A committee of concerned parents has been working to implement a stronger athletic program into our school system. Please be present to lend your support for the young people of Abernathy.

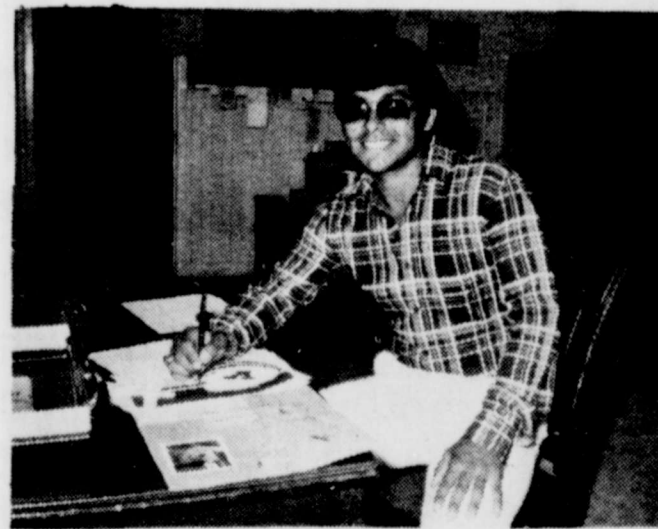

Basketball Parents Continue To Press Case At Long, Long School Board Meet

About 20 people attended Abernathy School Board's special meeting and budget hearing on August 20. None stayed for the budget hearing, however, and most came to press their case for continued participation of the varsity girls basketball coach in the junior high basketball program. Gale Davis restated the parents' insistence that the arrangement is necessary to a successful athletic program. She read parts of letters from coaches all over the state stressing the importance of varsity supervision in junior high and quoted a speech by then basketball coach Mitch LeMoine on the same subject.

AHS Principal LeMoine stood by his comments in the speech but explained the necessity for the high school teachers' schedule and why classes are arranged in present order. He explained why hiring a teacher, if one could be found, to take Coach Lewis' classes would not be fair to other teachers who have the same responsibilities and some who have a heavier load. School superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb discussed the administration's (and other schools') difficulties in completing the faculty for this fall.

School board members repeatedly said they have to consider the whole curriculum and that special considerations in one area would prove unfair to others. They tried to assure parents they would consider the matter in light of the whole curriculum and activities schedule but differed among themselves on whether the matter could or should be decided that night.

Board president Billie Harrison read portions of an athletic policy unanimously recommended by AHS coaches and adopted by the board in 1978. It acknowledged the idea that coaches are teachers first and coaches second and their willingness to accept teaching assignments. He also quoted AJHS principal Frank Bartlett's statement from last meeting that in junior high the emphasis is on participation.

Board member David Pinson was puzzled about the seeming animosity from the parents and asked if some "coffee shop rumor" were behind it.

Parents held firm in wanting a teacher hired to take Lewis' academic classes; administrators insisted that would be unfair to other faculty members and programs. Their thinking ran more in the line of hiring an aide to help the junior high girls coach with chores at school and on trips. Her husband accompanies her to out of town games or she and the team would have to travel alone. Parents expressed satisfaction with her coaching and leadership.

Board president Harrison finally called for an end to the discussion at 10:30 and board members decided to carry it into an executive session already scheduled for the evening. They adjourned to the board room and most of the visitors stayed--even after the Review reporter left at 12:30 a.m.--to see what decision would come out of the session.

Later that morning, the board agreed upon and presented a statement that they will leave the schedule as is for now but, recognizing the concern for improving the junior high athletic program, will try to make definite improvement as soon as possible. They asked the parents to recognize all the problems involved and asked for their patience and cooperation in reaching that accomplishment. They also agreed to ask the three head coaches to the next board meeting September 4th to consider their ideas concerning junior high athletics.

BUDGET HEARING
All the visitors left and the board held the public hearing -- with no public present -- on the proposed budget for the coming year -- \$2,995,708 worth.

