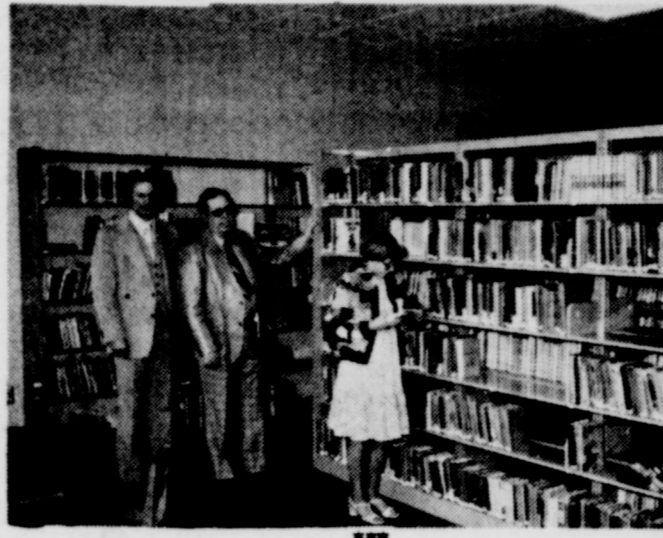
Mayor Pete Thompson, city council members and city manager Rod Ellis would like to thank everyone who had a part in the open house and thank each of you who came to view the facilities.

Football & Track Field Under Construction

Construction is well underway for Abernathy's new track field and football field. The new track field will no longer be a 440 yard track, but will be a 400 meter track field with an all weather surface. This surface will be made of reslite, a combination of asphalt and rubber.

Since the track will be all weather the problem of waiting three or four days after a rain is eliminated. With this new surface the track would be useable in an hour or perhaps less.

In almost every track meet held in the past, after some of the events or the rain, lines would have to be remarked with chalk, but this is no longer a problem, because the lines on the new track will be permanent.

There will be eight lanes, forty-two inches wide instead of the conventional thirty-six inches. Normally on the 36 inch wide lanes the hurdles would overlap, but with the forty-two inch there will be no overlapping.

Even the field events, such as broad jump, and pole vault will be held on the reslite surface. AHS also has some of the best jumping equipment.

The school board has said, we need a new fence with a turnstile. This will prevent bicycles from coming in and getting on the two fields.

More people will be able to use the track field without getting in each others way.

The Abernathy community seems to be becoming more and more interested in "jogging", the track field would benefit all you joggers.

