Abernathy 4-H To Have Fabric Sale

The Finance Committee members of the Hale County Extension Homemakers and 4-H Councils have been offered a unique fund-raising project from Roadrunner Fabrics.

This opportunity is a fabric sale being sponsored in Plainview at the Agriculture Center on Monday, March 26, from 9:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. by the Extension Homemakers Finance Committee. A percentage of the fabric sold will be given to the Council to be used for scholarships and other educational programs. 4-H clubs in Petersburg, Hale Center, and Abernathy will sponsor the sale in each community on March 27, 28, and 29 respectively.

Proceeds received from these three sales will be used for the Exchange program. In this program, Hale County 4-H families will host Kentucky 4-H members this June, and visit Kentucky 4-H's in June of 1980. In previous years, 4-H members of Hale County have had similar exchanges with Iowa and Minnesota. Plainview area residents should take advantage of this opportunity to buy spring fabrics at low prices, while helping Extension Homemakers and 4-H programs at the same time.

Candidate Roster Complete For April 7 Election For City And School Entries

The April 7 candidate roster is complete. Mayor Pete Thompson, elected to office six years ago, is unopposed for re-election. Carl Johnson, store manager for Sanders Auto Supply, joins incumbent aldermen Hoppy Toler and Harold Thompson in a try for two city council seats.

Three open places on Abernathy School Board attracted Larry Griffin, Carmen Lopez, Max Garza, Jan Wesley, Bob Cuevas, Jr., and Bobby Cunningham as well as incumbents Bob Riley, Jerry Oswald, and Daniel Fondy.

Griffin is a pharmacist and former city alderman; Lopez, a homemaker and former teacher's aide; and Garza, building inspector for the cities of Lubbock and Abernathy.

Wesley is a hairdresser and homemaker; Cuevas, a job developer counselor; and Cunningham, a local businessman and former city alderman.

City voters will also vote for or against a \$250,000 bond issue to finance the proposed Community Civic Building and Community Library.

Absentee voting began last Monday at City Hall. Qualified voters who will be out of town on April 7 may cast their ballots for mayor, aldermen, school board representatives, and the bond issue through Tuesday, April 3. City Secretary Otella Clement is absentee election clerk.

There's still time to attend meetings, talk to candidates and elected officials, ask questions, and discuss views before making up your mind. Architects' drawings of the proposed civic building and library are on display at City Hall, the city council will have an extra meeting Tuesday, March 27 at 4 PM, and the school board's next regular meeting will be Monday, April 2 at 7:30 PM.

Do You Want Dogs Running Loose In City? Dog "Problem" To Be Presented At Council Meeting

In some places the robin may be the harbinger of spring but in Abernathy it is the annual beginning of calls to City Hall by local citizens complaining of dogs being allowed to run free on our streets. City Manager Larry Fields reported there were several calls last week and again this week reporting dogs loose, and asking for them to be picked up.

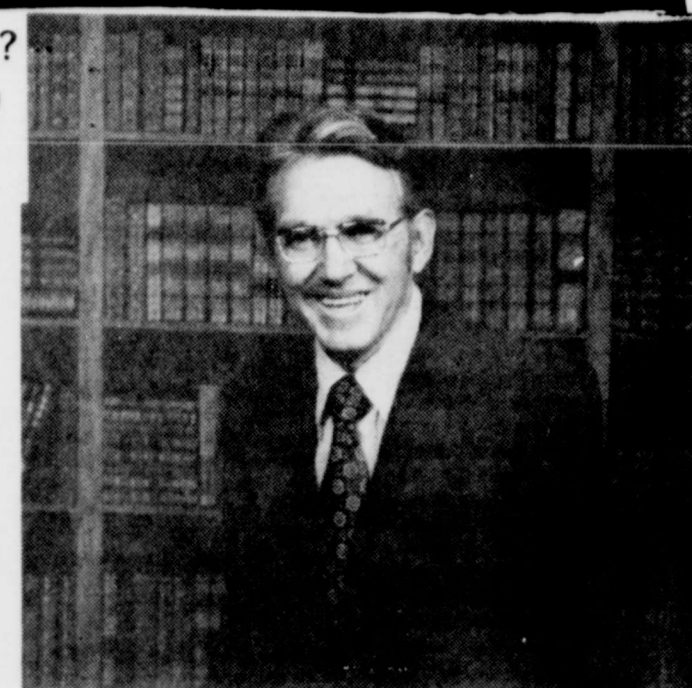
As the weather changes and begins to be suitable for outdoor activities more people are out to exercise, walk, jog, bicycle, or begin their yard and garden work. They are finding that there are many, or more, dogs on the loose as there were about a year ago when our present City Dog Ordinance was implemented. The people are annoyed and upset that the ordinance has not been enforced. Although some people need to be outside for exercise for health reasons it seems that the dogs have top priority. Other than being a nuisance, tearing up flowers and gardens, clothes off the line, etc. they are also a danger. Some of the large dogs are capable of seriously injuring a child at play.

