Iva Rhodes Retires From SPS Position

Eighteen years ago when her two sons were in junior high and high school, Iva went to work as cashier-bookkeeper of Southwest Public Service Company's Abernathy branch. Now she's "tapering off" into retirement, leaving the office in the hands of a young woman in circumstances similar to her own 18 years ago.

Conny Gist, the new cashier-bookkeeper, has two daughters past the helpless stage. As Conny moves into the working mother routine, Iva will be at home sleeping past the get-ready-for-work hour, reveling in the routine of housework, and repairing the wear and tear that raising teenagers puts on a house and furnishings.

Iva's actual date of retirement is June 1 but she is using her accumulated sick leave to begin a less taxing lifestyle. She'll be subject to call, however, until June.

Iva said she loved working at SPS. It isn't a hard job but is very detailed. The Abernathy office does the same things the Lubbock, Amarillo, and Plainview offices do but with fewer people. While employees in these other offices specialize in limited areas of work, the Abernathy employee handles it all.

Collections and sales are a minor part of the job. Things get traumatic when the lights go off. The cashier-bookkeeper must then answer constant telephone calls, maintain radio communications between repair crews, and still serve people trying to pay bills. During a particularly bad snow last winter, Iva was needed at the office from 11 PM until 2 or 3 AM when repair crews got stuck and she had to direct maintainers to the rescue.

She has worked under four bosses, Melvin Rape, who is manager now at Olton; Leroy Wilkinson, now manager at Seagraves; Davy Cavitt, now at Muleshoe; and present manager Bill Scott who came from Earth three years ago.

Boss Scott took her out recently to the Tucco switching station to show her the big transformer, all the lines, and switching procedures. She found it fascinating to see for the first time the equipment and operations behind the words she dealt with every day.

Iva has lived all but a couple of years of her life in Abernathy. She attended 1st through 12th grades here and played tennis and basketball in high school. Her father, Charles H. Williams, farmed and later dealt in real estate.

She attended Draughon's Business College in Lubbock; then worked for an accounting and auditing company. With them, she kept books

for all six Mark Halsey drug stores and for Rhodes Brothers (no relation to her husband). One of her best memories is a New Year's evening when she and Doug Chapman accompanied Buford Davenport and Dorothy Chapman to Happy where a former Abernathy pastor married the latter couple. When Buford tried to put the ring on Dorothy's finger, it caught on his vest button, flustering him terribly.

Another is her exciting one and a half years in California during World War II working as a clerk in the supply control office of Ryan Aircraft, the company that built the first Navy jet airplane. When production slowed down after the war ended, she came home and in 1947, married Irvan Rhodes who was bookkeeper at Farmers CoOp Gin. He had spent two years in the service in Hawaii.

The couple later moved to Petersburg for a few months where son Bill was born; then to a farm 11 miles northwest of Abernathy where son Bud completed the family. They soon moved to a house on 14th St., then in 1964 built their present home on Ave. H.

Both boys are graduates of AHS and of the University of Texas. Bill works for IBM in San Antonio, is married to an Austin girl, and has a baby son. Bud is a farmer and married a local girl, Sue Enger. They and their son live here.

Iva doesn't agree with husband Irvan that she'll be retiring now that she's leaving public work. She always truly enjoyed housework and home and family life and thinks these pursuits, and the exploits of Roger Staubach and the Dallas Cowboys will keep her well entertained.

She will miss seeing everyone each day. One of the best things about her years of work with the public was the opportunity to get to know so many people of other races she's never have met staying home. She always worried about people who found it hard to pay utility bills and each new rate increase brings new worries about how less affluent ones will be affected.

This sympathy for other people made the job harder for her perhaps than for someone not so caring. Several people dropped by last week to bring her little gifts and wish her well, proving that this quality so troublesome to her has endeared her to SPS customers through the years.

Word Substitution Causes School Board Disagreement, Representatives Question Summer Bid Procedure

Over the strong objection of one of its members and refusal to participate from another, Abernathy School Board voted to change a word in the minutes of a June school board meeting. Don McKenzie voted against the change and Daniel Fondy abstained.

The disagreement was over whether the word "ask" could be changed to "let" in a motion made by Fondy concerning bids on school improvements. The arguments boiled down to whether the word substitution is a correction, which is legal, or a change, which is not.

