## Kim DuBose and Debora Oswalt Among The 20 Finalists In South Plains Maid of Cotton

LUBBOCK---Two contestants from Abernathy are among the 20 finalists in the South Plains Maid of Cotton Selection, a preliminary in the National Maid of Cotton Selection. They are Kimberly DuBose, 19, and Debora Oswalt, also 19.

They will compete in the area finals here Oct. 25-27. The final around of judging will be televised at 7 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 27, on Lubbock Channel 28 TV.

The South Plains Maid of Cotton becomes an automatic finalist in the national selection in Memphis in December. She will receive an all-cotton wardrobe and an expense-paid trip to the national finals.

Kim was graduated from Petersburg High School where she was active in band, junior and senior plays, Future Homemakers of America, Future Teachers of America and Future Farmers of America. She was captain of the basketball team, receiving honorable mention in the All-District selections, and was a member of the tennis, volleyball and golf teams.

She was "Class Favorite", district Lion's Club queen and "Miss Congeniality" in the State Lion's Club contest. She is a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Debora Oswalt is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Oswalt of Abernathy. She is 5-foot-9 with brown hair and eyes. A graduate of Abernathy High School, she was the first girl at the school to receive the Lone Star Farmer degree at the state Future Farmers of America convention in Dallas. She held several FFA offices and received the Star Greenhand and Outstanding Young Farmer awards.

Also in high school, she was in Future Homemakers of America, Future Teachers of America, 4-H, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Drama Club, Thespians, Science Club, cheerleader, and on the "Antelope Outlook" staff. She was on the varsity basketball and track teams and in the junior and senior plays.

She attended Angelo State University before transferring to Texas Tech where she is a sophomore, majoring in clothing and textiles. She is a member of Zeta Tau Alpha Sorority, Junior Executive, Tech Fashion board, chairman of transfer students music committee and active in intramural sports.

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## Antelopes Win Biggie!! In First District Game With Hornets Here 30 to 7

The Antelopes of Coach Larry Aldridge continued their winning ways here last Friday night as they opened District 4-AA action against the Tulia Hornets with an impressive 30-7 commanding victory.

The Lopes wasted no time in putting points on the scoreboard. AHS elusive halfback Sylvester Dunn raced for 136 yards on 15 carries and scored 2 touchdowns, including a 71-yard scoring scamper on the first play from scrimmage, and added a 44-yard scoring jaunt early in the second quarter in leading the Lopes to the win.

Antelope quarterback Tony Heath's passing was brilliant as he came through in the clutch, teaming up with Dean McGuire on 3 occasions for 45 yards, hitting Dunn on a 13 yarder, and firing a strike to Scott Morrison for an 18 yard gain which kept a scoring drive alive. Heath also scored a TD, going in from 16 yards out, and Kenneth Sanders added a TD on a 1 yard plunge.

Willie Betts, who along with sophomore Ricky Houston was credited with the Big Hits on defense, kicked three extra points and rounded out the scoring with a 33 yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

The Lopes put forth a team effort as they played their best game of the season. The defense held the visitors inside the Antelope 10 on one occasion, and stopped them on the one on another. On the other side of the coin, the offensive unit, which found itself in a hole on at least 3 occasions in the first half, came through with clutch plays to stay in command of the game.

Heath, who carried 6 times for 31 yards, completed 5 of 13 passes for 76 yards, but was "on target" on other passes which were "in and out" of the hands of the receivers. The Lopes picked up 256 yards rushing for a total of 332 yards to the Hornets' 313 total yards. The visitors completed 5 of 19 passes for 139 yards, including an 18 yard TD pass from quarterback Wade Littlefield to tight end Kelly Carlisle, and had 2 aeriels picked off by Antelopes Scott Morrison and Kenneth Moss.

Moss reserve quarterback, piloted the team in the latter stages of the game, and bootlegged once for a 5 yard gain. Halfback Tony Cox had 6 carries for 17 yards, and Mike Flores had 26 yards on 4 carries, including a 15 yard burst through the middle of the line.

The win upped the Antelopes season record to 5 wins, no losses and 2 ties, while the Hornets stand at 2-5-0.

Sanders took the opening kickoff on the goal line and carried it out to the 29 for the Antelopes. Then on the first play from scrimmage, behind good up-front blocking, Heath sent Dunn through the middle of the line. The scabback picked up a good downfield block from Morrison, cut back to his left and outran the defenders to the goal line with only 17 seconds having elapsed on the clock. Betts added the extra point to give Abernathy a 7-0 lead.

