Ralph Davis' pancakes went over real fine at the O.E.S. pancake breakfast early Wednesday morning. "There were not as many people as we would like to have had," said Myrna Davis. "But we enjoyed the good fellowship and made \$100."

"We appreciate all those who came out especially our law enforcement officers. I think every one of them came to eat breakfast with us."

She added that the group sold more baked goods this year than last at their booth on the city square.

The Girl Scout float won first place honors in the parade. Abernathy Music Club's float won second and Abernathy Classroom Teachers Association won third.

The AHS Antelope Band beat The Blast From The Past (band exes, some from WAY back) and won the retired Tuba Trophy for the effort. Jent's Home of Music donated the tuba made June 15, 1886.

It will hang proudly in the band hall until next year's 4th of July band competition.

Members of Kay Taylor's and Gloria Torres's first grade Brownie troop performed the flag raising ceremony in front of City Hall after the parade. The girls in the color guard were Christy Ramirez, Sue Rowan, Shanni Waters, and Marcella Ryan, and Julie Torres, Cadette Scout.

SCHOOL BUILDING PLANS TAKE ON NEW WRINKLE AT BOARD MEETING

Abernathy School Board had its July meeting Thursday, June 28, as is the custom because July is vacation month for school administrative personnel. Board members Jerry Cowlett and Richard Howard were absent.

NEW IDEA

Discussion on school building projects took on a new wrinkle. School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb and architect Herbert Brasher suggested that the oldest wing of elementary school, formerly considered beyond repair, be renovated to house administrative offices. Four offices are quartered there already; the rest is used for storage.

Brasher said the floor and walls of the building are usable and that he can, in effect, build a new top with supports, tear down the old roof and ceiling, renovate the inside, redesign the outside, and make a nice modern looking building out of it for around \$450,000.

Dr. Webb said the building is not needed for classroom space. The board discussed crowd conditions in the administrative offices and figured the old building could give them plenty of room. Everyone agreed they should get productive use out of the building or tear it down.

Brasher reported that an all weather track will cost around \$100,000. The board had asked him to figure an estimate to present at this meeting. He also revised the estimate on the cost of a new gym to \$750,000 which, since the board was thinking of a one million dollar project, leaves about \$300,000 for a new lab facility.

Daniel Fondy wondered whether the school should build a limited use facility like the show barn for use of essentially private organizations like the stock show association. David Pinson pointed out that the community indicated it was needed. Board President Billie Harrison added that a space that big could serve many purposes.

Riddell, however, feels strongly that the stiffer requirements help build a strong band and asked that jackets continue to be awarded only to seniors. The board respected his wishes.

CURRICULUM

The principals of Abernathy schools prepared curriculum summaries requested by the board last meeting. Dr. Webb said there are weaknesses in the curriculum but with only 500 students, they have a problem finding enough to make up some classes.

The school tries to offer courses that students request and offers individual study opportunity when possible. Some courses, though, require classroom practice to be effective.

CONFUSION

The education industry in Texas is groping its way through recent legislation trying to figure out how to put it to practice and what effects it will have. Dr. Webb said he helped put some of it together and still doesn't know what it means.

The legislation has some very good things in it that take time to put into operation because the bills say what but not how it should be done.

"It's not the big things in these bills," said Webb, "It's the fine print and interpretation."

The bill spelling out classification of open space land for tax purposes is most complicated. Another bill (the one Webb helped write) spells out tests that students must pass before they can get a diploma.

Little more assurance that the school can do all this without raising taxes. Dr. Webb reviewed an estimated financial statement. He said that without cutting programs, supplies, or anything, the school district could take on these projects and have them paid for in 1990. He said the August budget hearing will show that even with replacement of the boiler system and other major improvements, the school is in better financial shape the end of this budget year than last which was also a good year.

Dr. Webb said the board should decide by the 20th what the project should include so the budget can be figured accordingly. Fondy asked what would happen if the bond election didn't pass. Webb replied that they could do one or two projects with the regular budget or do nothing and cut taxes. Schools are allowed only so much surplus.

The men also said the people of the school district are getting a bargain because of the oil property in the district. People in the district pay only half the school taxes; the oil companies pay the rest.

Dr. Webb suggested that because time is short, they put two projects in the regular budget so they can be started immediately. That course of action would also cut the bond issue amount in half.

