Bus Accident Strands Singers In Abernathy

A bus accident north of town at 11 AM Dec. 12, gave a California based singing group a taste of Abernathy hospitality and Abernathians a chance to meet a delightful bunch of young people.

icy roads under construction caused the bus carrying the "Celebrant Singers" to slide and overturn north of Abernathy. It was a fairly gentle process however, though the mishap sent people and equipment flying inside the bus. The only injury was a broken toe.

"We know beyond a shadow of a doubt that the Lord protected us," said Wes Rowland, assistant director of the group.

The Singers had spent Tuesday night in Perryton after doing a concert there and were on their way to an engagement in El Paso when the accident occurred. Everyone but the driver was asleep and perfectly relaxed, a good state to be in for an injury free accident. Rowland said the driver, who is a member of the group, was driving slow and did everything in his power to control the bus. He had a 65,000 mile accident free record until Wednesday.

The 23 travelers were taken to First Baptist Church until the bus could be righted and damage assessed. Baptist ladies brought food to the church for the group's lunch. When it was determined they'd have to stay overnight, the group accepted an invitation to the church's covered dish supper scheduled for that evening. They then went to church member's homes for the night.

They left for El Paso Thursday morning on a borrowed bus, leaving two people behind to drive their own vehicle when repairs were completed. The Singers' bus is a sturdy 1960 model which came through the accident with broken windows and a crumpled side. Body shop men said a newer model would not have fared so well.

The Celebrant Singers are a Christian group composed of 10 singers and a small orchestra. They are winding up their 1979 world tour which included India for the second time. Last year they performed in India. Their home base is Visalia, California.

Members of the group are in their early twenties, come from 14 different states and 10 different denominations. They travel year around except for four "breaks" a year and use whatever mode of transportation is available—planes, lots of trains, rickshaws, and even oxcart.

Their faith and purpose make them adaptable. Unusual conditions are usual to them so the bus accident left them completely untroubled.

They hope to include Abernathy in their next concert itinerary.

City Sales Tax Revenue Is Up 8% From 1978

The sales tax revenue received by the City of Abernathy to Nov. 29, 1979, was 8% more than was received for the same period in 1978, according to a report from Texas State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Abernathy received \$7,137.73 for the month ending Nov. 29, 1979. For the same period in 1978, the city received \$6,645.22.

Total for 1979, to Nov. 29, amounted to \$44,408.74 for the city from sales tax. This compares with \$40,997.82 received to Nov. 29, 1978.

Mrs. McCurdy Bags A Doe & Two Bucks

Cecil and Mary Ellen McCurdy were invited to go to San Antonio for a visit and a deer hunt with David McCurdy, Cecil's nephew. They went to San Antonio on December 3 and spent the night and the following day they went to Pearsall, Texas to a ranch house and deer lease, where they spent two days and nights. The first morning at 6 AM they went to their deer stands, each being five miles apart. At 7:00 AM Mary Ellen had shot her first doe. Cecil and David picked her up at 10:00 AM and took the doe to be dressed and cleaned and they ate lunch. They went back to their deer stands at 12:30 PM and at 4:30 PM Mary Ellen shot an eight point buck and in twenty minutes she shot a seven point buck. Mary Ellen said, "she was scared, shaking, crying and very sick. When Cecil and David came for her they were very surprised to see she had killed two bucks. Cecil killed one doe David didn't even see a deer.

The following morning they packed the meat in ice and put it in the car and headed home. Mary Ellen said, "we have lots of deer meat, two sets of deer horns, and pictures wither and the three deer. The game warden took them. Mary Ellen said, "she never wants to go deer hunting again."

City Initiates New Policy On Brush Hauling

Brush and trash will no longer be hauled away by the city free of charge, decided Abernathy City Council at its December 10 meeting. Under new policy, there will be a minimum charge of \$5 plus whatever it costs the city to do the job (personnel wages, etc. figured on an hourly basis). The city manager will work out a definite rate schedule to go by. Citizens call City Hall to request the service.

SALARY INCREASES

The council reviewed city employees' salaries and granted cost of living increases to several. The maximum increase granted was 10%.

Salaries paid to city employees are public information and may be checked at City Hall.

