## GENE D. McDONALD IS A SEMI-FINALIST IN NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP EVENT

The names of some 15,000 of the nation's most intellectually able students who qualified as Semifinalists in the 1980 Merit Program were released today by National Merit Scholarship Corporation of Evanston, Illinois. Semifinalists who advance to Finalist standing in the competition will be considered for approximately 4,300 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 1980.

Gene D. McDonald, a Senior student in Abernathy High School, is in the list of semi-finalists. He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Glenn D. McDonald, 501 Ave. D, Abernathy.

Over 1.1 million students enrolled in about 18,000 high schools entered the 1980 Merit Program by taking the 1978 qualifying tests, the PSAT/NMSQT. Semifinalists are the highest scorers in each state, named from the top half of one percent of the state's senior class in numbers proportional to that state's percentage of the nation's graduating seniors. In order to increase the educational opportunities of Semifinalists, most of whom will complete high school and enter college in 1980, they also are identified to regionally accredited U.S. colleges and universities.

To be considered for Merit Scholarships, Semifinalists must qualify as Finalists by meeting further requirements--being fully endorsed and recommended for scholarships by their secondary school principals, submitting records that confirm high academic standing, and substantiating their high qualifying test scores with equivalent scores on another test. Over 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to qualify as Finalists next February, and each will receive a CERTIFICATE OF MERIT attesting to distinguished performance. All Merit Scholars will be chosen from this highly able group of Finalists and announced in April and May.

The 1,000 National Merit \$1000 Scholarships that are allocated on a state representational basis are supported by grants from business and industrial organizations. In selecting the winners, a Selection Committee of professionals in admission and counseling in the nation's colleges and high schools considers every Finalist. The Committee is convened specifically to choose each state's winners of National Merit \$1000 Scholarships on the basis of the Finalists' academic records, extra-curricular accomplishments, test scores, and leadership qualities.

Finalists who meet preferential criteria designated by Merit Program sponsors for about 3,300 four-year Merit Scholarships will be considered for these awards, also. Some 1,500 of four-year Merit Scholarships to

## I-27 Bids To Be Taken For Work In Hale Center Area

AUSTIN--Bids will be received in September by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation for the construction of a section of Interstate Highway 27 in Hale County.

Lubbock District Engineer George Wall said the project will provide an upgraded highway facility in the Hale Center area. The work will extend from approximately 1.0 mile south of Farm to Market Road 37 to north of Hale Center, a distance of 8.2 miles.

The existing four-lane divided highway will be upgraded to four and six lanes and deficient overpass structures will be replaced. The work also will provide for control of access with the construction of frontage roads and interchanges.

Jack N. Moore of Lubbock will be the department's engineer in direct charge of the work.

## 18-Year-Old Man Under \$100,000 Bond In Webb Case

This is a follow-up story from last week on the brutal attempt on Mrs. Delwin Webb's life. We appreciate Chief of Police Clyde Vandygriff and Deputy Sheriff Dayton Marr coming by The Review Thursday to give us this report.

On Tuesday, September 11 at eight minutes after 12 noon Chief of Police Clyde Vandygriff and Deputy Sheriff Dayton Marr received a call to go to a house at 412 5th Street where they found a man that had taken a cupful of poison. The EMS ambulance crew had also been called to the house. Seeing that the man had taken poison, Deputy Marr went to the bathroom to search for a bottle of something that might have poison in it. While in the bathroom Marr saw a wet white t-shirt with the number 19 on it. Mrs. Webb had told them that the abductor had on a white shirt at the time he abducted her. They then checked his tennis shoes and they matched the tracks at the place where he had taken Mrs. Webb and beat her.

The man was taken by ambulance to Health Sciences Center Hospital in Lubbock for treatment and was admitted to the hospital.

That afternoon Vandygriff, Marr and Abernathy police patrolman Joe Zuniga and Wacey Scott of Plainview went to the hospital to talk to 18 year old Joe Valderas, they read him his rights. Valderas gave the officers a full statement of what had taken place on Monday evening.

Thursday morning, Valderas was taken before Judge Charles Smith in Lubbock for arraignment. Bond was set for \$100,000, before being taken to Plainview where Valderas was arraigned before Judge Glenn Stone and bond was set for \$100,000.

