She has been to Europe several times, traveling in both West and East Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia.

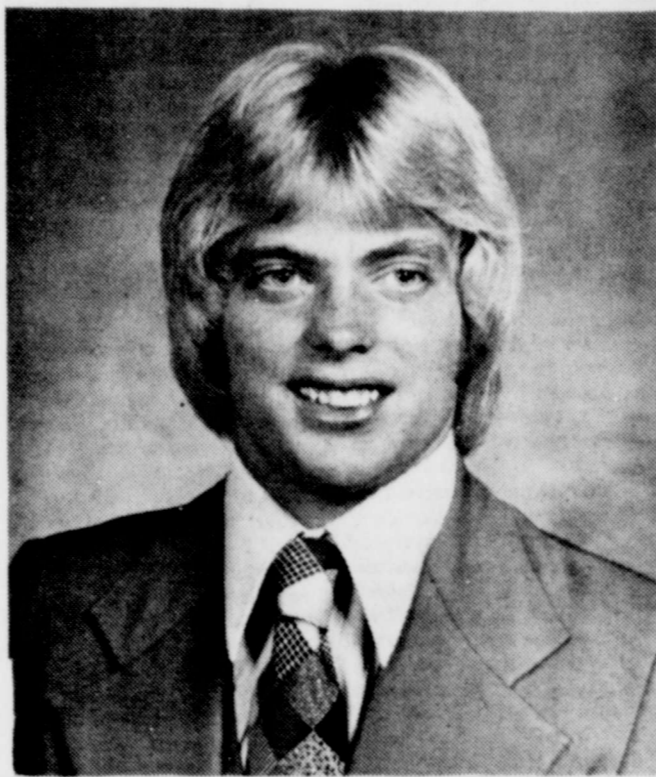
"I've stayed in Germany and Austria primarily. Munich and Vienna are my two favorite cities," she says.

Homemaking Staff Attends State Convention

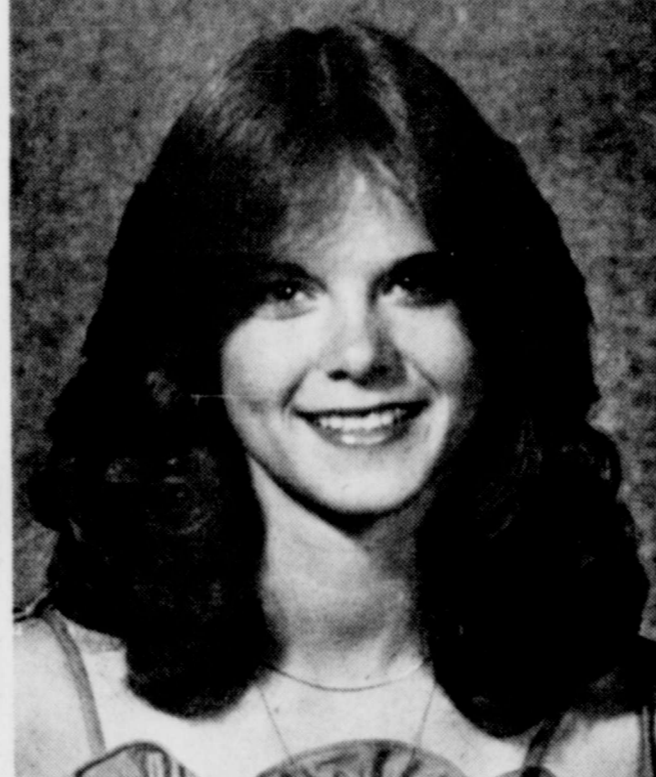

Review Visits Waits Miniature House

The most charming house in town is located on a table at 211 Ave. H. The builder of the Country Victorian style structure is Lelloine Waits, age 9, is the proud owner.

It is a seven room, two story house, beautifully furnished right down to a teeny fly swatter. The walls are papered with dainty floral patterns. Wide baseboards and door add to the authentic atmosphere.

Lelloine has collected miniatures ever since she married and several were appropriate for the house furnishings. She made many things herself, however, included fine crafted wash stands, croquet set, desk, kitchen sink, Victorian couch and wing chairs, and needlepoint carpet and cushions for the living room.

She made a tiny mug from a bit of wire and a 22 bullet, an etagere with little wood beads and hat pins. She papered empty thread spools to make hat boxes and folded little strips of fabric around cardboard to simulate bolts of material in the sewing room cabinet.

A tiny framed butterfly collection decorates one wall. The butterflies look real but are drawn ones which Lelloine cut from catalogs and put into handmade frames. Daughter Elizabeth made several things including a fancy miniature perfume bottle of crystal beads.

Earring chandeliers and lamps, lace handkerchief draperies and bedspreads add elegant touches. The beautiful rugs in two rooms

are very old crocheted dollies which Lelloine found in a relative's trunk.

Other relatives also contributed to the furnishings. A great-aunt started some knitting on toothpicks to put in a tiny knitting basket. Another made a walnut basket to hold straw flowers. Lelloine's father, who is also a doll house builder, made a brass bed for one of the rooms.