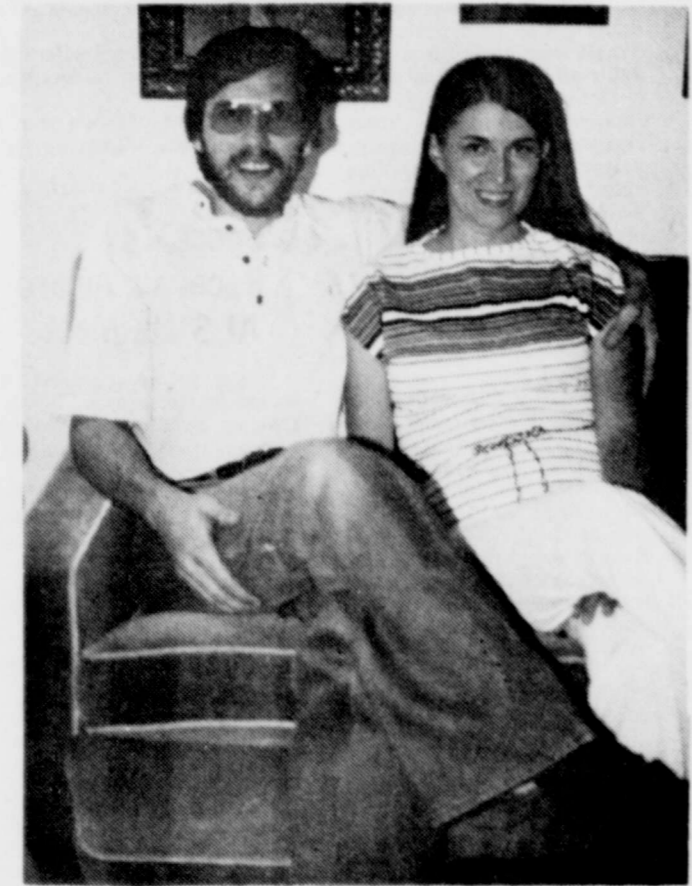

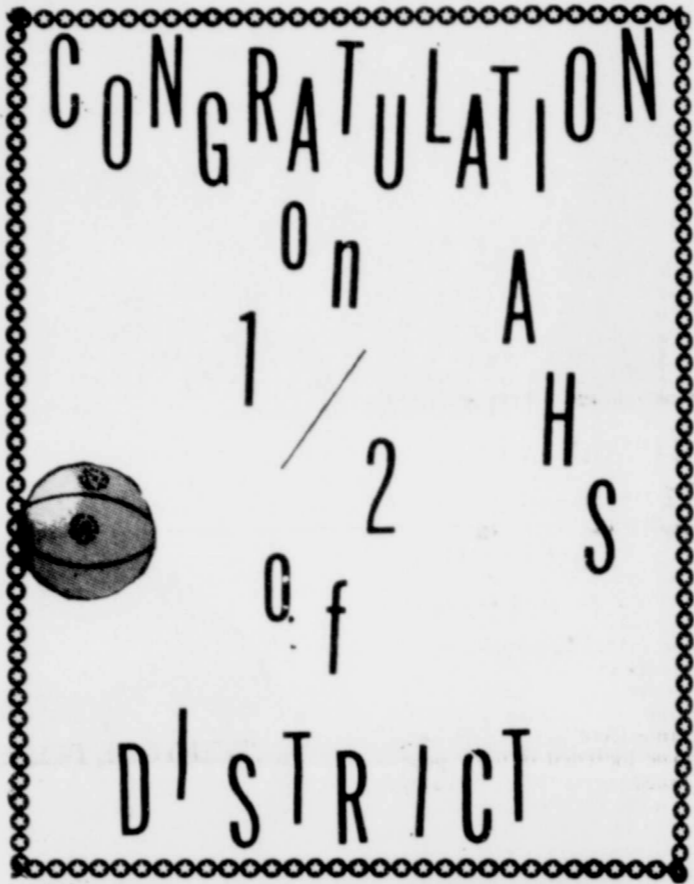

SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY:
 Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it needs to increase its retail rates by 14.78 percent to the customers in Texas served by the electric company.
 Information outlining Southwestern's needs is being presented to city officials in this area today. Formal filing with all regulatory bodies is pending.
 Bert Ballengee, executive vice president of SPS, said the increase is needed for three primary reasons: inflation, the high cost of money and the cost of switching from gas to coal.
 "Every one of us is affected by inflation including SPS," Ballengee said. "As our costs for making and delivering electricity continue to go up, the price must also go up."
 "Everyone of us is also affected by high money costs, including SPS. When we borrow money at today's record high interest rates or sell stock, people are actually letting us use their savings to build new power plants and lines and to build new equipment. If we do not give them a reasonable return on their investment, the people will stop letting us use their money and our ability to deliver electricity to our customers will be limited."
 "And everyone of us is affected by the change in the way we make electricity. We must build coal-fired plants instead of the conventional gas-fired plants because of cost, supply and government regulation. Coal-fired plants cost almost twice as much but the electricity will still cost less than continuing to burn higher priced natural gas," Ballengee said.
 Ballengee also said that based on existing rates being charged to all Texas retail customers, SPS projected revenues for 1979 will be less than the cost of service to those customers by \$42,637,065.00.
 The 14.78 percent increase is an average for all types or classes of customers. The increase will vary from one rate class to another. For example, the customer that uses 500 units of electrical energy per month would have an increase of \$5.43 per month.
 The increase in rates would not affect the rates charged to wholesale power customers.
 The last base rate increase in Southwestern's rates for retail service was based on 1977 costs and went into effect in October 1978 and amounted to about 7 percent, well below the amount the company needed at that time.