LIBRARY FURNISHINGS

The council earmarked \$3000 to be used for furnishing the new library. The money is from bond issue funds left over after construction costs were paid on City Hall improvements.

Dan Ward, representing the Library Planning Committee, presented a list of things needed. It included a catalog file, circulation desk, magazine racks, and reading chairs and tables. The committee plans to have some of the equipment built locally to help get by as economically as possible.

PURCHASE ORDERS

The council voted to initiate the use of purchase orders for anything exceeding \$20. City Manager Rod Ellis said the system will promote better control over city finances.

GRANT APPLICATION

City Engineer Clayton Yeager presented the completed application for funds to finance Step 1 of an improved wastewater treatment system. Step 1 is a "feasibility and infiltration study" an analysis of the present system to see what needs to be done to make it comply with federal regulations.

The study will cost \$43,551. The grant will pay \$32,663 of that amount and the city will pay the remaining \$10,888.

If the application is approved, the grant money will probably be available next April. Step 1 will take about a year to complete; then the city will go on to Step II.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

The council voted to renew the city's contract agreement with Lubbock County Hospital District under which Abernathy's Volunteer Emergency Medical Service operates. The District furnished us with the ambulance; local volunteers man the service.

The council also decided to ask Hale County for more assistance in financing the service since so many calls originate in Hale County. The mayor and aldermen plan to meet with Hale County commissioners in January to discuss the situation.

OTHER MATTERS

The audit report on the agenda of the meeting was not ready so will be considered at the council's January meeting.

The council also discussed the problem of non-payment of the commercial sanitation rate by a local enterprise.

Three visitors and all councilmen were present at the meeting.

TURKEY SHOOT POSTPONED

The Turkey Shoot scheduled for Dec. 15 by the Petersburg Jaycees was postponed until Jan. 5.

DPS Estimates 123 Mishap Deaths During Holidays

AUSTIN--The Department of Public Safety today estimated that 123 persons would be killed in motor vehicle mishaps during the forthcoming Christmas and New Year holiday periods.

DPS Director Wilson E. Speir estimated that 67 persons would be killed during the Christmas Holiday week end and that another 56 persons would be killed during the New Year holiday weekend. Both counts are 102 hours long.

He added that the Christmas count starts at 6 p.m. December 21 and continues until midnight December 25, while the New Year count starts at 6 p.m. December 28 and continues until midnight January 1.

Speir said that statewide traffic deaths are presently running about six per cent ahead of the record pace of a year ago. Last year there were 3,980 persons killed statewide in motor vehicle crashes.

At the end of preliminary holiday counts last year 57 deaths were reported during the Christmas period and 39 during the New Year holidays.

Speir said all available DPS troopers would be on duty. State Troopers and local officers will be working together to keep traffic moving safely. "I have asked our officers to place special emphasis on removing drunk and reckless drivers from the streets and highways," he added.

"We will continue to work with the news media to keep motorists posted on unusual traffic conditions and to advise them when and why serious holiday wrecks are occurring," he said.

