

Improved Phone LD System Goes On Here Dec. 17

......

Equipment that will identify for billing the numbers of one party telephone customers in Abernathy who dial long distance is being installed in Abernathy, according to J. H. Davis, Memphis Division Manager for General Tele-

Davis said the service is scheduled to begin Dec-ember 17, 1979. There will be no changes in methods of dialing. Presently the operator takes the number and keys it into the equipment. The new equipment will do this automatically for one party customers.

"You will now be able to dial your own operator assisted calls such as collect, credit card, third number billing and person-to-person, Davis said. To place an operator assisted call, you dial the digit "O" plus the area code of the distant city if different from 806 plus the seven digit number of the telephone being called.

When dialing a Zero Plus (0+) call, the operator will still come on the line after dialing is completed by the customer. operator will determine and perform the type of service desired such as collect, credit card, third number billing or person-to-person. These are considered operator handled calls and are more costly than One Plus Calling.

He added there will be no changes in the existing 1-plus dialing procedures, emphasizing 1-plus calls are the cheapest way to call long distance. In some instances, several station calls can be made for the price of one person call.

If equipment failures occur, one party customers may be asked for their numbers, however, they will not be charged the more expensive operator assisted

There will be no change for party line customers in dialing of 1-plus calls. Party line customers, however, may also dial 0+ calls in the same manner as described above for one party custo-



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



New Texas Almanac Is Distributed

The 1980-81 Texas Almanac and State Industrial Guide, now off the presses, marks a major milestone in book publishing. It is the 50th edition of this unique book since the first edition was published in Galveston

A special article in the new edition, written by Lee Milazzo, director of archives at Southern Methodist University and book reviewer for The Dallas Morning News, traces the history of the Texas Almanac since Willard Richardson, who was the Galveston News publisher at the time, launched the enterprise.

There have been several times gaps in the book's publication, the longest being from 1873 until 1904 the longest when publication was resumed in Dallas by A. H. Belo & Co. The Belo Corporation, publisher of The Dallas News, has been the book's publisher since that time. Throughout most of this century, it has been published every other year, except for a gap of several years during World War I.

Another article tells of the colorful and sometimes tragic history of the city of Galveston. The account and another on the Port of Galveston were written by Robert A. Nesbitt, writer, editor and former president of the Galveston Historical Foundation.

In continuing to present a section of Texas (The Hill Country of Lyndon Johnson, 1976-77 edition, and Texas West of the Pecos, 1978-79 edition), the Gulf Coast of Texas is spotlighted in a special article in the new 1980-81 edition of the Texas Almanac. It was prepared by the staff of the Dallas Museum of Natural

History.
The feature, which is with liberally illustrated with color photographs made by the museum staff, discusses places, plants, birds, mammals, reptiles, fish and sea-shells found along the Texas

Gulf Coast. For Texas political historians, Richard M. Morehead, who for many years was chief of The Dallas News' Austin Bureau, has written a history of Texas politics since 1857.

The 1980-81 edition has many other features as well as updated data on Texas weather, statewide political races, business agriculture, mining and petroleum production, state boards and commissions. organizations -- almost every subject about Texas that Texans will want to know. Also included are the lists of state and national parks, lakes and rivers--plus a special feature on floating on Texas rivers -- and inter-

esting places to visit.
The Texas Constitution, a history of Texas, gardening in Texas and the popular section--Counties of Texas with maps--are among the contents of the book's 704

HOLIDAY HAZARDS

With the holiday season rapidly approaching, care must be taken to insure that in all the hustle and bustle that accidental poisonings do not occur warns the Texas State Poison Center." Holiday plants and decorations can cause considerable problems," warns Michael Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison

"Plants, such as the poinsettia, Christmas holly, mistletoe, and the Jerusalem cherry can all cause problems if left where small children can get to them," Ellis noted. "Although the poinsettia is not the deadly plant it is often misrepresented as, if the leaves or stems are eaten or chewed on, frequently we see fairly severe vomiting and diarr-hea. This in itself can cause dehydration problems in small children.

"If holly berries are eaten they can produce severe vomiting and diarrhea, due to a number of extremely irritating sub-stances found in both the red and green berries. Mistletoe, on the other hand, has proven deadly when ngested in any quantity Ellis noted." The bright red berries of the Jerusalem cherry can be mistaken for tomatoes by small children, and the consequences may prove severe.'

Since we know that small children are attracted to plants, and particularly those with bright colors, Ellis said, "they should be placed high enough that small hands cannot have access to them." This means that places like the coffee table are definitely out as areas to display these

Other holiday decorations can pose problems also. "Christmas tree ornaments, such as the older bubbling lights, contain methylene chloride, which if consumed

prove quite toxic," noted Ellis, "each year we are consulted about children eating glass Christmas tree balls, and the possibility of mouth or the gastrointestinal tract being cut or injured is very real.

The drinking of Christmas preservatives by children is also common, but generally is of little concern if the amounts consumed are

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



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
