#### Governor Sets "Back To School Safety Week"

(AUSTIN) Calling children our greatest natural resource, Governor Clements has asked all drivers to become" especially aware of the need for increased safety and vigila ce, particularly around our school zones.

Clemetns proclaimed Back to School Safety Week, from August 25 through Sept. 1, to call attention to this need for added caution during the start of school." Clements cited the nearly 4,000 traffic deaths in Texas last year and the 389 children killed because of traffic accidents in setting aside this week for particular driver awareness.

Increased traffic safety awareness and careful driving can help preserve the lives of our children and save them from harm, "said Clements.

#### Immunization Requirements In Texas Elementary And Secondary Schools

Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs: Three doses of oral polio vaccine. Three doses of DTP vaccine. One dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine. (b) Children enrolled in

kindergarten through grade five: At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4. At lease three doses of DTP but one dose must have been received after age 4. All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness. One dose of rubella is required. Mumps vaccine for all students through seven years of age.

(c) Students in grade six through twelve: All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4. All students must have received at least three doses of DTP with at least one dose having been received after age

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age, and all students enrolled in the sixth grade, will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness.On September the first of each year thereafter, students one year older or one grade higher must meet these requirements.

Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday.)

Students enrolling in school for the first time should bring medical certification verifying that they have received the required immunizations.

#### Basketball Parents Continue To Press Case At Long, Long School Board Meet

(By Jacquelyn Smyers)

About 20 people attended Abernathy School Board's special meeting and budget hearing on August 20. None stayed for the budget hearing, however, and most came to press their case for continued participation of the varsity girls basket-ball coach in the junior high basketball program.

Gale Davis restated the parents' insistence that the arranment is necessary to a successful athletic program. She read parts of letters from coaches all over the state stressing the importance of varsity supervision in junior high and quoted a speech by then basketball coach Mitch LeMoine on the

same subject. AHS Principal LeMoine stood by his comments in the speech but explained the necessity for the high school teachers' schedule and why classes are arranged in present order. He explained why hiring a teacher, if one could be found, to take Coach Lewis' classes would not be fair to other teachers who have the same responsibilities and some who have a heavier load. School superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb discussed the administration's (and other schools') difficulties in completing the faculty for

School board members repeatedly said they have to consider the whole curriculum and that special considerations in one area would prove unfair to others. They tried to assure parents they would consider the matter in light of the whole curriculum and activities schedule but differed among themselves

on whether the matter could or should be decided that night. Board president Billie Harrison read portions of an athletic policy unanimously recommended by AHS coaches and adopted by the board in 1978. It acknowledged the idea that coaches are teachers first and coaches second and their willingness to accept teaching assignments. He also quoted AJHS principal Frank Bartlett's statement from last meeting that in

junior high the emphasis is on participation.

Board member David Pinson was puzzled about the seeming animosity from the parents and asked if some "coffee shop" rumor" were behind it.

Parents held firm in wanting a teacher hired to take Lewis' Parents held firm in wanting a teacher fired to take Lewis academic classes; administrators insisted that would be unfair to other faculty members and programs. Their thinking ran more in the line of hiring an aide to help the junior high girls coach with chores at school and on trips. Her husband accompanies her to out of town games or she and the team would have to travel alone. Parents expressed satisfaction with her case him and leadarship. th her coaching and leadership.

Board president Harrison finally called for an end to the dis-cussion at 10:30 and board members decided to carry it into an executive session already scheduled for the evening. They adjourned to the board room and most of the visitors stayed-even after the Review reporter left at 12:30 a.m. -- to see what

decision would come out of the session. Later that morning the board agreed upon and presented a statement that they will leave the schedule as is for now but, recognizing the concern for improving the junior high athletic program, will try to make definite improvement as soon as possible. They asked the parents to recognize all the problems involved and asked for their patience and cooperation in reaching that accomplishment. They also agreed to ask the three head coaches to the next board meeting September 4th to consider their ideas concerning junior high athletics.





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#### D. O. E. Awards Solar Energy Grant To SPC

Berl Springer, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the Department of Energy (DOE) has awarded a grant of approximately \$500 thousand to the General Electric Company and Southwestern Public Service Company to study the feas-ibility of repowering one of Southwestern's generating units with a solar system.

This would be one of the largest solar projects in the United States, "Springer said. "The grant will fund an engineering study for repowering our No.3 generating unit at Plant X, near Earth, Texas.

The proposed solar system would utilize a liquid metal-cooled central receiver to repower the 100,000 kilowatt gas-fired unit at Plant X and would be designed to supply 60% of the thermal energy required for the full output of the generating unit.

The solar portion of the system consists of a surround field of glass, unenclosed heliostats reflecting the solar insolation to a towermounted cylindrical receiver. The receiver is cooled by liquid sodium with the flow rate through each receiver panel controlled by individual electromagnetic pumps, so that a constant outlet temperature can be

maintained. The impact on the existing plant is limited to piping tie-ins and controls nodifications. Minimu intrusion into existing plant operating requirements and capabilities have been a najor design objective of GE and SPS

The overall concept of the solar system represents a highly flexible system that would allow the Plant X unit to operate on solar and gas at the same time or on gas or solar alone. The concept is based on the General Electric Alternate Central Receiver Program solar plant design and will benefit from its past and future engineering experience.

It is expected that contracts for the feasibility study will be signed about September 1 and the project completed in approximately 12 months.

We at SPS are very excited at the prospects of working with General Electric on this project and we feel that this could very well be the breakthrough we have been waiting for as an alternate source of energy, Springer concluded. ...........

#### OIL and GAS

OIL AND NATURAL GAS from Lubbock County wells in 1978 boosted the county economy and accounted for 10-million of the \$17.1billion value placed on Texas production last year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assoc-

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in of Texas, the Dallas-based Association said the county ranked 148th among the 202 counties having marketed production valued at 100,000 or more, including the sale of natural gas liquids.

The county's wells produced 1, 1-million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$9.9million, and 147,000 Mcfs of natural gas, valued at \$148,000.Owners of royalty in the county received \$1.3-million as their share of the output, the Association said.

"Considering the short-fall in total U.S.petroleum production relative to our nation's energy needs, production from every Texas county is more vitally important today than ever before," said the Association's president, H. B. (Hank) Hardkins of Alice, an independent producer and drilling contractor.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$465,000, according to the Association Crude oil taxes amounted to \$454,000, while natural gas levies totalled \$11,000.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 787 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$7.3-million in 1978. In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas operators


spent a reported \$7.2million in the drilling of 38 wells, including 12 wildcat, or exploratory wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 26 oil wells, although some \$2.4-million was lost in the drilling of 12 dry holes