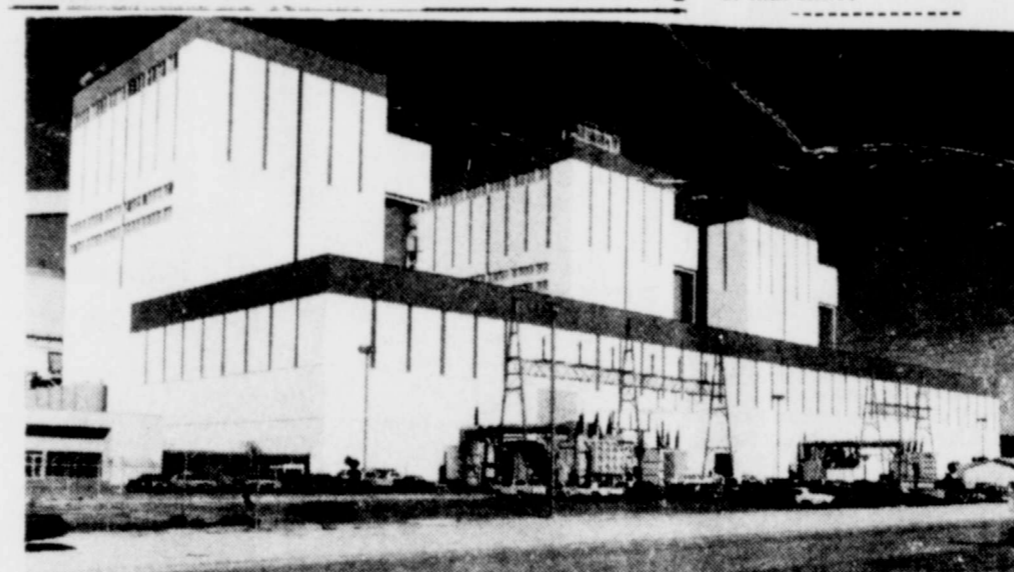

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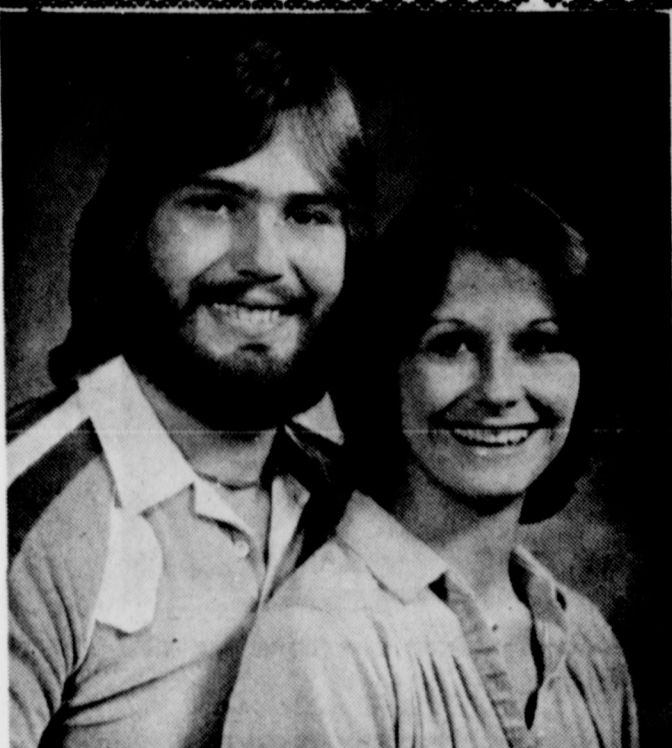

SPS coal-fired plant becoming reality

Blue steel reaches high in the air — almost 16 stories high — at Southwestern Public Service Company's Tolk Station. The coal-fired plant in Lamb County seven miles west and two miles south of Earth is becoming a reality — no longer just blueprints or a large hole in the ground surrounded by huge construction equipment, piles of blue steel, a few temporary construction buildings.

Although still two and a half years from scheduled completion, the unit is beginning to take shape — 20,000 yards of concrete have been poured, 1,750 tons of structural steel have been erected.

Tolk, like all of Southwestern's plants constructed since 1952, is designed and engineered by Southwestern personnel. No two units have been built exactly alike but the first and second unit at Tolk will be very similar. However, if new technology is introduced which would make the second unit more efficient or easier to operate, then changes would be made.

Southwestern is one of very few electric utility companies in the United States that design and engineer their own plants. This procedure has proven to be very efficient and economical — so economical in fact, that Southwestern's plants are built for about one-half of the national average per KW. And when you consider that the first unit at Tolk will cost well over \$200-million, the savings becomes apparent.

FOR THE LAST few years, Southwestern has put a new unit on the line about every two years but each unit takes longer than two years to construct. As Harrington III near Amarillo enters its last six months of construction, Tolk has been under construction for about 15 months.

At Harrington III, all major pieces of equipment are now in place. The boiler has been

tested for leaks. This boiler, like all boilers in Southwestern's plants, is custom designed and built to Southwestern's specifications but is assembled at the plant. After the boiler is in place, it is filled with water and pressurized or "squeezed" to locate any leaks. Some leaks, whether from factory or on-the-site welds, are normal but must be found and corrected before the boiler can be used. Each

major piece of equipment will be tested between now and March of next year, before the boiler is used.