The Hornets returned the ensuing kickoff from the 10 to the 20, and from there picked up four first downs against stout resistance, moving deep into Antelope territory. With a first and 10 on the Antelope 13, Betts stopped Littlefield for a 2 yard gain, a pass was broken up by McGuire, Bobby Gough and others stopped a left end run at the 10, and a 4th down desperation pass fell incomplete.

The Lopes took over on their own 10, but managed only 9 yards on 3 carries, and Joey Garcia, who averaged 41 yards on 5 punts, as a Tulia punt went out of bounds on the Antelope 5. A clipping penalty against the Lopes moved the ball back to the 2. Behind good protection, Heath then passed to Mr. McGuire, who carried out to the 20. However, on the next play the handoff was fumbled, and Tulia's John Kirk recovered for the Hornets on the Antelope 8.

The Lopes defense dug in and held for four downs, taking over on the 1 yard line. Sanders carried three times, picking up 10 yards and a first down. Two more running plays netted only a yard, then Heath fired to McGuire who went high in the air amid two defenders for a fine catch and a 13 yard gain. Heath tried another aerial, this time to Morrison who appeared to be wide open, and apparently Morrison thought so too as he headed for the goal line before actually having possession, and the ball dropped to the ground. A couple of plays later however, the youngster redeemed himself as Heath hit him from the shotgun for an 18 yard gain and a first down. Sanders then carried 14 yards on a draw moving the ball to the Hornets' 44. On the next play Dunn started through

**Great Society E.H.A. Meets**

The Great Society Extension Homemakers Association met Monday 15th of October at the Abernathy Community Center for a program on frozen foods.

Maybell Glass opened the meeting with prayer and the club answered roll call to "My favorite dish that freezes well."

Mrs. L.A. Suttle brought the program with material furnished by the extension office in Plainview. There are three by words for making the most efficient use of your freezer-plan, buy and use. With a freezer, you can enjoy the best foods at the lowest prices at all times-if you take advantage of your supermarkets' "specials" and food in season.

Mrs. Suttle gave a demonstration on do-ahead sandwiches. She reminded the women what they could not safely put in sandwiches if they are to be frozen. Moist sandwich ingredients with applesauce, fruit juice or dairy sour cream, never with mayonnaise, salad dressing or jelly. Don't use fresh vegetables or boiled egg whites in sandwiches to be frozen. If food that has been frozen is improperly handled one who used the food is subject to salmonella.

The line cut to his right around the defense. He stiff-armed the only defender between him and the goal and tipped down the right sideline for his second TD of the night. The extra point attempt was blocked. The Lopes held the visitors on the next series, forcing them to punt, the ball going out of bounds on the Tulia 43. The Lopes moved the ball to the Tulia 27 on four carries, then lost 7 yards on a pitch-out and set up for an apparent field goal attempt. It turned out to be a fake field goal, however, with Heath pitching the ball to Dunn who in

turn passed downfield to Morrison. The pass was incomplete, but pass interference was called against the Hornets at the 16. From that point Heath kept on an option, cut inside and then back out to the right, going in for the score. Betts' kick was true, and the Lopes carried a 20-0 lead into the dressing room at halftime. It didn't take the Lopes long to score again in the third quarter, going 38 yards on 7 plays, including a 20 yard Heath-to-McGuire pass. Sanders capped the drive with a 1 yard thrust with 6:26 remaining in the quarter, and Betts added the PAT for a 27-0 lead. The Lopes had gained possession when Victor Dees recovered

a fumble at the 38. After an exchange of punts following the ensuing kickoff, the visitors appeared to be starting a sustained drive, but that was thwarted early in the fourth period when Moss intercepted at the Abernathy 36 and returned it to the 47. Heath threw a screen pass to Dunn for a 13 yard gain. Flores burst through the middle of the line for 15 yards to the Tulia 25, then Sanders hit the middle for 6 yards to the 19. A Heath pass was then intercepted, but pass interference was called against Tulia at the 8 and a clipping penalty on the same play moved the ball to the 4. Heath then blasted over the goal line for an

apparent TD, but a clipping penalty against the Lopes nullified the touch and moved the ball back to the 19. Two passes fell incomplete, Sanders carried to the 16, then Betts came in and booted a 33 yard field goal from the 23 to end the scoring for Abernathy, which at that time was 30-0. The hard rushing Antelopes nailed the ball carrier at the 2 yard line on the ensuing kickoff, and forced Tulia to kick from the 10 three plays later. However, the Lopes also bogged down and Garcia punted to the Tulia 15 yard line. From that point the Hornets drove to their only score of the game. Aided by a 15 yard penalty against Abernathy and a 37 yard screen pass,

the visitors moved to the 18, then Littlefield connected with Carlisle for the TD. Davis kicked the extra point to end the scoring for the night. The Antelopes will travel to Lockney this Friday for a 7:30 p.m. encounter with the Longhorns. Lockney lost its conference opener last week to Floydada, 21-0, but boasts a 4-2-1 season record.

