COMMUNITY CIVIC BUILDING AND COMMUNITY LIBRARY PROJECT DISCUSSED AT MEETING

City Manager Larry Fields answered three big questions about the Community Civic Building and Community Library Project at Lions Club Tuesday last week. --Can we afford it? Who is going to pay for it? The answer to the first, he said, "YES, WE CAN AFFORD IT." The city is in excellent financial shape with a debt ratio almost unheard of among cities.

EVERYBODY IS GOING TO PAY FOR THE PROJECT. The use of tax dollars means everybody will pay their share equally. EVERYBODY WILL GET TO USE THE NEW FACILITIES. If everybody pays, everybody should benefit. There will be no extra advantage for anyone.

Fields asked and answered another question that may be in people's minds. "IF WE ARE IN SUCH GREAT FINANCIAL SHAPE, WHY DOES THIS PROJECT MEAN A TAX INCREASE?"

In spite of inflation and \$100,000 worth of capital improvements projects and organizational improvements over the past few years, the city's general debt requirements have

decreased each year. For that reason, the city has been able to put increasing percentages of tax dollars into the general operating fund, alleviating the need for a tax increase.

In 1974-75, 58% of the tax rate was applied to general obligation indebtedness. That decreased to 41% in 1975-76, 33% in 1976-77, 21% in 1977-78, and 12% in 1978-79. Without this switch of tax money from general obligation indebtedness to the general operating fund, a tax increase would already have been necessary to help the city meet month to month expenses.

It took \$100,000 worth of improvements to meet goals set by Abernathy City Council to care for present and future needs of the city. The water project designed to insure an adequate supply is almost complete, a new fire truck was purchased and the old uncerified landfill was closed and a new certified one opened. The city also purchased a new police car and hired two police dispatchers. All this was accomplished without a tax increase, yet without the Community Civic Building and Library

Project, the city will be out of debt in two years. There's no financial reason not to begin a new project beneficial to the community.

With the three main questions answered, said Fields, PEOPLE NEED TO DECIDE WHETHER OR NOT THE PROJECT IS NEEDED AND WILL BE AN ASSET TO THE COMMUNITY.

The city meeting room was used an average of 200 days out of 261 weekdays last year by about 14 different groups. These figures don't include city council meetings, etc. which average twice a month. There's also a booking problem with several groups needing the room the same days.

The meeting room is much too small for many groups using it regularly, such as the large Sunshine Group, a gathering of older citizens. It is totally inadequate for community dances, large receptions and reunions and banquets. The planned addition to City Hall will be about the size of the school cafeteria and will offer plenty of room for previously mentioned community gatherings. The present meeting room can handle

medium size ones and the library room can take care of small groups. All three can be in use at the same time. Construction of the new addition will not interrupt use of the present meeting room.

Groups having large banquets must now use the school cafeteria which, because of school rules, limits their menu to dinners prepared by the school cafeteria staff. Banquets in a city facility could be catered by restaurants or other food serving groups.

Another frequently mentioned community benefit is the possibilities for use during Abernathy's Fourth of July celebration. It would offer shade, coolness, and badly needed restrooms.

EXPANDED LIBRARY NEEDED

The Abernathy Library recently had to refuse a donation of 50 books because there's no place to put them. Librarian Evaughn Hackler said it made her ill to have to turn down the offer but several boxes of books already fill a corner of the library room because there's no place for them on the shelves. That was not the first donation of books she has had to turn down.

The library, begun years ago by the 1935 Study Club, outgrew the library room long ago. The club still operates and is responsible for the library with financial aid from the City of Abernathy and Hale County. Mrs. Hackler lists many programs the library could offer Abernathy people if there were only room.

Abernathy's main problem is lack of recreation facilities for its people. An expanded library could do a lot to fill that gap. The weekly movies during the summer drew too many kids to fit into the city hall meeting room and fire hall. This popular program cannot be continued without more space and more personnel.

The Weekly Review asked Mrs. Hackler to describe what an expanded library can do for Abernathy and what she needs to adequately serve the community. She suggested that local people consider the following questions.

Do you want a public library where you may come and read quietly for a few hours or check out a book

to take home and enjoy reading for fun or facts? Do you need an answer to a question or information on a definite subject which may be found in a public library?

Do you need a place to view a film for fun or facts which the public library may furnish? Do you need information for a report or part on a program which may be found in reference books in the public library?

Would you like to share in a pattern exchange in the public library? Do you have an exhibit you would like to share in the public library?

Do you have a child who would like a story hour in the public library? Do you have books you would like to donate to a public library?

