"Miss Wayland" Kym Thompson Heads For Miss Texas Pageant July 4-7 In Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH---More than \$20,000 in scholarships and prizes will be awarded to winners in the 1979 Miss Texas Pageant, July 4-7, at the Tarrant County Convention Center in Ft. Worth.

Last year's Miss Texas hopefully competed for just over \$12,000 in scholarships and awards.

An Abernathian, Miss Kym Thompson, is a contestant in this year's Miss Texas Pageant. She will carry the title of "Miss Wayland" into the state pageant. She won the title in a "Miss Wayland" contest held a few months ago at Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, where she is a student. Kym is a daughter of Mayor and Mrs. J. Pete Thompson of Abernathy.

The contestant named Miss Texas 1979 will receive a scholarship for one full year to North Texas State University. In addition, she will be awarded a \$2,000 wardrobe from Stripling's Department Stores, a \$1,000 Gillette-Kellogg-Campbell Miss America Pageant fashion award, the use of a car for a year from Vandergriff Buick-Chevrolet in Arlington and the traditional crown and trophy. The new Miss Texas will also represent the state at the Miss America Pageant in Atlantic City in September.

Sixty-two contestants from throughout the state will be competing for these prizes, finalist scholarships, and talent and special judges awards at this year's pageant.

Police, Firemen To Take Onlooker's Driver's Licenses

WARNING! Because local people are so bad about following fire trucks and ambulances lately, Abernathy police officers and firemen plan a strict policy of confiscating driver's licenses of anyone who follows fire trucks and ambulances. The licenses will be turned in to City Judge Morris Stevens who will issue tickets and fine drivers when they come to pick up their licenses.

Police Chief Clyde Vandygriff said police officers haven't time to write tickets in emergency situations and because the problem with fire trucks and ambulance chasers is severe, license confiscation by policemen or firemen is the only answer.

In the future, policemen or volunteer firemen will be stationed at each intersection near the scene of a fire or Emergency Medical Service lifesaving operation. Any bystander who does not live or have business on the block will have his or her license taken away.

This goes for both emergency and practice situations. Volunteer firemen will be having outdoor practice drills often this summer because volunteers must spend many hours on drills before they can be certified. They try to do more outside drills in good summer weather and save the indoor practice and study for winter.

Chief Vandygriff mentioned also that anyone who drives over a fire hose can be fined \$100 because firemen's lives are at stake. Constant water pressure enables firemen to get so close to a fire as possible. Should the pressure be interrupted because of a suddenly damaged hose, the flames flash back at the firemen.

At an EMS call recently, the medical crew couldn't get the person in distress to the ambulance because of so many onlookers. Police had to be called to clear the way.

Remember, your curiosity can cost someone their life or inflame you at harm. It can also cost you money, embarrassment, and considerable inconvenience.

Jim Bob Smith Ends Ties With Grocery Business

Abernathians have bought groceries from Smiths since 1948 but this week, no Smiths are in the business. Jim Bob, the last Smith grocer, sold Smith's Thriftway to Robert Lowe of Levelland. The new management took over this week, changing the name of the store to Pay-N-Save.

Jim Bob's maternal grandfather, R. H. Stevens, and his dad, Lee R. Smith, bought a grocery store from J. A. Bruce in July 1948 and operated under the name of Smiths & Stevens Food Store. In February 1956, Stevens decided to retire and Jim Bob bought his grandfather's share of the business.

He and his dad operated as Smith's Food Store, moving to a new building at the present location in 1962. The name was changed to Smith's Thriftway. When the elder Smith died in 1968, Jim Bob bought his share and continued the operation alone.

In an interview Monday, Jim Bob said the store is still doing well and nothing dramatic caused him to sell it, but he has worked there since he was 14 years old and is just tired of the grocery business. He has nothing in mind for the future but wants to relax and enjoy things for awhile before deciding on a new career.

