City, School District Residents Choose Representatives, Decide Bond Issue

Abernathy voters go to the polls Saturday to elect a mayor, two city aldermen, three school trustees, and decide the fate of a proposed meeting facility addition to Abernathy City Hall and expansion of the city library.

Voting for mayor, aldermen, and school trustees takes place in the City Hall meeting room, 7 AM to 7 PM, April 7. Voting for the bond issue to finance the meeting room and library expansion will be in the library room at city hall, same hours.

Election judges and clerks will steer voters to the right place. Only people who live in Abernathy can vote for mayor and aldermen. Only property owners who live in the city limits can vote in the bond election. Both Abernathy taxpayers and those who live outside the city limits but in Abernathy Independent School District can vote for school trustees.

Zelma Hale is city election judge with Teresa Marez as alternate. Leland Phillips is school election judge.

This is Bob Cuevas, Jr.'s first bid for public office. He is a job-developer counselor for SER Jobs For Progress in Lubbock.

The \$25,000 bond issue to finance the Community Civic Building and Community Library will mean a 16% increase in city taxes. Property taxes now are 95¢ per \$100 valuation. If the bond issue passes, taxes will be \$1.10 per \$100 valuation.

Proponents say the present meeting room is totally inadequate for community needs. It is booked constantly and many groups must search for places to meet. It is too small for banquets, dances, Sunshine Group luncheons, and other large gatherings. School facilities have too many restrictions on use but a city meeting room is open to everyone. Only commercial enterprises and groups who don't clean up after themselves or damage the facilities will be refused use of the room.

The planned facility will permit large, small, and medium size groups to meet at the same time. It can be used for community dances like the one so popular at the 4th of July celebration, teen dances that aren't permitted at school, facilities for catered banquets and other things never done here because there was no place to do them.

The library is desperately needed because there's not enough room for the present supply of books and book donations must be regrettably refused all the time. The library is heavily used in the summer and its popular shows for children must be discontinued if more space isn't made available. An expanded library can offer more movies, even for adults, displays, exhibits, book and pattern exchanges, and other activities we badly need to make up for our lack of recreational facilities.

Opponents say existing buildings, if properly used, can handle most of the meetings. They say people on fixed and low incomes can't afford any increase in taxes no matter how small. They don't believe everyone will get to use the meeting room and would rather see money spent on other things such as street paving.

Some think the facilities will be used a lot at first but the novelty will soon wear off. There seems to be considerable resentment against school board policy restricting use of school buildings by the community which are paid for by everyone. Some think the city meeting room will be the same way.

Proponents say the city has spent very little money on improvements and it's time we did. Even with the

Contract Let For I-27 North

LUBBOCK---The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation held a pre-work conference on Tuesday, March 27 at the Highway Department Office, 601 Slaton Road, Lubbock. The purpose of the conference was to plan and coordinate the Construction Sequences in order to provide for the safety and convenience of the public during the construction of that portion of I-27 located in Hale County from just North of Abernathy to 1.0 Mi. South of FM 37 East.

Contract for the construction of Grading, Structures, Flexible Base, Asphalt Stabilize Base, Asphalt Concrete Pavement, One & Three Course Asphalt Surface Treatments, Continuous Reinforced Concrete Pavement, Safety Lighting, Signing, Grade Separations and Safety Rest Driveways was awarded to Ashland-Warren, Inc., Cooper & Woodruff, Inc. and Stafford Construction, Inc. Total amount of the contract was \$21,371,263.30 not including Engineering and Contingencies. The project is 8,256 miles in length and the Contractor will be allowed 450 working days for completion. A speed limit of 45 MPH will be imposed where necessary within the Construction Areas.

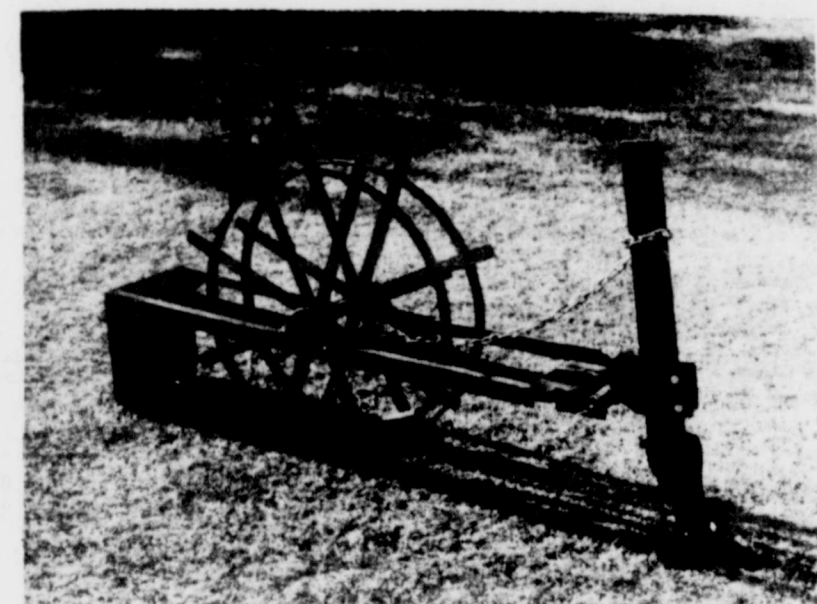
Work is expected to begin on the Project on Monday, April 2, 1979. The first phase will involve the construction of the West Frontage Road throughout the length of the project.