This house was Lelloine's first attempt. Her only tools were an X-Acto knife and glue. The house materials came in a kit but were not pre-cut or drawn. This talented and clever lady can do anything though, and a walk through her human size home proves it. It is full of unique touches she made herself. Several gift shops in Texas and New Mexico also carry her handiwork.

The women in the family thoroughly enjoy the doll house and are always on the lookout for more furnishings. They haven't so far been able to find a doll family they really want to inhabit their pride and joy.

Immunization Requirements In Texas Elementary And Secondary Schools

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs: Three doses of oral polio vaccine. Three doses of DTP vaccine. One dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine.

(b) Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade five: At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4. At least three doses of DTP but one dose must have been received after age 4. All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness. One dose of rubella is required. Mumps vaccine for all students through seven years of age.

(c) Students in grade six through twelve: All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4. All students must have received at least three doses of DTP with at least one dose having been received after age 4.

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age, and all students enrolled in the sixth grade, will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness. On September the first of each year thereafter, students one year older or one grade higher must meet these requirements.

Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday.)

Students enrolling in school for the first time should bring medical certification verifying that they have received the required immunizations.

Students that attended Abernathy High School last spring but did not pre-register may register Wednesday, August 22nd.

Students that will attend Abernathy High School for the first time may register August 23rd.

The principals office will be open each day from 9-12 a. m. and 1-4 p. m.

AJHS

Junior High School students (grades 6, 7 & 8), who did not pre-enroll last spring, may enroll through August 24 during the hours of 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. in the principal's office.

ELEMENTARY

Elementary students will register Thursday morning August 30, 9 to 12 a. m. Students entering school for the first time will need their birth certificate and immunization record.

For Hale County Judge Henry Heck Services August 2

PLAINVIEW--Services for Henry Heck, 77, who was serving his third term as judge of Hale County, were held August 2 in First Baptist Church with Dr. Carlos McLeod, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Parklawn Memorial Gardens directed by Lemons Funeral Home.

Mr. Heck died at 7:10 a. m. July 31, in Central Plains Regional Hospital where he had been a patient since suffering a heart attack July 28 at his home. 1309 Ennis St.

A native of Groesbeck, Mr. Heck graduated from high school at Wilmett and attended Simmons College now Hardin-Simmons. He was a U. S. Marine Corps veteran of World War I.

In 1924 following his marriage to Grace Hancock, Mr. Heck moved to Lynn County and farmed and started a cotton gin at New Home in 1926.

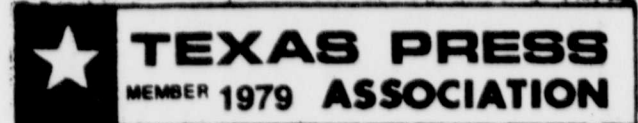
Mr. Heck, moving to Lubbock County in 1948, built a gin in the present Heckville Community, named after the Heck family. He served as a director of Southwest Telephone Co-op which he helped establish for the Heckville area in 1948.

After serving as mayor of Balou two years, Mr. Heck came to Hale County in 1958 and farmed near Halfway. He had lived in Plainview since 1960. He was a member of Plainview Rotary Club, Knife and Fork Club, the Chamber of Commerce and Hale County Historical Commission.

Judge Heck founded the Hale County Peace Officers Association and set up the juvenile program in Hale County. He helped establish the July 4 prayer breakfast. He was a trustee of Wayland Baptist College in 1964-74. He was a second vice president of South Plains Association of Governments.

Mr. Heck, a Baptist Church deacon since 1936, was a member of First Baptist Church where he was assistant teacher of the Forby Sunday School Class.

Survivors are his wife, one daughter, one son, two brothers, two sisters, six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

We landed at Gatwick Airport in London at 10:00 a.m. May 7th which would have been 4:00 a.m. our time. Jimmy youngest son and family are stationed at Alconbury base, met us at the airport. He had told us to be prepared for a 4 hour trip by car to their home. It was only 60 miles and we wondered why it would take that long but, we found out. The roads are real narrow and winding, you sure don't make good time on them.

We enjoyed the ride, the country was beautiful. Evelyn stayed two weeks and I stayed two months. We went to London to see the "Queen". Well we did see what we went for the changing of the guards. It is very pretty to watch. We also got to hear Big Ben gong one time. It was one o'clock just after we got there. We also got to eat at McDonalds in London. We visited Herods of London. We toured a high castle in Warwick. They are kept exactly like they were when they used them. We also visited a mill that was still in use. We bought some flour, whole wheat and plain. I tried my cooking ability with it but, didn't have to good of luck. It was very interesting to see how they grind their wheat after seeing our mills here which take out and add things.

Some of the fields that were so green when we got over there, in about a week turned into the prettiest yellow blossoms. I ask what it was, they told me it was mustard. They said, they make bird seed from it.

