elevator helper for the company, nearly found out what it is like to be buried alive white eight other men worked to free him by scooping the beans out from underhim -- a process which took nearly an hour.

Dusty but unhurt, West-moreland had crawled into the 60-foot tall, 30-foot diameter tank to unclog the drain when the soybeans avalanched filling up around him

Help arrived some 10 minutes after the accident which Charles Hobgood, plant manager termed as serious but which could have been worse. He said that workers had entered the grain tanks several times in the past but added that no one had ever been nearly buried before.
