AHS WINS DISTRICT 4-AA LITERARY MEET HELD HERE

On Saturday, April 7, Abernathy High School won the District 4-AA literary meet for the first time in more than thirty years. It may be the first time ever but no records were available to prove it.

Abernathy accrued a total of 214 points. Idalou was second with 142 and Floydada third with 139. Tulla had 93 and Lockney had 47.

Hosting the event, Abernathy had 36 local students entered in 13 events, which include science, math, speaking and writing.

Abernathy's first place winners and local sponsors for their events were Rene Graham in Persuasive Speaking, (Teresa Beasley); Jody Smyers, Feature Writing (Charlotte Carter); Gene McDonald, Headline Writing, (Charlotte Carter); Weldon Patterson, Spelling (Barbara Webb).

Eric Todd and Stanley Chen won second place in Debate with Bitsy Aldridge as sponsor. Toby Barrick placed second in Poetry Interpretation, (Barbara Webb); Gay Hobgood, Prose Reading, (Malena Gough) and Editorial Writing (Charlotte Carter); Gene McDonald, Number Sense

(Bettie Hardin) and Science (Kathryn Newton); Charles Badley, Ready Writing (Wanda LeMoine); Dianna Shafer, Spelling (Barbara Webb).

Rita Quinonez placed third in Informative Speaking (Teresa Beasley). Roger Howard placed third in Science (Kathryn Newton). Darrick Stallings was chosen alternate in News Writing (Charlotte Carter) as was Charles Badley in Slide Rule (Martin Kennedy). Beverly Taylor in Number Sense, and Perry Evans in Science.

Fifteen of these students will advance to regional competition in Lubbock April 21.

Judges for the events were provided by Texas Tech University.

Twenty-seven student council members and other student volunteers served as monitors and assistants. "These students were instrumental in helping the meet to function smoothly," commented Mr. Mitch LeMoine, District Director and AHS Principal.

Visiting competitors and their sponsors were complimentary of the facilities provided. The new vocational building served as the student lounge, where stud-

ents could have refreshments and watch the scores go up. Mrs. Jan Montgomery and her students were in charge of this area.

Sponsors enjoyed doughnuts and coffee in the homemaking living room. Principals and other workers were able to utilize the new administrative office facilities.

Incumbents Are Returned to City And School Post

Local voters decided Saturday to keep the same city and school representatives and, in a close vote, upgrade community facilities. It was the largest voter turnout in Abernathy history.

Of 574 ballots cast in the \$250,000 bond election, 315 were for and 259 against construction of a large meeting room addition to City Hall and expansion of the city library. Only 56 votes made the difference.

The school election drew more than 700 voters for the first time. The total was 711.

Five hundred sixty-two voters gave their approval to unopposed Mayor Pete Thompson. Incumbent aldermen Hoppy Toler and Harold Thompson won over challenger Carl Johnson.

Voters asked school trustee Bob Riley to continue his 15 years of service on Abernathy School Board and returned Daniel Fondy and Jerry Oswalt to second terms on the board.

School Board See "First Ideals" Drawings Of Proposed Activities Center At Meeting

Architect Herbert Brasher brought drawings of the proposed school activities center to Abernathy School Board's April 2 meeting. He stressed that the drawings, based on the list of 25 uses submitted by an appointed citizens committee, are just a place to start.

Dr. Webb said the architectural firm did 20 revisions of plans on the vocational building before the school and board agreed on the plans. He also said Brasher attended the Plainview Stock Show to get an idea what sort of area is needed for show and care of animals.

The plan shows basically a steel structure trimmed in brick, a 180'x140', 24' high ceiling main building with 60'x140' animal care facility on the back. It is surrounded on the front and sides by smaller 10' ceiling rooms connected by corridor to the main building.

The main room is a little longer than and twice the width of the present main school gym. Big garage type doors divide the main room from the animal care area. With these doors raised, both rooms constitute an indoor track, eight laps equaling a mile.

Brasher planned asphalt paving or concrete floor for the main building and animal care area, evaporative air conditioning, folding bleachers, and two removable basketball court floors for the main room. It is large enough to contain four courts with no room for seating.

