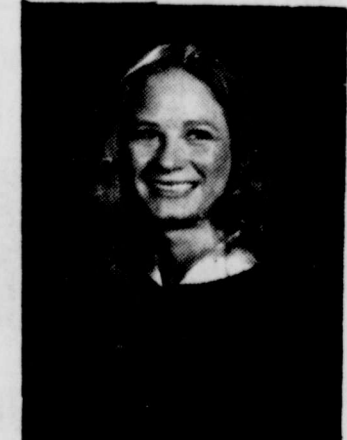

**Hearing Is Urged On Grain Program**

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has called for a Congressional investigation of USDA's failure to administer the 1979 Feed Grain Program, according to the law passed by Congress in 1977. The House of Representatives Committee on Agriculture Chairman Thomas S. Foley, was officially requested to conduct a formal hearing into the problem, in a letter (dated May 21) from GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp.

The purpose will be to insure the USDA administers the Feed Grain Program as Congress intended. The Agriculture Act of 1977 established a formula for determining grain sorghum target prices. Grain Sorghum Producers Association is asking that this formula be applied.

Dr. Howard Hjort, Director of Economics for USDA, recently admitted to the Subcommittee on Livestock and Grains, "There is in fact a discrepancy. The \$2.30 will have to be increased very likely to \$2.35, in order to be consistent with the law." GSPA contends that the increase should be 10 to 18 cents (depending upon which USDA cost of production figures are used.)

Harp told the Chairman, "The grain sorghum farmers of the United States are in critical economic condition at this time. They need all possible help to survive the present low prices. The tenant farmers in the United States produce over 50 percent of the grain sorghum. USDA's latest figures on cost of production to tenant farmers is \$5.02 per hundredweight. On May 15, 1979, the average price received by producers throughout the United States was \$3.62 per hundredweight, and this is after paying storage and interest on grain from harvest time until the middle of May. This is an average

net loss of \$1.40 per hundred, plus storage and interest. The 59 cent deficiency payment for the 1978 crop certainly does not bridge that gap. The loss will probably be larger in 1979, due to the increased cost of production and the prospects for another bumper crop. We need your help."

**Epilepsy Society Of S. P. Is Formed**

Do you know anyone who is an epileptic? Have you ever seen an epileptic seizure? Would you like to know more about Epilepsy?

The Pilot Club of Lubbock has felt that there is a need in this area for a program to inform and help those who have a member of their family or are themselves epileptic. About 2 months ago the first meeting was held to see if there was interest in having such an organization. There was very good response and the "Epilepsy Society of the South Plains" was started. Its purpose is to learn more about epilepsy and its problems and to further educate the public and others as to how they can help.

The Pilot Club is a group of business and professional women's service club and they are undertaking the organization and sponsorship of this society.

If you are interested, or know of those who are, there is to be a meeting at 7:30 p.m. on June 12, 1979 at the Hodges Community Center in Lubbock (41st and University). They are interested in any questions that you may have. At this time the society is very new and they would like to meet the need in this area. 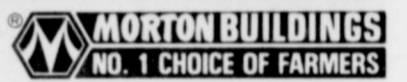

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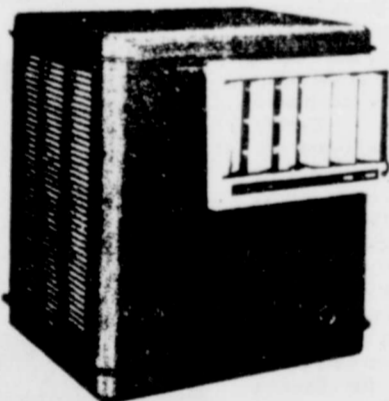
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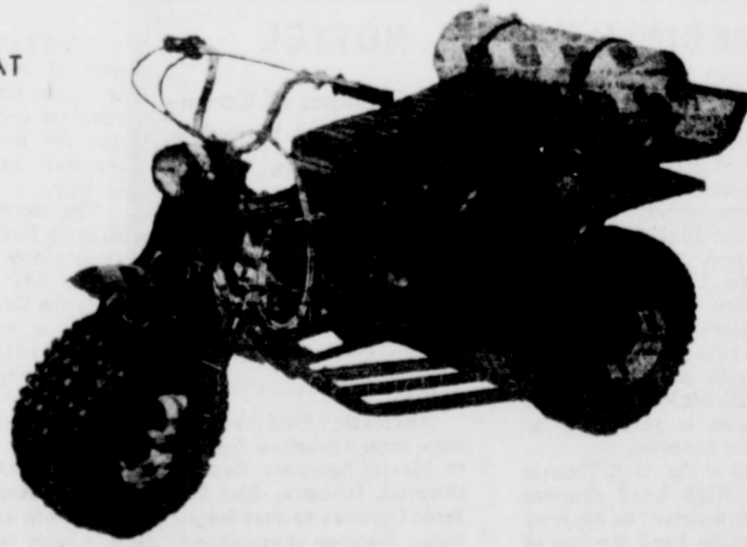

### Abernathy VO/AG Featured In State FFA Publication

This story appeared in the April/May issue of TEXAS FUTURE FARMER.

Doing to learn is a very important part of the Abernathy Vocational Agriculture Department's program. Advisors Jerry Adams and Gerald Kelley believe anytime a student learns to fix or build something he has obtained a valuable skill. Abernathy's program is thus geared to introducing and developing a wide variety of useable skills.

Last October they purchased an old 1950 Chevrolet bus. They are in the process of rebuilding and restoring the bus to near new condition. They have just finished rebuilding and reinstalling the motor. About 75 percent of the body work has been completed. The CVAE upholstery is upholstering the seats, door panels, and headliner. When completed the bus will be

repainted the school colors, maroon and white and used as a spirit bus for some athletic events and used to transport ag students across town to their livestock facilities.

In addition to developing mechanical skills, emphasis has also been placed on developing carpentry skills. This is done by building things that require the boys to read basic blueprints and by building things that teach basic construction practices and which are practical to the students. This year the Abernathy Vocational Agriculture Department built one 8x12 storage building and seven Cargill style hog houses.

A program of learning to do by doing to learn would not be complete without participation in leadership and judging teams. Adams and Kelley believe these contests offer a unique opportunity to their partic-

ipants. Abernathy's Green-hand Skills team placed first in the State Contest.