Larry Fields says we do have a good ordinance but have problems and it is not getting the job done. "It is hard to enforce due to the large number of dogs and lack of cooperation by the dog owners," said Fields. Stray dogs are part of the problem but by no means all of it. Mr. Pete Cantu

devotes 5 hours of his time each week driving the streets and checking for dogs loose. He is also on call at all times. The question was asked "Can the city not afford someone to work this full time or more time than is presently being devoted to it?"

There will be a special meeting of the City Council on March 27 and Fields says he intends to present this package to the Mayor and City Council members. A stepped up enforcement of the Dog Ordinance with the issuing of more citations to dog owners who are not complying with the ordinance, (only two citations have been given since the ordinance was put into effect) the use of the dart gun, and traps. There is also the possibility of having more man power.

If the residents of Abernathy want to have the Dog Ordinance enforced they should make their wishes known and cooperate with the officials. It is pointless to have it on the books if it is ignored as would be the housing code, etc. Your pet should be kept in a fenced in yard he cannot jump out of, or be on a leash at all times. Anyone wishing to report a dog out may call City Hall and be sure to give the exact location of the dog. Mr. Cantu should receive cooperation from everyone and the dog owners should not resent him for doing his job.



New Minister At ND Church of Christ

Jack Nadeau, the new Minister at the New Deal Church of Christ, is a Professor of German and Bible at Lubbock Christian College. He is a graduate of Harding College in Searcy, Arkansas, and of Eastern Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. DORETTE DAVIS ON DEANS HONOR ROLL

SAN MARCOS-Four Hale County students were among the 3,629 students whose fall semester grades earned them places on the Southwest Texas State University Dean's Honor Roll and Superior Honor Roll lists.

To make the regular Honor Roll, a student must be enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester hours of coursework, excluding physical education activities, and achieve an overall "B" average.

To make the Superior Honor Roll requires grades of "A" in at least 12 of the required 15 semester hours of coursework, excluding physical education activities, and no lower than a "B" in the other three-hour course. This translates into a 3.8 grade-point average on the 4.0 scale for honor.

Undergraduate courses only are considered in the tabulated list. Incomplete, or "I", grades earned during the fall semester disqualify students from the Honor Rolls.

CITY COUNCIL REPORT FROM MARCH 12

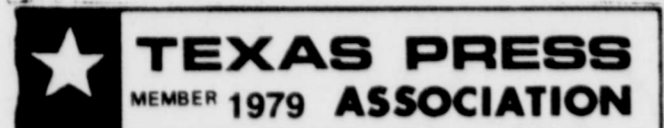
A local man angrily interrupted Abernathy City Council's March 12 meeting with complaints about the chief of police and some unhappiness with the council. City Manager Larry Fields explained that charges against public employees must by law be presented in writing and considered at a subsequent meeting with both sides present.

