## LOOKING BACK TO 1959

Americans held prisoner in Iran, a homeless Shah, terrorists doing what they please wherever they please, government blunders--it's hard to be optimistic about the new year. No matter what dangers the world faces though, everyday life for most people stays the same.

We checked back issues of The Weekly Review to see what happened in Abernathy when other years were just beginning. Here's a summary of the news for January 1, 1959. . . .

On Christmas Eve, Three shots were fired at an unnamed local man who went to the post office to get his mail about 8 PM. The man fell to the floor to dodge bullets which all missed.

The lucky citizen was one of two who discovered evidences of burglary at the post office that evening. One stayed while the other went for Deputy Sheriff Jay Daniel. A hidden burglar or burglars then made their get-away, firing at the man who stayed. Daniel was at Bridges Mobile Station getting his car serviced but the burglar got away by the time he could get to the post office.

Acting postmaster Herbert T. Hardin determined that the only post office property missing was two Colt .45 revolvers and about 100 rounds of ammunition, 1917 issue. The burglar took \$4 to \$6 of American Legion funds Hardin kept in a box at the post office. opened about 11 Christmas packages and a number of letters, and had tried to pry open drawers

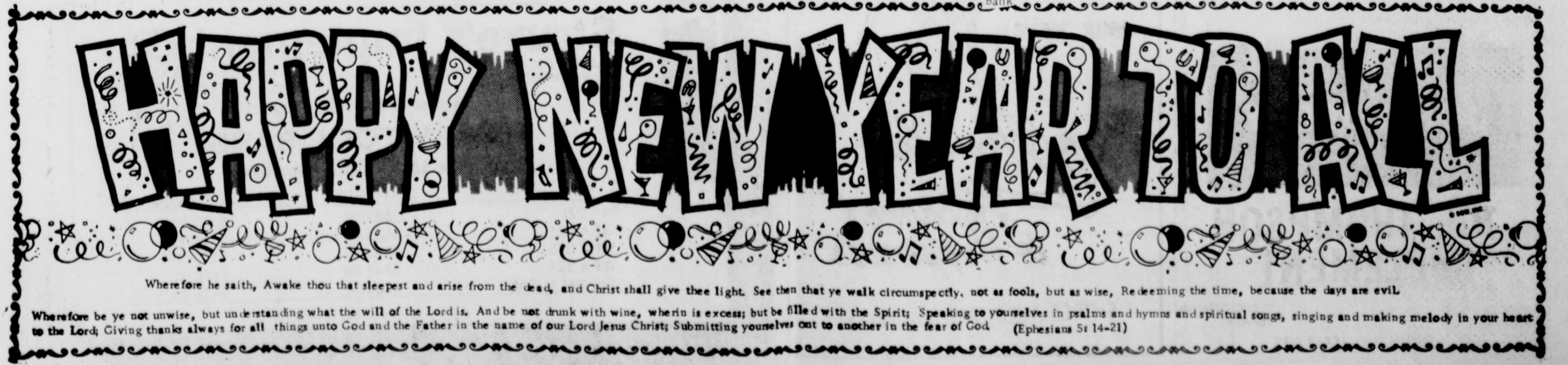
Reports indicate Garcia was repairing his car when the vehicle apparently slipped off of the blocks it was sitting on, crushing Garcia beneath it.

**Bids for highway scheduled**

AUSTIN — Bids for the improvement of various sections of highways in Bailey, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Parmer Counties are expected to be received during December by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The work will consist of seal coating the roadways with an application of asphalt and rock to promote waterproofing and help maintain roadway strength.

Bailey County: FM 1731 and FM 1760; Floyd County: SH 207; Hale County: FM 179 and FM 400; Hockley County: US 84; Lubbock County: FM 40 and Loop 289; and Parmer County: FM 1731.

CANYON — The West Texas State University department of agriculture business and economics is offering a special topics course for the spring semester entitled Farm Business Records.

"The course will deal with capital accounts, depreciation, inventory accounts, receipt and expense accounts, income statements, income estate tax management, use of farm record accounts and cash flow and operating statements," said Dr. Doug Williams, associate professor and head of agriculture business and economics.

The course will be offered at 9 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Registration for the course will be during WTSU general spring registration from 8:40 a.m. to 7:20 p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 9, in the Activities Center.

The course is a three-hour credit course and will be taught by Dr. Don Williams, associate professor of agriculture business and economics.

**Pioneer Hi-Bred Announces Major Poll On Transportation Issues**

PLAINVIEW--JANUARY 2, 1980--Texas farmers will have a unique opportunity to be heard on grain transportation issues through a poll announced today by Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc.

James W. Lindsey, president of Pioneer's Southwestern Division, today outlined details of the "Pioneer Poll on Grain Transportation" to be conducted in 16 major agricultural states to gather farmers' opinions on the current crisis in grain transportation.

"The purpose," Lindsey said, "is to find out exactly how serious our current transportation problems are, how they affect farmers in various regions and what farmers think should be done."

According to Lindsey, poll results will be publicized and shown to key decision-makers to give them a better understanding of farmers' views.

Pioneer dealers are responsible for distribution and gathering of completed questionnaires. Lindsey said, "Each dealer is encouraged to work for maximum distribution and return in his area by reaching all concerned grain producers."

Estimates are that this poll, available to all farmers, will yield as many as 75,000 completed questionnaires, possibly more.

"Polling this extensive is unusual," Lindsey said, "but so are the growing problems of grain transport facing farmers in many areas."

Prepared by Jefferson Davis Associates, a Cedar Rapids, Iowa research firm and Yankelovich, Skelly and White, Inc., New York, the questionnaire asks farmers to respond to more than 50 statements on grain transportation issues.