The June minutes record a motion by Fondy and second by David Pinson that architect Brasher ask for bids on improvements to the school. At that same meeting, Brasher presented estimates for the work which included ceiling tile, storm windows, roofing, and renovation of the administrative area at high school, and paving for the Academic Center parking lot. Total estimate for the work was \$89,245.

At the board's January meeting, Board President Billie Harrison said they needed to correct the June minutes because of an error in the penciled notes of business manager Earl Carter who takes minutes of the meetings. Harrison didn't

explain or specify the correction. There was a long discussion about whether or not a correction could be made. Fondy said since that item was not on the agenda, action and further discussion had to be delayed until next meeting when it could officially be put on the agenda.

When the discussion was continued at the February meeting, Dr. Webb said he checked with Texas Association of School Board legal sources which said minutes can be corrected at any subsequent meeting.

The situation still seemed to bother McKenzie who said he did not want to be held liable to the taxpayers (for an improper procedure). He asked Harrison how many times minutes had been changed in his 20 years on the board. Harrison replied that it's done all time but when pressed further, couldn't remember offhand the last instance.

When Richard Howard asked McKenzie how he wanted to handle the matter, McKenzie said they should consult Attorney Paul Lyle, the school's usual legal consultant. His motion to do that got no second and died. A motion by Jerry Oswald to change the wording from "ask" to "let" was approved by Oswald, Pinson, Bob Riley, Howard, and Harrison.

When asked later why he

opposed the change so strongly, McKenzie said he couldn't remember nor find record of bid approval by the board as required by law. The change of wording makes the original Fondy motion in June say that architect Brasher should let bids on the project. When asked later what was the intent of his original motion, Fondy said he intended what he said—that Brasher ask for bids on the improvements.

School boards, city councils, and other groups handling public funds are required to ask for bids on expenditures amounting to more than \$2000. Requests for bids must be advertised and bids submitted within certain time limits. The group receiving bids opens (or designates someone to open) them in an advertised public meeting and decides which one, if any, to accept. Bids which are granted are said to be "let".

The bid procedure is time consuming and inconvenient but helps prevent mishandling of contracts and public funds. Elected groups sometimes depart from it in emergencies by parceling out one job in several contracts of lesser amounts. This is bending the law but is understandable in real emergencies and conscientious public officials take care to explain the action and the necessity.

NEW APPOINTMENTS

Five more citizens were named to the Building Planning Committee to represent minority groups of the community. Richard Howard, Daniel Fondy, and Jerry Oswald nominated Israel Garza; Bob Riley nominated Lupe Ramos, David Pinson nominated Dee Palmer, Don McKenzie nominated Mrs. Jesse Marez, Jr., and Billie Harrison nominated O. A. Sanders. The committee will meet for the first time Thursday, February 15 at 7:30 PM. Harvey Lutrick is serving as chairman.

ELECTION SET

The board called for an election April 7 in City Hall to fill three places on Abernathy School Board. The terms of Daniel Fondy, Jerry Oswald, and Bob Riley expire in April. The city election is the same date and place but will be supervised by a different staff. Business manager Carter said city and school officials decided, after a trial of one staff for one election, that things go much faster with two.

The board decided to ask Leland Phillips to serve as school board election judge and Dan Ward as alternate judge. City Secretary Otella Clement will be absentee election clerk. (CONTINUED ON PG. 3)

Filing Deadline Fast Approaching For April 7 Candidates

People who plan to be candidates in the school board and city council elections April 7 have only two and a half weeks to file their intention at City Hall or the school administration office. The deadline is March 7, 30 days before the election.

The city council terms of Mayor Pete Thompson and Aldermen Harold Thompson and Hoppy Toler end in April. Mayor Thompson has served three two year terms. Both Hoppy Toler and Harold Thompson were elected to their first terms of office two years ago. None of the three have as yet filed for re-election.

Both Jerry Oswald and Bob Riley are candidates for re-election to Abernathy School Board. Daniel Fondy, whose term also ends, has not filed. School board representatives are elected at large for three year terms.

Oswald is finishing his first term on the board. He is a farmer and received all his schooling in Abernathy. His wife, the former Claudia Shipman, is also an AHS graduate. They have three children. Debbie is a freshman at San Angelo State, Jeff is a junior at AHS, and Lori is a sophomore.