A catering kitchen, two 30x30 meeting rooms, two large restrooms, a large concession area, office, and storage areas surround the largest structure. The drawing included an optional indoor 42'x75' Olympic size swimming pool connected to the south side of the facility by dressing rooms.

Board members commented that the plan doesn't allow for all 25 activities named by the committee. Brasher said the main room can be used for roller skating and tennis but wasn't sure how many courts. Richard Howard suggested the proposed indoor rifle range could only be accommodated in an underground room. Brasher agreed, saying it would be no particular problem to include one with a seven foot ceiling. Dr. Webb said visiting football teams could use the center's dressing rooms to suit up instead of the school gyms and that weight lifting equipment could be installed in some of the smaller rooms.

Brasher designed a 300 car parking lot between the street and the center to cover a city sewer line running north and south through the football field to the lift station just north. He explained that it's bad to build on top of one and it's possible but more difficult to plan a facility to fit between the sewer line and the street.

Jerry Oswalt suggested another site possibility behind the football stadium near the bus barns.

Brasher said he figures the 40,000 square foot center without the swimming pool would cost around a million dollars, with three to \$500,000 added on if the pool is included. He had no figures to estimate cost of pool operation and maintenance.

He said he figures the facility at \$25 per square foot and that the average school building now costs \$35 per square foot.

David Pinson mentioned that the school really got a bargain on the Academic Center at \$14.21 per square foot, which seemed terribly high at the time. They got that building just barely before construction costs

drastically increased.

Dr. Webb suggested that board members look over their copies of the drawings before next meeting and note changes and suggestions for Brasher to consider when making revisions.

BOILER BIDS

Board President Billie Harrison opened the three bids on a new boiler system and condensate lines for high school. Anthony Mechanical of Lubbock submitted a bid for \$51,900; HGS Mechanical of Amarillo for \$44,259; and Bud Samson Co. of Lubbock, for \$47,963. Representatives of two of the companies were present at the meeting.

These bids also included additional amounts for three alternate kinds of equipment. One was for fiberglass piping and two were for chemical feed systems-one automatic and one manual-to treat the water. Brasher thought Abernathy used Canadian River water which must be treated to protect the lines and boilers.

When told we don't use Canadian River water, he suggested the board hold off on the alternates until he has the water analyzed. The equipment can be added later but once installed, must be regularly maintained. That often causes trouble. The present system lasted 25 years without water treatment.

The board accepted HGS Mechanical's bid.

Don McKenzie asked if some parts of the old system could be salvaged. Brasher first said no but when McKenzie pointed out over \$1000 worth of controls purchased for it last year that might fit boilers in other buildings should they ever go out, Brasher said he'd check into it. McKenzie suggested the rest of the old system might be sold for junk.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

The school board appointed E. J. Pope and E. A. Houston, who have previous service on the Board of Equalization, and Don Blackmon to serve with carry over members Harvey Lutrick and Hoppy Toler. W. C. Bryant, Lindell Myatt, and Harold Thompson were appointed alternates.

The board will meet the morning of June 18 to hear appeals from local people and that afternoon to hear representatives of commercial establishments. They will meet for a one day orientation the week before.

Dr. Webb said the Board of Equalization appointments are the most important the school board makes. Members must know what tax bills are before the legislature to serve adequately. The board usually meets in May but must convene later this year because of new requirements put on evaluation engineers by the legislature.

AHS MOURN OVER LOSS OF FRIEND

Abernathy High School's planned day of rejoicing Monday over record wins in last Saturday's UIL competition, turned to a day of mourning over the death of one classmate and severe injury to another in a weekend car wreck.

Jimmy Olivarez, an AHS junior known as Jimmy-O, died at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock Sunday night. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Olivarez.

Jo Badley, an AHS sophomore, underwent surgery the same night and Tuesday was still in the intensive care unit. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Badley.

Leroy Johnson, the driver of the car, is at home recovering from lesser injuries suffered in the ordeal. He is a junior at AHS and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clois Johnson.

The three had been to Buffalo Lake climbing rocks and were returning to Abernathy about six. At a blind curve on a caliche road northwest of Idalou, Leroy had to swerve sharply to avoid an on-coming car. His overture several times throwing Jo and Jimmy out.

