Notes and Comments...

N&C--The new edition (1980-1981) of The Dallas Morning News' TEXAS ALMANAC is being distributed. It is chock full of information. It lists Abernathy's estimated population as 2,812. This is an increase of 18 over the 2,794 estimated population appearing in the 1978-1979 edition of the TEXAS ALMANAC. What is your guess on Abernathy's current population figure? Mine is 3,000-plus. This year of 1980 is census-taking time again. Later this year, we should have the official census count.

N&C--Abernathy may have the shortest (2 blocks long) Main Street of any town its size, but it has the most highly concentrated city square of cities of any size. Centerpiece of the town is the Abernathy City Hall. The new addition attached to the city hall is the big Community Center which can accommodate a few hundred people at banquets and even more in a non-food meeting configuration of seating. The city hall-Community Center complex now features three separate meeting rooms: the former library room for small meetings, the original city hall clubroom for medium-size meetings and the big Community Center meeting room. Also, there is another large meeting room on the city square. It is in the new city fire-ambulance station. The fire station hall mainly is for the use of the Volunteer Fire Department members. However, it has been used by others on occasions. The city library, a project of the 1935 Study Club, is in larger quarters in the re-arranged and redecorated former fire station, also attached to the city hall building. The city square even has living quarters. One is above the current library, and was last occupied by Nannie Belle Ritchey, former night police radio operator. When the new station was built, living quarters were provided against the day when the fire department will have paid firefighter who will live in when on duty. Other city-owned buildings on the square are the Abernathy Post Office, a small brick building west of the new fire station, a stucco building on the NW corner by the city water tower, and the jail police headquarters/office for Department or Public Safety Troopers in a building on the west side of the square has served as a meeting place for Volunteer Firemen. City Council meetings, and for scouting sessions. A spacious parking area is on the east side of the city square. The contractor is in the final stages on the Community Center before turning it over to the City Council. (Mrs. J. B. N&C--According to a write-up and photos in a magazine, "Grain Producers News", December, 1979, edition, which The Review receives on a regular basis, former Abernathian Dennis Rhodes is general manager of the sprawling Kleberg County Farmers Coop complex south of Kingsville, Texas. Among other things, the Kleberg Farmers Coop includes a grain elevator and cotton gin. The magazine item, by Jerry Sinise, quotes general manager Rhodes on the 1979 crops. The gin produced 16,820 bales of cotton and the elevator handled 550 cars of milo. The story mentions Rhodes' 10 years as manager of Service Grain in Abernathy. And, prior to that, his connection with Plains Grain & Farm Supply in the insecticide and fertilizer department. The story also says that Rhodes' wife, Johnnie, now is a secretary for Morrison & Womack, CPA's, in Kingsville. Mr. and Mrs. Rhodes and son Ricky were here during the holidays. Ricky, who was active in 4-H/FFA livestock shows here and later at Kingsville, says this year he will be showing swine.

Fort Worth's Fat Stock Show Is Jan. 23-Feb. 3

FORT WORTH---Plans are being made for another big all-western parade through downtown Fort Worth to call attention to the 84th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Jan. 23 through Feb. 3.

Step-off time for the parade will be 2 p.m. Friday Jan. 25, reports C. L. (Chuck) Shytle, Stock Show parade committee chairman.

"We are pleased to announce that the march will be televised again this year," Shytle said. "Our parade can be seen locally on Channel 11, which will carry the program throughout Texas and into parts of Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico and Louisiana on its cable network."

Anyone wishing to participate in the parade should register with the Stock Show's special events department before Jan. 15. Shytle noted there is no charge for an entry, however, participants must be bands, marching units, floats on horse-drawn vehicles or riding clubs or individuals.

Unlike any other parade in the nation, the Stock Show march is all people and animals. Motorized vehicles are not allowed in the lineup as a matter of maintaining the western heritage of the event, the chairman said.

Last year 31 riding clubs, 21 floats and 19 bands and marching units participated. Awards are presented for outstanding efforts in different entry categories.

Joining the parade in recent years have been wagon trains and trail drivers who have come from as much as two weeks on the trail.

