And, if the family to whom a holiday message is sent moved more than a year ago, it cannot be forwarded. With a return address, OIC Awtry says, such letters are returned to the sender with a notation that the following "order" has expired.

Carry Medical History When You Travel

COLLEGE STATION---Travelers--especially when leaving the country--should carry a one-page personal medical history with them in case of accident or other medical emergency.

A person who contracts a disease or has an accident requiring immediate medical aid can help the attending doctor by having this information available, says a health education specialist, Carla Shearer.

Ms. Shearer is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Follow this advice to prepare yourself for any possible emergencies: 1) Prepare a short medical history on each family member, and keep it with passports or international identification cards for easy locating.

2) Include any drug allergies or hypersensitivities as well as any information about regular medication that you are taking. 3) Note if you are a diabetic, have a pace maker, wear contact lenses or any other conditions that might influence emergency care.

4) Include the name and address of your personal physician along with the type of health insurance that you have.

5) Be sure that you are not carrying illegal drugs as you enter other countries. Very stiff jail terms or heavy fines are the rule in many countries.

6) Check your health policy on its applicability outside of the United States. Remember that Medicare generally does not pay out-of-country medical bills for persons 65 and over traveling or living abroad.

7) If you are uncertain about local medical services, contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate.

Grain Worker Escapes Injury

An employee of Plains Grain & Farm Supply of Abernathy spent nearly an hour standing neck deep in a grain tank loaded with soybeans after the contents of the tank avalanched while he was attempting to unclog it Nov. 19.

Frank Westmoreland, an elevator helper for the company, nearly found out what it is like to be buried alive while eight other men worked to free him by scooping the beans out from under him--a process which took nearly an hour.

Dusty but unharmed, Westmoreland had crawled into the 60-foot tall, 30-foot diameter tank to unclog the drain when the soybeans avalanched filling up around him.

Help arrived some 10 minutes after the accident which Charles Hobgood, plant manager termed as serious but which could have been worse. He said that workers had entered the grain tanks several times in the past but added that no one had ever been nearly buried before.

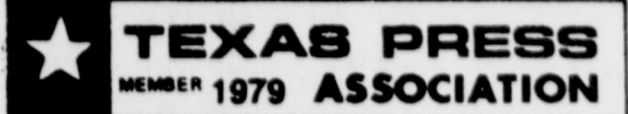

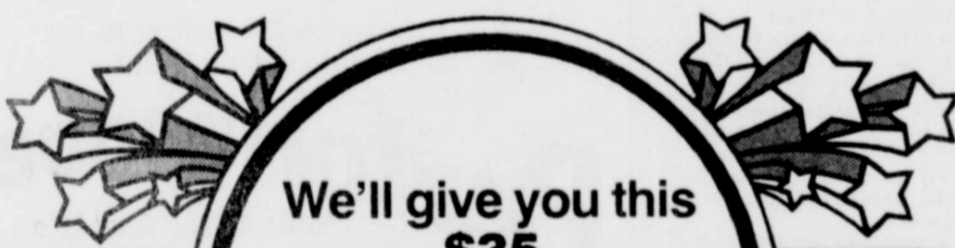

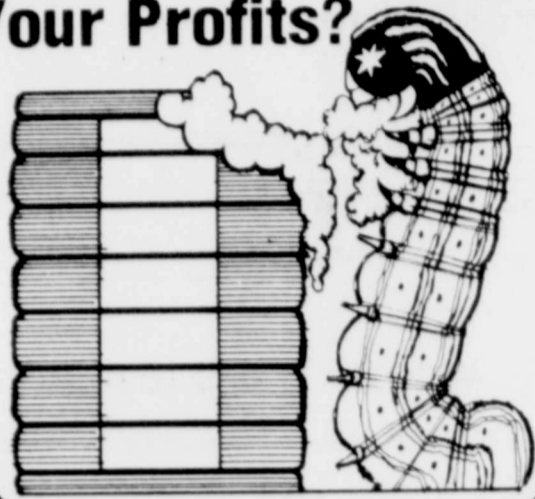

New Deal Wins, Idalou Loses In Bi-District

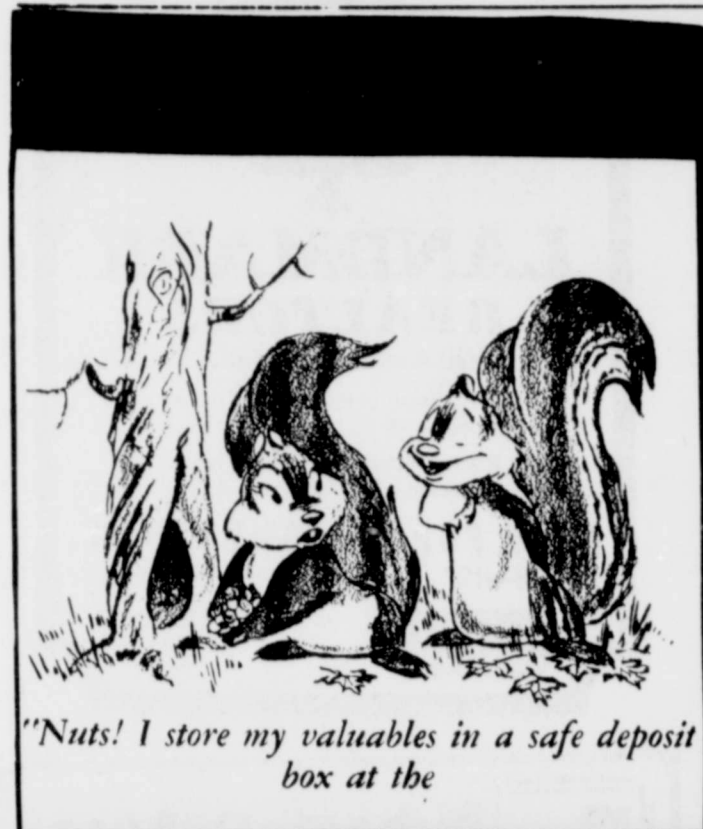
