Rod Ellis Named Abernathy's New City Manager Will Assume Duties September 1

Abernathy City Council chose a new city manager in a special meeting Tuesday, July 24. He is Rod Ellis, 30, a native of Rally, Personnel Director for the City of Longview. He will begin work here September 1.

Ellis is a graduate of Texas Tech with a bachelor's degree in business administration and a master's degree in public administration. He served in the U.S. Army from 1968-70, achieved the rank of sergeant, and is a Vietnam veteran. He is married and has a daughter.

He worked in city administration in Austin several years before going to Longview, where he had supervised 600 city employees. He applied for the Abernathy position because

he wants to get into city management and to be closer to relatives in this area.

Alderman Hoppy Toler said the council was most impressed with Ellis personally and with his qualifications. He has had experience already with federal grant programs Abernathy is just getting into such as the EPA sewer system improvement program.

The council didn't actively advertise the open city manager position but word of mouth among professionals generated eight applications. The council already knew several of those who applied and interviewed three more. They think they made a good choice for the city.

Three elementary age girls are spending the week at Ceta Canyon Methodist Camp. They are Sharmia Toler, Kelley Omerant and Kara Havens.

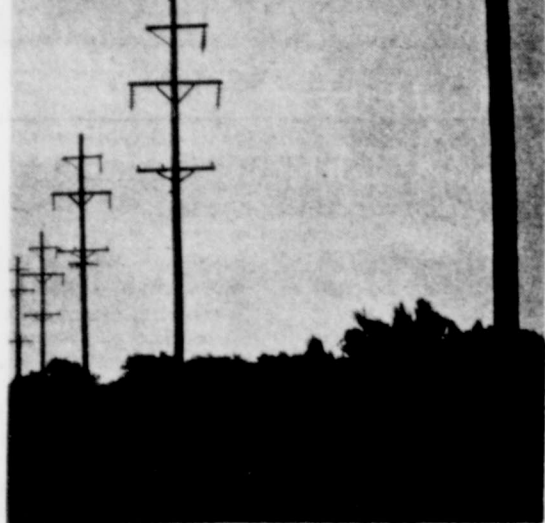

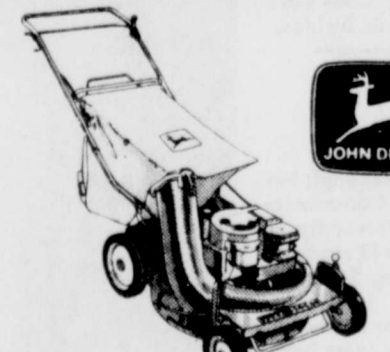