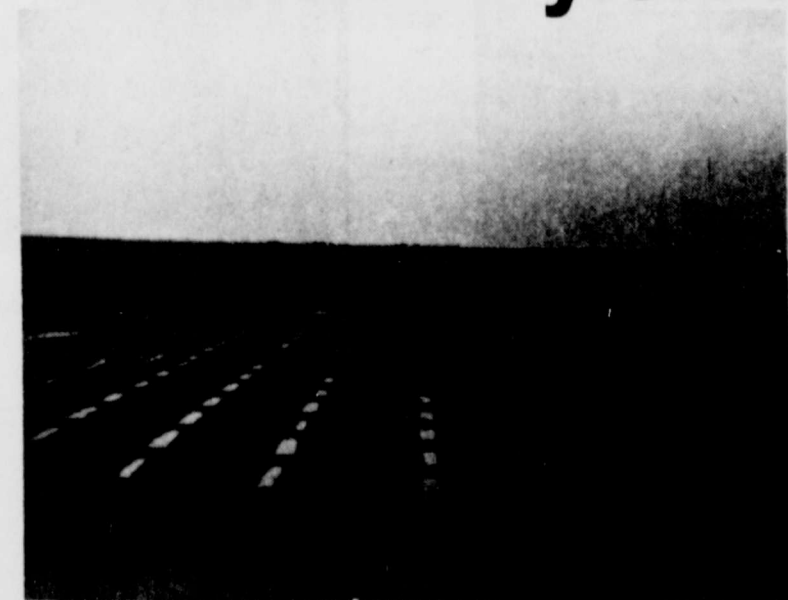

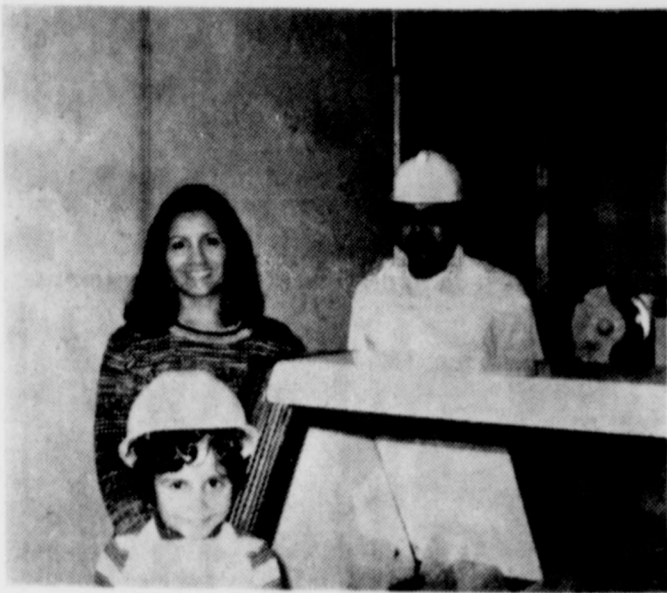

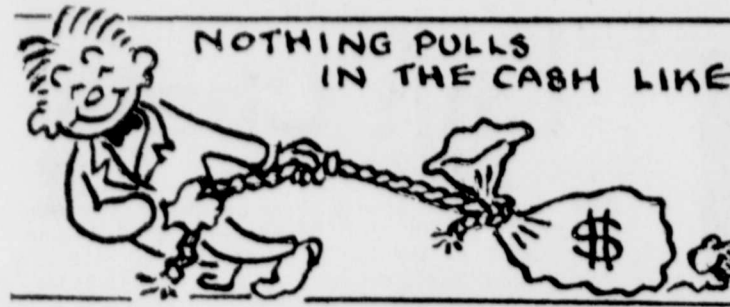
