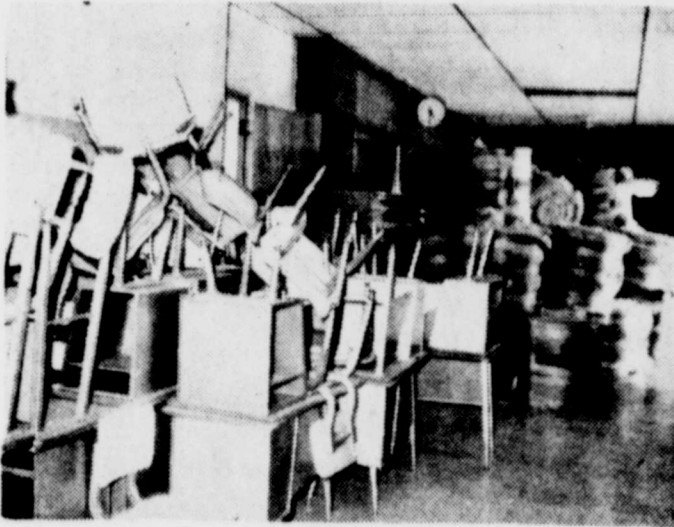

## School Buildings Facelift Almost Complete

Abernathy maintenance chief Carroll Bradley headed a summer long facelift operation on school buildings. It's nearly over and, though the intermediate building looked a mess when Bradley was interviewed Tuesday, will be ready for the kids the first day of school.

## City Determined To Collect Delinquent Taxes; Sets Tax Rate At 75¢ Per \$100

The chairman of the city's board of equalization recommended to Abernathy City Council last week that the city initiate proceedings to collect delinquent taxes. Jim Bob Smith said the board discovered people are in arrears for about \$20,000 per seat for the five regular season home games.

The city's tax assessor, bond advisor, and other professionals in city finance have mentioned Abernathy's poor tax collection practices before and consider the high percent of non payment something the city can ill afford. Cities can seize and sell property to collect unpaid taxes.

Smith explained that the board's job is to equalize taxes but if the city does not insist that everyone pay their share, the taxation isn't equal at all. The council agreed that they do not favor letting tax bills stack up. It only gets harder to pay as the bill increases and it's not fair to those who pay their taxes to be lenient with those who don't.

The board of equalization consulted the city's tax assessor who informed them about companies who specialize in collecting delinquent taxes for a percent (perhaps 15%) of the amount. They work as hard at collecting the small amounts as the large ones so it's fair to all.

The council voted to ask the city secretary to ask for details on these companies for next meeting.

Only one citizen showed up for the public hearing on the new city tax rate at the Monday, August 13 city council meeting. The council voted to tax on 100% valuation instead of the previous 60% because it is so much easier to figure, because a law passed by the Texas legislature requires everyone to use the 100% valuation by 1981 anyway, and because Abernathy tax evaluation badly needs reworking. They also decided to set taxes at 75¢ per \$100 valuation rather than the previous 95¢ per \$100.

They figured that, in order to take care of the budget, the city must have a 15% increase in taxes to take care of the community meeting room and library projects and 10% more because of the inflation factor. The 15% increase was included in explanations of the city's construction projects before the bond election.

Mayor Pete Thompson pointed out that the city's share of federal revenue sharing funds is amounting to less and less lately and mentioned the possible effects of a law suit brought by U. S. Steel to contest the constitutionality of city sales taxes. City Secretary Otella Clement reported there's very little money left out of last year's budget which was tight with even no employee salary increases. There's also been unexpected water and sewer line installation expense.

The council voted to join the Hale County tax appraisal district. Since part of Abernathy is in Hale County and part in Lubbock County, both the city and school district had the option of joining either or both. The school board voted to join the Hale County district, too. The councilmen discussed the new appraisal with Mr. Clement who attended a seminar on the new system. The City of Abernathy and Abernathy Independent School District will carry more weight in the Hale County district and hope to get a representative on the tax district's board of directors.

**ELECTRICAL PLANS**  
 There was considerable confusion about a proposed change in electrical work plans for the new construction at City Hall. Architect Arnold Macker and his electrical engineer, John

Jennings, came to present their recommendations. Southwestern Public Service Manager Bill Scott, Fire Chief Jim Bob Smith, and local journeyman electrician and contractor James Conn were also present.