One such group, the Texas Trail Ride Association of Huntsville, Texas, will leave Centerville on Jan. 19 with plans to arrive for the parade. The 50-member association will camp at Buffalo, Fairfield, Richland, Rice, Waxahachie and Mansfield, reports executive officer Buddy Thompson.

The court voted to accept a bid from G and A Oil Co. of Petersburg for 10,000 gallons of unleaded gasoline to be stored at the new storage tank at the sheriff's office. The Petersburg firm offered to sell the fuel to the county for 94.78 cents per gallon.

The panel voted to transfer \$75,000 from the general fund to officers' salaries.

Postal Service To Sponsor National Letter-Writing Week 2/24-3/1

The Postal Service announced today it will sponsor a National Letter Writing Week from February 24 through March 1, 1980.

The objectives of the special week are to focus attention on the power of the written word and letter writing to shape opinions, preserve memories, lift spirits, and link people and to encourage more personal correspondence.

There will be special activities, highlighted by the publication of a new 64-page book, "All About Letters," prepared by the Postal Service with the cooperation of the National Council of Teachers of English. The book is designed for students in grades six through twelve and will be distributed by the Council.

During National Letter Writing Week, many post offices will offer to students special guided tours of their facilities and in some cases will send postal representatives to classrooms to talk and answer questions about the mail service.

In addition to schools, National Letter Writing Week will also be observed by business, media and trade associations. Museums, public libraries and other buildings of historic significance will be encouraged to display books about letters and letters written by famous people who have helped influence the course of human events throughout the ages.

The occasion will also be marked by the issuance of a special three-pair of U.S. postage stamps.

Prominent Americans in all walks of life are being asked to share with the Postal Service letters from their experience that have preserved memories, shaped opinions, and lifted spirits, the three themes to be stressed during Letter-Writing Week. The results of this survey will be made available during the Week.

Dodie Stokes, house manager of the Granbury Opera House, has had her share of good news in this season of glad tidings. Young Farmer Chapter Formed At New Deal