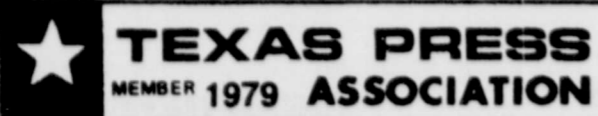

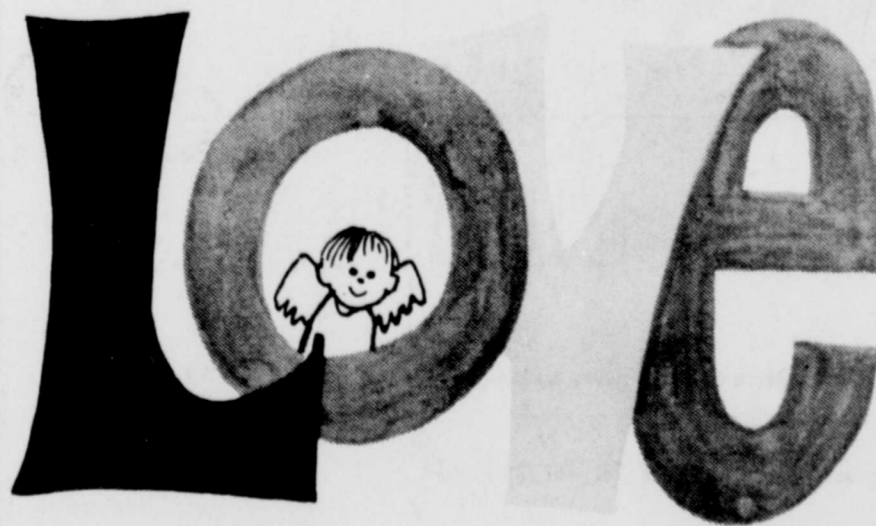

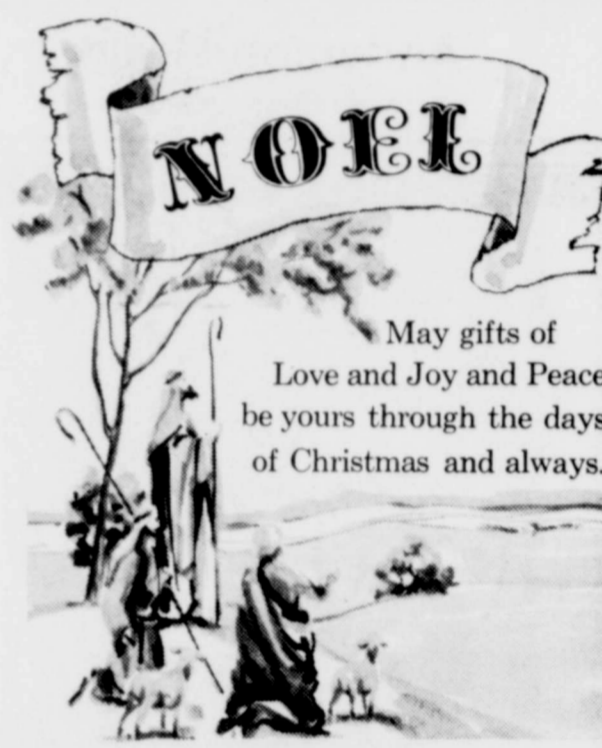
In the years past, I realize I did not appreciate those priceless treasures or care for them as I should have--but now I repent my carelessness and humbly ask you to remember me with another supply this

COLLEGE STATION... A child's self-esteem greatly depends on his family, says Diane Welch, a family life education specialist.

With others and with their environment. Parents can help again by recognizing successful experiences--and by minimizing failures.

Here are some suggestions on how: RESPOND TO CHILDREN--They need verbal responses when they're trying to communicate.

When parents ignore a child, the child feels worthless and undervalued of attention.

RESPECT CHILDREN--Treat a child with the same respect you would give another adult. State messages to the child in a positive way--with empathy and sensitivity for his feelings.

ACKNOWLEDGE FEELINGS--Let your child know you recognize the feelings--and the child's right to have them.

Help the child work on self-control and on expressing feelings in positive ways. MAINTAIN LIMITS--Children look to adults for control.

They feel more secure when consistent limits are set and followed.

They need to know and understand their behavioral boundaries.

They need to be guided by discipline that includes love and respect for each child.

ALLOW INDEPENDENCE WITH LIMITS--Allow each child experiences with independence, but make sure it's in keeping with his ability and within clearly defined limits.

Give a child the knowledge and understanding necessary to handle the situation.

As children gain independence and learn to make decisions for themselves, they learn to trust and appreciate their own opinions.

This forms the basis for self-control later in life. GIVE A SENSE OF FAMILY--Help each child see himself or herself as a useful, functioning member of the family.

Include them in family discussions, projects and tasks in accepting ways. Above all, help the child to see himself as valuable--with love, concern and respect of other family members.

Christmas Tree Is a Tradition In Many Lands

What would the holiday season be without a Christmas tree? Part of the enchantment of childhood memories is the recollection of the family tree, gaily bedecked and surrounded by temptingly mysterious packages.

State Offers Free Home Energy Payback Analysis

The State of Texas is offering a free home energy payback analysis. TEXAS CONSERVE provides homeowners access to a nationally developed computer program to calculate potential savings, or payback, from specific energy conservation actions. Energy payback calculations tell how long it takes different home energy conservation measures-like insulation, caulking, and storm windows - to pay for themselves in lower home utility costs.