STEF BAND REQUIREMENTS

In their efforts to give student excellence in academics, music, and other fields the same recognition and prestige as athletic ability, Abernathy School Board asked Band Director George Riddell for recommendations on new qualifications for letter and jacket awards for band students.

Athletes often earn jackets early in their high school career and get to wear the coveted awards for several years. Band students must work four years for theirs.

The bride and groom were both graduates of Abernathy High School. The couple will reside in Abernathy after a wedding trip to Cloudfcroft, New Mexico.

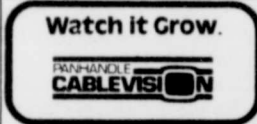

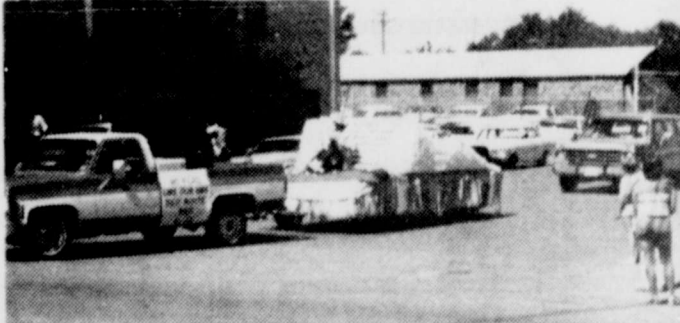

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ABERNATHY SCHOOL BAND HISTORY

BAND STUFF!!!!

In 1948 the Abernathy School Board told Fred Miller, Superintendent of schools, that they wanted a band. Mr. Miller informed the board that to have a band would require money. "You don't just get a lot of kids together to 'toot' a horn." The board was to commit the school to full backing of any band director--and Mr. Miller lived up to that word for the city tax payers and youth of the school that became part of a heritage----

D. W. (DUB) CRAIN, JR.
Abernathy Band Director
1952-1960
In 1952, a man by the name of D. W. Crain, Jr. (Dub) came for an interview with Supt. Fred Miller. Mr. Crain was band director at Lovington, New Mexico at the time. When Mr. Crain walked into Mr. Miller's office, the first words he heard were, "I want to win!" As soon as Mr. Crain assured Mr. Miller that he wanted a winning band, he was hired as Antelope Band Director. That first year Mr. Crain was in Abernathy, the band made all II Divisions.
In 1953-54, the Abernathy High School Antelope Band made their first Sweepstakes Award. Mr. Crain went on to help the Antelope Band win five other Sweepstakes

Not only did the Antelope band make Six Sweepstakes under Dub Crain but they also became known as one of the finest marching bands throughout Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. The band was chosen the outstanding band in just about everything they entered--at that time the band could enter unlimited numbers of contests and events. They marched in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, the Inaugural Parade in Austin, Home-coming Parades in Texas and New Mexico, and attended the Tri-State Music Festival in Enid, Oklahoma.

Supt. Fred Miller wanted a winner and the Antelope band became one of the winningest organizations in the state. Several of Mr. Dub Crain's students were chosen to be in the Texas Music Educators Association All-State Band. All-State Bandmen included Dan Nelson, 1954, Tuba; Patsy Mills, 1955, Bass Clarinet; Jimmy Torres, 1958, French Horn; and Doyle Johnson, 1960, Tuba.

At the present time Mr. D. W. Crain, Jr. is president of the TEXAS BANDMASTERS ASSOCIATION which will hold its convention in San Antonio the last week in July. In 1979, Mr. Crain earned the 18th Sweepstakes Award in his band directing career. He is presently band director at Dumas High School.

MR. EVERETT MAXWELL
Abernathy Band Director
1960-1969
Mr. Everett Maxwell came to Abernathy from Andrews, Texas. He was a well known composer of marches. During the time he was in Abernathy, Mr. Maxwell composed ten marches.

Several of the marches have become well known throughout the United States, especially a Spanish March which Mrs. Ruth Adams named "Ojo de Aguila" which means Old Eagle Eye. The name came from a note which was passed from Pam Davis to Connie Knight. The note said, "We better quit passing notes or Old Eagle Eye will catch us."

Well, he did!!! Mr. Maxwell still has the note. The march has been used in just about every band clinic in the United States. By the way, Pam and Connie were both inducted into the Eagle Eye Society at the Spring Concert that year. They had to sit at the front of the stage wearing oversized glasses while the entire band played the march.

