City Considers Paving Project

The City of Abernathy is contemplating a Paving Project this coming spring or summer. Those people presently without paving improvements are reminded of the city's paving policy.

The present policy of the City of Abernathy for curb, gutter, and paving improve ments is that the individual property owner bears the entire cost of all improvements abutting their property. The city bears the costs of those improvements abutting city property, to include intersections, curb and gutter radi at such intersections, and that portion of street adjoining the alleys which does not abutt on private property. A city ordinance regulates the construction, alternation and improvements of streets and

alleys in the city. Persons desiring curb, gutter, and paving improvements with the city should observe the following steps: (1) Come by the City Hall to fill out a request stating improvements

desired, or mail a letter to the City Hall to that effect. After the required 66 2/3% of property owners involved in any given area have made known their desire for improvements, the City Engineer will prepare specifications and cost estimates.

(3) All property owners involved will then be notified what their particular costs are, and that amount must then be deposited in an escrow account by at least 662/3% of the property owners involved. required money must be placed in escrow before any project can begin or other

arrangements made. The remaining 33 1/3% percent, or less, which did not voluntarily petition and place their cost of the paving in the escrow fund established for such improvements, will then be placed in the assessment

STONE GIVEN GRAIN AWARD

COLLEGE STATION ----(Spl)----Regional winners have been announced in the 1978 Texas 4-H Grain Sorghum Production Project.

Dudley E. McClurg of Tulia placed first and will receive a \$500 scholarship for producing the most irrigated sorghum in Region I of the project.

Other winners, in order of placing, in the irrigated sorghum division of Region I include Jody Foster, Lockney; Lanny C. Fulton, Floydand Don D. Stone of Abernathy. Foster will receive a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond and Fulton and Stone will each receive a \$25 bond.

The contest was conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas 4-H Foundation arranged with Louisiana Seed Company, Inc. and Funk's Seed International for sponsorship of the awards. All entrants in Region I planted Funk's G-623 GBR grain sorghum,

Stone planted about 5, 5 acres on June 12. He applied 125 pounds of 10-30-9 with a side dressing of 100 pounds of anhydrous ammonia. He irrigated twice and applied Milogard herbicide. The plot was harvested on Oct. 12 with a yield of 3,781.8 pounds per acre. Abernathy Community 4-H'er is the son of Mr. and

Baptist Church Improvement Work Construction

Construction started January 22 on the first building project undertaken by FirstBaptist Church in 20 years. The project includes enlargement of the church foyer, choir, and pulpit area and construction of a bride's room and additional restrooms at the front end of the educational building. covered walkway will connect the new rooms to the foyer.

The auditorium will have new carpet and cushioned pews. The pulpit area is to be completely redone with wood paneling and sliding doors to display or cover the baptistry as needed. The auditorium was last redecorated in 1959. construction was the nursery building in 1957.