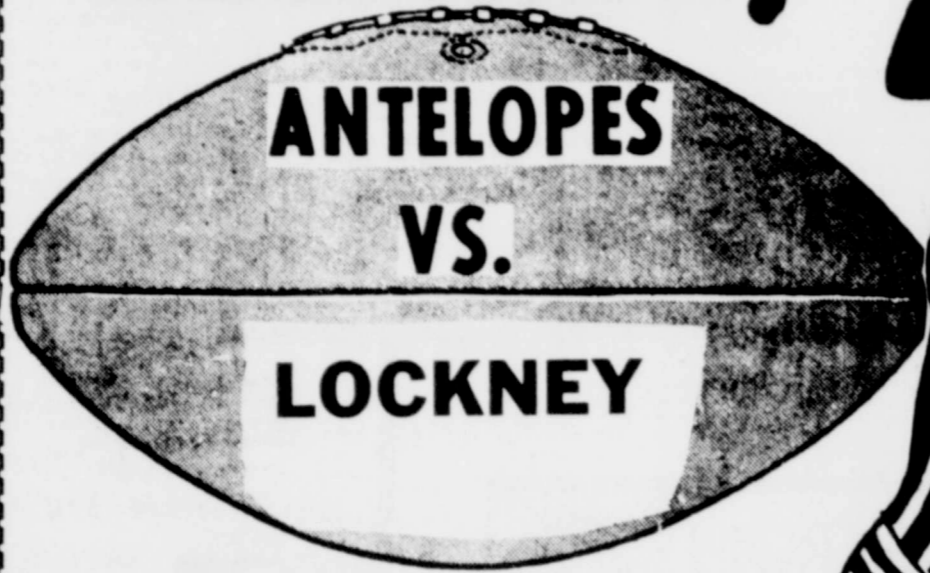

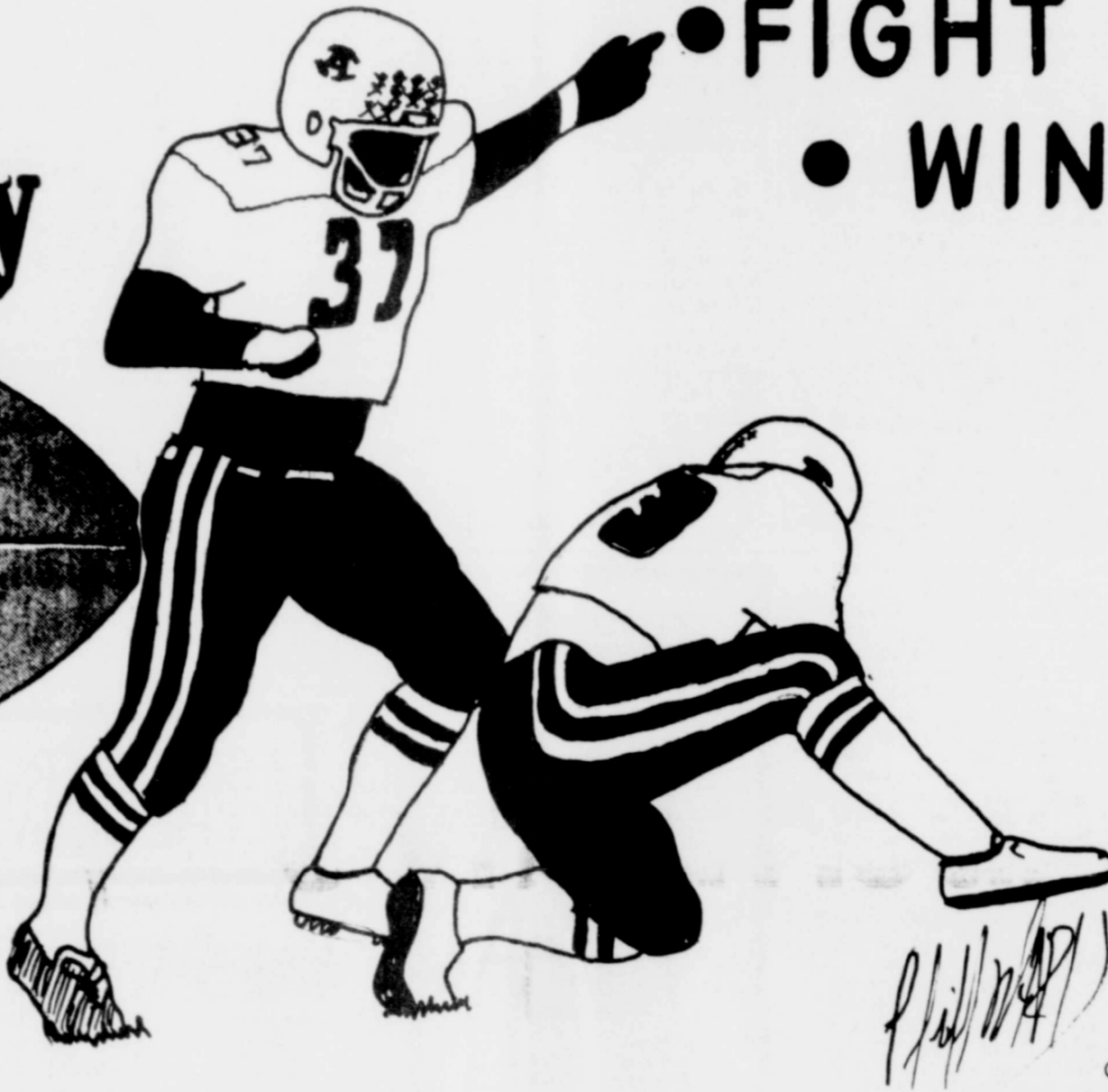

**"Why My Family Does Not Take Part In Halloween"**

The following article was researched by a sixth grade student James Aldous for a class project in his sixth grade English class. Mrs. Richard Thomas is his English teacher.

Deuteronomy 18:9 and 10. "When you come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you, don't follow the disgusting practices of the nations that are there. Don't sacrifice your children in the fires of your altars and don't let your people practice divination or look for omens or use spells or charms and don't let them consult the spirits of the dead. The Lord your God hates people who do these disgusting things, and that is why He is driving those nations out of the land as you advance. Be completely faithful to the Lord."

Druids were pagan priest among the ancient Celts. They worshiped pagan gods that were common to the ancient world. Their services were held in oak groves and the mistletoe was believed to be sacred. They believed in reincarnation.

Halloween means hallowed evening. The name is taken from the fact that it is the eve of the religious celebration of the Catholic Church, All Saints Day, on November 1st. Many pagan customs of the Druids became a part of this religious celebration. The Druids of old had a festival called Samhain that was still popular among the peasants. The Druids believed that Saman the lord of the dead, called out evil spirits, at this time. The superstitious people burned huge bonfires believing this would protect them from these supernatural creatures.

Our present day Halloween practices are a combination of those pagan customs such as decorating with leaves, pumpkins, and

