

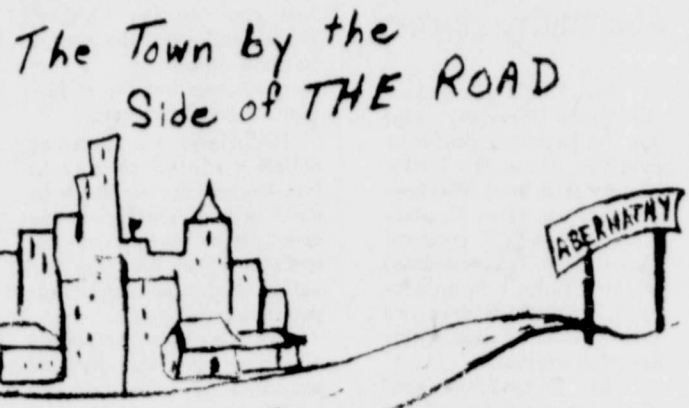


Abernathy Standouts Honored

RELATIVES AND FRIENDS OF LOCAL PEOPLE IN STORM AREAS APRIL 10

A decision to come back to their home in Abernathy Tuesday, April 10, may have been a life-saving one for Mr. and Mrs. Roy Calvert. They had been visiting in one of Mrs. Calvert's cousins in Wichita Falls.

The Calverts discussed waiting until Wednesday, April 11, but decided to start their journey home, leaving Wichita Falls about 10 a. m. Tuesday, April 10. That night, the most devastating tornado in Texas' history hit Wichita Falls. The relatives the Calverts had visited huddled in a clothes closet in their home and escaped injury, but their house was badly damaged by the storm. En route home, the Calverts drove through Harold and Vernon. Later in the day, these two places also were hit by a killer tornado.

We did not realize that Abernathy area had so many relatives and/or friends in the Wichita Falls and Vernon areas until the tragedy struck April 10. This story covers all that The Review staff knew about at press time. There may be many others in South Hale County and North Lubbock County who had relatives/friends in the storm area.

Reports said that the home formerly occupied in Wichita Falls by former Abernathians Mr. and Mrs. Carl Rose was destroyed by the storm. The Rose family was transferred from here to Wichita Falls and later they moved from Wichita Falls to their present home in Weatherford. Carl is employed by Diamond Shamrock Company.

Former Abernathians Mr. and Mrs. Ray (Shag) Willis now of Wichita Falls escaped injury. They said that the tornado damage came within four blocks of their home in Wichita Falls.

Former Abernathians Mr. and Mrs. Freddie Apperson and family of Wichita Falls escaped injury. There was some roof and glass damage to their home. Their daughter, Belinda, lost the first car she had ever owned in the storm. She had left her new car at the home of a friend and they had left that location in another car and escaped injury from the storm. Mrs. Apperson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Furman Shipman of Abernathy, had a "very strange" feeling in her head, believed to be caused by the tornado, and she told her family that a storm was approaching near their vicinity.

A sister and other relatives of Tom Cox of Abernathy went to a storm cellar at Wichita Falls and were not injured, but their home was badly damaged.

In Wichita Falls, the Don Snodgrass family escaped injury and property loss as the tornado passed three or four blocks from their home. Formerly of Abernathy, Don is a son of Y. F. Snodgrass.

Abernathy people spent anxious hours last week trying to discover the fate of relatives and friends in Vernon, Wichita Falls, and Lawton after the tornados. A few were able to contact relatives by phone but most could not.

Sharon Kester's sister-in-law and a niece were killed in the Vernon tornado. A nephew was missing for some time but finally found by his father in a Wichita Falls hospital. The Kesters left for Vernon just after the tornado to be with her brother.