Oswald says of his candidacy, "I am running for re-election to the board because I have an interest in the overall school system. I feel we have an excellent school system here at Abernathy. I hope to continue to serve and help make decisions that will provide for the best possible education for the boys and girls of the Abernathy School District."

Bob Riley is also a farmer and is finishing his fifth term (15 years) on the school board. He's a graduate of AHS and married to another AHS graduate, the former Gwen Simpson. They have four children. Van, the youngest, is a junior at AHS.

The Dale Arthurs Earn Acapulco Trip from Elanco

PARIS, Tx--Dale Arthur, who resides east of Abernathy on FM 597, has captured first place in the 1978 Soybean Association Yield Contest (TSA); the winning yield was 71.6 bushels per acre.

Arthur was awarded the title at the TSA convention here on January 26. Presentation of the award was by R. J. Hodges, Jr., Texas Agricultural Extension Service Agronomist, and Jim Forrest, District Sales Manager for Elanco Product Company.

Arthur has been raising irrigated soybeans--the old recipe--intermittently for years, but this year he tried a new twist. He planted Northrup King's Multivar 100 beans in double rows on 40-inch beds. The seeding rate was 56 pounds per acre.

Dale Arthur knew he had a good soybean crop, but was surprised when the yield was calculated to be 71.6 bushels/acre. He feels that while the extremely hot weather here has kept yield down, his last irrigation pushed his yield up high by helping the beans finish filling out.

Soybean raise as one of Arthur's favorite crops there are few weed problems and the crop combines cleanly.

The West Texas grower was pleased with the Multivar 100 beans. Shattering was not a problem, and the pod placement on the stalk made combining cleaner and easier with little field loss. Dale Arthur comments, "I only lost beans (to harvesting) when I knocked some off with the combine at the turnrow."

This was Arthur's first entry in the yield contest. Northrup King Termino Manager, Billy Beard, sold the Multivar 100 seed to Arthur and then convinced him to enter the contest. Dale and his wife Dorothy are excited about the win, and Dale would like to enter other yield contests. In regard to Dale's future plans, Dorothy summed up his feelings, "I think he's got the winning fever."

Dale Arthur feels he can improve on his winning yield. While he is undecided on his 1979 strategy, he does feel that his 1978 yield should be credited to using double row planting, timely irrigations, and "cotton fertilizer" (analysis 10-30-9). Also, in preparing the seedbed, Arthur dragged "bullet" -- heavy sections of metal pipe -- down the furrows to allow more efficient use of irrigation water. He slowed down the application speed of the water during each of the 5 irrigations.

Arthur will increase his soybean acres in 1979, planting NK Multivar 100 exclusively.

The entire Arthur family is actively engaged in working the family farm. Daughter Kathy, 20, is married and her husband Bryan Wigham works the farm with Dale Arthur, Ronnda, 18, Donna, 16, and Susan, 15, are all students at Abernathy High School in Abernathy. Son, Grady, 13, is in seventh grade in Abernathy. Mrs. Arthur comments, "Even though the kids gripe about the work occasionally, they like farm life and don't want to move to town." Dorothy Arthur herself drives the trucks at harvest time and often journeys to town for replacement parts for broken equipment.

The Arthurs enjoy their rural lifestyle, and their reflection and heritage is reflected in Dale Arthur's CB handle, "Texas Plow Boy."

In recognition of the winning yield, Dale and Dorothy Arthur will travel to Acapulco, Mexico, as guests of Elanco.

