A grand is the best instrument and a beautiful asset but would need the whole community's protection and care.

Other things that could add attractiveness and usability to the facilities may be donated. A local savings and loan firm has already expressed interest in making a donation and donations in memory of Abernathy citizens would be appropriate Ellis said the city will gladly accept donations. businesses or private citizens are welcome to contact him or a member of the planning committee about appropri-

After an executive session for review of the superintendent's contract, the board unanimously granted Dr. Delwin Webb a new three year contract effective July 1, 1980 and set his salary at \$11,000 per year above the minimum state scale with salary increments as earned and allowances for board approved out-of-district expense. The contract will be reviewed
