In order to be chosen, the coaches select a committee, for the north and a committee for the south, and these committees choose fifteen of the best players in the surrounding districts to participate in the game. Carrie Lee was the only player in the Abernathy district chosen for the game.

Not only was Carrie Lee chosen for the North-South game this year, she has also been selected for the All Plains Team, also she was all district and this year honor roll in the Panhandle Plains Top of Texas Basketball book for Class AA (area sports people pick these players). District coaches picked Carrie Lee for the most outstanding player in the district.

Carrie Lee has played on the girls varsity team for the past three years. She made all district all three years. Her sophomore year Abernathy's girls were district champs, her junior year they were district co-champs, now in her senior year Abernathy girls once again are district co-champs finishing the year at 24-7. When Carrie was a junior she was awarded the Fighting Heart Award, by her fellow teammates, this award is for loyalty and dedication.

Carrie Lee's statistics this year are as follows, average points per game, 15, steals 88, rebounds 179, field goals 54%, free throws 62%, total points 428 and career points 1,186.

Tax Pamphlet Is Available At New Deal City Hall

Patty Pledger, tax assessor-collector for the city of New Deal, today announced the availability of a new 12-page pamphlet which will help local residents save on their property taxes. According to Patty Pledger, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates, and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens. The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

Information in the pamphlet is applicable to property taxes collected by all levels of local government, including counties, cities and school districts. Patty Pledger noted that homeowners are eligible for a \$2,000,000 city-homesite exemption from the value of their property.

Additionally, owners of agricultural land have the option of having such property taxed at its productive rather than market value. April 30th, 1980 is the rendition deadline for the city of New Deal, and Patty Pledger urged citizens to render their property and apply for exemptions or productivity values for which they may qualify before that date.

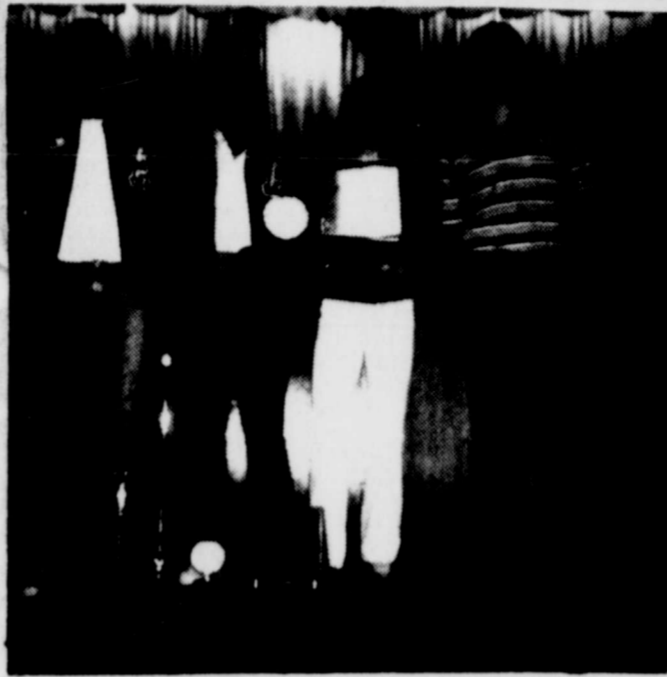
Donna Webb Named Manager LPG Supply For Sun Gas Liquids

Jody Smyers, a senior student and the president of the AHS student body called the assembly to order and led the group in the Pledge of the American flag. Smyers then turned the program over to high school principal Mitch LeMoine, who stated that he is very proud of the Antelopes and their coaches. He reminded the group that before the Antelopes left to go to Austin to play in the state tournament that he had said, the boys would be the state champs. Mr. LeMoine then turned the stage over to the Athletic Director, Larry Aldridge who commended the young men who went to Austin for a purpose, that being to bring home the silver trophy and the gold medals they wore around their necks. He also commented on the good conduct of these young men while they were there. Aldridge also stated that the AHS cheerleaders were the best, they out yelled any of the others there, the Abernathy fans were the best they out yelled the other fans and the support was the best. He also said, that it takes the

leadership of the school, administration to make this kind of trip possible, but there were two men who spearheaded it all and that was heard coach Carl Irbeck and assistant coach Delbert Dearing, who made the right decisions at the right time. Coach Aldridge, at this time ask coach Irbeck to come to the stage. Irbeck said, "this has been an tremendous honor and the support of everyone has made it tremendous." Warmer weather appears to be on the way, but there's still plenty of time for freezing temperatures over much of Texas, according to information compiled by the National Weather Service at Texas A&M University. Most southern areas are past the average date for the season's last freeze while the average date for the last freeze in South Central and East Texas is about mid-March. The average last freeze occurs in late March in northeastern, north-central and west-central areas and extends into April in the plains--as late as April 22 in the Panhandle. Farmers and gardeners should heed freeze dates when planting warm-season crops.