Subject areas include rural roads and bridges, railroads, barge lines as well as rates and regulations affecting grain carriers. Every questionnaire will be electronically scanned to provide the total result. Findings of this poll should provide the most complete picture yet of the current relationship of transportation and the American farmer, according to Lindsey.

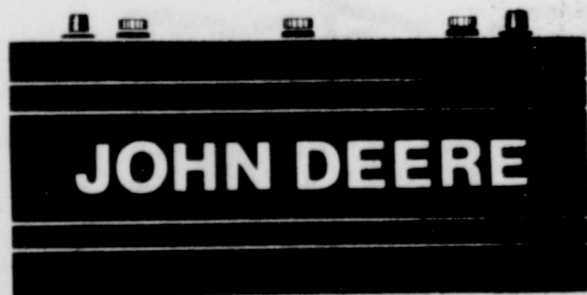

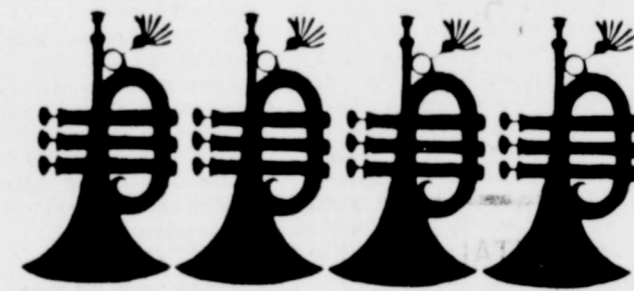

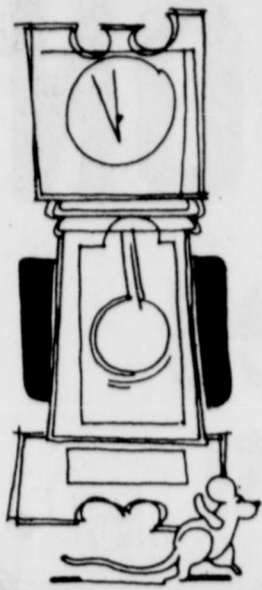

Gasohol In Texas Still In Question

While other states are proceeding with the large-scale production of alcohol to be used as "fuel extenders", such as "gasohol", attempts to develop a Texas alcohol fuels industry is still encountering political problems.

Questions of interpretation concerning recently-passed Texas law and the role of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission continue to re-appear. State Senator Raul Longoria (D-Edinburg) as chairman of the Special Committee on Gasohol in the Texas Senate, has requested an Attorney General's opinion regarding portions of the new law as well as an opinion on existing laws, their interpretation and enforcement by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Prompting Senator Longoria's request for the Attorney General's opinion was the Alcoholic Beverage Commission's (ABC) interpretation of the law last summer. Gasohol legislation had earlier been stalled in the Liquor Regulation Committee of the Texas House of Representatives until a compromise was agreed upon by the pro-gasohol proponents, the liquor lobby and the ABC's representatives to the Legislature.

Senator Longoria's request for an Attorney General's opinion centers around several questions, including

ownership, leasing arrangements, and the holding of dual permits by the same person or company.

The ABC interpretation restricts gasohol production to Texas residents only, forbidding out-of-state companies from locating new facilities in Texas as well as prohibiting the production of alcohol for cosmetics, pharmaceuticals, medicines and for food additives. Currently, alcohol production as a beverage is not allowed in Texas although liquors can be produced in Texas with imported, non-Texas alcohol.

The ABC's interpretation of the new Texas law has been criticized by State Senators lately in light of Texas being

the nation's top producer of alcohol, not from agricultural produce, but from petroleum.

## Electric Co-op Files for Increase in Rates

South Plains Electric Cooperative, which serves most of the Cotton Center area and farms south of Hale Center, has filed for a rate increase with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, to become effective with January 1980 billing, or as soon as legally possible after that date.

The application with PUC for a rate increase was filed November 21. The rate increase will vary with each class of electric service the cooperative offers, including residential, commercial, irrigation, etc.

The average increase is 10.45%. Although it varies substantially between types of service, the residential hike averaged 6.98 percent. The maximum increase will be 30 percent for mercury vapor lighting. Irrigation -- the co-op's largest service load -- will be roughly 16 percent increase. The increase in commercial rates will average about 14 percent for small accounts, scaling down to about 7 percent for large commercial users. Rate increase percentages are based on a test study year from April 1978 to March 1979.

The residential increase will amount to about \$1.43 per month for 100 KWH (kilowatt hours) upward to \$2.40 on 2,000 KWH per month. The average monthly increase for residential users is \$1.70. The increase will average \$5.25 per month for commercial accounts. It will vary from \$5.23 for 500 KWH to \$10.25 for 5,000 KWH per month.

Reasons for the increase are listed by W.C. Newton, cooperative general manager, as: 1. added operating costs; 2. added cost of new facilities and replacement; and 3. added cost of interest on long-time borrowing.

Newton added that spiraling inflation had affected labor and transportation costs, and costs of facilities -- both for new facilities and replacement and all related costs of operating the electric system. "These, plus escalating interest costs on borrowing actually prompted the rate increase, the first since January 1976," he explained.

Newton cited that the need for increasing rates was apparent in early 1978.

South Plains is seeking the rate increase for 17,819 customers, including 10,318 residential customers, in Crosby, Hall, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn, Floyd, Garza and Lamb counties.

The proposed increase would amount to a 10.45 percent hike in rates. South Plains Electric generates 253 million kilowatts of power, a PUC spokesman said.

The Lions placed eight players on the team, three more than either Hale Center or Lorenzo, which had five each.