He graduated from AHS in 1951, attended Texas Tech two years, and spent two years in the army, including a tour of duty in Korea. His wife, Roifae, is a 1957 graduate of AHS. The couple married in 1957.

Their youngest child, Rob, is in sixth grade. The older son, Kevin, and daughter, Jana, are students at West Texas State in Canyon. Both Jim Bob's mother, Bernice Smith, and Roifae's, Vera (Mrs. Hugh) Vaughn, still live here. Jim Bob is a deacon of First Baptist Church and is Fire Chief of Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department.

Each year the members spend many hours getting the arena and grounds ready and making them as safe as possible for the contestants and guests.

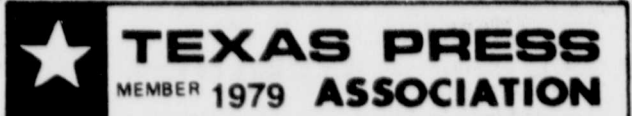

Mrs. Wilson To Be S.A. Camp Chairman

The Service Unit furnishes them with any clothing, toiletries or other items they might need, arranging medical examinations and providing them with \$5.00 in cash. It also arranges transportation to and from the camp for them.

The local Service Unit guarantees local expenses in getting the boys ready. The Salvation Army Texas Division pays all costs of the camp itself, which offers swimming, hiking, athletic contests, and many group activities in each of four one-week sessions.

Burial was in the Abernathy Cemetery under the direction of Chambers Funeral Home. The five brothers and sister of Ramos served as pallbearers.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ramos of Abernathy; five brothers, Alonso of Canyon, and Amulfo, Anibal, Hector, and Ruperto, all of Abernathy; and a sister, Mrs. Ted Perez of Lubbock.

NGC--I regret having to report that Father Clifton Corcoran may be away from the pastorate of St. Isidore's Catholic Church in Abernathy for a considerable length of time. When he became ill a few weeks ago, he was taken to Hill-Plains Hospital, Hale Center, then to St. Mary's of the Plains Hospital, Lubbock. When he is released from St. Mary's he will spend some time at the St. Ann's home in Panhandle, Texas. Father Corcoran's pastorate work also includes the Catholic Church in Petersburg, where he resided before entering the hospital.

NGC--"Count Your Many..." And, one of my blessings is that I do not have to deal with this name every week: Shahad Ghasemkhanababovrdi. He is the college student from Iran who ran a stop sign in Tallahassee, Fla., last week and crashed into Governor Bob Graham's automobile. The official received minor injuries in the two-car crash.

NGC--Wayland Baptist College of Plainview is opening a campus in Honolulu, Hawaii.

NGC--It seems that almost every year brings a rabbit-metal irrigation pipe and electric power line related death on the South Plains. There were two deaths in Lubbock last week involving rabbit-metal irrigation pipe-electric powerline. The two victims, David Bigham, 17, of Lubbock and Harris Bigham, 16, of Shallowater were double cousins of Larry Bigham of Abernathy. Larry is a Department of Public Safety Trooper. It has not been many months since one of Larry's uncles was killed when he was riding atop a building being moved in Lubbock and came in contact with a high voltage electric line.

NGC--Cashier's checks on which the amounts had been altered were passed at two businesses in Plainview last week. A \$4.58 check had been changed to \$820.00 and a \$5.10 check had been changed to \$3,050.00.

NGC--A former Abernathian, Thomas Monroe Cain, died earlier this year. He was a resident of Cherry Valley, Calif. He was born in 1884.

NGC--This information is from the Texas Department of Public Safety: From 1975 through 1978, 1,186,654 Americans died in all the United States Wars, from the Revolutionary War through the Viet Nam War. And, from 1900 through 1978, 2,239,244 Americans died in U.S. Highway accidents. Back to the wars; it is ironic that the most useless war in which Americans died, the Civil War, had more casualties, 529,332, than any other one war. World War 2 was next with 407,828 Americans being killed. Another useless war, Viet Nam, claimed 56,261 Americans. Claiming the fewest American lives was the War of 1812, with 2,260. The Spanish American War was second lowest with 2,446.

