

TAKE ON OLTON MUSTANGS FRIDAY NIGHT

Antelopes Battle Buffaloes To 6 - 6 Tie In Defensive War

The 1979 version of the Abernathy Antelopes battled the Class A state-ranked Petersburg Buffaloes to a 6-6 season opener last Friday night at Petersburg.

The Lopes of Coach Larry Aldridge and the Buffs fought throughout most of the first half primarily between the 30 yard lines, each team testing the other. It wasn't until late in the second quarter that the Lopes hard charging defense caused an interception which senior Roger Mitchell ran under and carried to the Buffs 12 yard line. Four plays later, with second and goal at the 1, the Lopes fumbled into the end zone and Petersburg recovered. That was the only threat by either team in first half.

The second half started off similar to the first, but late in the third quarter the Buffs, who had been kept deep in their own territory by excellent Antelope punting, began an 83-yard drive which the Lopes' defense stopped on downs early in the fourth quarter at the Lopes' 12 yard line. However, after an exchange of fumbles, the Lopes fumbled again and the Buffs recovered and set up camp on the Antelopes 19. It took six plays against the strong Antelope defenders for the Buffs to score, with David Juarez going the final 2 yards for the TD. Quarterback Todd Shurber's extra

point attempt was wide, and the Buffs led 6-0.

The Lopes began an earnest drive following the ensuing kickoff, but bogged down by the aid of a 15-yard penalty, and punted to the Buffaloes 15. The Lopes defense again stiffened and forced the Buffs to punt, the ball going out of bounds on at the Abernathy 12. With just 1:09 left on the clock, the Lopes went into the "shotgun" formation, and senior quarterback Tony Heath rifled four consecutive pass completions, two each to Dean McGuire and Willie Bets, placing the ball on the Buffs 1 1/2 yard line with just 16 seconds left. Two incomplete pass attempts ate up 9 seconds, then Heath faked a handoff through the line, and tossed a perfect strike to flanker Scott Morrison who had drifted into the end zone. With the score tied at 6-6, kicker Willie Bets, who had kicked beautifully in workouts during the week, put his toe to the ball, but it sailed just to the right of the uprights and the score remained 6-6.

For the night, the Lopes had 11 first downs to Petersburg 12, and rushed for 83 yards while the Buffs had 176 on the ground. The Lopes hit on 8 of 14 passes for 91 yards, while holding the Buffs to 3 of 9 for only 17 yards, giving the Buffs a slight total yardage edge, 193 to 174.

Mrs. Delwin Webb Victim of Brutal Beating Monday

Barbara Webb, Abernathy High School faculty member and wife of school superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb, suffered a vicious beating from an unknown assailant Monday night and was admitted to the intensive care unit of Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. She was moved to a private room later Tuesday.

Law enforcement officers were working as hard and fast as possible to find her assailant, so none could be reached for official information. They were questioning a suspect Tuesday afternoon.

According to available sources, Mrs. Webb was abducted by a young man in her own car when she went to turn off the school tennis court lights after attending an evening meeting. He took her out into the country, beat her with a shovel and, leaving her there, drove away in her car.

In spite of severe injuries, Mrs. Webb managed to walk back to Abernathy to the home of close friends. Dr. Webb had notified police and was searching for her. She was taken to the hospital by private vehicle.

Abernathy Lions Club members, thoroughly upset over Barbara Webb's Monday night ordeal, took the first steps Tuesday to set up a local Crime Line program similar to the one used successfully in Lubbock to aid law enforcement agencies. Immediately after the weekly Lions Club noon meeting Tuesday, they opened an account at First State Bank and deposited funds collected at the meeting to be used in the crime solving program.

The men, already shocked by Mrs. Webb's ordeal, responded to a moving presentation at their meeting by Frank McGlaun, chairman of the Crime Committee of Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and the Crime Committee of Lubbock County. The program previously scheduled, was by coincidence most relevant to community feelings on Tuesday.

McGlaun said he thoroughly believes in and devotes his time to two things--serving the Lord and this crime prevention program. He described his crime committee work with the FBI, Narcotics Bureau, Department of Public Safety, District Attorney's office, Texas Rangers, and other law enforcement agencies. The Abernathy men already had the program in mind and after hearing McGlaun, determined to aid local police in a crime solving and crime prevention program of their own.

