Touch Call Phones To Be Available Here On May 7th

Touch Call (pushbutton) telephones are coming to Abernathy May 7, 1979, according to J. H. Davis, Memphis Division Manager for General Telephone.

"Touch Calling is an optional service that lets the customer push buttons instead of twirl a dial," Davis said. "The simplicity of the phone means fewer dialing errors are made, and calling is faster and easier."

Davis said equipment is being installed in the Abernathy telephone building that will provide the service beginning May 7.

He pointed out recent developments in equipment have made it possible to provide customers Touch Calling upon request at a reasonable cost. The new equipment uses little valuable switching center space and requires shorter installation time than was previously possible.

The new optional service will be available only to one-party business and residence customers for a one-time new or change-in-service charge and a small monthly charge which varies depending upon the style and number of telephones.

"Pushbutton telephones are the phones of the future as they are designed to work in complete harmony with the new generation of telephone equipment now being installed across the nation for both local and long distance services," Davis said. "Customers can usually punch a seven-digit number in the time it takes to spin a nine on a conventional telephone."

The telephone company manager pointed out that in addition to the speed, convenience and accuracy, each Touch Calling button plays its own electronic musical note.

Door prizes were awarded to patrons and winner of the color T.V. was Lindy Neis. Also given away were 15 towel sets, and 30 small bales of cotton.