## AHS ANTELOPE BAND TO MARCH IN FAIR PARADE MONDAY

LUBBOCK--Approximately four dozen bands from throughout West Texas and eastern New Mexico are expected to compete in the "parade of bands" to be conducted in conjunction with the 62nd annual Panhandle South Plains Fair here Sept. 22-29.

The big parade is scheduled to get underway in downtown Lubbock at 10 a.m. on Sept. 24.

Director George Riddell's AHS Antelope Band will march in the parade. A total of \$2,250 in cash prizes is being offered in Classes B, A, AA, AAA and AAAA. Premiums include \$150 for first place, \$125 for second, \$100 for third and \$75 for fourth in all five classifications.

The "outstanding band" of the parade will be awarded a traveling trophy. The traveling trophy will be permanently awarded to the school winning it three out of five years. Judges will be Charles Taylor of Abilene Christian University, Harris Brinson of Angelo State University and Dan Gibbs of Monahans.

The panel will judge the bands on playing (50 percent), marching (30 percent) and appearance (20 percent).

## N. D. Lions Win Homecoming Game

NEW DEAL (Special)--Sweet Deal's Lions took a New Homecoming Victory here Friday night, stopping the Plains Cowboys, 13-0, on the strength of quarterback Keith Venable's TD passing and halfback Tony Howell's bruising ground attack.

Venable launched his first TD pass from the 5-yard line after New Deal had recovered a fumble at the Plains 32 yard line. Split end Russell Nichols took it in for the TD, and Jim McIntire, offensive tackle, booted the PAT, for a 7-0 second quarter lead.

In the fourth quarter, Venable fired a strike to Howell for a 35-yard TD play, and, although the PAT was blocked, the 13 points stood up for the win.

Howell picked up 133 yards on 23 carries for the winners, in addition to his 35-yard TD pass reception. Billy Thiel added another 78 yards on 14 tries for New Deal.

## ANTELOPES BLANK OLTON 20-0 IN RAIN

The AHS Antelopes opened the home season here last Friday night, hosting the always-tough Olton Mustangs on a rain-slick turf, then sending the visitors home on the short end of a 20-0 score.

The Lopes again looked extra good on defense, and provided enough offensive punch at crucial times to push over three TDs, including a 60-yard pass-run play from quarterback Tony Heath to ever-alert end Dean McGuire. The other two TDs came on 2-yard runs by hard-charging Kenneth Sanders and injured Roger Lindsey, capping drives of 33 and 66 yards, respectively. And Willie Betts kicked two of 3 PATs.

The Lopes defense forced the Mustangs to punt four times, stopped them on downs 5 times, (on the Antelopes' 8, 11, 34, 36 and 25 yard lines), once on the Antelope 26 with a fumble recovery and killed a drive on the Abernathy 37 with a pass interception by Scott Morrison.

With a rain falling throughout most of the first half and intermittently in the second half, the ball was bobbed on numerous occasions, but each team

lost the ball only once on fumbles. The Lopes rushed for 218 yards on the ground and completed 4 of 12 passes for 89 yards, but their running was to no avail as the Lopes held them scoreless. The Lopes, playing without the services of runningback Sylvester Dunn and with Lindsey seeing only limited action late in the game, picked up 134 yards on the ground and 83 through the air. Heath and McGuire teamed up on two occasions, once for the 60-yard TD toss, and the other a 23 yard completion to keep the second TD drive alive. Antelope halfback Ken Sanders carried 21 times for 96 yards and 1 TD.

Joey Garcia punted four times for a 35 yard average and got off one for 52 yards. He also threw a key block allowing McGuire to sail into the end zone for the first TD. Heath also got into the kicking game, getting off two quick kicks for 25 and 44 yards.

The Lopes started the game by kicking off to the visitors, then after allowing them a couple of first downs, forced them to punt. The Lopes took over on their own 37. Heath carried

the 40 on a busted play, then on second down dropped a bomb to McGuire for the initial score. Betts added the point after, and the Lopes were on their way to victory.

The Mustangs were allowed only a six yard return on the ensuing kickoff, and went into action on their own 17. Brown burst around end for 26 yards and a first down, then the Lopes defense put up a blockade and forced the visitors to punt. Two running plays and an incomplete pass netted only 4 yards, and Garcia got off a 52 yard punt to the Olton 5 yard line.

