Panhandle Cable Television Opens Office; Local Crews Begin Installation Of System

More varied entertainment, in the form of cable TV, is on the way in Abernathy. Last week, Margie Morrison opened the Panhandle Cable Television office at 703 Main St. and Bill's Electric crews dug a lot of trenches and laid a lot of cable in Abernathy alleys. There's a long way to go and progress depends on the weather but Panhandle Cable hopes to provide service by early fall.

The system in operation will feature the four channels now available plus five more including Adams, Chicago, the West Coast, the Christian Broadcast Network, and a continuous weather channel. The popular Home Box Office will also be available.

The Chicago channel will feature plenty of agriculture news and information. Viewers will have a much greater choice and more variety in sports events and special programs. Home Box Office makes current movies available soon after and sometimes during theater runs. One channel will broadcast sessions of the U. S. House of Representatives for a couple of hours every day.

"There's something in this package for all members of the family, regardless of age," said Mrs. Morrison. "The continuous weather will be of value to everyone. There will be fantastic children's programs and home bound people can watch something besides soap operas in the afternoons."

An interesting feature of the weather channel is that Mrs. Morrison can broadcast local news and announcements in print across the screen by means of a keyboard in her office.

From now until the system is in operation, Panhandle Cable TV is offering one month's free viewing of the nine channels and Home Box Office to everyone who signs up for a \$5 installation charge. After that, installation fee will be \$17.50, the nine channels will cost \$10 per month, and the nine channels plus Home Box Office will cost \$19.50 per month. There will be a \$2 per month extra charge for every additional TV set in the house receiving the cable service.

People who sign up for the free month and decide they don't want it after that may have it disconnected. Those who want to try the cable service that first month don't have to accept Home Box Office but the \$5 fee will be the same in either case. Viewers cannot get HBO without the basic cable programs. There's no limit on the number of people who can get the one

month's free service. "We hope everybody in town signs up," said Mrs. Morrison, the most enthusiastic customer. Those who had cable TV service somewhere else. The office is open 9 to 12 and 1 to 5 Mondays through Fridays. Jesse Morrison, representing Panhandle Cable TV, will go to every house in Abernathy to explain the service and to make a map showing locations of TV sets in each home that wants cable TV service. He will carry company identification.

People building new homes can have the cable built in as they go. All they need do is contact the Panhandle office at 298-4044. The company will furnish the wire and the contractor can return what he doesn't need.

Panhandle Cable TV is part of an expanding corporation. One of the owners, Ernie Larson, lives in Denton. He has instructed the Morrisons to buy everything they need locally when possible. His policy of using local resources extended to having cable installed by Billy Gist's company instead of by the usual big contractors.

Another Larson innovation for customers' benefit is separate crews for different phases of installation so men who have been working outside won't track dirt into houses doing inside work.

Panhandle Cable's systems in Spur, Crosbyton, and Falls are already operating. From here, they go to Hale Center, Olton, Petersburg, Idalou, Lorenzo, and maybe Lake Ransom Canyon.

The Morrisons got interested in cable TV in Spur when Jesse was incapacitated with many serious back surgeries. It never occurred to them when they moved here that Abernathy wasn't on a cable. Panhandle learned of their enthusiasm and asked Margie to manage the local system and Jesse to be the troubleshooter.

The Morrisons have a ranch at Spur and moved to Midland and then to Abernathy to be near daughter Karen and her husband, Jim Thomas, who until recently owned the Abernathy Dairy Queen. Their son just moved from Petersburg to Lamesa with Dawson County Farm Bureau.

The Morrisons were quite active in civic and school affairs at Spur. He was Spur's Man of the Year in 1959 and served on the city council and as mayor of that town. For eight years, he was president of Spur's Ex-Students Association and Margie was secretary. Under Morrison guidance, the

organization grew to be the biggest in the state with an office and current records that insure quick location of any former Spur student.

There's a lot of work to be done on installing the cable TV system but the Morrisons say it's going well and they think Abernathians will enjoy it. We are the first small town to get underground cable. The system will be more expensive to install but have much less operating trouble.