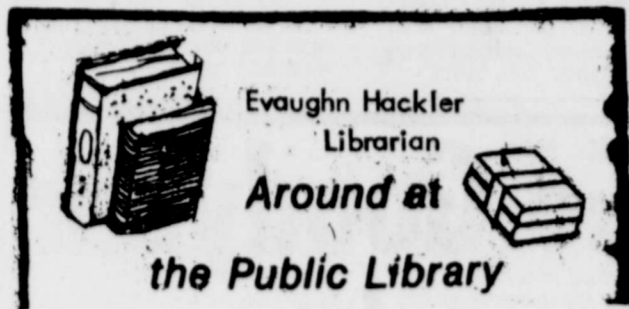

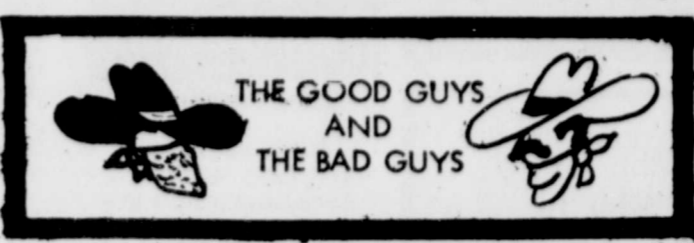

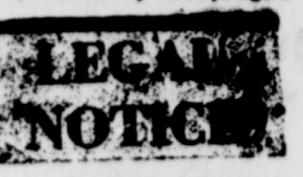

Early Spanish speaking settlers gave us towns and cities with religious names such as Los Angeles, Santa Fe, and San Antonio.

Repairing Rates Increase Story

REPAIRING RATES INCREASE STORY:

"Repair work" is needed on the story in last week's Review about the City of Abernathy raising water and sewer rates, and about General Telephone, Southwestern Public Service and Pioneer Natural Gas Company seeking rate increases through state agencies. The statement that General, SPS and Pioneer all three were seeking rate increase through the Texas Public Utility Commission was in error.

General Telephone and Southwestern Public Service Co. are going through Texas Public Utility Commission in seeking rate increases. However, Pioneer Natural Gas Company filed a statement of intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas proposing to increase natural gas rates to a list of large volume special contract customers (see list of customers in a legal notice in this issue of The Abernathy Weekly Review).

Although the rate increase sought by Pioneer is not directly aimed at residential and the average business customers, it is reasonable to assume that the large volume special contract customers of the gas company will, if the raise is granted, pass the increase through to their customers who are the consumers of their products and services.

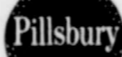

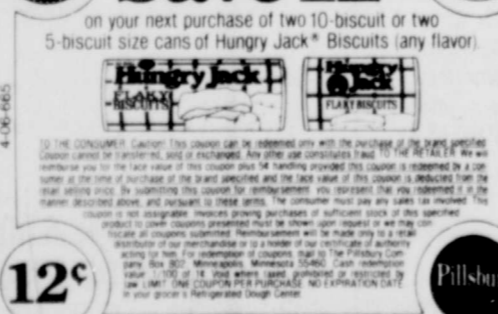

Inflation has been on everyone's mind so much lately that it now rivals the weather as a topic for small talk. Almost everyone with the responsibility of supporting a family or even just themselves has worried about how to cope with today's rapidly rising prices.

Government statistics indicated the overall inflation rate for 1979 was approximately 13.4 per cent, one of the highest ever for the United States. At this rate, the price we pay for goods and services will double in just over five years. Statistics released for January indicate the worst may be yet to come. February statistics, when released, will probably show an annualized inflation rate hovering around 20 per cent. No economy anywhere has ever been able to survive a rate this high for a prolonged period.

Inflation is not caused by a single event in the economy but rather is the total result of every economic event that occurs. Every financial transaction, every minute of labor, every technological discovery has some impact on the economy. Some events are depressive, some are inflationary and some seem to have a stabilizing effect.

The economy could be likened to a round ball on a flat surface. As long as the surface is held level, the ball will remain generally steady. Tilt the

surface and the ball begins to roll slowly at first, but the longer it remains out of balance, the faster the ball rolls and the harder it is to stop. If the surface is not tilted back, the ball finally reaches the edge and falls. Too much adjustment to the tilt of the surface and the ball speeds in the opposite direction with equally disastrous results.