cornstalks and associating ghosts, witches, cats, fortunetelling, etc. France, England and Ireland, have also added to our Halloween customs.

Trick or treat came directly from the early practice by the Roman Catholics of preparing all food for the November 1st festivities on the previous day. Their pagan neighbors were often poor and lazy would ask for food and goodies.

Many people also enjoyed giving sweet treats to the children of relatives and friends. When a family refused to give food, or goodies to anyone, some harmless prank was played on them. These pranks became more destructive.

Another well known part of Halloween is the jack-o-lanterns. This came from an Irish legend about a man named Jack who had played tricks on the devil and had to roam the world with a lantern, after his death, until Judgement Day. This legend was combined with superstitions that a light in a window would show spirits of the dead the way home, keeping them from becoming angry and harming someone. This led to our present custom of hollowing out a pumpkin, carving eyes, mouth and nose, then placing a burning candle in it, and placing the pumpkin in a window.

All of the customs of Halloween are of pagan origin. Too many Christians think it is harmless fun and don't take any of it seriously. They enjoy helping their children to dress as witches, ghosts, devils, etc. However, God considered it serious enough to instruct the nation of Israel in Deuteronomy, 18:9-10 not to take part in the pagan practices where He was talking to them. God hated anything to do with witches, spirits of the dead being called for any purpose

(what we call ghosts) fortunetelling and other such beliefs which are commonly associated with the devil. Why encourage your children to take lightly what God hates?

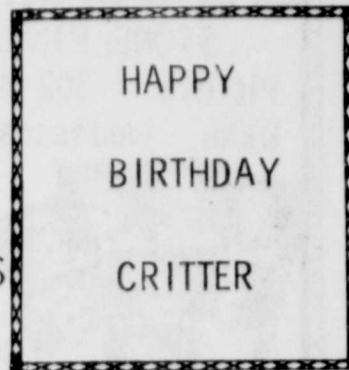
