## Antelopes Loose In Battle With Wildcats

The Antelopes of AHS were handed their first loss of the season here last Friday night at the hands of District 4-AA foe, Idalou. The loss put the Antelopes at 2-1 in loop action, while Idalou is now 2-0. Idalou still has to play Lockney and Tulla, which Abernathy has previously beaten handily, and the Lopes still have one final game, against Floydada, who was beaten previous week by Idalou, 29-14.

The Lopes now have a 6-1-2 won-loss-tie record for the year, and will finish out the regular season this Friday night at Floydada. Game time is set at 7:30.

The Lopes held the Wildcats to only 6 points during the first half, the Wildcats having scored on a 2 yard run by Brad DeBusk during the first quarter. The PAT was blocked by the Lopes.

With just over four minutes gone in the fourth quarter, and trailing 12-0, the Lopes put together a drive for their only score of the contest. Quarterback Tony Heath, who completed 8 of 24 passes for the night,

hit tight end Willie Betts who carried to the 16, then a play later completed a 14 yarder to end Dean McGuire for the score. Betts' extra point attempt was blocked.

Having scored their second TD following a fumble recovery, the Wildcats again fell on an AHS miscue, and again converted it into 6 points, while DeBusk getting the honors on a 26 yard scamper. DeBusk then hit Gary Fabila with a pass for two points, giving the Wildcats a 20-6 cushion.

Following the ensuing kickoff, the visitors picked off their third pass interception of the night, then covered 58 yards in 8 plays to put the game on ice, 26-6.

Heath's 8 pass completions accounted for 117 yards, with an additional 8 yards by air coming on a Dean McGuire to Kenneth Sanders pass. The Lopes picked up 98 yards rushing, with Sanders leading the pack with 56 yards on 10 carries. Betts was the leading pass receiver, hauling in 5 catches for 112 yards.

## SPS Makes Half Cent Reduction

The base rate for electricity for most of Southwestern Public Service Company's customers in Texas went down one-half cent per kilowatt hour October 1.

The reason is that SPS's winter rates went into effect at that time. During the summer months--June, July, August and September--the base rate for residential service is 2.75 cents per kilowatt hour for all KWH after the first 30. The rest of the year, or during the winter months, the base rate after 30 kilowatt hours is 2.25 cents per KWH.

A customer who used 500 kilowatt hours in September received an electric bill for \$30.94 plus city tax. His bill in October for 500 kilowatt hours would have been \$27.08 plus tax.

Not all of the savings this customer would realize would come from the lower winter rate, however. SPS paid less for its fuel in October than it did in September, so these savings were passed on to the customers. The fuel cost portion of the September bill was \$13.52 while the October fuel cost portion dropped to \$12.02.

For a customer who uses 500 kilowatt hours per month, the winter base rate saves him \$2.36 over the summer rate.

## Local High School Student Wins NCTE Achievement Awards In Writing

Gene McDonald of Abernathy High School has been cited for outstanding performance in writing. The National Council of Teachers of English has named him a winner of a 1979 Achievement Award in Writing. The NCTE writing contest is held annually beginning in January. Gene is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Glenn McDonald.

Over 7,000 students were nominated last February by their English teachers for NCTE Achievement in Writing. Each nominee submitted a sample of his/her best writing and an impromptu essay. These compositions were evaluated by state judging teams of both high school and college English teachers. The approximately 850 finalists selected each year represent high school in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and American schools abroad. The number of possible winners for each state is keyed to state population.

Nominated last year by Mrs. Barbara Webb, Gene is one of 48 Texas finalists. Forty-six were from AAAA school and one was from a AAA school.

The Council recommends the award finalists, now seniors, for college scholarships in 1979, should they need such assistance. Names of the students are sent to admissions officers and English department chairs at U.S. two- and four-year colleges and universities.

The National Council of Teachers of English is a professional organization of individual and institutional members at all levels of instruction. Its goal is to increase the effectiveness of the teaching of English language and literature in the nation's schools and colleges. NCTE furnishes such teaching aids as books and recordings, and publishes several professional journals, among them College English and English Journal.

