An accompanying letter congratulated him on accumulating over 2000 hours of sick leave and said that recordshows he is aware of the values and benefits of sick leave.



City, School District Residents Choose Representatives, Decide Bond Issue Abemathy voters go to bock. This is Bob Cuevas, Jr. 's first bid for public

the polls Saturday to elect a mayor, two city aldermen, three school trustees, and decide the fate of a proposed meeting facility addition to Abernathy City Hall and expansion of the city library.

Voting for mayor, alderand school trustees takes place in the City Hall meeting room, 7 AM to 7 PM, April 7. Voting for the bond issue to finance the meeting room and library expansion will be in the library room at city hall, same hours.

Election judges and clerks will steer voters to the right place. Only people who live in Abemathy can vote for mayor and aldermen. Only property owners who live in the city limits can vote in the bond elect-Both Abernathy taxpayers and those who live outside the city limits but n Abemathy Independent School District can vote for school trustees.

Zelma Hale is city election judge with Teresa Marez as alternate, Leland Phillips is school election

Incumbent Mayor Pete Thompson is unopposed for re-election to the office he has held for six years. Incumbent aldermen Hoppy Toler and Harold Thompson have each served two years on the council. Challenger Carl Johnson, an unsuccessful write-in candidate last year, is store manager of Sanders Auto Supply.

Six candidates, including two women, want school board places held by incumbents Bob Riley, Jerry Oswalt, and Daniel Fondy. All three incumbents are farmers. Riley has served on the board 15 years. This election marks the end of Oswalt's and Fondy's first three year term.

Carmen Lopez, a homemaker and former teacher's aide, and Jan Wesley, a homemaker and hairdresser. are the only women candidates for school board since Mona Toler ran unsuccessfully several years ago, Irma Ward, now deceased, was elected to the boardback in the 50's. She's the only woman ever elected to the board.

Two former city aldermen are school board candidates. Larry Griffin, a pharmacist and president of West Texas Junior Basketball Association, was an unsuccessful candidate for school board last year. Bobby Cunningham, owner of 66 Butane & Fertilizer Co., was unsuccessful write -in candidate for school board several years ago.

Max Garza is making his third try for a seat on the school board. He is the building inspector for the City of Abemathy and Chief Building Construction Inspector for the City of Luboffice. He is a job developer counselor for SER Jobs For Progress in Lubbock. * * *

The \$25,000 bond issue to finance the Community Civic Building and Community Library will mean a 16% increase in city taxes. Property taxes now are 95¢ per \$100 valuation. If the bond issue passes, taxes will be \$1, 10 per \$100 valuation.

Proponents say the persent meeting room is totally inadequate for community needs, It is booked constantly and many groups must search for places to meet. It is too small for banquets, dances, Sunshine Group luncheons, and other large gatherings, School facilities have too many restrictions on use but a city meeting room is open to everyone. Only commercial enterprises and groups who don't clean up after themselves or damage the facilities will be

refused use of the room, The planned facility will permit large, small, and medium size groups to meet at the same time. It can be be used for community dances like the one so popular at the 4th of July celebration, teen dances that aren't permitted at school, facilities for catered banquets and other things never done here because there was no place to do

the m. The library is desperately needed because there's not enough room for the present supply of books and book donations must be regretfully refused all the time. The library is heavily used in the summer and its popular shows for children must be discontinued if more space isn't made available. expanded library can offer more movies, even for adults, displays, exhibits, book and pattern exchanges, and other activities we badly need to make up for our lack of recreational

facilities. Opponents say existing buildings, if properly used, can handle most of the meetings. They say people on fixed and low incomes can't afford any increase in taxes no matter how small. They don't believe everyone will get to use the meeting room and would rather see money spent on other things such as street paving.

Some think the facilities will be used a lot at first but the novelty will soon wear off. There seems to be considerable resentment against school board policy restricting use of school buildings by the community which are paid for by everyone. Some think the city meeting room will be the same way.

Proponents say the city has spent very little money on improvements and it's time we did. Even with the
