the trips. The main problems in getting regular or substitute drivers is the 20 hour driving course applicants must take. It's also hard to find people with "clean" driving records.

Regular drivers are usually school teachers or ai les, local preachers, anyone who can do the job in addition to their regular one. They are paid \$150 per month. Substitutes must have the same qualifications and get \$5 per run. Fondy said a raise in substitute's pay might help solve the pro-

To guard against vandalism, Fondy suggested that area schools form a mutual protection association in which host schools guard visiting team buses. Richard Howard said it would be cheaper than hiring security guards to travel with buses. They also asked Dr. Webb to check into radios. WRITER'S NOTE: Dr. Webb reported last week that buses now park in designated lighted areas in front of gyms instead of out of the way places andwe've had no further damage to