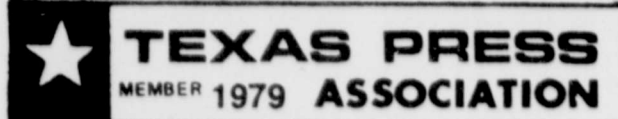

Sunday September 9 we attended the Wesley United Methodist Church in El Reno, Oklahoma. Sunday evening we attended the vesper service at Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Oklahoma. It was such a wonderful experience to see that many young people praising the Lord. Monday morning we toured the beautiful campus and the lovely Prayer Tower. It's a campus where miracles are wrought by prayer 24 hours a day. We arrived in Arkansas Monday, Tuesday we visited the Elna M. Smith Foundation in Eureka Springs, Arkansas, where we saw the Great Passion Play. It is staged in a beautiful outdoor theatre with the splendor of Arkansas Ozark's serving as a backdrop. The theatre is situated on the slope of a mountain. Each seat includes a splendid view of the stage. The setting, staging and costumes and the script taken from the gospel all combine to make the final days of Christ life come alive. The feeling of being there makes Great Passion Play one of the most acclaimed outdoor dramas in the world. It is an excellent reproduction of Jerusalem during the final days of Christ's life. We also had a magnificent view of the Christ of the Ozark's Statue from our seats in the theatre. The play opens on the first Friday in May and continues every night except Monday's and Thursday's through the last Saturday in October. It is located among four inspirational attractions. The seven-story Christ of the Ozark's Statue, the Christ only Art Gallery, the Bible museum, with over ten bibles on display, and the Holy Land in Life size which is now under construction. We visited the Smith Memorial Chapel. The Chapel was furnished by several people, many items have been assembled from various parts of the country. The podium came from the Christian Church in Footville, Wis., Rev. Gerald Smith's first parastate. The communion table came from the First Christian Church in Beloit, Wis., the church where Mr. and Mrs. Smith were married and where he was the pastor. The pews were all hand-made by an employee of the foundation. The large central Chandelier came from a church in Chicago, Ill. The Bible stand and the crucifix came from a church in Italy. The fourteen Stations of the cross were donated by a couple from Florida. The paintings were French and hung for 150 years in a cathedral in Evanston, Ind. until the cathedral was torn down. The altar was from Amsterdam, Holland. The finish is polychrome over hand carved wood and dates from the time of Raphael. The two angels (lights) were bought in an antique show in Pasadena, Calif. The angels and

two small figures came from a remodeled church in Jefferson, Wis. The Christ above the altar came from a dismantled convent in Long Beach, Calif. The stained glass window above the door was presented to Mrs. Smith by the employee's of the Elna M. Smith Foundation in 1976. It was such a good feeling to be in a place so lovely.

We traveled to Branson, Missouri in the Ozark mountains. The oldest range of mountains and highlands on this continent, we went by jeep-drawn train tour to the old mill theatre, out under the stars, to see the famous play "The Shepherd of the Hills", on this very ground where it actually took place nearly a century ago. The Shepherd of the Hills, acclaimed by critics across the land as one of the nations most satisfying vacation experiences and has been ranked as America's best attended historical pageant. To the historical and educational significance add the superb entertainment value of dramatic staging, excellent acting and top technical equipment, the authenticity of the buildings, the two old mills, old Matt's cabin, and Little Pete's cave that comprise the setting for the story and the Ozark's most popular historical drama becomes a must for everyone on vacation in this part of Missouri to see. A minister, author the name of Harold Bell Wright came into the hills for his health. While here he wrote about the people and the area. The book was published under the name of "The Shepherd of the Hills". Today outside of the Bible it is the fourth most widely read book in America.

We stopped on Sunday in Hope, Ark. at the First United Methodist Church for the 11 o'clock worship service, it was most helpful and enjoyable. The people were very friendly, they made us feel so welcome. We arrived home Monday, September 17. Always thankful and glad to be home.

### Young Race Car Driver Maintains Unusual Schedule

Ricky Pope, 17 year old senior at Abernathy High School, maintains an unusual schedule of study, work, and race car driving. He was one of the youngest competitors every weekend in the mini-stock class at Lubbock Speed Bowl the past two years.

Ricky drove a Volkswagen with a 1600 cc stock engine with high lift rocker arms. The other cars had dual port heads and special valve work to make them go faster. Ricky's car didn't have racing cams like all the other but still he had the championship mostly wrapped up last season. He finally lost by only five or six points.

He outran everybody for a while and an adult race driver and friend says Ricky will be the one to beat. As the sport drew more and more enthusiasts with bigger engines, he got out. His average, though, was so good that he managed to stay in third place despite faster competition. He hopes to get a bigger engine in his car so he'll have a better chance of winning again.

The racing began as a "family deal," said Ricky, Charles Pope, his dad, is a mechanic who used to race some. It was dad's idea, brother Rodney's car, and

your reactions," he continued. "I've kept out of a few wrecks on the highways because of it." The cars do have safety features such as roll cages which reinforce the car body, and all must carry fire extinguishers. Drivers must wear helmets and face protectors and use seat belts. The helmets protect drivers against the noise as well as accidents.

The mini-stocks are the second fastest cars on the track. They average an estimated 70 mph on straightaway. The modifieds are fastest at 80 mph and the street stocks slowest at 50 mph.

There are regulations governing engine power and racers must abide by regulations in the International Rule Book plus extra ones set up by the track.

Track officials keep drivers' scores which are based on a point system figured on averages. The cars line up for races by averages; those with higher averages start further back in the pack.

The drivers are all good friends and root for each other even while competing. There are "dirty drivers" among them who "run you into the wall" but they are part of any sport.

Winning is not the main thing to Ricky; having fun is. "But when you win, it's the most fun," he said, grinning. It feels great to drive the winner's lap around the track and get a trophy and a kiss from a pretty girl.

Winners get money awards, too. The amounts vary according to ticket sales on race nights. The Pope brothers usually win their entry fees back at least. Ricky's goal is to make "make a clean sweep" which means he must win all three of one night's races.

