SPS Makes Half Cent Reduction

The base rate fo electricity for most of Southwestern Public Service Company's customers Texas went down one-half cent per kilowatt hour October 1.

The reason is that SPS's winter rates went into effect at that time. During the summer months -- June July, August and September -- the base rate for residential service is 2.75 cents per kilowatt hour for all KWH after the first 30. The rest of the year, or during the winter months, the base rate after 30 kilowatt hours is

2.25 cents per KWH. A customer who used 500 kilowatt hours in September received an electric bill for \$30.94 plus city tax. His bill in October for 500 kilowatt hours would have been \$27.08 plus tax.

Not all of the savings this customer would realize would come from the lower winter rate, however. SPS paid less for its fuel in October than it did in September, so these savings were passes on to the customers. The fuel cost portion of the September bill was \$13.52 while the October fuel cost portion dripped to

uses 500 kilowatt hours per month, the winter base rate saves him \$2.36 over the summer rate.

Here's the way the bill is broken down:

September (summer Base rate - 1st 30 KWH \$4.50 Next 470 KWH

Total base rate-500 KWH Fuel Cost (factor \$.027047 \$13.52 Total Electric Bill (less City tax)

October (winter rate) Base rate - 1st 30KWH \$4.50 Next 470 KWH Total Base Rate Fuel Cost (factor \$.024040) \$12.02 Total Electric Bill

\$27.08 (less City tax) The fuel cost factor is determined by averaging the fuel costs for all of Southwestern's eleven generating stations. includes the cost of coal, natural gas and fuel oil.

Southwestern Public Service Company's base rates for winter months are lower than low summer months because the Texas Public Utilities Commission requires all electric utilities in this state to design their rates this way. SPS customers use more

electricity in the summer months because of air conditioning and irrigation. The summer loan determines the amount of generating capability that SPS must have. If SPS customers used the same amount of electricity in the winter months, the cost of generating a kilowatt hour would be less.
