CITY TO TRY NEW ANIMAL CONTROL ARRANGEMENT

Larry Fields reported to this office that the city is going to make a real effort to clean up the dog problem in Abernathy beginning with the hiring of a full time Animal Warden, He asks that anyone interested in the job come by City Hall and make application.

The job will include a 40 hour work week but aldermen agreedit won't be 9 to 5 hours, Stray dogs present the worst nuisance early in the mornings and late at night. The dog catcher will fumish the vehicle and the city will pay mileage. The

The council turned down similar programs from differentagencies twice already. Alderman Harold Thompson said he feels Abemathy needs some kind of housing but doesn't know what kind is best. Another consideration is that all government grants for city improvements are tied to housing programs. He contacted Congressman Kent Hance's office for information on all available workable programs so the council can look them over. Alderman Toler said it might be a way to get existing houses rejuvenated.