CITY MANAGER FIELDS TO LEAVE FOR GREENER GRAHAM PASTURES

City Manager Larry Fields submitted his resignation to Abernathy City Council at its June meeting Monday night. He will become city manager of Graham when the present city manager there retires in several months. Fields said his only reason for leaving Abernathy is to take advantage of the opportunity for professional advancement. Graham is a city of 11,000. Both Fields and his wife, Judy, like that size town and the fishing and golfing convenient to the area. They will make the move the first week in July.

Mayor Thompson commended Fields for the good job he did for the City of Abernathy. He said the council appreciates the advance notice and they don't blame him for taking advantage of the opportunity.

Fields came to Abernathy four years ago from Panhandle where he was city manager for two and a half years. He said Abernathy is a good town, well organized, and he's proud to have had a part in several accomplishments during his time here.

Among them are the new water wells, supply lines, and tank which cost less than half the expected price because of a Farmers Home Administration grant; the sewer extension to the east part of town which had not had the service before; the state certified landfill; the building and electric codes; the airport improvements; the Emergency Medical Service; and new fire

fighting equipment which makes Abernathy the envy of the state.

Fields' professional goal has long been "a town like Graham". The City of Graham chose Fields over more than 60 applicants and asked him to come right away. He wanted to stay here however until the bids are let on the library/community building project, the water tower contract complete, and have a week to review city operations with whomever the council designates to take over until the city hires a new manager. Several people have already contacted him about the job.

Abernathy is very well known in city management circles because of the good "track records" of former Abernathy city managers. Paul N. Land went from here to Los Alamos, N.M., then to Albuquerque, and is now at Port Neches; Bob Sokoll went from here to Levelland and from there to Paris, Texas, a much larger town; Glenn Metcalf is at Canyon; and Jim Davis went to Port Neches, then Fort Stockton, and now is at Waxahatchie. The men's advancement speaks well for Abernathy.

Fields said the timing of his departure is not bad for the city since the bids on the construction project will be let and contracts signed, all other projects completed, and since it's almost budgeted, a new city manager can prepare his own instead of working with an inherited one.

Larry and Judy have enjoyed their time in Abernathy. Their three daughters, Lesley, age three; Lindsey, 18 months; and Allison, two months; were born here. The other men who have held the position here agree that baby girls seem to go with the Abernathy city manager job.

BUSINESS OPENS IN FORMER BOWLING ALLEY BUILDING

The new outfit in town, A-1 Liquidators and Supply, is a fully busy but not ready for business yet. It's a branch of Wolf Irrigation and still in the process of setting up in the old bowling alley at the south end of town. The farm supplies formerly housed at the parent company are being transferred to A-1 Liquidators across the highway.

"We're getting rid of everything at Wolf's Irrigation that doesn't pertain to irrigation work," said owner Ralph Wolf. "This will enable us to give better service on irrigation."

Bobby Thomason, formerly with a motor freight company, is manager of A-1. The new business will buy, sell, and trade used farm, industrial, and recreational equipment, purchase distressed merchandise of

all kinds, handle pipe and steel, sell on commission or consignment.

The stock is liable to include anything. "We may have a bulldozer one time and shipment of boots the next," said Wolf.

Preparations for the new business included a new roof on the building, improvements to the store front, and partial paving on a fenced six acre yard. They plan more paving, installa-

tion of pipe storage racks, and have plenty of room for expanding the yard if it becomes necessary.

Wesley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jessie Knight, Jr. of Abernathy. He was born in Lubbock, May 24, 1948 and received his education in Abernathy schools. After graduation he attended the Spartan School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Knight entered the U. S. Army on April 11, 1968 and served until January 12, 1971. He served in Vietnam and was injured during his service there. Upon returning home he attended Texas Tech University at Lubbock.

The four runners up in each age division will be invited to state competition. Deadline for entering will be June 23. Entry fee is \$25.00 and \$3.00 for insurance.

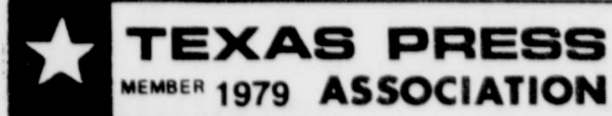

LEARN TO READ YOUR ELECTRIC METER AND SAVE!!!

It will let you determine how many kilowatt hours you use in a given period of time — an hour, a day, a month or a year. That's how electricity is measured — by kilowatt hours (kwh) used.