WRITER'S NOTE: Now that's an important matter but the public doesn't seem interested enough to make a reporter lose a night's sleep. However, it's also quite unrealistic to expect people to attend public hearings in the wee hours of the morning, if time allows, we'll ask Dr. Webb to point out budget highlights in a future issue of the Weekly Review.

BIDS
The board opened school depository bids from First State Bank of Abernathy and City National Bank of Plainview and accepted the first. Gasoline bids from Phillips 66 for 8 1/2¢ and from Consumers Co-op for 78.7¢ were also opened and the latter accepted.

BOND ISSUE
The board voted to table a proposed bond issue until a later date.

PREVIOUS MEETING
The August 6 school board meeting also lasted too long to cover completely so school business manager Earl Carter reviewed the missed action later at a fairly decent hour.

PERSONNEL
The board accepted the resignations of Rosemary Gonzalez, Tresea Beasley and Jerry Beasley and accepted for employment David Booth, high school agriculture; Elaine Gann, pre-kindergarten; Diana Ridenour, Pat Wood, and Ann Hannel for junior high.

BIDS
The board accepted bids for milk from Borden's, for insurance on school operated vehicles from Richard DuBose Insurance, for student insurance from Heritage Insurance Writers, for liability insurance for AISD trustees and employees from Texas Association of School Boards.

Hubbard Insurance and Bell Dairy Products also submitted bids. No gasoline bids were received because the companies had no allocations at the time. The board reviewed revised specifications for a public address system and called for bids to be opened at the September board meeting.

The board also:
APPROVED handbook changes requested by the high school and junior high school principals.

SELECTED Billie Harrison to represent the board at the TASB delegate assembly in San Antonio in September.

VOTED to participate in the Hale County tax appraisal district.

SET the next school board meeting for 8 PM, Tuesday after Labor Day.

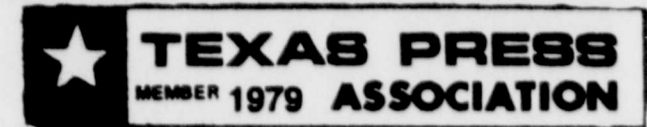
Grandson To Return From Germany Sunday

Rites Held For B. E. Attebury

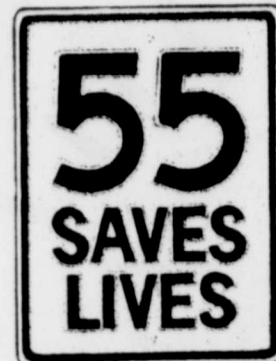

CONFERENCE TO LOOK AT FLIGHT OF RURAL CHURCHES

COLLEGE STATION-- Rural churches remain a stronghold. "something to cling to," for many rural Texans, but forces of change are at work that are affecting both rural communities and their churches.

Discussions on the nature and extent of these changes will highlight the 34th annual Town and Country Church Conference at Rudder Center, Texas A&M University, Oct. 4-5. Conference theme will be "New Towns in Old Communities: The Conversion of Rural Texas."

Church and community leaders are groping for new meaning and direction, and this conference will focus on the latest issues affecting church and community life," points out Dr. Dave Ruesink, sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and conference chairman. The Extension Service is sponsoring the annual conference along with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

A highlight of the conference will be the presentation of the Texas Rural Minister of the Year Award by the Progressive Farmer magazine during the final session.

Along with a host of speakers who will address the issue of rural change, the conference will acquaint participants with the many resources available to local communities through Texas A&M University, notes Ruesink.

Headlining the list of speakers will be Calvin Beale, a demographer with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, who will discuss national population trends in rural areas. Then Dr. Bob Skrabanek, Texas A&M demographer, will bring the issue closer to home by discussing population changes in rural Texas.

Other speakers the first day will include Lonnie Jones, State Property Tax Practices Board, Austin, and Steve Murdock, Texas A&M rural sociologist, who will talk about "The Consequences of Sudden, Massive Change" on rural communities. Also Jim Benson, Texas A&M transportation specialist, will discuss "Impacts of the Gasoline Shortage in Rural Areas."