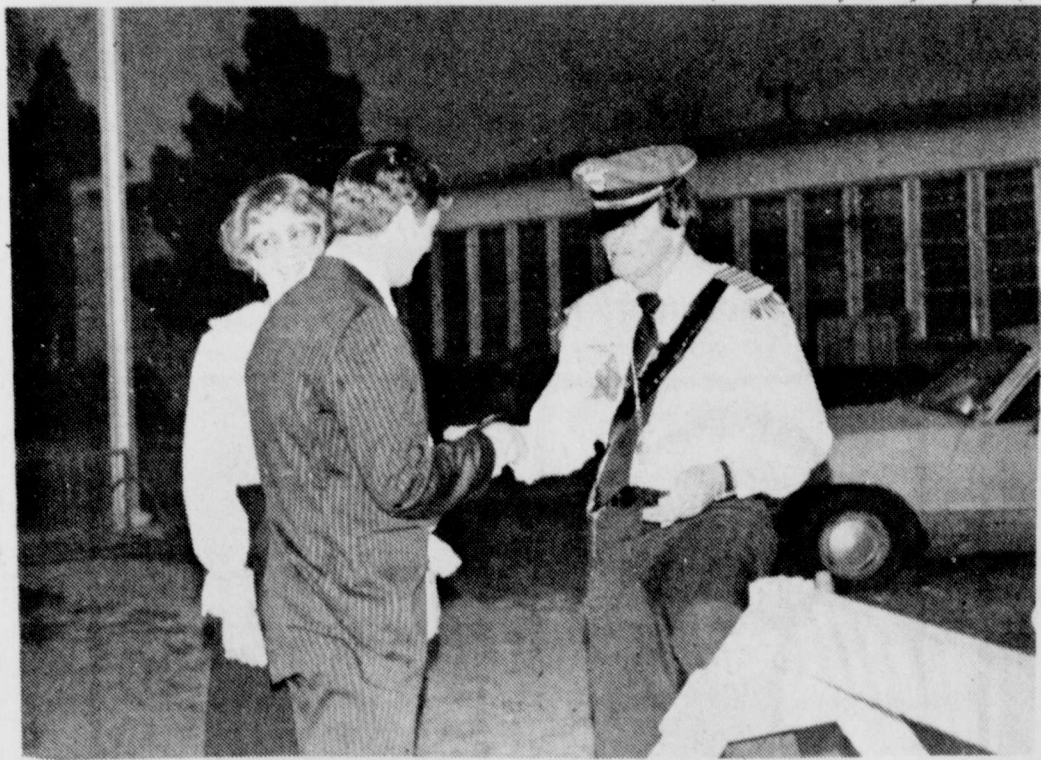
Bill Smyers was in Lawton, Okla., for a Federal Aviation Administration labor/management school during the tornado, but the building he was in was not damaged. He finished out the week and returned home Friday.

CITY TO TRY NEW ANIMAL CONTROL ARRANGEMENT

Larry Fields reported to this office that the city is going to make a real effort to clean up the dog problem in Abernathy beginning with the hiring of a full time Animal Warden. He asks that anyone interested in the job come by City Hall and make application.

The job will include a 40 hour work week but aldermen agreed it won't be 9 to 5 hours. Stray dogs present the worst nuisance early in the mornings and late at night. The dog catcher will furnish the vehicle and the city will pay mileage. The

exact method of figuring that is still under consideration.

Fields says that the Dog Ordinance is going to be fully enforced. The city is now working on the animal shelters where the dogs which are picked up will be held for three days. If owners do not claim them within that time they will be destroyed. The animal warden will use every means at his disposal in picking up the stray dogs including the use of the dart gun. This method is necessary on some of the larger dogs which are almost

impossible for anyone to catch.

Also being used in apprehending strays will be several traps. The city is buying one and will make three others. Some citizens who are being bothered by dogs may want to put one of the traps on their property and be responsible for it being used there.

This effort to rid the city of stray dogs and those dogs whose owners let them run loose is appreciated and will require the cooperation of all the people.

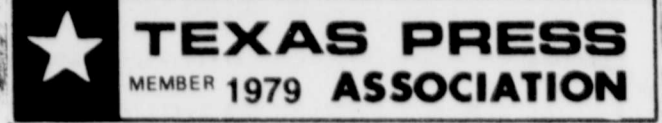

BIDS & ENGINEERING
The city's consulting engineers and representatives of three paving companies were present for the opening of seal coat bids on Abernathy streets. The council accepted the low bid of \$22,880 from High Plains Pavers of Plainview. Ronnie Zahn Pavers of Lubbock bid \$25,520 and Bob & Bobby Nobles Dirt Contractors of Colorado City bid \$30,800.

The low bid was 18¢ per square yard below estimated cost of the project so more blocks can be added on.

Blocks to be seal coated are three on 14th St., five on 13th, one on 9th, three on 4th, one on 2nd, four on Ave. F, four on Ave. H, two on Ave. J, two on Ave. M, two Jerome, two on Ave. G, and possibly eight more.