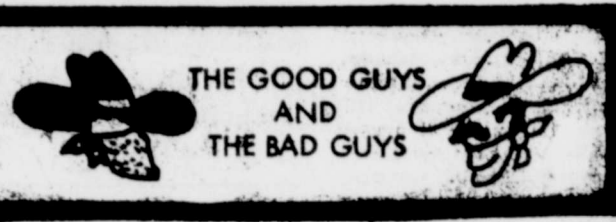

Nutrition, management and new trends in the swine industry will highlight sessions of the June 28 Swine Short Course at Texas Tech University. The 27th annual short course is expected to attract more than 125 and will take place at the new Texas Tech Livestock Arena, Indiana Ave. and Brownfield Highway. Co-sponsors are the Texas Pork Producers Association, the Texas Pork Producers Board and the Texas Tech Animal Science Department. The registration fee is \$10 and there is no pre-registration. 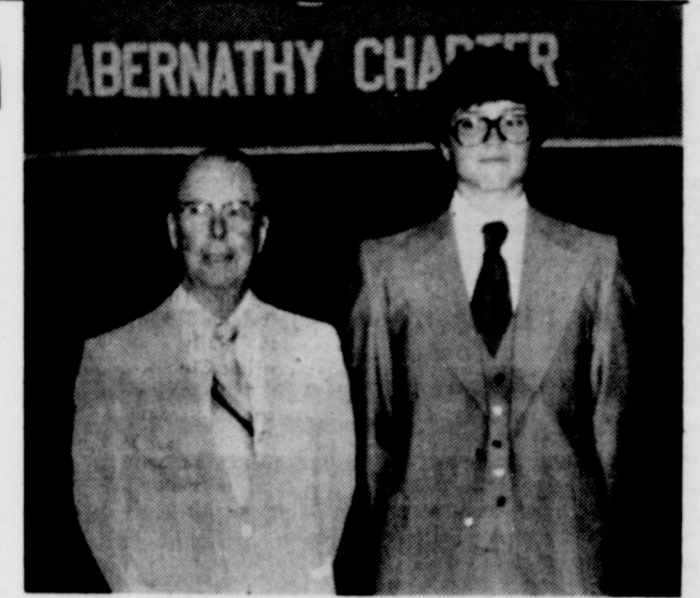

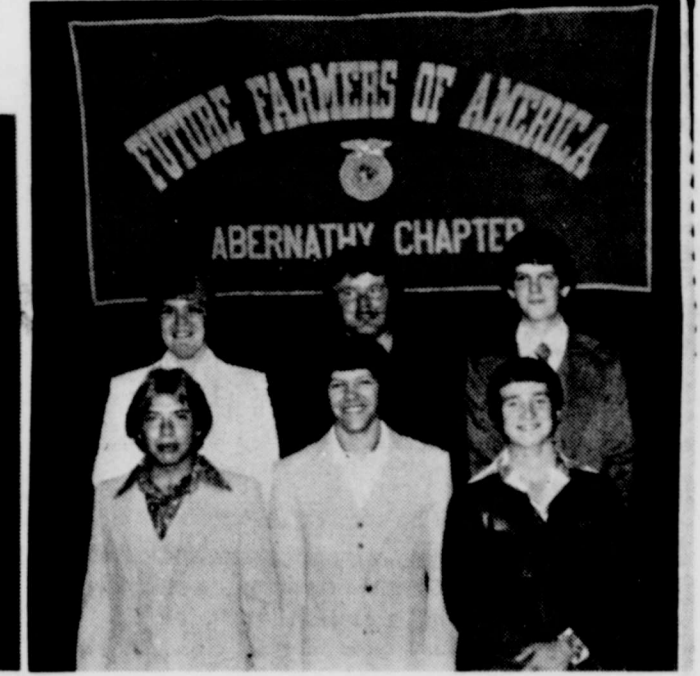