The analysis being offered by the Governor's Office of Energy Resources will be localized and will consider climate utility rates, and local material and labor costs. The homeowner will supply the computer specific information on this home by filling out a simple form. About 10 days after the form is sent in, a computer printout will be mailed which provides information that can be used to decide which energy conservation investments make sense for the home.

A more energy efficient home can save energy, lower utility bills, and increase comfort level. The homeowner is the only person who can decide which energy efficiency improvements are within his budget and which have benefits which outweigh their costs. The home energy payback analysis provides the information needed to make these important decisions.

The questionnaire takes about 15 minutes to complete. All results and information are strictly confidential. 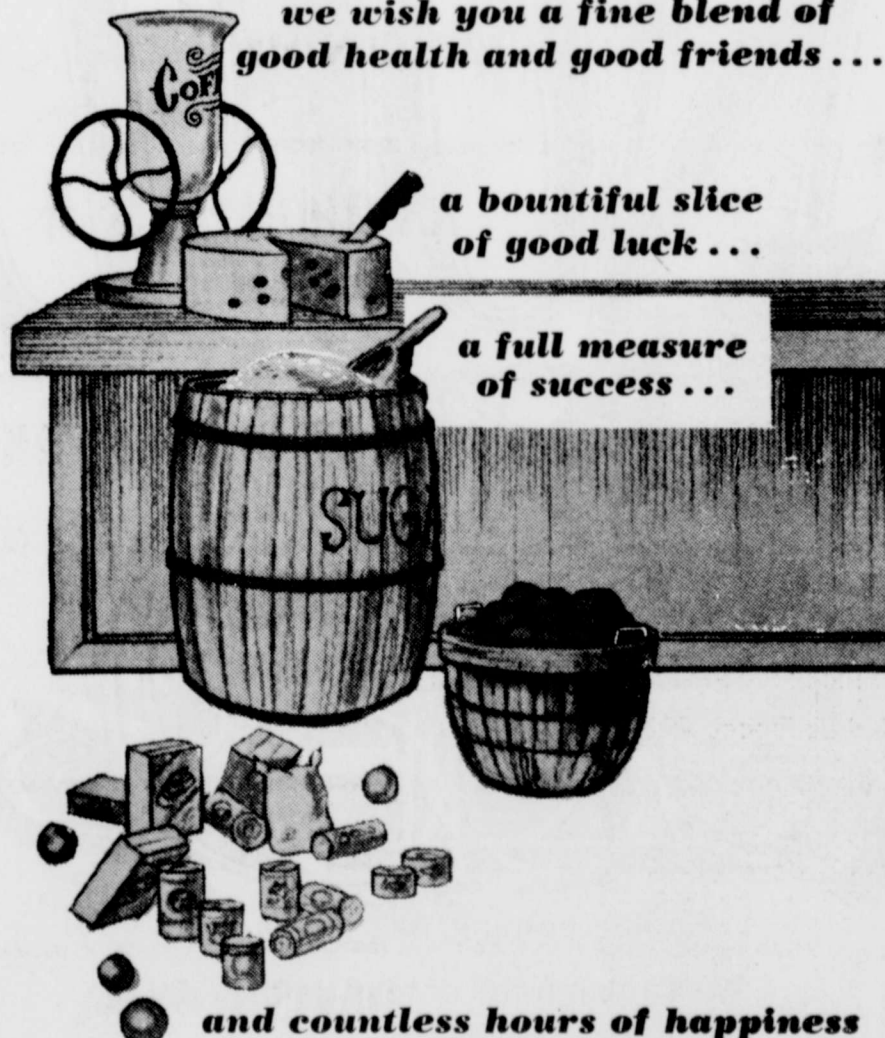

General People Planning Ahead

"Telephone service is expected to be available whenever it is requested. The work involved to prepare for the future may be taken for granted by many, but the service will be available—thanks to the work being done today in General Telephone Company's western area forecasting department", according to J. H. Davis, Memphis division manager.

Tom Gearhart, area forecast manager, and his forecasters, Mary Jane Kizer, Pat Grover, Larry Crochet, Bob Levo and Dave Steward carry the responsibility of preparing and maintaining accurate forecasts. These forecasts are one of the basic tools all departments use for planning and budgeting purposes. They determine when, where, and how much the telephone company must spend to assure that the right quality of central office equipment and outside plant facilities are available when needed.