QUESTIONS
Before they left, the engineers answered several questions from the council about Lakeview Addition plat changes, the new water tower, and a city lease agreement.

In answer to questions about whether the city or developer should pay for proposed concrete drainage channels in Lakeview Addition, the engineers said the

trend is for developers to bear all the expense and that the city should think twice before approving plats that will cost the city.

Concerning the new water tower, engineers said it leaks a little now because of high pressure tests but won't under normal conditions. It is guaranteed against leakage for one year.

Local people are kidding councilmen about "who picked the color of the new water tower?" One man was disappointed when told it will eventually be painted a conventional silver.

The council wasn't happy with a bill for cotton damage from Lakeview Gin, which leases land owned by the city. When the lease was negotiated, they told the city they had no plans to grow cotton on the land; only to park cotton trailers. The bill, however, is for cotton damage on five and a half acres when the city water lines from the new wells were installed. The council plans to confer with them further on the matter.

RUBBLE
Everyone wants to know when rubble from recently demolished buildings will be removed. Piles of that all over town don't look much better than derelict buildings and the council doesn't want more torn down until rubble from the others is removed (removal activities are underway at this writing).

Fields said the city and the highway construction boss worked out a trade. The city lets them dump dirt on city property if they help cart off the rubble. The council, however, asked that he set a deadline so that if highway crews can't get to the rubble, the city can make other arrangements.

The owner of the old service station on Ave. D beside Patton's Parts Place appealed her condemnation notice but hasn't been able to attend any council meetings to present her case. She said she'll try to make the next one. Townspeople are impatient to be rid of this abandoned building in the main part of town.

PAGERS
Fire Chief Jim Bob Smith asked for use of 16 old EMS pagers. Most volunteer firemen have Electron fire warning units in their homes but that's no good when they're at work. Some have them at work but not at home which doesn't help either.

The city recently bought new pagers for EMT's because the old ones aren't dependable. That won't be so crucial for firemen. The city wants to keep four for personnel and checked into trade-in value or saleability of the others. They decided they'll be worth more to keep and agreed to fire department use of the extras.

JUNIOR-SENIOR DANCE
High school students Kim Grant, Valerie Moss, and Becky Smith, on behalf of AHS juniors and seniors, asked for use of the fire hall for a dance after the Junior-Senior Banquet May 12. The banquet will be in the Texas Tech Ballroom.

Two councilmen said they were sponsors for the dance last year and all went well. Mayor Thompson suggested to the girls that the group take pains to keep outsiders away from the dance.

The council approved the request subject to approval by Abernathy Volunteer Department, which must move all the equipment out to make room for the dance and decorations.

MORE RENT SUBSIDY
The council considered still another low rent housing proposal, this time from David Clark, Director of Plainview Housing Authority. He handles the HUD Section 8 rent subsidy program for Plainview and proposes to administer the service in other towns in the county.

Fields said Clark's agency does an excellent job with the program in Plainview and he'd recommend that Abernathy use it, too, if the council ever decides we need the program here. "The question is," said Fields, "Do we want this program in Abernathy?" The council turned down similar programs from different agencies twice already.

Alderman Harold Thompson said he feels Abernathy needs some kind of housing but doesn't know what kind is best. Another consideration is that all government grants for city improvements are tied to housing programs. He contacted Congressman Kent Hance's office for information on all available workable programs so the council can look them over. Alderman Toler said it might be a way to get existing houses rejuvenated.

The Picture page program is designed to encourage parents to work with their children and to have children and their parents become familiar with their public library. Captain Kangaroo on CBS will announce this program.

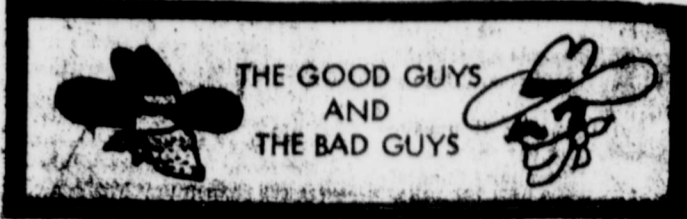

with her husband, Jimmy, to help his mother whose home was demolished. His mother was keeping one of her grandsons at the time but had gone to her brother's house just before the tornado to cook dinner. They weren't hurt but the mother lost all her belongings.

Paul Herchman and Lee Echols traveled to Vernon last Wednesday to check on the safety of relatives in the area after hearing of the tornado which hit there and being unable to reach their people by telephone.