Individually, there is not much we can do to correct the national economy. Rather, we must be concerned with economic survival for ourselves and families. How do we cope?

If it could be determined how far the ball was going to roll in one direction, solutions would be easy to find. As long as the ball rolls in an inflationary direction, additional purchases of durable goods such as housing, land and automobiles should be considered. The more financed, the better. As the ball picks up speed and the rate of inflation surpasses the interest rate, the repayment of the debt becomes relatively easier. The dollars used to pay off the debt will be more plentiful and easier to obtain than when the purchase of the goods was originally made.

The problem with this kind of philosophy is that should some event such as government action or other influences in the economy cause our imaginary surface to level out or tilt back the other way, the ball is going to slow down or completely change directions, and with the

inflationary ball rolling backwards, dollars become tight and repayment of debts is more difficult than when the purchase was made. The result could mean foreclosure or mortgaged property and possibly economic ruin.

Without the benefit of a crystal ball to determine what the future holds in store, what can be done to minimize the impact of a volatile economy? Although factors such as age, financial income and long term objectives influence every economic decision, the following should be considered in any situation.

A. Savings: A savings account at a bank, savings and loan or other financial institution should be established. An amount should be accumulated in the account to cover living expenses for three to six months should no income be available. During a period of high inflation as we are currently experiencing, the savings account is going to lose purchasing power. The interest earned less income taxes paid on these earnings will not equal the loss due to inflation. However, the security of the savings account and the protection in the event of a reverse in the economy more than justify the account.

B. Real Estate: The "piece of ground" concept is applicable in today's economy. The "piece of ground" concept means a home or small acreage which is owned free and clear of any mortgages or encumbrances. Real estate will generally hold its value relative to automobiles, clothing and bushels of apples even though the purchasing power of a dollar rises and falls.

C. Other Investments: Once the "piece of ground" concept is satisfied, other investments should be considered. The investment should be undertaken only when economic ruin would not result if lost. If interest rates can be arranged that are lower than the rate of inflation, the maximum possible amount of the investment should be financed. Investments should be of a durable nature such as land, rental property or business equipment. An ideal investment is one that produces an annual return on the investment sufficient to liquidate the debt in 10 years or less.

Stocks and Bonds: In theory, the value of a share of stock in a major company should rise at least as fast as the rate of inflation. However, during recent years, the average share of stock has lost ground when compared with the C.P.I. (Consumer

price index). Still, a good, blue chip stock offers an outlet for your investment dollar and will offer some protection against erratic changes in the economy. Generally, the increase or decrease in the value of a stock in a major company will move slowly.

Highly rated bonds will generally pay an interest rate lower than currently available at most banks and savings institutions. Because of this, they are often discounted so that effective yields are competitive with other interest bearing securities. If the economic ball begins to roll back in the opposite direction, the amount of discount will be reduced and a nice gain could be realized on the sale.

E. Higher Risk Investments: Normally, the higher the risk the investment is, the greater the potential return. This is not always the case. Some investments have an extremely high risk factor with only a minimal potential return. Investments promising unusually high returns should be investigated very carefully, particularly when promoted by someone not personally known. High risk investments would include gold, silver and other precious metals, diamonds, high risk stocks and shares in

oil wells. Unless investments of this nature are your business, it's generally best to avoid them. True, many fortunes have been made with gold, silver and oil during the last few months and many more may be made in the future. But the risk is equally as great that these fortunes will be lost. It's no accident that those who do consistently well in this market. Generally, they are in an inside position and have knowledge of world events which influence these markets before it's available to the small investor. Sure, your fortune can be made in high risk investments, but before getting in, be sure you can handle the loss of a significant part of your investment if things don't go as planned.

In summary, a contingency reserve should be established in the form of a savings account. A home or "piece of ground" should be acquired and then additional investments should be undertaken. The greater your ability to withstand a loss, the greater risk you can take. Thoroughly investigate your investment alternatives before jumping, and be highly suspicious of any program promising unusually high returns. Deal with professional individuals and organizations, preferably with which you are acquainted. Resist the temptation for luxuries that have no lasting value, particularly if financing will be required for the purchase. In the long run, you'll be dollars ahead.