NK Crop Demonstration Set For Sept. 18

Northrup King, a firm that breeds and distributes many kinds of field and garden crop seeds, and local dealers for Northrup King planting seed will host an NK Crop Demonstration Center, and a free lunch, Tuesday, Sept. 18. The demonstration plot is located five miles south of Hale Center and about ten miles north of Abernathy on US 87 (in the vicinity of Cone Elevator). The demonstration will start at 10:30 a. m. and the lunch will be served by a catering firm at 12 o'clock noon. All farmers are urged to attend and inspect the NK demonstration plot.

Dealers hosting the event include Harold W. Thomas and Bob Rogers of Abernathy. One of the NK representatives co-hosting the demonstration will be Billy Beard of Abernathy, an NK Territory Manager for 12 area counties. One of NK's office/storage/distributing point complexes is located at New Deal.

Also, Mr. Ed Lutrick sent word to us that we could have his collection of old copies of The Review.

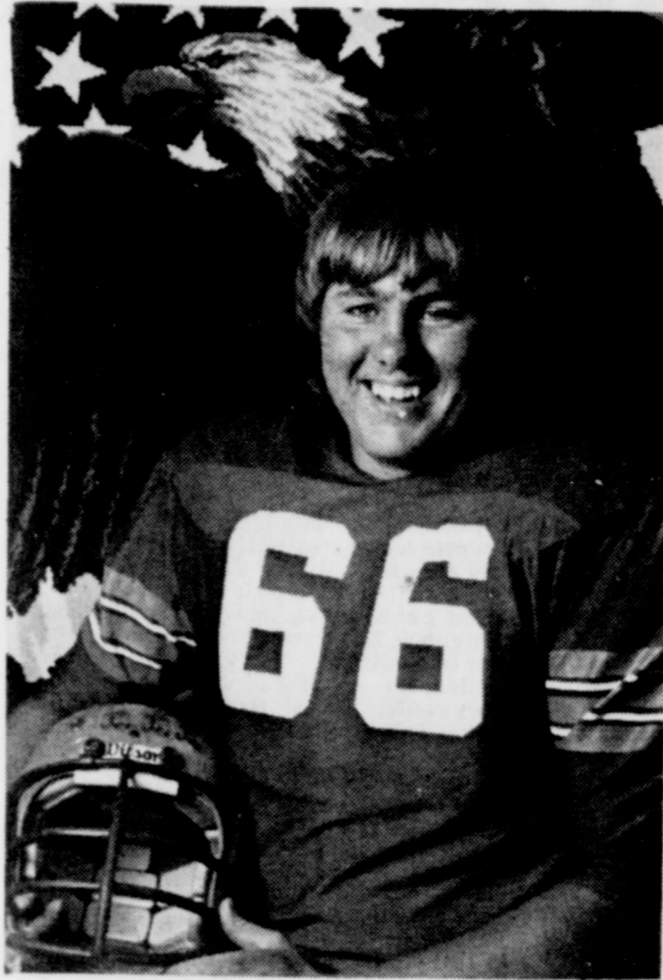

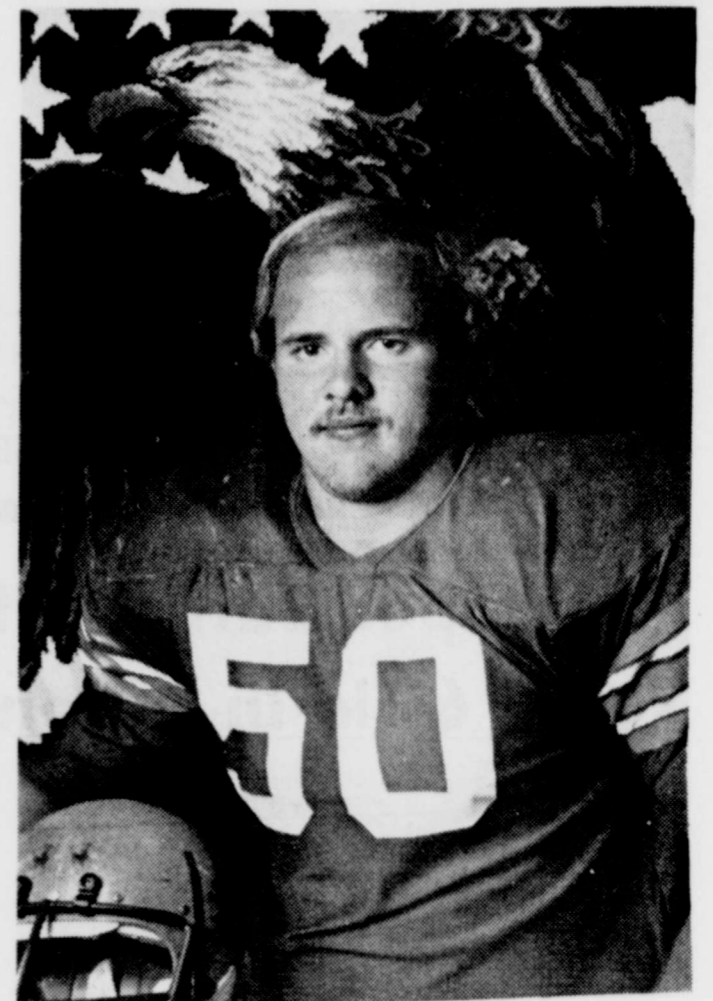

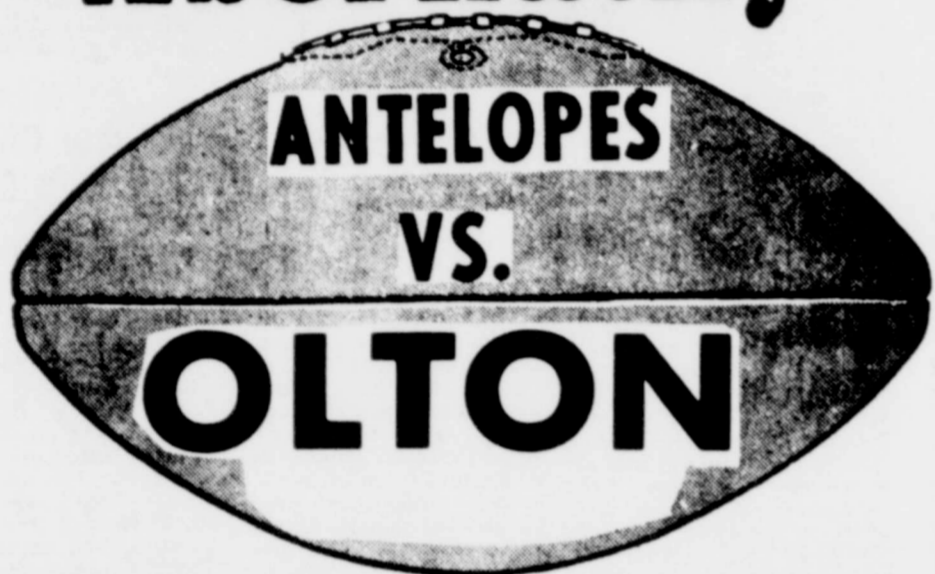

**PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT
(H.J.R. 108)**

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

(H.J.R. 133)**

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
 - To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
 - To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
 - To prescribe procedures; and
 - To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.
- The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 13)**

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

Cystic Fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children and approximately 40% of persons suffering from C/F are not yet diagnosed.

According to Mrs. Settle, contributions to the Kiss A Baby Campaign will help support a national network of over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers, research projects around the world and various educational programs.

Cystic Fibrosis Centers, most located at teaching hospitals affiliated with leading medical schools and universities, provide diagnosis, treatment, and referral to children suffering from cystic fibrosis, asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, childhood emphy-

sema and recurrent pneumonia.

Hospitals dealing with gastrointestinal disorders related to C/F are located in Dallas, Houston and San Antonio.

"Through research we hope to find a cure and control for cystic fibrosis," said Mrs. Settle. "Another goal of the research program is developing better methods of treating children with all lung-damaging diseases."

"Most of the funds that are raised in the Kiss A Baby Campaign go to these very important national programs," she said. "But, almost 50 percent of the money stays in this Chapter area to support services for local children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases."

Cystic Fibrosis affects one out of every 1,500 infants born each year. Although incurable, cystic fibrosis can be effectively treated.

Since the C/F Foundation was established in 1955, remarkable progress has occurred in treating children with cystic fibrosis," the campaign chairman commented. "At that time, most children with this disease died early in life. Today, more than 50 percent of the children with cystic fibrosis live past their 19th birthday, and that is a beautiful 20th anniversary gift of life."