It seems that fire department volunteers worked out an electrical setup they considered better and cheaper than original plans for their end of the service during construction of the new meeting room and library renovation. However, the building contractor said it will cost \$1800 more than the original plan. Macker and Jennings felt they could not recommend the expenditure. They weren't keen on the proposed change anyway and wanted a statement from the council saying they are not responsible for it.

After lots of technical discussion, Macker, Jennings, Scott, and Conn went elsewhere to confer. They came back later with a better understanding of each other's position and recommended the contractor go ahead with the original plan at the original estimate. The fire department, though, wants to keep for possible future use certain electrical equipment that must be removed for the construction.

**CARBIDE PIT**  
 The city had asked Ace Welding to find some method other than the present open pit to dispose of byproducts from its operation. The city considers the pit a danger for which it, as well as Ace Welding, is responsible should somebody fall in.

Owner A. C. Harris, Jr. attended the meeting to explain why he has to use that pit and that nobody he knows of uses any other method, though he is checking to see if there are any. He assured the council there is no ecological problem but the city is concerned about safety.

The council agreed to let him keep using the pit if he puts a fence around it. He said it would be done immediately.

**TRASH COMPLAINT**  
 Ed Crow came to object to the city trash rates for businesses which he thinks are exorbitant. He checked on rates in Seymour and Burk Burnett which handle their own trash at cheaper rates than here. He insisted that the City of Abernathy could do the same.

Mayor Thompson asked if the rates those towns pay for the trash service or if it is subsidized with tax money. He pointed out that if taxes are used to help pay the cost, some other area of city operation must be shorted or taxes raised to cover the expense.

Many people get trash service who do not own property. Therefore, if taxes are used to subsidize the service, taxpayers pay and others get a free ride. If the service pays for itself, everyone pays their share.

Crow had not asked about a subsidy in those towns but was certain the city could run its own operation at less cost since the present trash contractor must make a profit. Councilmen mentioned several sources which were amazed that the contractor handled Abernathy's trash so long at former rates. The mayor also mentioned the sizeable investment in equipment should the city handle its own trash and that, at current pay scales, he doesn't think the city would come out cheaper to hire an employee to handle the trash operation.

Crow still said the council should survey trash rates in other areas and the council agreed, though they asked every applicant for the city manager position for ideas on a fairer solution. None could offer any. If businesses are charged less, residential rates must be raised.

Crow thought there must be some way to charge according to use and said the council "better make

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, nearly 300 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-fifth annual Boys Ranch Rodeo, a traditional Labor Day weekend event.

In anticipation of record-setting crowds for the two performances on September 2 and 3, the Ranch rodeo arena has enlarged general admission sections that will accommodate an extra 1,500 people. Most sections of the arena have been covered to provide for the comfort of the rodeo guests. Another added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$2.00.

About 150 boys will be contestants in the rodeo. They will compete in bareback bronc riding, and also be trying for the best time on Brahma bulls, steers, calves and stick horses. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation, as the only contestants are boys riding professional rodeo stock under R.C.A. rules. The rodeo is also a reunion for the approximately 3,000 boys who have lived at the Ranch since 1939.

Using the amount of city sales taxes as an indicator, 1979 business in Abernathy is better than during the first seven months in 1978.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's report for the period ending July 26, 1979, shows that Abernathy received \$2,839.35 for July. This figure compares with \$2,770.82 in city sales taxes received in July, 1978.

Monthly payments to July 26, 1979, total \$26,220.89, compared to \$23,884.55 for the first seven months of 1978. This represents an increase of 9% in sales tax received in 1979 over last year through July.

**HALE COUNTY OIL and GAS PRODUCTION**

THE SALE OF CRUDE OIL AND NATURAL GAS from Lubbock County wells in 1978 boosted the county economy and accounted for \$10-million of the \$17.1-billion value placed on Texas production last year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the top producing counties of Texas, the Dallas-based Association said the county ranked 148th among the 202 counties having marketed production valued at \$100,000 or more, not including the sale of natural gas liquids.

The county's wells produced 1.1-million barrels of crude oil valued at \$9.9 million, and 147,000 Mcfs of natural gas, valued at \$148,000. Owners of royalty in the county received \$1.3-million as their share of the output, the Association said.