We sure longed for a hamburger and coke. That is just something you don't find if you are out for a day of fun. You take your drinks and sandwiches. They don't know what ice is, so you drink your drinks right out of the can. Very few have refrigerators. We were told when we got over there not to ask for iced tea, they

wouldn't know what you want. They had open meat markets and their bakeries were open. We had tea in one of the tea shops. It was very good with cream and sugar.

I had my first train and subway (tube) is their name for it. We went to the horse races one day. The very first race had one horse from the U.S.A. Jim and I bet on it and won. Their races are called steeple chases. We went to Cambric. It is a beautiful town. They have 27 colleges that make the University of Cambric. We went through several of them, they are beautiful. Every little town or village have a market day. Some have three days a week. I have never seen as many bicycles. Older people ride them. They go shopping every morning for the day. We went to several large towns but, we enjoyed most of all visiting over the country just to see how they did things.

I never saw so many different kinds of flowers and all just beautiful. The roses were in full bloom the first of July when I came home. I never saw roses any larger. The weather was cold and rainy most of the two months I was there. I decided it takes cold weather for flowers. Everything is quite different there from our ways here. The people are very nice and friendly.

The flight over and back was very good. The food excellent and two movies both ways. I would recommend the 747 for anyone for comfort. I enjoyed my trip very much. I think any grandma visiting her kids and grandkids will have a good time. I was real glad to get back to good old Abernathy. It never looked so good.

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OES Has Program On Rob Morris

A "Rob Morris" program was presented August 2, at the stated meeting of Abernathy Chapter No. 877 Order of the Eastern Star.

Honoring a request by The Abernathy Weekly Review, Myrna Davis prepared for our publication a story, "Rob Morris and the Order of the Eastern Star" which follows. Mrs. Ralph (Myrna) Davis has served as Worthy Matron of Abernathy Chapter No. 877 of the Eastern Star during two separate Chapter years, 1951-1952 and 1976-1977.

Mrs. Beatie Waters is the current Worthy Matron of the Chapter.

ROB MORRIS AND THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR:
 Why have a Rob Morris program every year in August? This question has been asked by friends who see the announcement of our meeting in the paper each month.

If you were asked why we have programs honoring George Washington in February each year you would answer, "Because he was the founder of our country." So Dr. Robert Morris was the founder of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Dr. Morris was born August 31, 1818 near Boston, Massachusetts. He grew up in New York where he received many educational advantages. He became a very successful lawyer and lecturer. Dr. Morris became a Master Mason in Oxford, Mississippi March 5, 1849. He soon became interested in an idea, that the female relatives of Master Mason should benefit from the knowledge of this great fraternal order, so with this desire in mind, he set forth to plan for an order from which both men and women could benefit. Dr. Morris and his wife invited other Master Masons and their wives to discuss plans, and it was while he was teaching as principal in "The Little Red Brick School Building" in Richland, Mississippi in 1850, that he worked many hours writing Ritual of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Dr. Morris was known the world over not only by

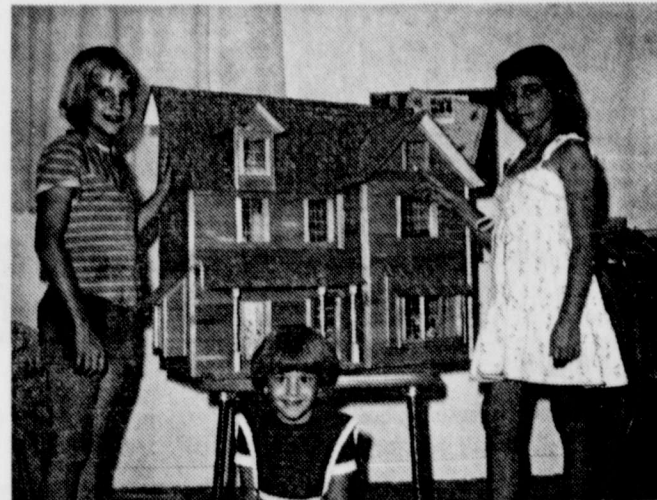
Master Masons and members of the Order of the Eastern Star. For he was a great poet, having written over 400 poems. Many of these poems were devoted to the Order of the Eastern Star and are used in our chapters today, but some are beautiful religious poems. He also wrote many religious songs, of which my two favorites are "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked" and "O Galilee", which he wrote while he was living in the Holy Land. He organized the first Masonic Lodge in Jerusalem.

On July 31, 1888, when the news of his death was learned, a great loss was felt by people around the world.

On August the 3rd and 4th many members from 714 chapters of the Order of the Eastern Star in Texas, which make up the Grand Chapter of Texas will meet in Arlington at the O. E. S. Home for a special founders day celebration, to be known as the Rob Morris Anniversary.

Under a large pavilion, we will sell all kinds of hand made gifts, home baked and canned goods, also will have a flea market with many antiques. This is open to the public, and all proceeds go to our O. E. S. Home where a hundred lovely ladies, all over 70 years old live. This year I will be working in the "General Store" part of the pavilion, and would love to see anyone from this area that might be in Fort Worth or Dallas on those days.
