

The Board, composed of a representative of the Office of Personnel Management, a Postal District Manager, and two postmasters, selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for appointment to each vacancy

Mr. and Ms. Moreland are members of the First Baptist Church and he has served as an adult Sunday school teacher. He is also a 32nd Degree Mason. Mr Moreland's postal career began in Lubbock, and he has served in many areas of the Postal Service, including the position of Senior Postal System Examiner. He was transferred to McAlester, OK, in March, 1978.



"I feel it is vital that the American people understand the