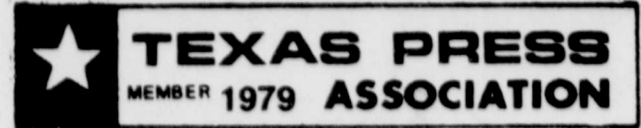

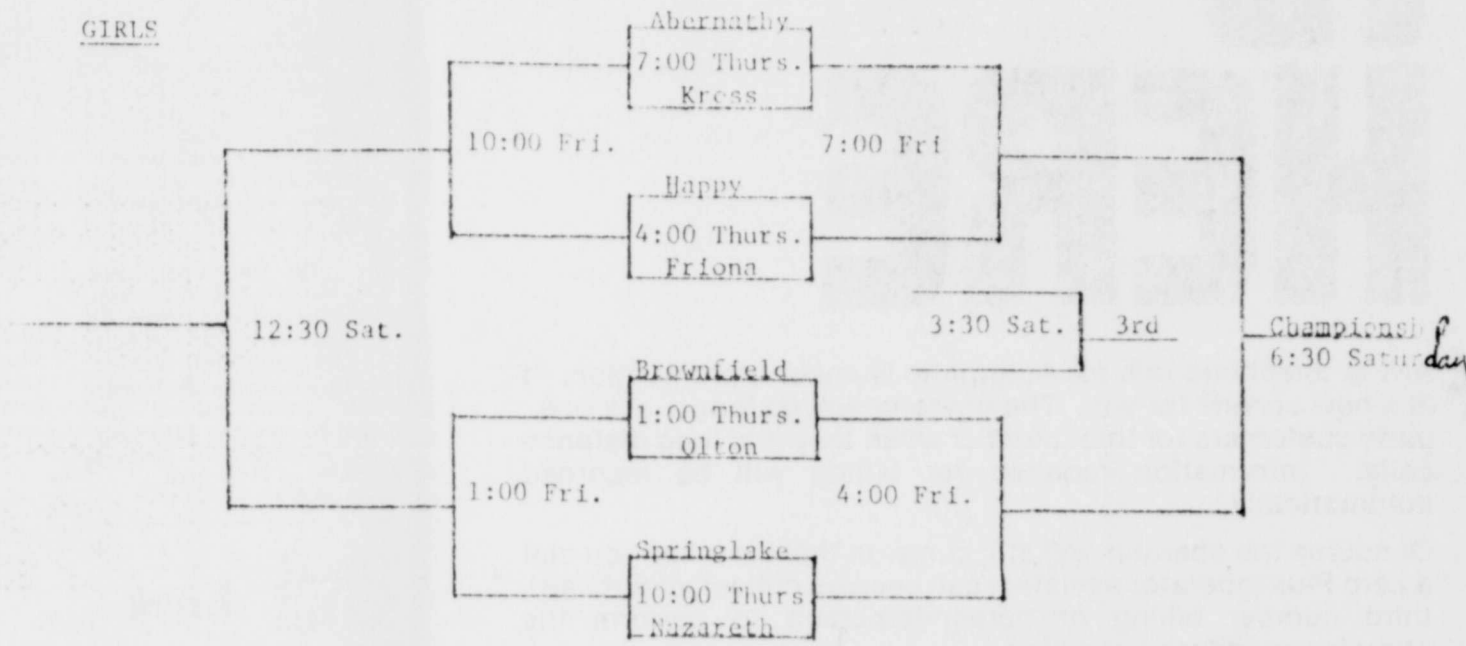

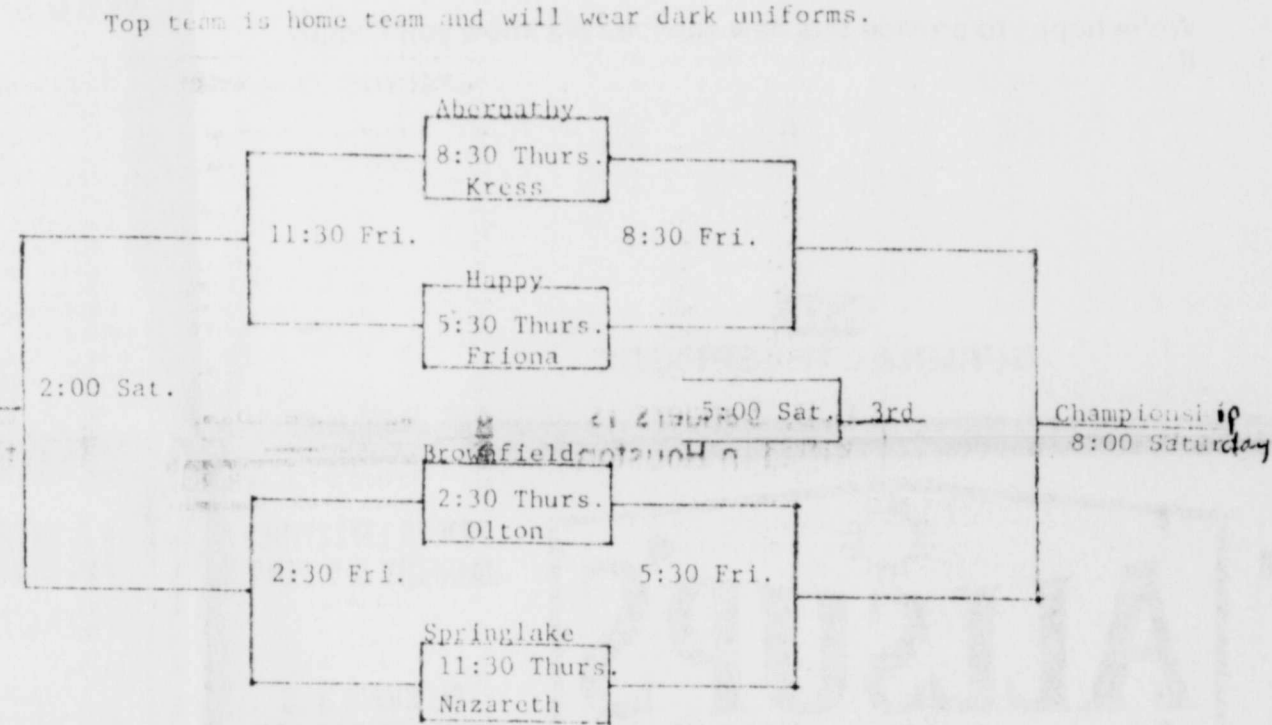