The other car did not stop. A farmer living in a house located at the curve ran out to aid the kids.

Jimmy-O attended Abernathy Schools third through ninth grades. He attended Petersburg schools when his family moved to that school district but came back to Abernathy last year to live in a house still owned by the family and continue studies at AHS. He worked for awhile at the Minit Mart here and impressed many adults who didn't know him with his courtesy and friendliness.

Jimmy-O and Leroy were close friends. The kids at school were fond of him and an adult friend wrote the following remembrance.

Jimmy-O played little League baseball for three years. The man who coached him during these years remembers that often, Jimmy would lose cotton all day and then walk the considerable distance from his home to the practice field.

"I used him for my lead-off batter," the coach said. "He was so short that he was hard to pitch to. He got on base just about every time."

Yes, Jimmy-O was small in physical stature, but he stands tall in the hearts of his friends. And his leaving will cast a long shadow from which we'll not soon emerge.

He possessed some qualities rarely found in people of any age these days: kindness, gentleness, the genuine concern for others that is the essence of true good manners.

Our loss is profound. We cannot afford this loss. (See obituaries on another page of this Review.)

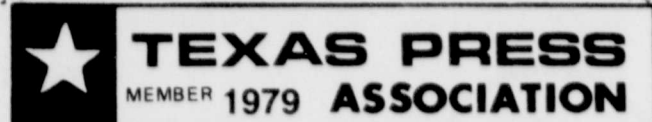

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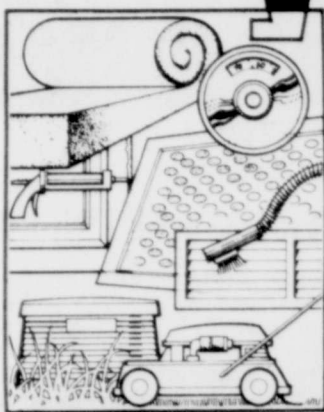

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT

Daniel Fondy recommended that school board policy which gives principals the power to decide whether or not a school employee's outside employment is compatible with the professional image, be amended to say the principal will make recommendation to the board which will make the final decision. He said since the board does the hiring and firing, it should also approve outside employment.

Harrison asked what would happen if the situation came up between board meetings. Fondy said the principal should deny the employment request until the board can consider it. They put off decision on the policy until next meeting.

HONOR SOCIETY TRIP

The board approved a National Honor Society trip to Austin 14, 15, and 16 for nine boys, twelve girls, and two sponsors in one school and one rented van. It will cost about \$7,620.

Dr. Webb and Harrison said it is a very worthwhile trip for the students. State Representative Pete Laney will have several things lined up for the students to see and attend.

The group planned to leave Sunday after Sunday School and return Tuesday. However, Howard and Fondy suggested they leave on Monday and come back Wednesday so as not to miss church and because there's more state government activity to observe on Tuesdays than on Mondays.

FCA GIFT

The board voted to accept a gift to the school from the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. The FCA wants to put a professionally done 10'x12' insignia on a wall at one end of the gym using money earned from homecoming mum sales and other projects. They will have a small sketch for the board's approval before the large one is done.

Dr. Webb said the school plans to buy two large trophies-one for athletics and one for academics-and have the names of students who win state level competition engraved on the plaques.

OTHER ACTIONS

In other actions the board voted to give the customary \$200 to the Abernathy Project Show. Richard Howard felt it shouldn't be necessary to wait on the board to approve the gift since it's a budgeted item.

They appointed Dr. Webb to the Joint Committee of the Area Education Service Center, approved changing local retirement age policy to 70 as required by federal law, approved regular bills and the resignation of LaVene Bames of Hale Center, set Monday April 9 at 1 PM as the day to canvass election returns. They'll meet for lunch at the school cafeteria before hand.

School Is About To Get Inflated Out Of The Banquet Business

"The school is about to get inflated out of the banquet business," reported Abernathy School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb at Abernathy School Board's April meeting. Costs per meal go up as food prices and wages increase. Cafeteria workers get time and a half for coming in extra to prepare and serve banquet meals.