Would you like a public library to be open in the evenings?

Would you like to learn a craft at the public library?

WHAT A PUBLIC LIBRARY COULD DO FOR ABERNATHY

northeast of here. He will continue to farm in addition to his work for the city.



TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Abernathy, Texas, on the 7th day of April, 1979, in obedience to a resolution and order duly entered by the City Council which is attached hereto and made a part of this Notice for all intents and purposes.

A RESOLUTION AND ORDER by the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, calling a bond election to be held within said City, making provision for the conduct of the election and other provisions incident and related to the purpose of this resolution and order.
WHEREAS, the City Council of Abernathy, Texas, has determined that an election should be held to ascertain whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the amount and for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore,
BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 7th day of April, 1979, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of the adoption hereof, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, be authorized to issue \$250,000 general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing permanent improvements, to wit: a community center/municipal library building adjacent to the City Hall; said bonds to be issued in one or more installments, to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council at the time of issuance; and shall there be levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the City sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"
SECTION 2: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V. A. T. S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:
THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR A COMMUNITY CENTER/LIBRARY BUILDING
The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.
SECTION 3: That the entire City of Abernathy, Texas, shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the City Hall in said City is hereby designated as the polling place. On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.
SECTION 4: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:
ZELMA HALE, Presiding Judge; TERESA MAREZ, Alternate Presiding Judge.
The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than eight (8) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.
Absentee voting shall be conducted at the City Secretary's office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of V. A. T. S. Election Code, Chapter 5.
SECTION 5: That all resident qualified electors of the City shall be permitted to vote at said election. This election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code except as modified by Chapter 1 of Title 22, V. A. T. S., and as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.
SECTION 6: That a substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be

posted in the election precinct and at the City Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in said City, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

S., de manera de permitir que los electores voten "EN PRO" o "EN CONTRA" a la mencionada proposicion que se presentara basicamente de la siguiente manera:
"LA EMISION DE BONOS DE OBLIGACION GENERAL PARA EL EDIFICIO DE CENTRO SOCIAL/BIBLIOTECA"

display youth exhibits including collections such as rocks, with appropriate books, or items from a tour taken by some local person. The library could offer paperback book and pattern exchanges and a summer reading program in cooperation with the school, including visits by grades and certificate awards. It could order materials for individuals from inter-library services, offer adult crafts, films, and club room use. It could have a story hour or films for children in summer time and adult films both winter and summer. With a Library Board and an active Friends of the Library Group, a city financed library could accomplish these definite goals set in a five year plan: (1) a new building, (2) whole library catalogue, (3) good equipment, (4) meet state library requirements for membership, (5) line up for public library grants. We can have a good public library in Abernathy. We need room for more books, to be open more hours, new and more programs for the community.

We need state membership to qualify for grants to improve our library. To meet membership requirements for libraries that serve 10,000 or less people, we must have a \$5,000 budget, 7500 items in the library, be open 20 hours per week, and have one staff member employed in library duties at least 20 hours per week. In 1978, the Abernathy library spent \$872.18 on books, \$1271 on salary, and saved \$101, for total expenditures of \$2,244.97. The City of Abernathy contributed \$1500 to the library's support and Hale County contributed \$944.97. In December 1978, the library contained 4,671 volumes and circulated 2,737 volumes. Book circulation average is 580 per month in summer time-May through August, and 49 per month in winter-September through April. Attendance at the summer films was 632 persons. Average attendance was 79.

We learn things early in our lives. Let's have a public library for our children. Learning ability develops 50% by the time one is four years old, 30% by the time one is nine years old, and 20% by the time one is 60 years old. When one reads, he has fun, is never bored, learns something new everyday. Education is caught, not sought.