"Considering the short-

fall in total U.S. petroleum production relative to our nation's energy needs, production from every Texas county is more vitally important today than ever before," said the Association's president, H. B. (Hank) Hardkins of Alice, an independent producer and drilling contractor.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$465,000, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$454,000, while natural gas levies totalled \$11,000, based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 787 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$7.3-million in 1978.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas operators spent a reported \$7.2-million in the drilling of 38 wells, including 12 wildcat,



GSPA Asks For Extension Of Set-Aside Program

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has officially requested that the U.S. Department of Agriculture extend the set-aside program for 1980 on feed grains. In a letter dated August 17 to Secretary Bergland, GSPA Executive Elbert Harp stated, "there is absolutely no justification for consideration of discontinuing the set-aside programs as provided in the Agricultural Act of 1977."

GSPA contends that the U.S. feed grain supplies are still in surplus and the current stocks of all grains, plus the bumper crop which is the forecast for 1979, point

to excessive stocks for the 1979-80 marketing year. These surplus stocks continue to suppress the grain prices far below the cost of production and removal of the set-aside program in feed grain would further depress the grain prices in 1980, according to Harp.

Ag Station Field Day Set Sept. 11

LUBBOCK--During the 70th Annual Field Day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES), weed research will be one of the highlights of interest to area farmers.

The Field Day is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 11 at 1 p.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, three miles north of Lubbock International Airport on F. M. 1294. (Southeast of New Deal.)

Due to the high amount of rainfall and the late cotton crop this season, there has been a great deal of interest in weed control and the new application equipment, according to TAES weed scientists Dr. John R. Abernathy, Wayne Keeling, and Jess Davis. These weed scientists will be presenting the latest data on weed control on the Texas High Plains.

"We are also going to take a good look at the new types of herbicide applications equipment," Abernathy said. Included in the Weed Control presentation will be the different types of row-wick applicators and spot spraying equipment.

The Weed Control stop on the field tour will also present information on the perennial weeds such as Texas blueweed, lakewood, nutedge, whiteweed, and johnsongrass.

Additional stops on the Field Day tour will include soil fertility, cotton breeding, water use efficiency, and grain sorghum breeding. Grape vineyard tours and soybean research will be among the added attractions this year.

The annual Field Day is a cooperative presentation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, High Plains Research Foundation, USDA-Science and Education Administration, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the National Service Agricultural Meteorology Office. Professional staffs of these organizations, state and federal agencies will be on hand during the Field Day to answer questions and discuss topics of interest with farmers, home owners and gardeners.

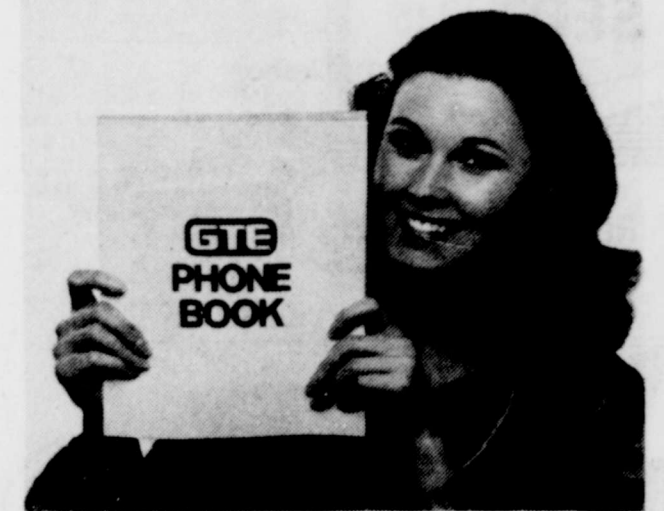
## Nazarene Society Has Meeting Here

## Immunization Requirements In Texas Elementary And Secondary Schools

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs: Three doses of oral polio vaccine. Three doses of DTP vaccine. One dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine.

(b) Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade five: At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4. At least three doses of DTP but one dose must have been received after age 4. All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness. One dose of rubella is required. Mumps vaccine for all students through seven years of age.

(c) Students in grade six through twelve: All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4. All students must have received at least three doses of DTP with at least one dose having been received after age 4.

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age, and all students enrolled in the sixth grade, will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness. On September the first of each year Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday.)

Students enrolling in school for the first time should bring medical certification verifying that they have received the required immunizations.