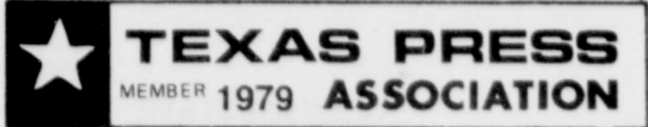

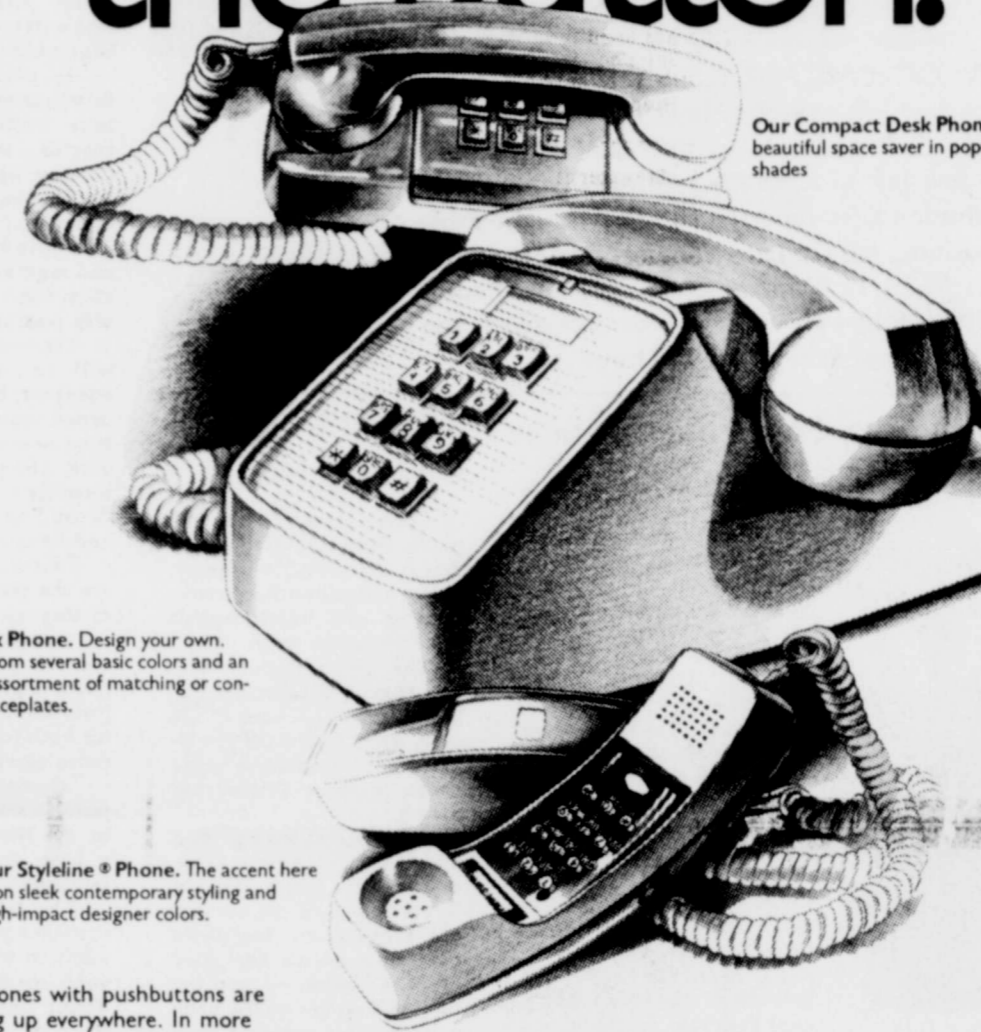

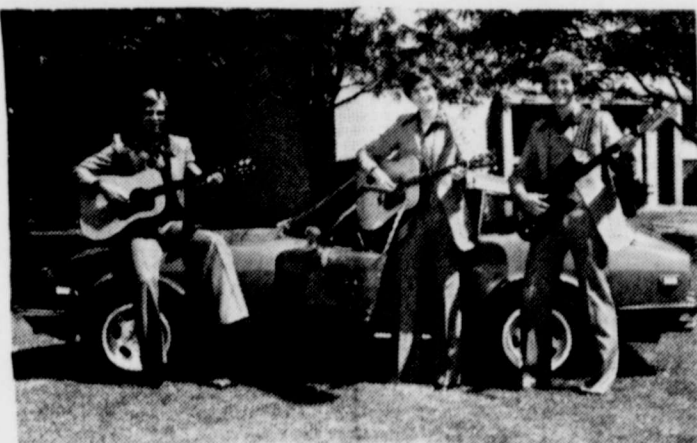

Liner Warns Against Too Early Planting

Cotton planting season is just around the corner and soil temperatures have warmed up enough to plant early cotton. County Agent Ollie Liner warns not to turn the corner too quick in planting cotton. Although soil temperature, by itself, is an excellent guide for establishing the earliest feasible time for planting, it could be misleading.

Soil temperature in Hale County has about reached the 60 degree average temperature at eight inch depth. However, soil temperatures don't usually reach this degree until early May, Liner stated.

In addition to soil temperature, we need to look at the calendar, and especially the long range weather forecast. Several days of cool, rainy weather are normal in this area during late April and early May, Liner noted.

In fact the 30-day weather outlook valid through mid-May predicts just this type of weather, according to Kenneth Wigner, agricultural meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Lubbock.

Through mid-May, the forecast says below normal rainfall is expected in the southern and southeastern counties of the South Plains, but above normal rainfall is likely over the rest of the area.

Often there is a dip in the soil temperatures in the South Plains in the first week of May, Wigner said. This occurs following rains which are common at that time, he explained.

The last 15 days of April often are much warmer than the first 15 days of May. The 60-degree average minimum soil temperature tells when not to plant as much as it tells when to plant. Research and demonstrations have shown that until the 10-day average soil temperature surpasses 60 degrees the percentage of emergence of planted seed is only about 30 percent, according to Ollie Liner.

The present soil temperatures might induce farmers to plant now, but do not insure an earlier crop than if cotton is planted about May 1. A three-year study conducted at the Research Station in Lubbock shows that cotton crops planted on April 10, April 20 and May 1 all reached the first bloom stage around July 5.

Earlier planting increases the possibility of stand reduction due to disease, early hail and sand, Liner said. We're just looking at two or more weeks of hazard and not gaining anything in time, because the blooming date will be about the same.

Since there is no apparent advantage in earlier fruit set and since anticipated rain and soil cooling in the next two weeks can lead to serious problems with seedling diseases, farmers might be wise to delay planting until May, he said.

Weather Spotters Training Course Features Awesome Examples

Larry Eblen of the National Weather Service in Lubbock showed most impressive slides and a movie of storm clouds and tornadoes in various stages of development at a weather watch training session Monday night in Abernathy Fire Hall.

Approximately 56 people - not all weather watch volunteers - took advantage of the training. You will be happy to know that in a practice test as Eblen flashed slides on a screen, local spotters were usually right in deciding which cloud formations called for a warning siren and which were harmless.

The slides and movie were awesome and the program fascinating. Watchers discovered that things you'd swear are tornadoes, aren't and things that are almost invisible are very damaging.

People often mistake rain shafts for tornadoes but spotters note whether a supposed funnel is tapered and holds together or not tapered and loosely formed. The main difference between the real thing and a look alike is circular motion, Eblen said.

Midland/Odessa spotters have a saying, "If it don't spin, don't call it in."

The key is knowing which area of a particular cloud a funnel is likely to descend from. Trained spotters know the difference. Very visible tornadoes often come out of the top of weak, late summer storms but are from the wrong part of the cloud to be a threat.

Eblen's map of tornado sightings showed most tornadoes in populated areas as in the Big Spring, Odessa, Lubbock, and Amarillo areas of Texas, yet none in New Mexico. He said it's not likely that tornadoes respect state line and credits the phenomenon to storm watchers in populated areas versus the wide open unpopulated spaces in New Mexico. The weather service is training more and more spotters in New Mexico, however, and expects many more sighting reports because people will know what to look for.

He said the most destructive, killing tornadoes are not even in "tornado alley". They happen in areas that don't work as hard as we do to watch and warn people. Statistics show more tornadoes every decade but Eblen thinks it's only that more are reported because people are more knowledgeable. A welcome statistic is that fewer people are killed by tornadoes each year.

He reported that research done at Texas Tech shows that an inner closet reinforced with 2x4's is an effective shelter if people keep all the bowling balls, projectors, and other objects off the closet shelves, crouch with head protected, and cover themselves with blankets or a mattress. Their research and recent experience proves that the most dangerous place to be in a tornado is in a car or other vehicle.

People caught out in the open should get out of a vehicle and into a depression of some kind. Don't spread eagle on the ground because you may be hit by lightning. Dig you a little hole - and fast - if you have time.

People often try to outrun tornadoes in cars but, Eblen warns, tornadoes can back up, move to either side, turn around on themselves and speed up to 70 miles per hour. He says there are expensive and very effective radios available that pick up only weather channels which give warnings and reports constantly. They are good protection and investment.

Eblen will present the training program in Matador April 23 and in Silverton May 1 at 7 PM both places in case you want to see it. At any rate, be sure not to miss it next year.
