TOO MUCH MONEY

The story in last week's paper about Abernathy School Board said it will cost approximately \$450,000 to renovate the old wing of elementary school across from First Baptist Church. That is an error. It will cost approximately \$100,000 to renovate the structure and \$450,000 to completely replace it. School Superintendent Dr. Webb said the school is only trying to make the structure safe or get rid of it. The news report also gave an erroneous impression about school taxes. Abernathy School District is fortunate to have oil properties in the district. Oil companies pay the other 82%. Oil companies pay half the total cost of school operations. People's taxes, combined with state and federal funds, cover the rest of the cost.

924 Steak House Opened Last Week

Because "a man shouldn't do the same thing all his life," Abernathy has a new restaurant, the 924 Steak House at 924 Ave. D. Donald Robison opened his new business Thursday last week. "There's still a lot we want to do," he said, "but people were pushing us to open."

He owned a general mercantile store in Rodeo, New Mexico for 18 years. Since moving to Abernathy two years ago, he ran a ceramics shop started by his son. He didn't enjoy the ceramics business and needed a use for the building he owned. Abernathy people kept wishing out loud for a really nice restaurant so he put the two needs together.

He had no background in the restaurant business but spent almost a year doing research and finding just the right people to work for him. He enlisted Ken Speiker to work with him on remodeling the building. Robison himself planned the interior right down to light fixtures.

He also ordered and arranged the kitchen equipment and was gratified when his experience meat cook, Ron Price, walked in for the first time and said that's just how he would have done it. Price worked three years at a well-known steakhouse in Plainview.

Robison is proud of the way the restaurant looks, his employees, and his menu. He thinks his location is good since he aims to cater to local people and the permanent ones in the surrounding area.

The 924 Steak House has, in addition to charcoal broiled steaks, chicken, shishkebab, and chicken fried steak. All the meat is cut right in their kitchen.

City Council Meeting Report

WATER LINES
The council considered a request by Jesse Morrison that the city extend water lines to the site of a mobile home park he is developing north of the Dairy Queen. Yeager and Overstreet outlined possible routes and the easements necessary before it can be done. The project will involve boring under Ave. D.

CAR TAX
The council accepted the tax relief exemption on personal use automobiles. Recent state legislation did away with the tax unless taxing bodies specifically vote to continue it. Abernathy School Board decided to continue the tax one more year.

AIRPORT MOWER
Airport Manager Max Crowell asked if the city could buy a mower to use sometimes at the airport. The present equipment can't get close enough to hangers and some other areas to cut the weeds.

TRASH RATE
Two aldermen and the mayor reported complaints still coming in about the commercial trash rates. Several people feel strongly that their particular rate is unfair.

OTHER ACTIONS
The council set the Board of Equalization meeting for July 30, 9 AM to 3 PM. It also set August 13 (the next council meeting) as the date to hear Jack Dillworth's appeal of the city's condemnation notice on the remains of his building south of the Dairy Queen.

GRANT APPLICATION
The city's consulting engineer Clayton Yeager said the city has been invited to submit an application for an Environmental Protection Agency grant for a new sewage treatment plant. The city first indicated interest in the grant in 1974 and it took this long for Abernathy to get to the head of the list.

Yeager said if they don't apply, the city will lose its place on the list. However, it will most likely be four or five years before anything actually comes of it.

He and Overstreet reported that the present treatment system badly needs updating and a new one will certainly be needed by the time the grant is approved. The council authorized Yeager's firm, Parkhill, Smith, & Cooper, to make the application.

The project involves three phases. Under terms of the grant, the city will pay the first \$1500 for engineering and feasibility studies. After that, the city pays 25% of the cost of the project and the EPA grant pays 75% unless treated sewage is used for irrigation. That is the case in Abernathy, so that grant will take care of 85% of the cost and the city, 15%.

TULSA, OKLA.—The International Petroleum Exposition will salute Abernathy, as one of the leading oil centers of the United States at its 56th anniversary event, September 10-13, 1979, in Tulsa, Oklahoma according to John M. Houchin, IPE president.

The Tulsa Onshore Oil Show, first held in 1923, will have 10 1/2 acres of inside exhibits in an air-conditioned building large enough to house seven regulation football fields, plus five acres of outside space for larger, moving equipment.

Exhibits will represent the exploration, drilling, production, pipeline and refinery/petrochemical divisions of the oil industry. A special lounge will be furnished for independent oil men.

Attendance of 40,000 oil men from 50 states of the union and over 60 nations are expected, Houchin said.

The Diamond Shamrock employees and their families had an hamburger and ice cream supper last Thursday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harris Wiggins.

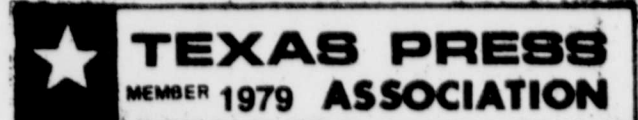

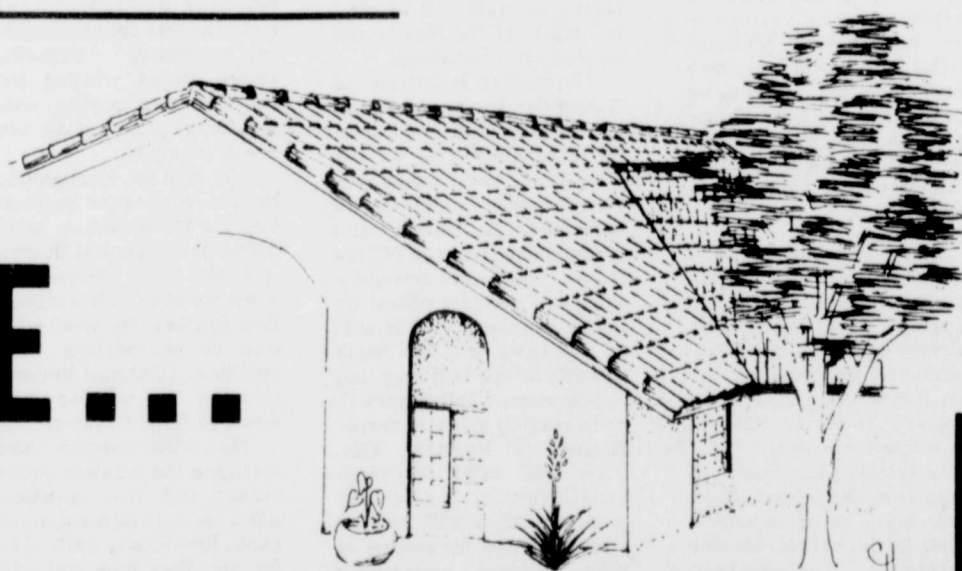
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Local Bandsmen At Tech Band Camp