A race, for Ricky, begins at 7 or 7:30 PM when he meets his dad (who keeps the car) at the track. They unload and check the car thoroughly. Then Ricky and the other drivers "iron out the track" watching for their cars' reactions and adjust air in the tires accordingly.

They drive "hot laps" for practice, then attend a pit meeting at which the pit manager reviews the rules for new drivers, checks complaints, and makes sure the line up is right.

The races start at 8:30 and Ricky gets home at 10:30 or 11, depending on how many wrecks or stalls held things up and how long it took everybody to line up for each race.

Ricky's car is #11, red with a black stripe and gold numbers. He used to always wear a red checked shirt and red striped socks to drive because the outfit seemed to bring him luck. He still depends on the striped socks but switched to a blue chambray shirt and jeans for the rest of his uniform.

In civilian life, he drives a yellow 1977 Pontiac Grand Prix, his first "good" car, acquired last June. He plans to keep racing just as a hobby, and as long as it's not too expensive. His father quit racing dragsters because of the expense.

"It doesn't cost a lot to drive an old Volkswagen with a good enough engine to keep up with the others just for fun," he said. Many racing buffs--and they include all age groups--don't even drive or have a car.

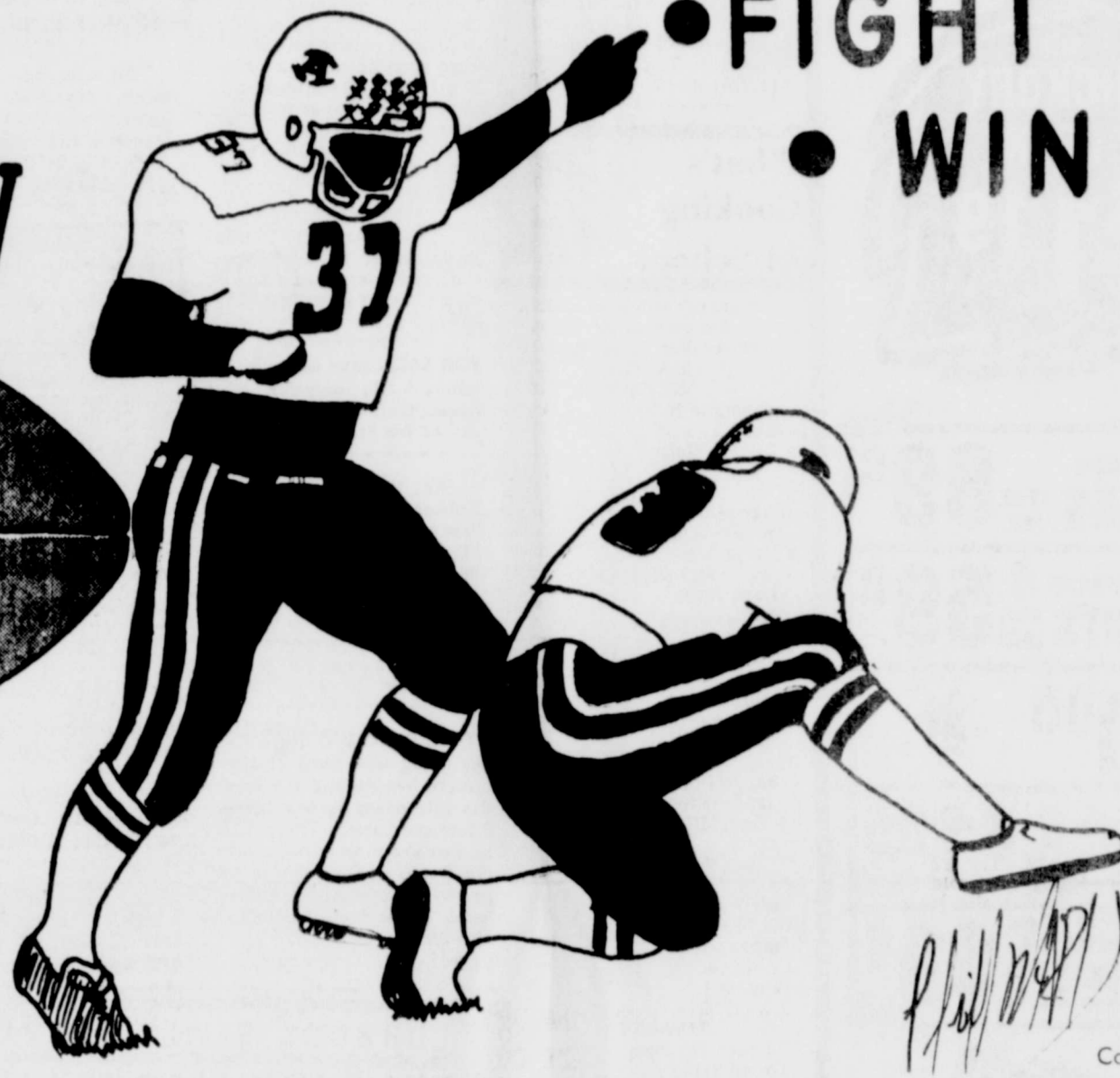