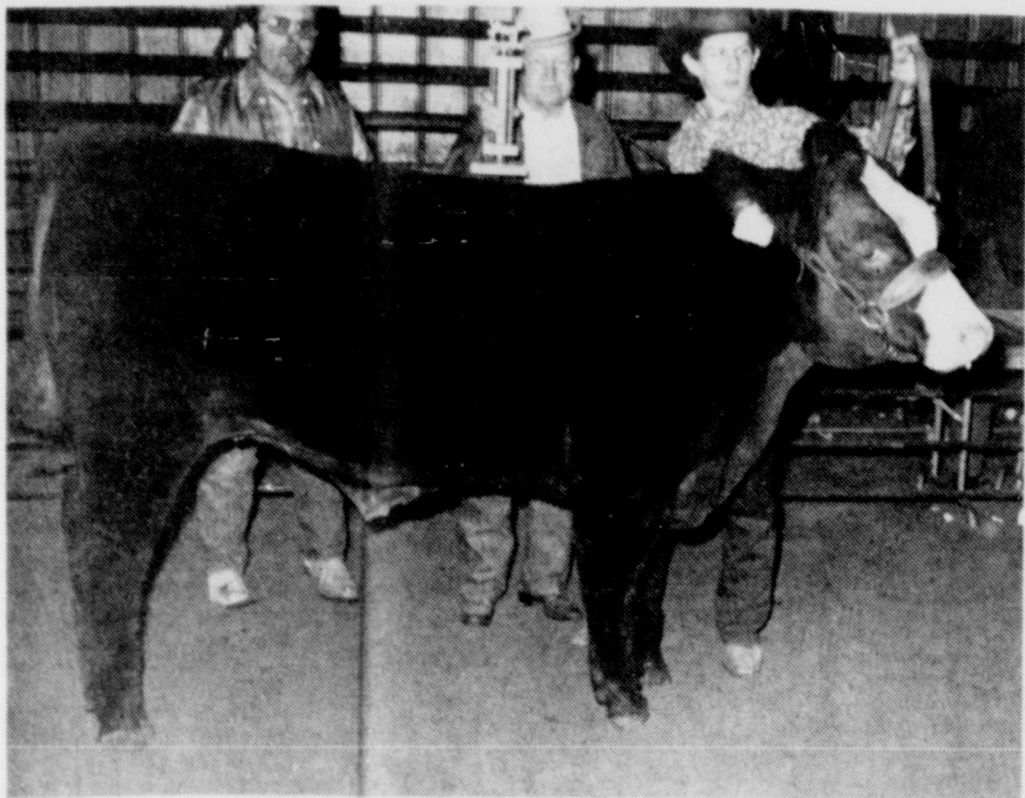

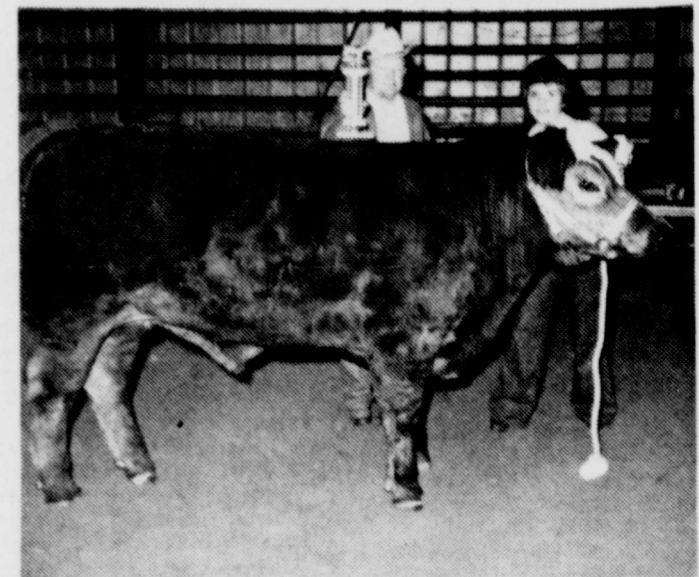

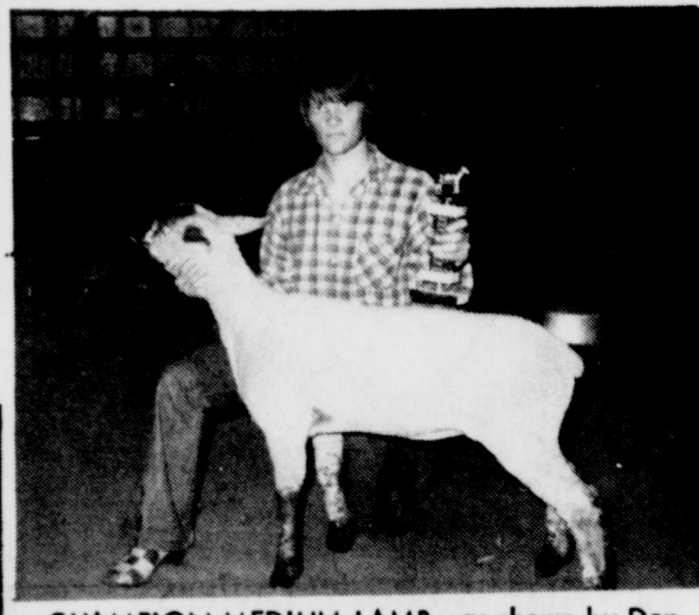
