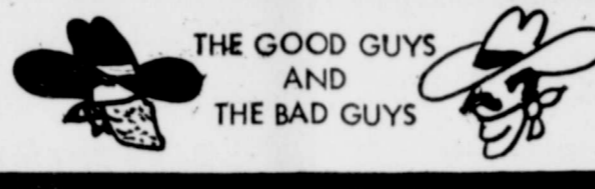

NEIGHBORHOOD PETS BECOME PESTS

COLLEGE STATION-- Those oft-treasured family "pets" are unleashing a new dimension to city problems--becoming neighborhood "pests" which are costly and a growing threat to human health and safety.

And it's spilling over into rural areas, too.

"Dogs and cats, particularly in urban areas, are going to have to be dealt with, sooner or later," assures Dr. Archie L. Flowers of Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

He said dogs and cats are a problem that's not going to stray away--but will get bigger, before it gets smaller.

About 60 percent of people in the U.S. have one or more pets, or companion animals, and "somewhere between 6,000 and 10,000 puppies and kittens" are being born every hour.

That's four times the rate of population growth of humans.

"Some cities have an ordinance, or dog law; others don't. If they do, they don't enforce it until there's a rabies outbreak," the veterinarian said, "or when people get fed up on

the litter, such as happened in New York City."

Flowers cited the outbreak in Houston in the 1950's which labeled the city as "Rabies Capitol of the World," and in El Paso where an epidemic of rabies occurred in March.

"The uncontrolled pet problem, particularly dogs, is invading rural areas as feral (wild) dogs mate with coyotes," Flowers added. "This is not only 'bad news' for livestock producers but all owners of cats and dogs because of rabies."

He said that city ordinances should become countywide to become effective, as dogs are not respecters of city limit signs.

AGM's College of Veterinary Medicine has a survey-education-cost-benefit program available to cities requesting such a program.

"We are not advocating complete animal control. That would be next to impossible," Flowers concluded. "But, what we are recommending will reduce potential dangers of mad dogs, health and nuisances."

RABIES THREAT

Cases of rabies in animals are on the increase in Texas. As of mid-June, 1979, there have been over 540 confirmed cases of rabies in animals. This is about 85% above the number found rabid in the same period in 1978, and is far above the expected number. The Texas Department of Health strongly suggests that the owners of cats and dogs in this area vaccinate them against rabies, prevent them from roaming, and report stray animals to city or county authorities.