Again the Lopes defense held, forcing Olton to punt to Morrison on the Olton 33. From there the Lopes drove for the second score of the game. Halfback Mike Flores carried for 4 yards, a 5-yard penalty against Abernathy nullified a gain by Sanders, then Heath hit McGuire for a 23 yard gain. A pass fell incomplete, then Sanders hit the line four times in succession, going over from 2 yards out on the first play of the second quarter to give Abernathy a 13-0 edge. Betts' extra point attempt was blocked.

**EDITORIAL**

The tension has been very high in our community over the tragic event that took place in our community Monday, September 11th. This is something that a small town thinks happens in large cities and not in their own town. It is my thinking that we need to wake up and not be so apathetic, so to speak, of what is really going on right here.

After talking to local police and deputies about the many different things that go on in our own little town, it is shocking, because most of the average citizens go home from work and get comfortable and forget what is going on and what our police are having to do. I feel we all need to wake up and back up our police officers.

I was asked I am ever in town between midnight and four a.m. I am not so I'm not aware but, I was told I would be surprised probably if I was aware of it. I remember that last year a man of this community did mention to me that one Saturday night he and his wife were returning home from Lubbock following a Tech football game and it was after midnight and he said there were cars and people going up and down the highway and all around town. He commented then why do these people need to be out in town just running around.

I know that many people don't agree that Abernathy needs a curfew but, if the parents won't take the responsibility of having their young people come home at a proper time the community may have to help some in this area.

I also feel that we might even be helping some young people stay out of trouble if we will help our police in having a curfew. It was brought to us that 11 p.m. on week nights and midnight on Saturday nights is late enough for young people 16 and under to be out on the streets.

You may say well they are not out to do any harm but, why are they just out walking the streets or driving up and down them? What has happened to home life? Are these young people not home because the home is too busy to spend time with them? Are they not there because they want to be with their friends? What has happened to opening homes to our children and their friends where they can go and be together. I know that it is easier to have them out and not underfoot but, it is useful. I feel from what experience that most young people really do want to know that their parents really do have time to share themselves. Parents, make the time to sit down and really get to know your children and that you are interested in what they are doing, and concerned for them. This is not old fashioned and most children not only need and desire discipline and supervision.

It's like the little boy that had overheard his dad say one morning as he was leaving for work that he had to go out to the rat race and the little boy asked if he would bring him home a rat. I work too, and I know that it is hard to find time, but, we all do what we want to do and it is useful for all of us to take time and take stock of what priorities are and what all is really necessary that we are doing with our time.

Many of the things that our children are doing are not good for them or condoned by society, and are done out of a need to test their parents to see if they really care about them, and are paying attention to them.

I had a lady that lives here tell me that she looks back on the time when her children were growing up and would come in at night saying "Mom and dad, listen, and they would need to just talk and share their inner-

The Antelope fans got a scare following the ensuing kickoff, when on 2nd down from the Olton 31, Mustang tailback Danny Garcia spurred through the Antelope line and rambled 38 yards before being pushed out of bounds by McGuire. On the very next play Garcia fumbled and the Lopes pounced on the ball at the Abernathy 34. Two plays later, on 3rd and 12, Heath got off a 25 yard quick kick to the Olton 43. Then the Mustangs began their deepest drive into Antelope territory against stout resistance as Lance Horsford, Dana Flud, Cody Connell, Victor Dees, Roger Mitchell, Betts, McGuire and others finally stopped them on the Aber-

athy 8 yard line.

Sanders carried 4 times for 26 yards, a pass for Bobby Gough was incomplete. Sanders carried another 4 yards to the 38, and after another incomplete pass, Garcia got off a short punt. The Mustangs again threatened and the first half ended with a blocked pass attempt from the Abernathy 11.

Sanders took the second half kickoff on his own 17 and returned it to the 37. He then carried for a first down on runs of 4 and 10 yards, carried twice more for 4 yards before a 3rd down pass bounced out of the youngster's hands, and Abernathy had to punt.

Two Olton pass completions, of 34 and 19 yards, mixed in with running plays, moved the ball to the Aber-

nathy 34 where a 4th down pass attempt was broken up by McGuire. From that point, with a good variety of plays, the Lopes drove for paydirt. Heath kept around left end for 4 yards. Sanders ran for 5 and 4 yards, then Flores hit off-tackle for 13 yards behind good blocking. A pass fell incomplete, then Flores again ran off-tackle for 9 yards and Sanders picked up 3 for a first down. Sanders then hit off-tackle for 8 yards and converted lineman Cody Connell hit the middle for a yard. Lindsey then came into the picture and carried on three consecutive plays (aided by a 6 yard penalty against Olton), and went the final 2 yards for the 3rd TD. Betts split the up-rights to give Abernathy a 20-0 lead late in the 3rd

quarter.