Paul's parents were about 4 blocks from the path of the storm and uninjured and reported no damage. He also has a brother and other relatives there who received no damage from the tornado.

The path of the tornado was about 4 blocks to the north of the downtown area and most of the deaths were located more in the rural area.

Lee checked on Alta's father, Mr. W. H. Tamplin, who was not in the storm area, and her brother and wife, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Tamplin. Mrs. W. H. Tamplin who was employed as a bookkeeper at the Canton Restaurant in Vernon was at work at the time the tornado struck shortly before 4:00 p.m. The building was completely destroyed with none being killed. Mrs. Echols sister received a "lick" on the head but no serious injury. Their car was destroyed but no other personal damage. Other cousins living there were not in the storm's path.

Mrs. Harold Gene Thompson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Brooks live in Wichita Falls and received no damage from the storm there.

Also living in Wichita Falls are Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Hancock. It was reported the tornado missed their home by 4 or 5 blocks. Loyd is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Millard Hancock and she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. N. McAllister, Jr., all of

Abernathy. Mrs. Evelyn Presley, sister-in-law to R. D. Presley, lost her home and all its contents with the exception of her sewing machine, a few clothes and linens. Later she found her mattress and springs and an end table. She was at work when the tornado hit and when she got home, could recognize which pile of rubble was hers only by one house left standing across the street.

No information was available at press time concerning Mr. and Mrs. Fred Pruner of 4806 George in Wichita Falls. They formerly lived here and Mrs. Pruner was a teacher in Abernathy Schools.

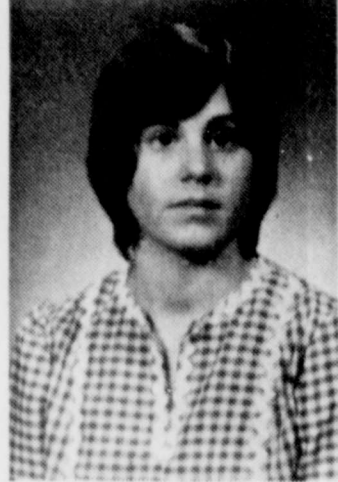

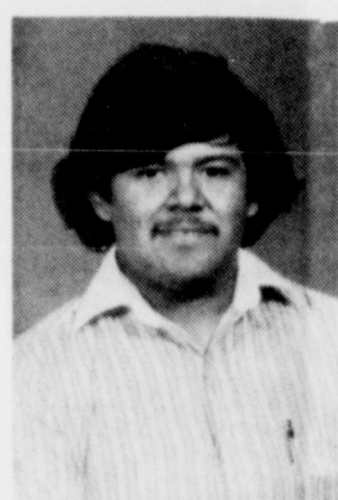

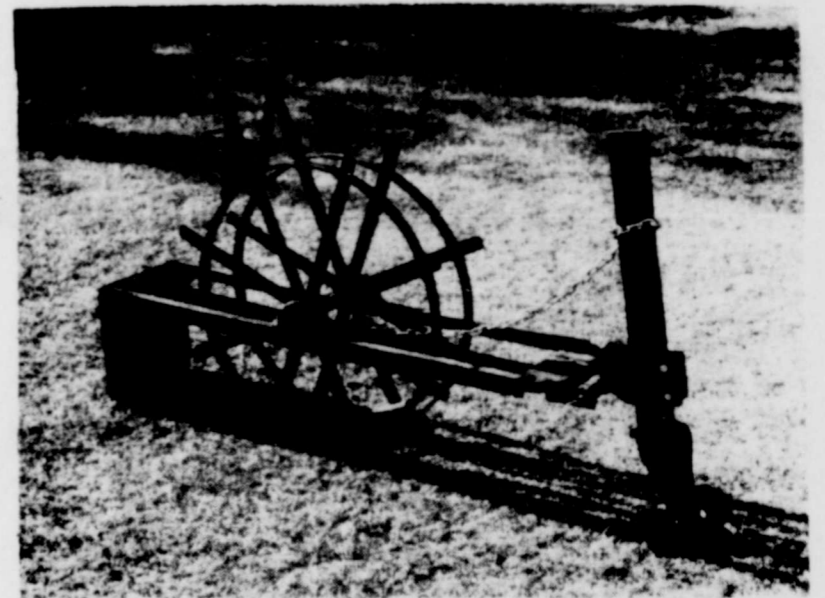