Since the chief was at the meeting, the man felt it should be discussed right then. However, after talking privately with Fields, he left and later in the week submitted the complaints in writing. SANITATION DIFFICULTY Preston Coomer of Triple "C" Sanitation Company met with the council to present figures proving that he's losing money providing garbage pickup for the city. He asked for immediate relief saying rising fuel costs and landfill fees hit him so fast he's almost operating on a depreciation schedule.

There's been no raise in garbage collection rates since 1975 and Coomer didn't ask for it then. Coomer handles trash pickup for other towns, too, and dumps at Hale Center and Crosbyton, where he can burn stuff. He had already suggested that the city let him dump collect garbage in the city landfill at reduced rates to avoid transportation costs. That would fill the landfill quickly, though, making it necessary to open a new one. The city would also be forced to buy a bulldozer to cover the dumped garbage more often than is now required. The only other alternative is a rate increase.

Fields said the landfill is paid for by taxes and loses money. He thinks it's best that people pay by use so as not to put a burden on the tax dollar. He agreed that people are leaving more garbage for the city to collect since landfill rates increased. People put things in dumpsters they used to take to the landfill themselves before dumping rates increased. A city truck keeps busy all the time hauling brush and tree limbs. Coomer says at present garbage rates, he furnishes the collection containers,

and seals them. The council approved a proposal for seal coating 31 blocks of street at an estimated cost of 70¢ per square yard for a total of \$31,357.20. The city's engineering consultants estimated \$26,877.60 but Fields thinks it's best to plan high to avoid surprises. He commended that \$19,357.20 of the seal coat project be paid out of revenue sharing funds. The city budgeted \$12,000 for street repair. The city engineer divided the streets into three priority groups but, since the city did no street work last year, Fields recommended that all the three groups be coated this year. He said the streets in worst condition are some with very little traffic. Discuse makes the pavement "die" and disintegrate. Traffic keeps pavement "alive" (cont'n on page 5)

ORDINANCE #237
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE 1, SECTION 14-16, OF THE ABERNATHY CITY CODE 1974; PRESCRIBING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; CONTAINING A SEPARABILITY CLAUSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 14, Article 1, Section 14-16, New Service Connections, of the Abernathy City Code 1974, be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 14-16. New Service Connections.

When a new service connection with the mains is necessary, the consumer or the property owner or his agent must pay to the City Water Works the following charges:

- 3/4" inch connection, ... \$125.00
- 1" inch connection, ... \$200.00
- Over 1" inch connection, ... Entire cost of tap.

The term "connection" shall mean that the City Water Works furnish all material and labor necessary to supply water to the consumer from the water mains through the meter, and shall include tapping water main, pipe, pipe fittings, meter box, meter valve, meter and labor. It shall be unlawful for any plumber, or person, or persons, other than the tapper employed by the City Water Works, to tap in street mains or to extend service pipes from mains, and all this material and equipment shall be under the exclusive control of the City Water Works.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and the new fee be effective on March 15, 1979.

SECTION 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and declared of no further force and effect.

SECTION 4. If any section, sub-section, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such section, sub-section, clause, phrase, or portion shall be deemed separate, distinct and independent provision, and such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE 3, SECTION 14-58 (c) OF THE ABERNATHY CITY CODE 1974; PRESCRIBING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; CONTAINING A SEPARABILITY CLAUSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY TO EXIST.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 14, Article 3, Section 14-58 (c) of the Abernathy City Code be, and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 14-58 (c)
(c) Where water service is discontinued as to any consumer, at one or more premises, on account of non-payment for water furnished consumer at any premises until the full amount delinquent shall have been paid together with all fees and charges herein provided. In such event water service shall not be again furnished consumer until payment in full of all delinquent amounts plus \$10.00 additional for reconnection and inspection fee or \$25.00 as to each such meter shall be paid prior to furnishing water to such consumer again.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and the new fee be effective on March 15, 1979.

SECTION 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and declared of no further force and effect.

SECTION 4. If any section, sub-section, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such section, sub-section, clause, phrase, or portion shall be deemed separate, distinct and independent provision, and such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion.