Your residential electric meter will have either 4 or 5 dials

Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1 if the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.

The dials above read (from left to right) 9-3-1-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later

The later reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 93115, from the new reading of 93138 — the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period. Each kwh costs approximately five cents.

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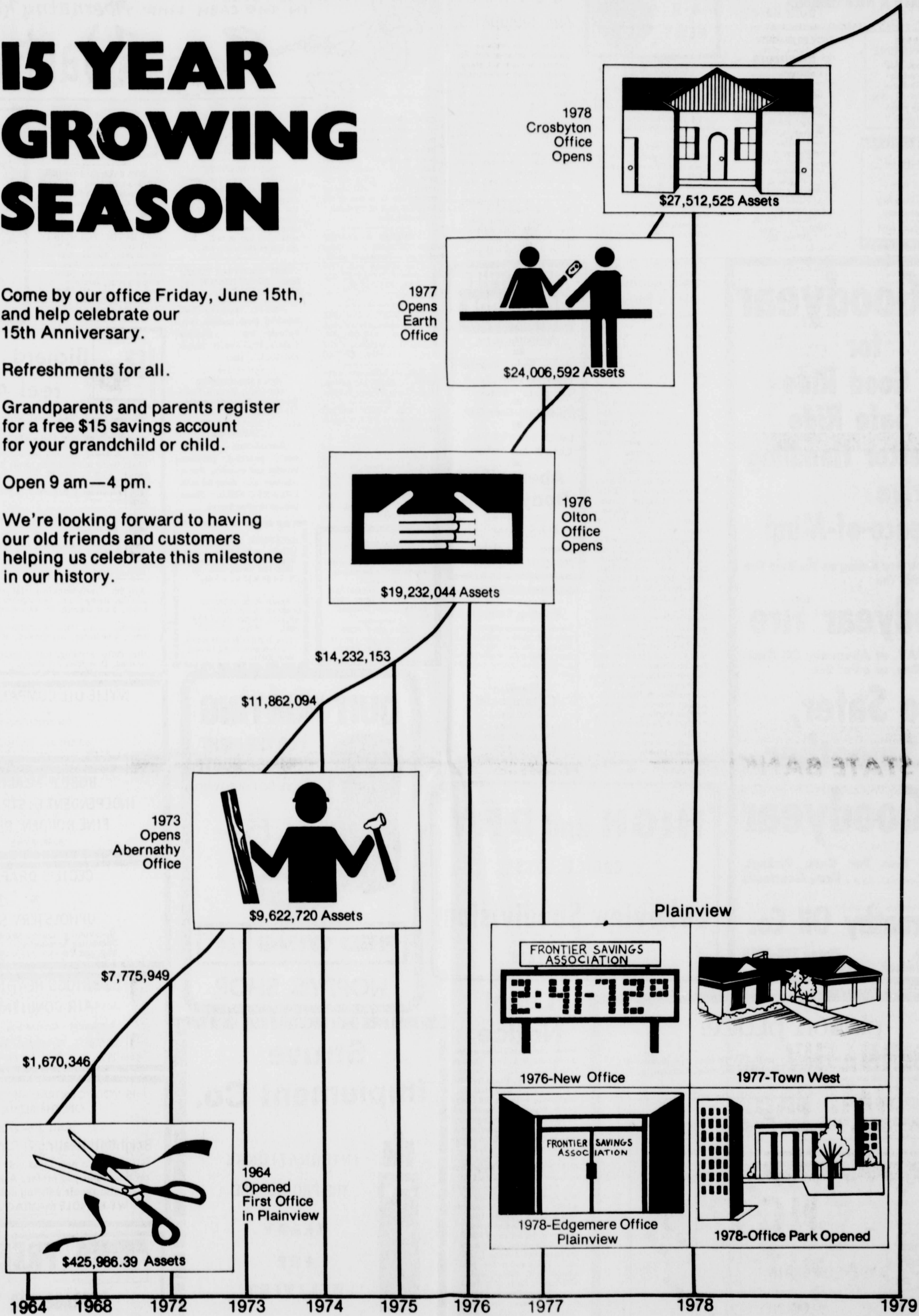