Harrington III, like Harrington II, will use an emission control device called a baghouse. The baghouse at Harrington III is composed of 32 compartments with 204 bags in each compartment for a total of 6,528 bags. It operates on the same principal as a vacuum cleaner.

Tolk will also use a baghouse filter system but will utilize a different bag cleaning technique.

AT TOLK the railroad into the plant, while not complete, is usable. The first shipment of equipment into the plant by rail has arrived. The steam drum, one of the largest single pieces of equipment, hangs from huge steel girders high in the top of the plant with the building constructed around it. Its placement is a milestone in the construction schedule.

An innovation at Tolk is the use of fiberglass water pipes, 120 inches in diameter, underground from the plant to the cooling tower. The 55-foot lengths of pipe won't corrode and are easier to put in place than pipe previously used.

Tolk will use stainless steel condenser tubes — 278 miles of tubes — and, for the first time, stainless steel condenser tube sheets.

Tolk, like Harrington III, will be equipped with a Direct Digital Control system. There are only five or six systems of this type in use in the country at the present time. The Direct Digital Control (DDC) incorporates three computer systems; the boiler control system; the data acquisition system (or plant computer which is the eyes and ears of the plant operators and continuously monitors the efficiency of the plant); and the turbine speed and load control system. All systems can communicate at rates in excess of 1200 bits per second.

MOST OF the dirt work is complete and structural work will begin in December on the

coal-handling facility. This facility, unlike the bottom-dumping facility at Harrington, will feature rotary-dump cars. Railroad cars, moving through

a dumping building located over the coal stackout hopper, will be turned upside down while still attached to cars in front and back. This type dumping will minimize coal dust and will enable coal, when frozen, to be dumped much easier and faster. The rotary-dump cars are five to seven tons lighter than the bottom-dump cars and will carry that much more coal and still remain within the maximum gross weight per car.

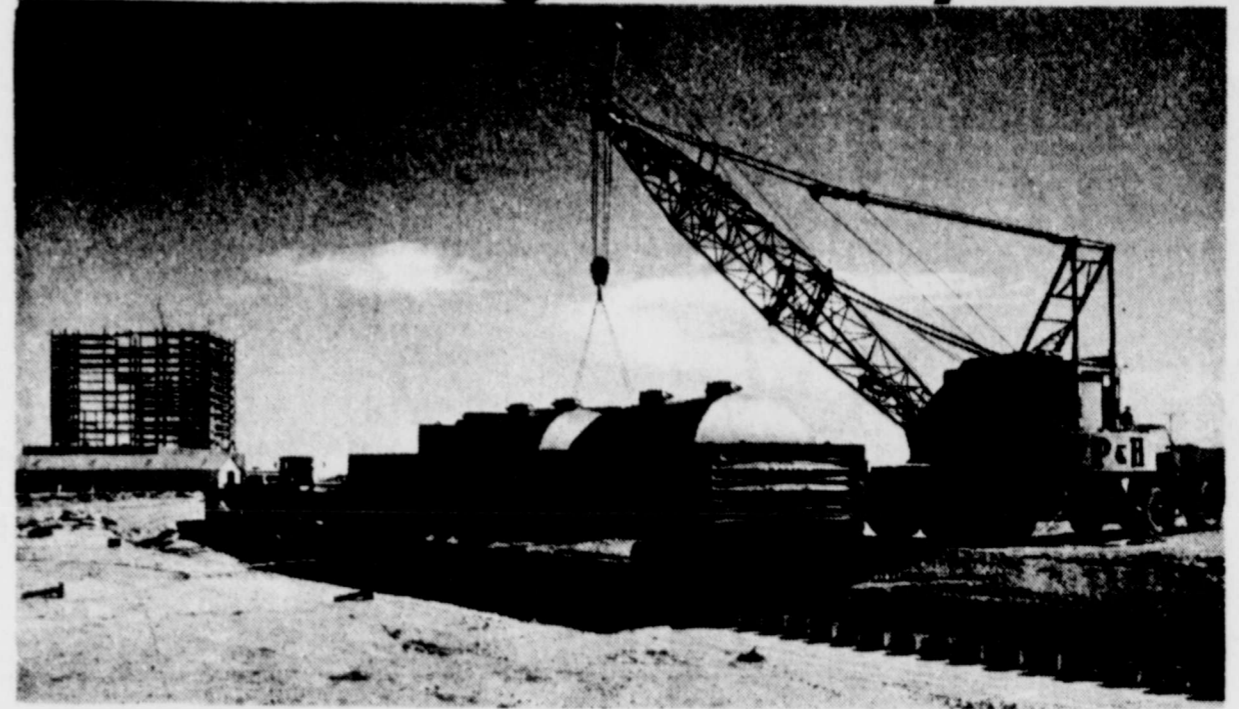
Tolk, with a capability of 543,000 KW, will be Southwestern's largest single unit. This one unit will generate more electricity than any of Southwestern's gas-fired plants and considerably more than a single unit at Harrington. Tolk will generate enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