Olton returned the kickoff to the 28 and moved out to the 43 on 3 plays. Then Betts caught quarterback Vance Stroebel from behind for an 8 yard loss on an end sweep. David Davis stopped Garcia after a 3 yard gain, and Connell and Betts teamed up to stop Brown for a 5 yard loss on his famous reverse, and Olton punted. However, an Antelope fumbled the ball in trying to field it, and Olton recovered on the Abernathy 45. The Mustangs picked up a first down, but any threat here was thwarted when Morrison intercepted a Stroebel pass on the 34 and returned it to the Olton 42. Following a series of penalties against both teams, including a 15-yarder

against Abernathy for offensive pass interference, Heath booted a 44 yard quick kick to the Olton 17. This time, with the aid of a 15-yard penalty against Abernathy, the Mustangs moved to the Abernathy 36 before being held on downs. At that point, with reserves up front and sophomore quarterback Kenneth Moss at the helm, the Lopes were unable to

make a first down, and Garcia punted to the Olton 30. Again the visitors moved down field to the 25 before losing 19 yards on a pass attempt on the final play of the game.

The Antelopes will host the Hale Center Owls this Friday night at 8 o'clock. The Owls were 27-6 winners last week over Kress, and

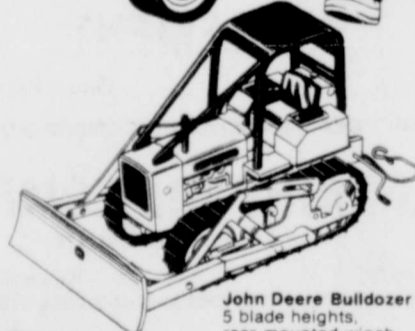

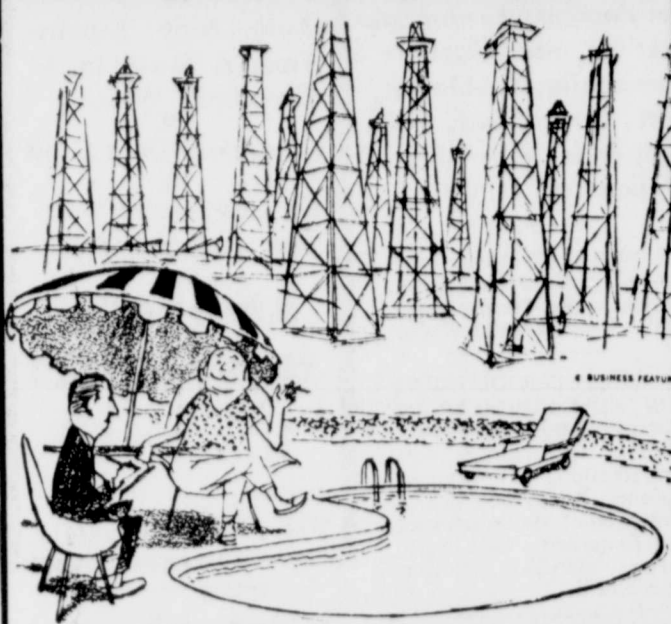

Before joining Congressman Hance, Pharr served as the city manager of Plainview for fifteen years. Prior to that he was the city manager at Andrews and an administrative intern for the City of Lubbock. He served in the United States Navy from 1955 to 1957 and was a member of the U. S. Naval Reserve for 21 years.

While in Plainview, Pharr was active in civic affairs and was a director of the Plainview Industrial Foundation. He was president of the Texas City Management Association in 1976 and served on the government affairs committee of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce. Pharr also served as a district chairman and vice president for the Boy Scouts of America.

Larry Milner, newly appointed director of communications and public affairs, said that Pharr would represent SPS in Washington, and also in Austin when the Texas Legislature is in session.

**PROPOSICION NO. 1**  
**ON THE BALLOT**  
(H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

**PROPOSICION NO. 2**  
**ON THE BALLOT**  
(H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

—To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department; —To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect; —To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules; —To prescribe procedures; and —To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

**PROPOSICION NO. 3**  
**ON THE BALLOT**  
(S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."