The main step in constructing a forecast is to determine all the factors which affect demand for telephone service. This required a considerable knowledge of the exchange and its economy. The impact that factors such as the gas shortage or high interest rates might have on future growth must be considered. Other things that must be evaluated

include past growth trends, the housing market activity, and meeting company upgrading objectives. Valuable information can also be obtained by interviewing persons both inside and outside the company. Timing is also important. The more information the forecasters have in advance, the better. Forecasters must be constantly alert to the changing economic conditions.

"In the final preparation, many factors and elements must be analyzed, evaluated, and judged. Once this forecast is complete, equipment must be designed, engineered, and purchased. Manpower must be trained and available for installation and maintenance and the proper tools and vehicles must be obtained and allocated," Davis explained.

Foresight, imagination, and sound reasoning are essential to good forecasting. Forecasting is essential to General Telephone Company. Accurate forecasting will ensure that customers will have telephone service when they want, without creating a surplus of phones being held in inventory by the telephone company.

"The challenge of forecasting is keeping up with the rapidly changing conditions and striving for greater accuracy. The reward is a satisfied customer," Davis said.

ORDINANCE NO. 37
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR AND CREATING THE OFFICE OF CHIEF OF POLICE OF NEW DEAL, DEFINING THE DUTIES PERTAINING TO SUCH OFFICE AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE AND HIS REMOVAL.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEW DEAL, SECTION 1: That there is hereby created and established for the City of New Deal the office of Chief of Police; the Chief of Police shall be appointed by the City Council of the City of New Deal, and shall hold office at the pleasure of said City Council and shall be removable from office by said City Council as and when said City Council may deem it expedient.
SECTION 2: It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to attend upon the Corporation Court while in session and shall promptly and faithfully execute all writs and processes issued from said court. He shall have like power with the Sheriff of the County to execute warrants, he shall be active in quelling riots, disorders and disturbances of the peace within the city limits and shall take into custody all persons so offending against the peace of the City and shall have authority to take suitable

and sufficient bail for the appearance before the Corporation Court of any person charged with an offense against the ordinances or laws of the City. It shall be his duty to arrest, without warrants, all violators of the public peace and all who obstruct or interfere with him in the execution of the duties of his office or who shall be guilty of any disorderly conduct whatever; to prevent a breach of the peace and to preserve quiet and good order in the prevention and suppression of crime and arrest of offenders. He shall have, possess, and execute like power and jurisdiction as the Sheriff. He shall perform such other duties and possess such other powers and authority as the City Council may be ordinance require and confer, not inconsistent with the constitution and laws of the State of Texas. He shall give such bond for the faithful performance of his duties as the City Council may require. He shall receive a salary to be fixed by the City Council.
SECTION 3: That this ordinance shall become and be effective and in full force and effect on and after the 20th day of December, 1979.