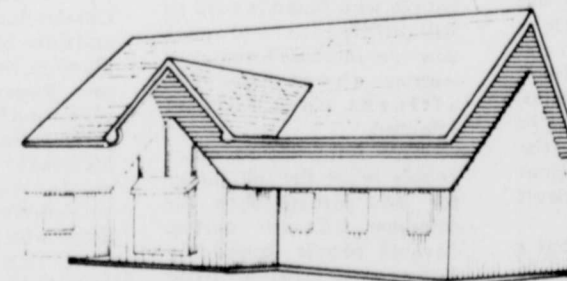

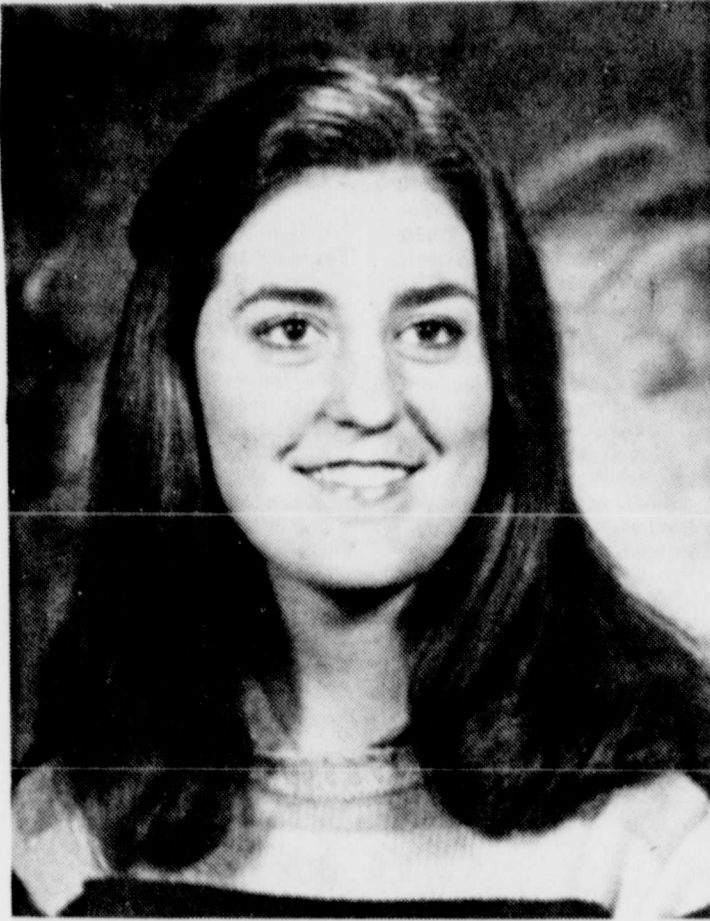

TAX EXEMPTIONS
People have been asking how to apply for the tax exemptions approved at the last session of the Texas legislature. People who own the houses they live in as of January 1, 1979 can exclude \$5000 of the market value of their home from school taxes. The exemption is only for two years.

Business manager Carter said about 774 people in Abernathy School District will benefit from that exemption. About 190 of those probably also qualify for an exemption for people over age 65.

Since the school tax office needs the applications for exemptions before April 30 and, since most people don't know the legal description of their homes (and it must be on the application), Mr. Carter suggested his office notify taxpayers by mail that application must be made and what information is required. He suggested they also enclose window envelopes so people will be more likely to reply. The envelopes will only cost \$26. The board approved the suggestion.

MORE ACTIONS
Public School Week was set for the first full week in March. Dr. Webb said this will be the state's 50th observance of Public School Week. The highlight of the event locally this year will be open house at the newly completed CAVE building.

Gary Stalcup was granted leave time from his teaching duties to run for the office of state director of the Classroom Teachers Association. If elected to office, Stalcup will need to be away two to four teaching days.

Policy Books - Board members were asked to bring their school board policy books by the administration office for update. One item to be changed is the mandatory retirement age recently set by the government at age 70 instead of 65, as the policy books indicate. Webb said the school has no employees affected by the requirement.

School Trips - The board granted permission for the Antelope Band to attend the Blossom Festival at Canon City, Colorado, May 4 if it wins first division ratings in both concert and sight reading events at contest this spring. It also approved a National Honor Society trip to Austin on a date to be set later and trips to the San Antonio Stock Show February 7-16.

Georgia Bartlett, art lab instructor at high school, asked to use the Academic Center and Art Lab for private art classes and for an art workshop this summer. She will charge a fee for these classes. The board approved her request but asked that she pay a minimum building use fee of about \$7.50 plus the cost of any extra custodial service.

Dr. Webb asked permission to assist Dr. Zingraff, head of the Education Administration Department at Texas Tech, in several workshops and seminars on the Tech campus this spring. School board policy encourages staff and faculty participation in such things but, since Webb will be paid for his services, board approval is required. Teachers don't have to have board approval for part time jobs because policy empowers school principals to decide whether or not the jobs interfere with teaching duties.