One unit at Tolk will burn 296 tons of Wyoming coal per hour, 7,104 tons per day, 2,592,960 tons per year. Four trains, each composed of 110 cars, will be required to supply coal to Tolk.

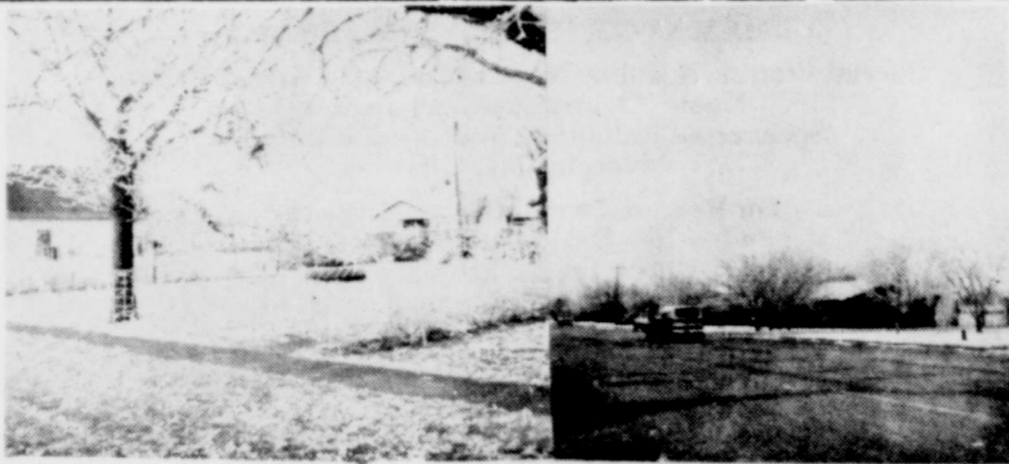
When the first unit at Tolk starts generating electricity in 1982, construction of the second unit at the same location will be well under way.

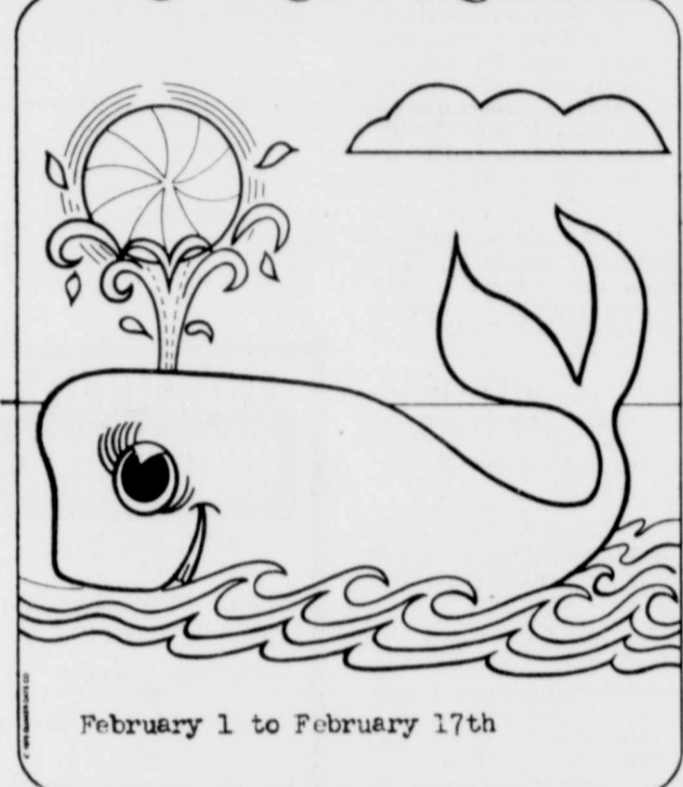