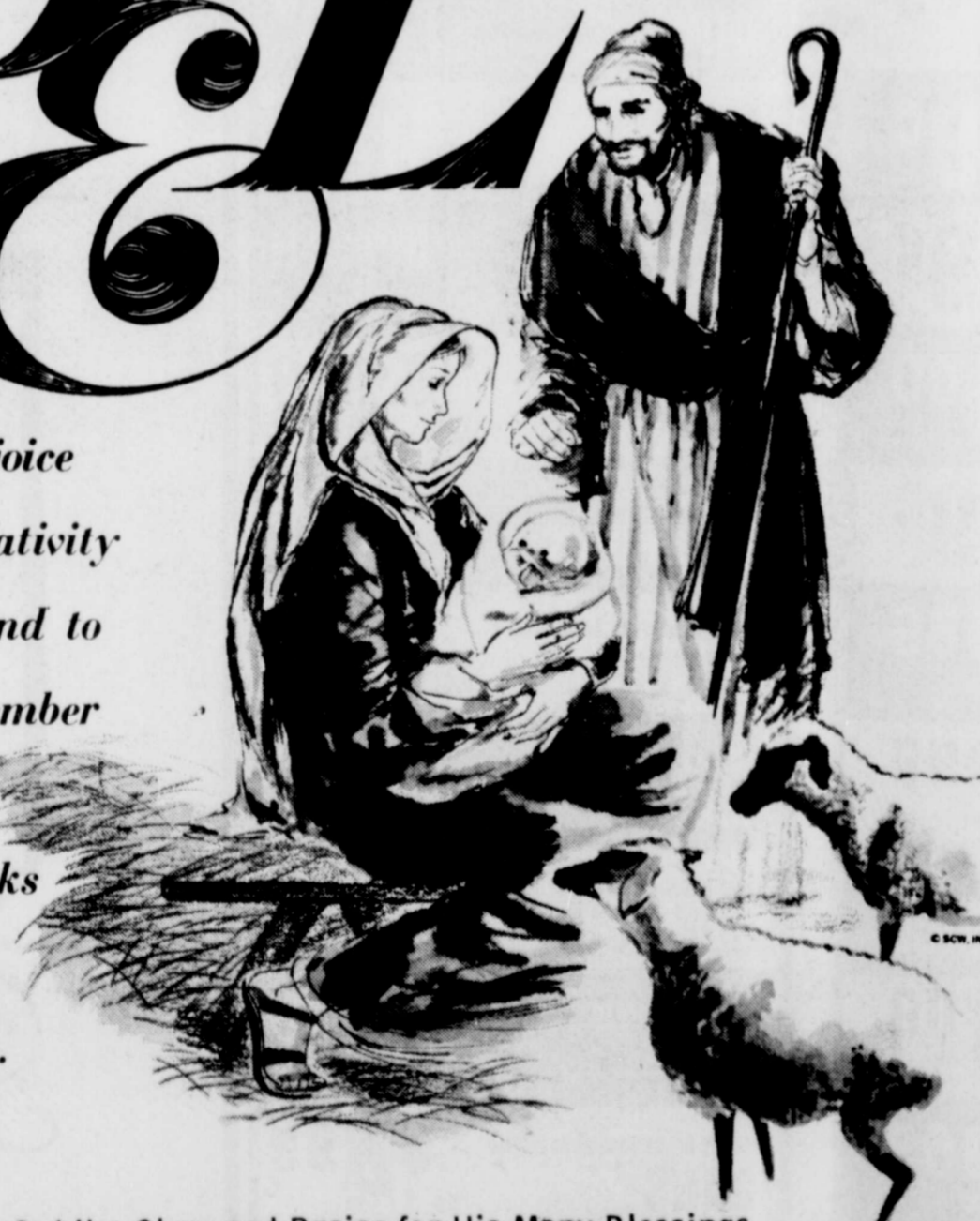

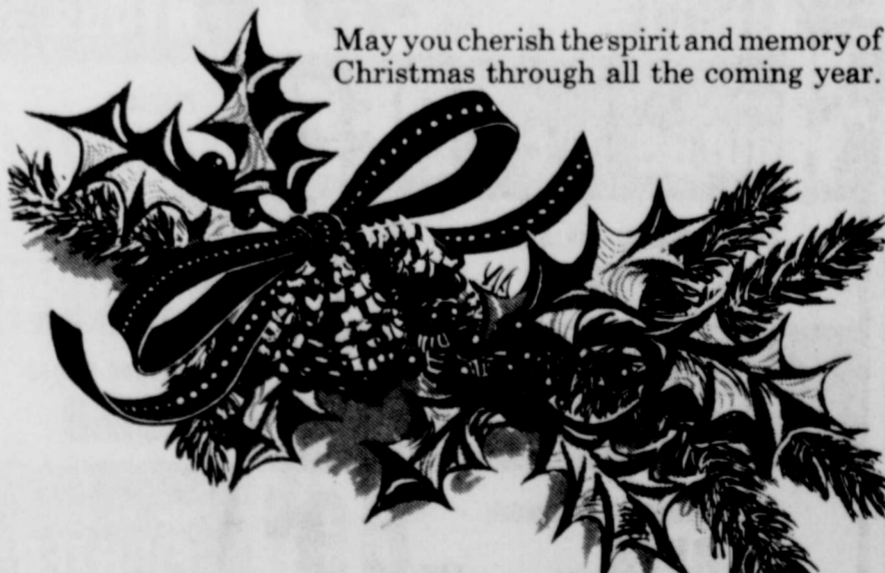