Webb said the seminars and workshops will require a lot of night reading but he considers the invitation an honor and a real challenge. He assured the board that it will not interfere with his duties as school superintendent.

RESIDENT TEACHERS
School policy stipulates that school employees must live in the school district unless they own their own home elsewhere at the time of employment or work in a "critical area". About 11 employees do not fulfill this obligation and board members discussed whether to drop or enforce the policy. They recognized the difficulty of finding suitable housing in Abernathy but noted the obvious advantages of resident teachers who share the after hours work load and participate in the community.

Dr. Webb said a bill about to be introduced in the legislature will add "place of

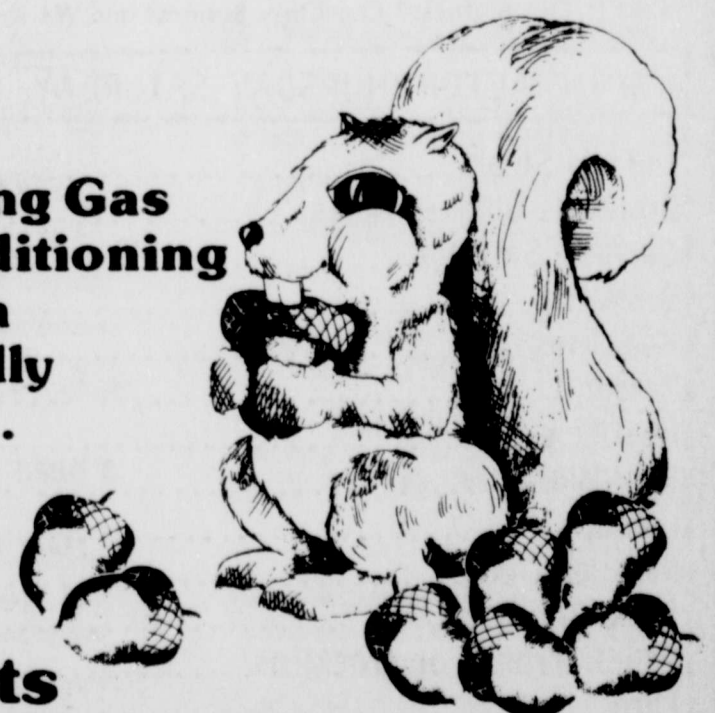

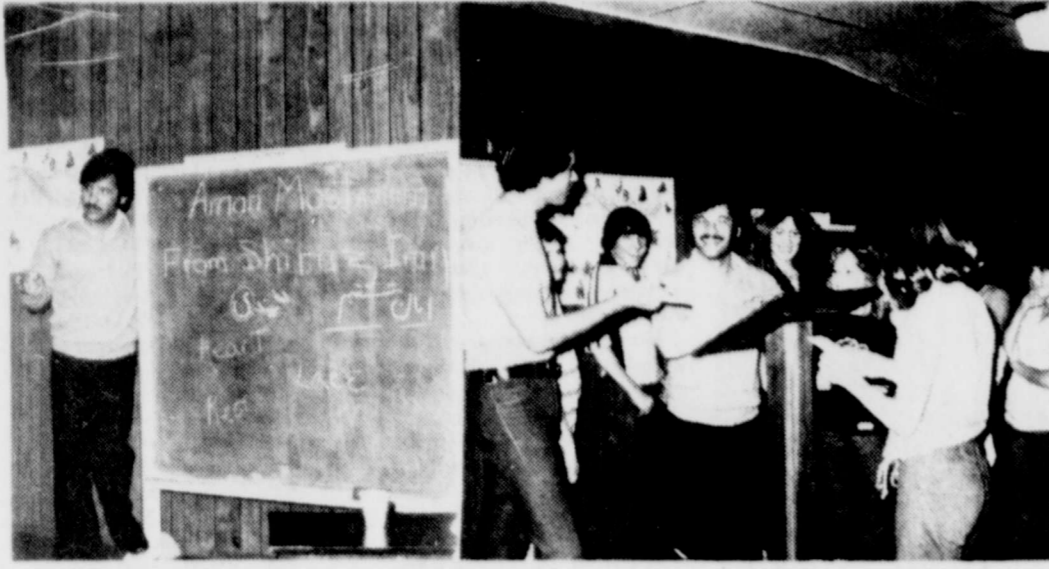

J.M.Y. Has Guest Speaker

Aman Mostaghim, a Civil Engineering student at Texas Tech University, from Shina, Iran spoke to the Junior High Methodist Youth Sunday, February 11 at 5 p.m. He presented many interesting aspects of his home country of Iran, that is now on the verge of civil war. He told of their culture, family life, education, schools and other interesting subjects.