Mr. Maxwell's bands earned five Sweepstakes Awards, seven First Places at the South Plains Fair Parade, 49 made the All-Region Band, Myra Kimball Reagan made the All-State Band in Contra Bass Clarinet, and numerous students won medals at the Region 16 Solo and Ensemble Contest. Mr. Maxwell's bands did well at every contest they entered, especially at the last contest to which he took the

Antelope Band. The band was chosen the Best Marching Band, Best Playing Band, and Outstanding Band at the Canon City, Colorado, Music Festival. Mr. Everett Maxwell presently teaches at Lubbock Christian High School.

Some interesting facts about the Abernathy High School Antelope Band and directors.

If there's one thing that makes the Antelope Band come alive, it's a good parade. Competition brings out the best in each Abernathy bandman as well as townspeople. The Abernathy High School Antelope Band has dominated the Panhandle South Plains Fair Parade for the past 24 years. First Place 18 times and Second Place four times. The parade was rained out twice. Two years, the band missed First Place by one point.

In the last 15 years (1964-65---1978-79), 145 students from Abernathy High School played in the All-Region Band. That's good representation for the school and the community.

The Texas Music Educators Association chooses enough students to make up two bands to play at its annual Convention Clinic. It is very difficult for someone from a small community to make this All State Band.

All band students from Conference AAAA, AAA, AA, A, and B are eligible to enter as long as their director is a member of TMEA. In order for someone from Abernathy to make the All-State Band he or she must first outplay bandmen from Lubbock, Plainview, Odessa, Midland, El Paso and all the towns surrounding these cities.

Students in the cities that make the All-State Band have usually taken several years of private lessons on their instruments. Students from Abernathy who have made the All-State Band regardless of the odds are:

To get a Sweepstakes Award, a band must be rated Superior in marching, concert, and sight reading at the annual U.L.L. Regional Contests. In the past 26 years (1954-1979), the Antelope band won the coveted Sweepstakes Award 13 times. The other years, the Antelope Band received a II division rating in concert nine times and in marching four times. Only once in the last 26 years has the Antelope band received a II rating in sight reading.

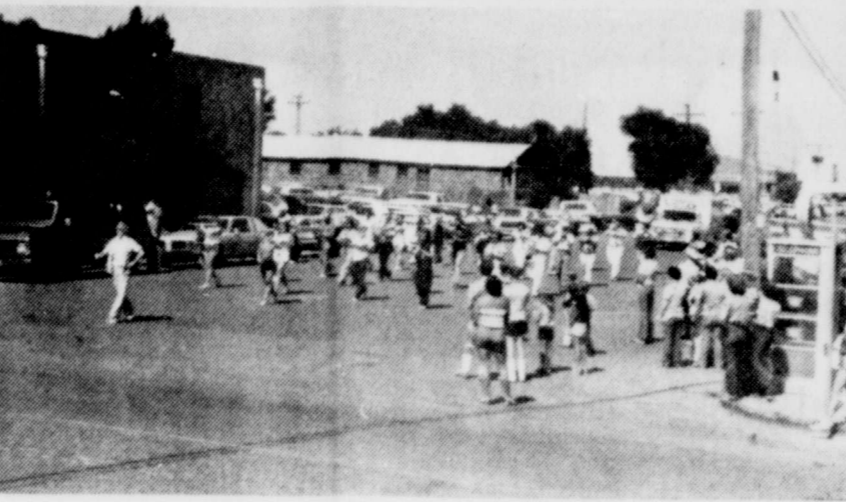
STATE QUALIFIERS
Through the years, Abernathy Bandsmen have competed in the U.L.L. Solo and Ensemble Contest. Three years in particular are remembered by past band directors because the Antelope Band brought back so many first division medals that they had to carry them out in a box. Those years when the band did so well were 1953-54, 1966-67, and 1977-78. In each of those years the band brought back close to 40 First Place Medals.
When a bandsman plays a Class I Solo or Ensemble--which is the most difficult Class in U.L.L.--he or she qualifies for the State Solo and Ensemble Contest which is held on the University of Texas Campus in Austin. The past two years, the Antelope band has qualified a good number of students.

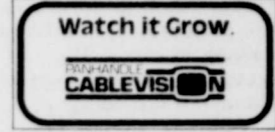

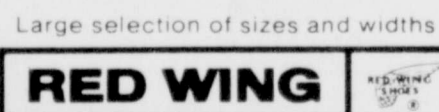
