The news report also gave an erroneous impression about school taxes.

CAR TAX The council accepted the tax relief exemption on Recent state legislation did away with the tax unless taxing bodies specifically vote to continue it. Abernathy School Board decided to continue the tax one

more year.

City Secretary Clement reported that the city will lose \$4600 in tax receipts by discontinuing the tax. The aldermen decided that, in the face of rising taxes and inflation, it is a small amount compared to the difficulty in making a distinction between personal and business cars, Cars five years and old and older aren't taxed anyway.

TRASH RATE Two aldermen and the mayor reported complaints still coming in about the commercial trash rates. Several people feel strongly that their particular rate is unfair. The aldermen said

complaints are to be expected since, for so long, pe ople paid much less than the service cost. The recent increase seems like a big jump -- more to some than others because the former rate system badly needed updating.

Aldermen spent many hours on the trash rates and think this is the best and fairest system. there seems to be a demand for one, they will hold a public hearing and rehash it again.

They said if anyone can come up with a better, more equitable way to raise enough money to pay for trash service, they will be glad to hear it.

GRANT APPLICATION The city's consulting engineer Clayton Yeager said the city has been invited to submit an application for an Environmental Protection Agency grant for new sewage treatment plant. The city first indicated interest in the grant in 1974 and it took this long for Abernathy to

get to the head of the list Yeager said if they don't apply, the city will lose its place on the list. However, it will most likely be four or five years before anything actually comes of it.

He and Overstreet reported that the present treatment system badly needs updating and a new one will certainly be needed by the time the grant is The council approve d. authorized Yeager's firm, Parkhill, Smith, & Cooper, to make the application.

The project involves three phases. Under terms of the grant, the city will pay the first \$1500 for engineering and feasibility studies. After that, the city pays 25% of the cost of the project and the EPA grant pays 75% unless treated sewage is used for irrigation. That is the case in Abernathy, so that grant will take care of 85% of the cost and the city,