Aman will graduate in May and then plans on returning to Iran to try to help his country through the use of his newly learned engineering skills. Aman and several of his friends have received much ridicule for their indifference to the Shah's regime from the anti-Shah protesters in Lubbock. They have not participated in any of the anti-Shah demonstrations in Lubbock.

Following his presentation the J.M.Y. members had questions for Aman. These are some of the things they wanted to know about; what does he like about living in

Texas? Aman said, he has traveled all around the United States and he likes West Texas best because of the friendly people and the sunshine. When asked about the type of food they eat, he said, they eat mostly chicken, lamb, vegetables, rice and fresh fruit. He said, they don't have juice so they eat fruit. He said, the most popular fruit is grapes. He also said, that he has not seen the kind of grapes here that they have in Iran.

When asked what it looks like at his home town, he said, there are nearly a half million people that live in Shina and that it has mountains around it. It is warm and people come there to live in the winter months. They grow a lot of flowers, fruit and they have very beautiful city parks.

Aman has four brothers and three sisters. His father makes construction materials such as bricks, pipes and ceramics for building.

The boys and girls were

interested to know about it. They go six years to elementary and six years to high school. The boys go to a separate school from the girls. There are a few schools that boys and girls attend together, but they have to take a test and be rich to attend these schools. Following getting out of high school both the boys and girls go into the military for two years. If a student wants to go to college they have to be tested over all they have learned in high school.

Aman had a friend that lived in Lubbock and he wrote to Aman and asked him if he would like to come to the United States and attend college, so he decided he would after he got out of the military, and three months later he was in the states. He came here in 1974 and attended college at Midland College in Midland for a year. He came to Texas Tech in 1975. Aman told the group that Iran has a different calendar than we do, it is based on Mohammed's birthday. At the present it is 1357 in Iran.

Another real interest was if they write like we do. Aman said, they have 32 letters in their alphabet and they are not like ours. They write from left to right. He wrote his name on the board for them. They were all given paper and he wrote all of their names for them and anything else they ask him to write.

Leaders for J.M.Y. are Johnny Rantz, who is a senior student at Texas Tech, who was responsible for getting Aman to come to speak, Mrs. David Waite is a leader also.

Morality can not merit it. Baptism can not buy it. Philosophy can not produce it. Education can not earn it. Science can not secure it. The government can not guarantee it. The church can not confer it. But you may have it.

St. Paul said, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast."

In other words: God thought it, the Bible taught it, Jesus bought it, the Holy Spirit wrought it, the mind caught it, the soul sought it, the devil fought it, faith accepted it, but everyone may enjoy it.

Yes, salvation is the gift of God. Accept it, won't you?

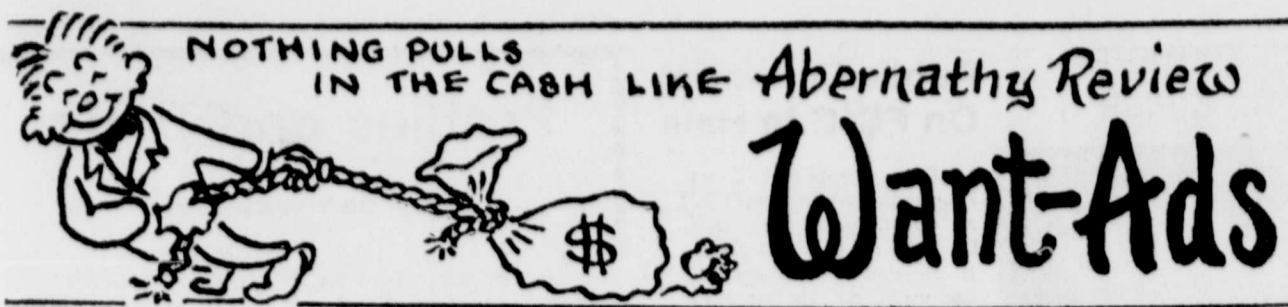