EASTER WAYS WITH MICRO WAVES



BROWN PUDDING
Total cooking time: 13 minutes

2 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs (3 slices)
1 cup buttermilk
1 cup packed brown sugar
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 egg
1 cup all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup raisins
1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts
Sifted powdered sugar
Whipped cream

Soak bread crumbs in buttermilk for 5 minutes; set aside. In mixer bowl, cream together brown sugar and butter, add egg and bread mixture. Beat till smooth. Stir flour, soda, cinnamon, and salt together thoroughly; blend into creamed mixture. Stir in raisins and walnuts. Turn into oiled 5 1/2-cup microwave ring mold.

Cook at MEDIUM for 12 minutes, giving dish quarter turns, three times. Cook at HIGH for 1 minute. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from mold. Cook thoroughly. Sprinkle with powdered sugar. Serve with whipped cream. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

MICRO TIP: Rushed schedule? With a microwave oven, you can whip up home economists, you'll always be able to fit in a quick meal. Slippy Joes take only 5 minutes; crumble 1 lb. ground beef in a casserole. Add chopped vegetables and seasonings; cook, uncovered, at HIGH for 5 min., stirring 3 times. Drain off fat; add one 10 1/2-oz. can condensed tomato soup and dash Worcestershire sauce. Cook, covered, at HIGH for 3 min. or till hot. Serve on hamburger buns.

BAKED DEVILED TOMATOES
4 large tomatoes, halved
Seasoned salt
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons chopped celery
1 tablespoon chopped green onion

Place tomatoes, cut side up, in 12x7 1/2x2-inch baking dish. Sprinkle generously with seasoned salt. Spread cut side of tomatoes with mustard. In small bowl, melt butter at HIGH for 30 seconds. Stir in green pepper, celery, and onion; spoon over tomatoes. Cook, uncovered, at HIGH for 5 minutes or till heated through. Makes 8 servings, approximately 61 calories per serving.

HEAVENLY GLAZED STRAWBERRIES
1/2 cup water
2 tablespoons strawberry jelly
1 tablespoon orange liqueur
2 cups fresh strawberries

In 2-cup glass measure, combine water, strawberry jelly, and orange liqueur. Cook at HIGH for 2 minutes or till boiling; stirring twice. Pour over strawberries. Serve immediately or chill sauce 1 to 2 hours before serving over berries. Makes 4 servings, approximately 65 calories per serving.

MICRO TIP: Squash is a delicious, low-calorie vegetable and microwave cooking makes it easy and fast to prepare. Take two 8-oz. acorn squash; prick with tines; cook whole for 6 minutes at high, rearranging once. Cut in half and remove seeds. Brush with margarine and sprinkle with paprika; return to oven for one minute. One-half cup squash has approximately 56 calories.

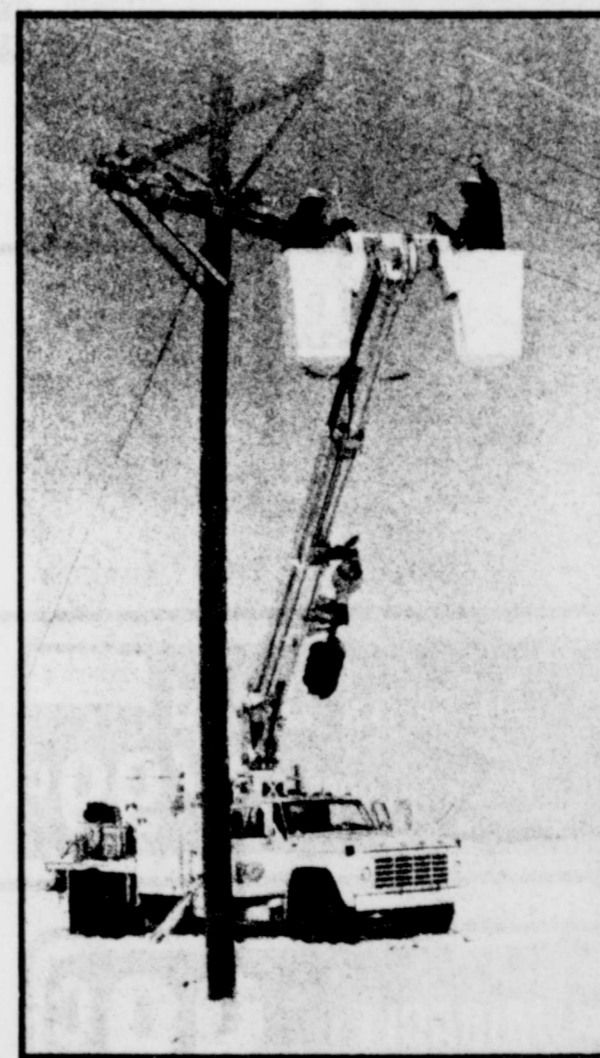