He asked for guidance from the board on the situation. The Chamber of Commerce banquet this week cost the school \$3.20 per plate for food alone. Labor costs brought the cost up to \$4.25. Ham is the cheapest thing to serve but nobody wants that at their banquet.

School groups' projects no longer make enough to cover costs of traditional school banquets but board members agreed they don't want to cut out banquets for student activities.

"Why penalize students because of inflation?" said board member David Pinson. "They've been waiting their turn a long time."

The only solution, they decided, is to subsidize school banquets out of operating funds set aside in the school budget for each particular activity and raise the cost per plate on outside banquets, hoping people will understand the necessity.

The school offers banquet service for community groups as a public relations

gesture but, for the prices the school must charge to break even, people expect restaurant quality meals and aren't always happy with what they get at the cafeteria. The prices to be charged in the future will probably run about the same as catered meals from restaurants.

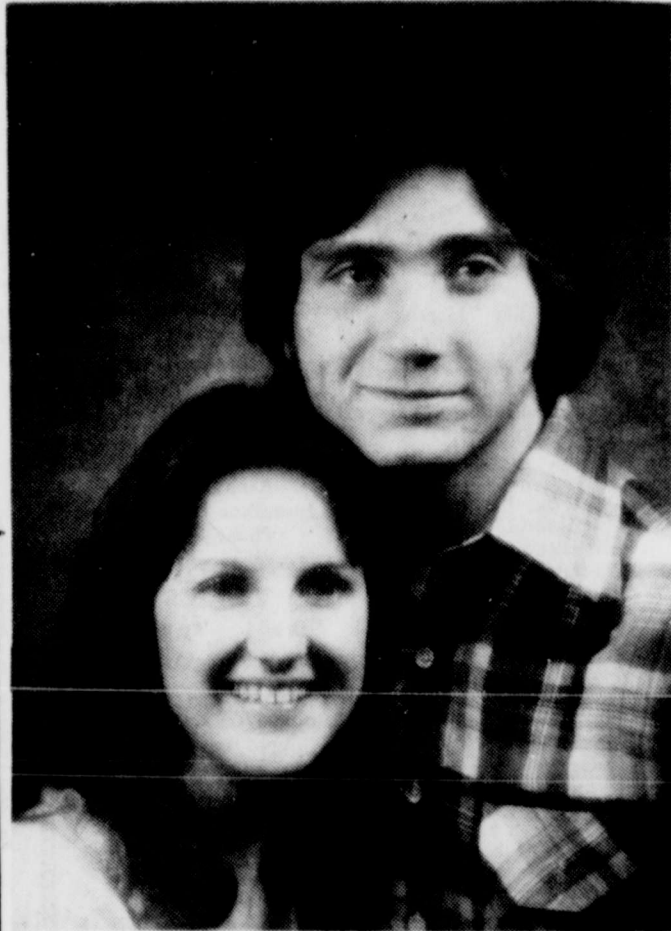
Leaders and parents volunteered their time to work the sales.

Inflation Is Problem For School Officials

Dr. Delwin Webb said at the Abernathy School Board's April meeting that the legislature is still wrestling with school finance. He testified before a House committee and got good reception from it. House Speaker Bill Clayton asked for a composite bill by the 15th, so action should start soon after that.

Governor Clement's number one policy is Initiative and Referendum which Texas Association of School Boards is strongly against. School boards feel that since school boards are elected by the people to represent them, they shouldn't need to call elections to take every matter back to the people.

The battle lines are drawn between the executive and legislative branches and Dr. Webb encourages board members to go to Austin and work with the legislators for finance bills favorable to schools. He said board members can be much more effective at times in influencing legislation than school administrators.

"I don't know any representative at state level that does not pay attention when people telegram or call," said Webb. "With 3500 bills to consider, they listen when you call them. We are lucky to have a rural thinking legislature."

Over 500 of the 3500 bills introduced this year are education bills. About eight are major finance bills. Board President Billie Harrison asked Webb to keep board members informed and they'll try to go to Austin.

All members were present at the meeting. They will meet at 8 PM May 7. There will be a School Board Workshop at Texas Tech April 27 and Abernathy will play host to the South Plains Association of School Boards April 19.
