THREE FROM HERE RETURN FROM **YUNTING TRIP TO ALASKA**

Three Abernathy men, Randy Peeples and David and Jim Waits, were on a hunting trip that avid hunters dream about. Leaving Lubbock International Airport August 30, they flew Continental Airlines to Seattle where they boarded an Alaska Airlines plane for Anchorage...and a moose hunt. They returned home Sept. 15, with moose meat from a 1400 or 1500-

pounder killed by Jim Waits. Jim also killed a caribou, which they dressed and used for camp meat for about five days before a bear raided their camp and ate the rest while they were away. Bears grow big in Alaska. Randy estimated bear claw marks at about 12 one big tree.

The three hunters spent about eight hours in actual flying time from Lubbock to Anchorage. Their main mode of travel while in Alaska was by airplane. Their cost for airplane travel in Alaska, and service, was not as much as paid by most hunters. Anchorage Attorney Hall Horton, a brother of Mrs. David Waits, was their pilot (in his own plane) and serviced their hunt. Horton flew them to hunting sites some 200 miles inland from Anchorage.All: their hunting was near lakes. In their 12 days of hunting, Horton brought in provisions at times and would fly them to another lake each time. He flew the moose meat back to Anchorage on one of the

trips.
Jim Waits got his hunt-ing over in about six days and flew back to Anchorage

The only contact the three hunters had with the outside world was through Horton's trips to their hunt-They went five ing sites. days once between Horton's trips. "And, its quiet, pleasantly quiet, out there," David said. Days were warm and nights were cold. "Nights" were more like twilight. "Between the twilight and moonlight, we could read at 3 o'clock in the morning," David said. The closest road and little settlement was some 100 miles from our locations,' he said.

Including the caribou meat, the hunters lived off of the land as much as possible by killing edible game

This was the second such hunt for David. killed a moose on a similar trip to Alaska in 1970.

David predicts that Alaska hunting permits in the future will be hard to get. Drawings may be held to see who gets the permits. (BFD Comment: If the

Dilworth also pointed out that the sewer lift station used by the Dairy Queen was built on his property without an easement. He didn't know until he had the property surveyed. Mayor Thompson pointed out that the Dairy Queen owners had it built and gave it to the city so nobody knows whose mistake located it on Dilworth's

The council granted him a 30 day extension saying they don't want to hurt the business transaction but want progress reports because they have to consider public safety and the city's liability. SPS FRANCHISE

The council renewed for 25 years Southwestern Public Service Company's franchise to furnish electrical power to the community Bill Scott, manager of SPS's Abernathy branch, presented

the request. The previous franchise agreement was for 50 years. In return for the franchise. SPS pays the city 2% of its gross receipts after taxes.

When questioned about future conflicts with power companies in adjoining territory, Scott discounted the possibility. He reviewed problems Lubbock and other towns have with more than one company providing service and described cases in which SPS is, by official request, providing supplemental service to city owned power plants in the area. Mayor Thompson remarked that REA and power co-ops were originally intended to provide service only where

private companies refused to. The aldermen agreed they have no complaints about SPS's service to the city. Scott thanked them for their confidence and said the company employees are proud of their record of service in Abernathy. Eight men recently made a major repair-purposely done after ballgame in consideration for the community--and only had the power off 17

minutes. "When the power is out," said Scott, "We're out (working to restore it)."

Antelopes Edge Past Owls 13-12 In Hard **Battle Here Friday**

The Antelopes of head football coach Larry Aldridge had no easy time of it last Friday night, emerging as 13-12 victors over the visiting Hale Center Owls. With some rain falling just before game time, it appeared it would be a repeat of the week before when it rained throughout most of the first half. However, the rain stopped, leaving the field just wet enough to be slippery, causing a few fumbles and leaving the passing game in jeopardy.

Antelope quarterback Tony Heath completed only 3 of 13 passes for 47 yards, while the visitors completed 5 of 17 passes and had two picked off by Antelope defenders. Another interception by Abernathy was nullified by an Antelope penalty. Some of Health's passes were "in-and-out" of the hands of would-be receivers, but always reliable tight end Dean McGuire was receptions for 44 yards. The other reception was a 3yarder by halfback Roger Lindsey, who also carried the ball 17 times for an even 100 yards.

Leading ball carrier for the Lopes was running back Sylvester Dunn, who carried 20 times for 137 yards and was credited with 2 TDs. The first time he crossed the goal line on a 21 yard carry, but fumbled the ball as he entered the end zone, and McGuire recovered. Willie Betts, who played an out-standing defensive game, kicked the extra point to give the Lopes a 7-0 lead, which held up until midway in the third quarter.

With just over 7 minutes remaining to play in the second quarter, the Lopes lined up for an apparent field goal try, but pitched the ball to Dunn who skirted around right end behind good run, but a clipping penalty against the Lopes nullified the play. The Owls took over and picked up three first downs before having to give up the ball on the Abernathy 34 when the Lopes defense dug in. The Lopes couldn't move the ball and Joey Garcia got off a 40 yard punt (one of 4, with a 40 yard average for the night) The Owls moved out just past mid-field before having a pass intercepted by defensive back Mike Flores on the final play of the first

The visitors came back strong after halftime , returning the kickoff to their own then picking up three first downs before facing a fourth-and-four at the Abernathy 11. At that point, Scott Morrison Intercepted a Freddy Palacios pass in the end zone, but the Lopes were offsides. and the Owls got another chance, this time with a first and goal from the 6. Two plays later fullback Gordon Compton carried in from 4 yards out for the score. The extra point try failed, and the Lopes held a narrow 7-6 lead.

Kenneth Sanders returned the ensuing kickoff from the four yard line out to the 25, then the Lopes put together a 75-yard scoring drive, with Dunn going the final 6 yards for the score. Betts' extra point try was off to the right, and Abernathy led 13-6 The Owls also started

a drive from the 25 follow-

ing the kickoff, and moved the ball the distance in nine plays, aided by a 15-yard penalty against Abernathy and a 29-yard pass. Compton carried the final 15 yards on a second and third-effort play to put the Owls again within 1 point of the Lopes. With a chance to go ahead the visitors lined up to send Compton through the line for a two-point conversion but the 195-pound back was stopped in his tracks by Roger Mitchell, Victor Dees, Willie Betts and several other Lopes, to preserve the victory for

Abernathy The rest of the game was a see-saw affair, as Abernathy lost the ball on a fumble after moving out past mid-field. They got the ball back two plays later when Lance Horsford intercepted
